The four princesses, one from each school which entered contestants, were in evening gowns for the final judging. They are Kathy Williams, Warren; Alice Dell Odom, Spurger; Jill Ogden, Colmesnell, and Kay Williams, Woodville.

One of the princesses will be queen, one will be princess of Tyler County, and the other two will be princesses from their communities.

Tickets to the coronation and pageant on April 4 are on sale at Citizens State Bank, Jarrott's Pharmacy, Best Pharmacy, Wartfield's, McClure Furniture and Woodville Inn. Those planning to attend are urged to purchase tickets now in order to assure themselves seats for the colorful event.

Ten Trail Rides Head For Western Parade Saturday

The Western Parade at 2:00 p.m. Saturday will be made up of ten trail rides which will start Friday and arrive in Woodville Saturday in time to participate in the ride through downtown from the starting point west on Highway 190.

Bob Bell, chairman of the western weekend events, said that at least 1500 horses and riders plus several other entries will make up the long parade which, with good weather, is expected to have at least 5,000 spectators lining the parade route.

The parade will begin from a point west on Highway 190 just past Tyler County Hospital. It will come eastward through the business district to Magnolia street and will turn north.

The western parade, as usual, will have no motor driven vehicles in it.

Mr. Bell said that to help the spectators identify the various trail ride groups public announcing systems will be set up at Cartwright's Food Town, the Methodist Church, Village Gulf Service, Rainey's Enco Station, across from Woodville Inn, and at Brookshire Brothers.

Trail riders in the order they will appear in the parade are Schwab City Trail Riders, Spurger Brush Riders, The Roughriders, Baytown; Tri-County Trail Blazers, Beaumont; Wildwood Stables, Wildwood Resort; Texas Saddle Club, Colmesnell; Corrigan Trail Riders, Dogwood Trail Riders, Livingston; Tyler County Youth Riders, Spurger; and Voth Night Riders, Voth.

At 3:30 p.m. Saturday, a Youth Rodeo will be held at the 4-H and FFA Rodeo Arena two miles west of Woodville on the Livingston highway. The arena is reached on the Tyler County Airport Road.

Trophies for winners in both the parade and the rodeo will be awarded, Bell said.

Trailride activities will begin on Thursday night with a Western Dance in Schwab City. Voth Night Riders will camp out in Kountze Thursday night and begin their ride Friday morning. Tri-County Trail Blazers will have a Western Dance at Triple D Guest Ranch Friday night.

Texas Saddle Club will have a Chicken House Dance on Friday night at Lovers. Lookout north of Colmesnell. Spurger Brush Riders will have a trail ride dance at Chapman Ranch west of Spurger. The Tyler County Youth Riders will have a Play Day on Friday night at the youth arena. In Spurger, Dogwood Trail Riders will have a dance in the Indian Springs Subdivision, east of Livingston on Friday night.

From 7:30 to 11:30 p.m., a ten dance will be held in Kirby Gym with an admission fee of \$2.00 for stag and \$3.00 for couples. The Brevities will play and this dance will be chaperoned.

The western dance from 8:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. will be held in Canada Gym with admission fee of \$2.50 for stag and \$4.00 for couples and will feature Clarence Wellford and the Nite Lites.

Census Forms Are In The Mail

Questionnaires for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by the Post Office beginning March 28 to all households in this area. District Manager M. M. Flournoy announced this week.

Distribution of this form before the start of the household canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member and about the house in advance of the census taker's visit. The District Manager urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The form contains 7 questions about every person in the household and 13 questions about the dwelling. The personal information asked for is: name, address, sex, color, or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is: number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

Most of the questions are answered by filling in the proper tiny circle with a common lead pencil, making a tiny black dot which can be "read" by Census Bureau machines. Residents should read the instruction sheet which will come with the questionnaire, before filling it out.

The census taker will check the questionnaire to see that all questions have been answered and will give any assistance needed in filling out a questionnaire that is incomplete. At every fifth household, the census taker will seek answers to additional questions covering population and housing characteristics that are being asked of a 20 percent sample of the Nation's population. The sample questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The District Manager pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports, and census information cannot be given to any other Government agency, local officials, tax collectors, police, health, welfare, or school officers, nor to anyone else.

Business Men Support Bonds

Business and professional men in Woodville are joining to urge the voters of the city to approve the \$500,000 bond issue for the expansion of the water and sewer systems and bring a poultry processing plant to Tyler County. The bond issue will be voted on at the regular city election on April 4.

Jim Gainey, who is president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, and other leading business men will run ads this week and next week in the Booster in support of the bond issue.

Mr. Gainey said that one point that confuses many persons is the difference between "revenue" bonds and regular tax bonds. In a revenue bond election, the city is bound by its election order to retire the bonds from revenue received for services (sewer, water and gas).

Mr. Gainey pointed out that the poultry company, in addition to a minimum of \$20,315 annually for these services, which includes \$1275 annually in lieu of city taxes (it will be outside the city limits). It will pay school and county taxes, however, at the same rate per \$100 valuation as other individuals and businesses.

"We can't afford to pass up this opportunity to get an industry which will help all our citizens," Mr. Gainey said.

Houston Bicycle Club Members To Tour County

Fifty members of the A.V.H. Bicycle Club of Houston will be in Tyler County April 4 and 5 and plan to ride in the Dogwood Festival Parade on April 4.

The group will stay at the Triple-D Guest-Ranch near Warren and will tour by bicycle the areas south and north of Woodville. They will ride about 60 miles each day. Although the tour is being sponsored by the Houston A.V.H. Bicycle Club there will be about 25 guest riders from Baton Rouge, San Antonio, Dallas, Temple and Tyler.

Some of the riders in the group which will be here have ridden as much as 200 miles in one day, according to Virginia Hancock, secretary of the Houston club.

Motorists are asked to watch for the bicycle riders in order to help prevent accidents. They will ride on Farm to Market roads south and north of Woodville.

The Houston A.V.H. Bicycle Club sponsors tours for members as well as weekend rides. Its officers are Bob Giese, president; Don Wing, vice president; Virginia Hancock, secretary; and Doug Fennell, treasurer.

Cypress Creek Water Supply Gets State Okay On Well

The State Department of Health has sent a favorable report on the water sample from the new well of the Cypress Creek Water Supply Corporation, according to Bertis Best, president.

The water supply corporation's board of directors will meet today (Thursday) with representatives of the engineers, construction company, and Farmers' Home Administration. They are that the installation of the distribution system can begin immediately, Best said.

The Cypress Creek water system will have 19 miles of mains to serve its 94 charter members plus any others who might want to join now that the well is completed. If the water sample is approved the district plans to have the system in operation by Fall.

The district's water system will run from past the Harmony church northward to the Kirkland place on FM 256; west to Lee Grimes and east to within about a mile of the Woodville city limits.

That explains the 19 miles of mains which will have to be installed to serve the district's members.

The district secured a Farm Home Administration loan for \$102,000. Charter members paid \$50 to jobs which includes the water meter and tapping in expense. However, those joining later will have to pay the \$50 membership plus the cost of the water meter and tapping expenses. This will run to at least \$125.

Besides the president, other officers are Lloyd Fortenberry, vice president; Mrs. Marion Oates, secretary. The board of directors includes the officers and Luther Owens and Bill Grimes.

Woodlands Trail Dedicated Tuesday

W. F. Crawford, of Jasper, president of the Texas Forestry Association, was speaker at dedication services Tuesday for the new Dogwood Woodlands Trail along Theuvinh Creek just off Highway 190 three miles east of Woodville.

Jim Freeman, Woodville mayor, and Jim Gainey, chamber of commerce president, welcomed the addition of the new trail to Tyler County's attractions. Marvin G. Angle of Nacogdoches introduced several of the personnel of International Paper Company here who worked to complete the trail including W. F. Sanders, district woodlands superintendent for International, and Roy Peterson.

Carl Shepherd, commissioner of precinct one in Tyler County, assisted Mr. Crawford in cutting the ribbon opening the trail. The trail is in Mr. Shepherd's precinct.

The Dogwood Trail parallels Theuvinh Creek (Mr. Crawford said that he learned from a Cajun friend that the pronunciation of the creek's name is "Theuvinh"). It is the fourth Woodlands Trail to be opened under sponsorship of the Texas Forestry Association.

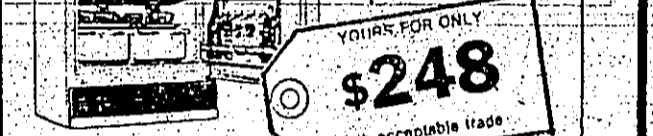
Green Thumb Tips

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County Agent Reports

Artificial Breeding of Beef Cows in Paver's artificial insemination is profitable for the beef cattle producer.

Figures released by John R. Beverly, Texas A&M Extension agent, indicate that the use of AI can produce approximately 5,000 calves in the same period.

Factors such as type of semen used, existing facilities and availability of extra labor can cause variations in cost. However, the best approximation of cost comes from a recent survey of 43 ranchers presently using AI. These ranchers are either using only AI or using it in conjunction with a natural breeding program, Beverly said.

Total average cost for each AI calf born on these ranches was \$7.92, while total average cost of a calf born from natural breeding was \$9.78.

The cost range when using AI was \$4.00 to \$19.00, Beverly said. "The range showed a spread of \$5.00 to \$18.00 when using natural breeding."

Only four of the 43 ranchers used technicians to artificially inseminate their cows, Beverly continued. The other ranchers did their own insemination or utilized existing personnel which seems to be the most practical and popular concept, he said.

According to Beverly, research reports indicate a cost of \$8.84 a calf when the sire costs \$500 with a \$1.12 per calf additional cost for each increase of \$100 in bull cost.

"All recent reports show that artificial insemination equals and in some cases, under good management, even exceeds the conception rates obtained through natural breeding," Beverly said. "The average conception rate for both is 70%.

The advantage of breeding artificially is that the ranch-

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WEEKEND GARDENING

From Tyler County Extension Service

The well planned and cared for home vegetable garden will insure fresh, nutritious vegetables for your dinner table and wholesome and fun recreation for the entire family. Mark the calendar now to begin cultivation during the early days of March in readiness for the backyard vegetable garden. Choose a garden spot which will be convenient to the home, fertile and well drained, and a spot that is near a water supply for supplemental water should it be needed. All vegetable plants must have sun and do best when not exposed to competition from trees and shrubs.

If space is a problem, which it may be on the home grounds, some vegetables are readily and handsomely as a background or border planting in the annual or perennial bed. Beans and cucumbers make attractive fence plantings, and onions usually go unnoticed in the penumbra patch. A well planned garden on paper will help make the most efficient use of gardening space. When a raising bed is planned, early maturing crops together so they may be easily replaced by a later crop. The garden plan will serve as a planting guide during the vegetable season. The crops selected should serve the needs of particular tastes of the family. If space is limited, consider planting vegetables which can be purchased fresh and

reasonable prices. Consider the croped maintenance of insect and disease control, watering, and cultivation in the garden. A clean cultivation and eradication of weeds and grasses will help to protect the plot from later weed attacks which rob the desirable plants of food and water. Sandy soils will profit from organic materials such as leafmold, sphagnum peat, or well rotted manure. The organic additives will help conserve moisture over the long hot summer months. Commercial fertilizers are must for good vegetable production, even though manure is used. Plan to apply approximately one-half cup of a complete and balanced fertilizer such as 8-8-8 or 10-10-10 per square yard of soil at the time of cultivation. Light applications of acid dressings of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium are best applied to sandy soils once the plant is well established and growing. The grower may find that some heavy feeding crops are better feeders than others. For example, cabbage and Irish potato require generous feeding. Over fertilizing, however, will injure and possibly kill vegetable plants.

One of the most important factors in growing vegetables successfully in the home garden is timing the planting and transplanting of each vegetable. The frost-free date includes Cabbage and onions, English peas, spinach, radishes, beans, and turnips. Vegetables to plant after the danger of frost, or after mid-March include: beans, sweet corn, cucumber, okra, peas, pepper and tomato plants, egg plants, and squash. Select varieties of vegetables to be raised. Some are better adapted to the area. For example, cabbage and Irish potato require generous feeding. Over fertilizing, however, will injure and possibly kill vegetable plants. One of the most important factors in growing vegetables successfully in the home garden is timing the planting and transplanting of each vegetable.

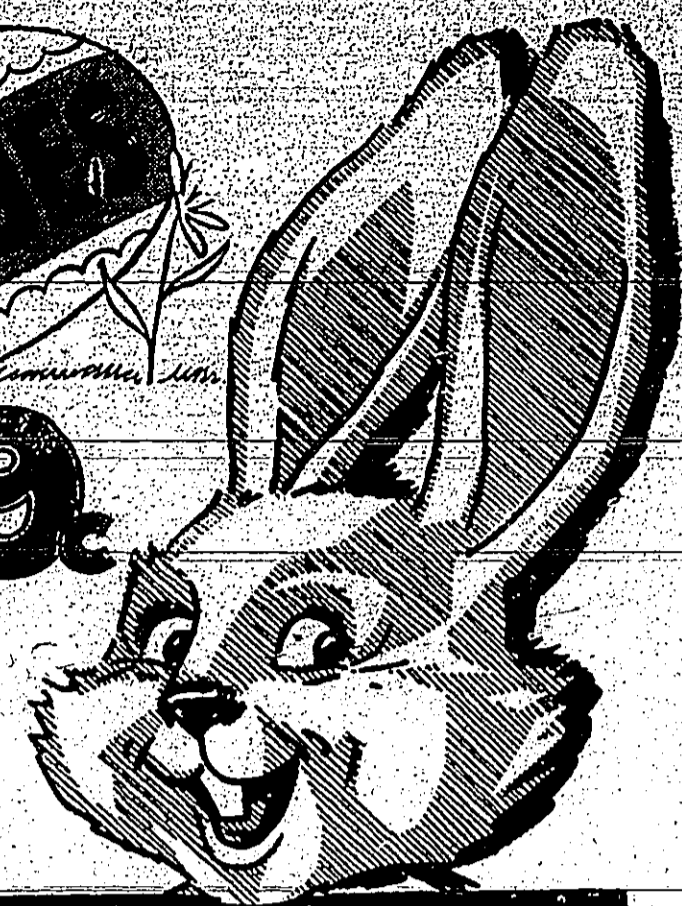

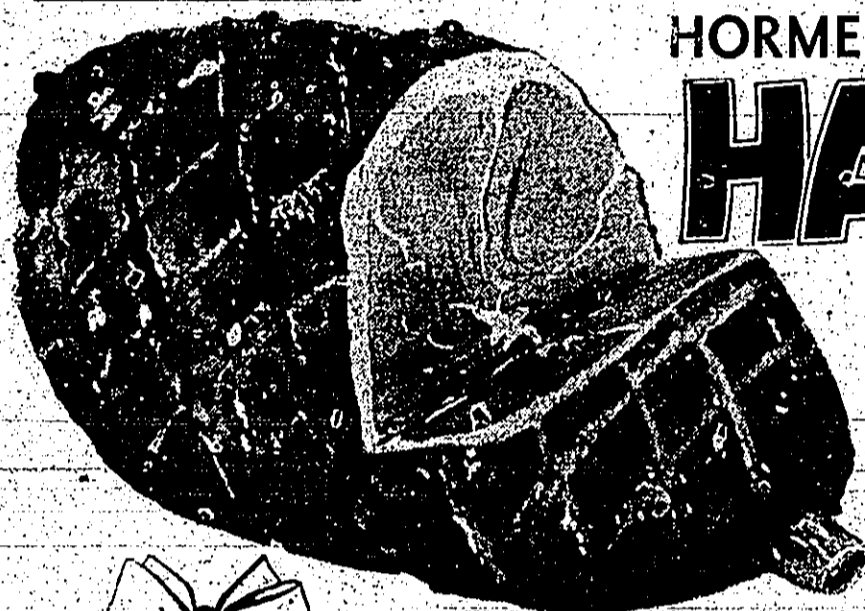
