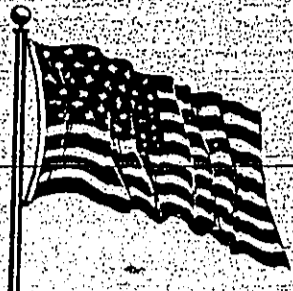

Dogwood Queen Coronation, Pageant Saturday

The 1970 Tyler County Dogwood Festival coronation and pageant will unfold Saturday night in Dogwood Amphitheatre with the crowning of a queen and her king and the presentation of three princesses from Tyler County and 30 duchesses representing cities and towns in Southeast Texas.

The queen has already been chosen by the Kings Men from among the four princesses selected earlier. Princesses are Alice Dale Odom of Sparger, Kathy Williams of Warren, Kay Williams of Woodville and Jill Ogden of Colmesneil.

One of these princesses will be crowned queen and one will be Princess of Tyler County. The remaining two will be princesses from their respective communities.

Trainbearers to the queen will be four semi-finalists, Cindy Polk, Woodville, Charlotte Belt, Colmesneil, Karen Lamb, Warren, and Lolita Payne, Sparger.

The 30 duchesses and escorts will be introduced and will take places on the stage prior to the coronation. The princesses, with one exception, will be presented along with their escorts. This is the time the audience realizes which of the princesses has been selected to reign as queen for the coming year.

Others in the queen's court will be James Crowell of Sparger, ringbearer; Ellen Gaye Findley, flowergirl; Robert Allen Moton of Chester, crown bearer to the king; Kimberly Freeman of Colmesneil, flowergirl; and Don Freeman of Woodville, crown bearer to the queen.

Gov. Ben Barnes will place the crown on both the king and queen.

Following the coronation ceremonies, a pageant will be presented with its theme, "Tyler County Under Six Flags."

In the first scene, Tyler County under the French flag is depicted with a typical Indian village showing the arrival of a trader and will feature dances by Indians from the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation.

Spanish rule is portrayed with settlers, encouraged by the Spanish, migrating to the area.

Under the flag of Mexico following its independence from Spain, colonists came to Texas in such numbers from the United States that Mexico established forts, such as Teran on the Neches, to halt the immigration.

The flag of the Republic of Texas flew over Tyler County as the fourth scene unfolds with pageantry of early Town Bluff on the Neches.

Scene Five portrays the coming of the Confederacy which Texas joined and the men went off to war. Soldiers around a campfire, women on the home front are quilting, sewing, etc.

And the Sixth Flag over Tyler County, that of the United States of America, is the stirring final scene in the pageant.

City Voters To Decide On Bonds Saturday

Qualified voters in the Woodville city limits will decide in the election Saturday on authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 in revenue bonds with which to enlarge and improve the city's water and sewer systems.

If the voters approve the bonds, \$308,000 of the amount will be used to add another sewerage treatment plant north of the city to take care of

waste from the proposed poultry processing plant of Angelina Poultry Company. The balance will be used to give sewer service to Cheswood addition and Cobb Mill road area.

Two propositions will be on the ballot with the first for against the issuance of \$210,000 in revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing extensions

and improvements to the city waterworks system and proposition two for or against the issuance of \$290,000 in revenue bonds for the purpose of constructing extensions and improvements to the city's sewer system.

All qualified voters within the city limits can vote, although two ballot boxes will be used, in one the ballots of qualified electors who own taxable property in the city and who have

registered if for taxation will be placed and counted separately, the other all other ballots, cast by the resident qualified voters, will be placed and counted separately.

Voting will be at city hall with J. Wood Fahn being election judge and Mrs. Nell Folger, alternate.

The call for the election was passed by the city council following discussions concerning the move of Angelina Poultry Company from its Lufkin plant.

The company offered to move here provided the city could furnish it with sewer and water service at a lower rate. The council after several meetings set a minimum charge of \$20,315 annually which includes \$1275 payment in lieu of taxes since the plant will be outside the city limits.

The plant, it was pointed out, will pay school and county taxes in addition to the payment to the city of Woodville.

The processing plant which Angelina Poultry Company operates in Lufkin is antiquated and the company must establish a new plant. Tyler County Industrial Corporation has agreed to finance a \$500,000 plant in the corporation's industrial park north of Woodville.

The poultry plant at the start of operations will employ about 100 persons with about 80 women employees. All but four key personnel will be hired in the county, the poultry firm officials said.

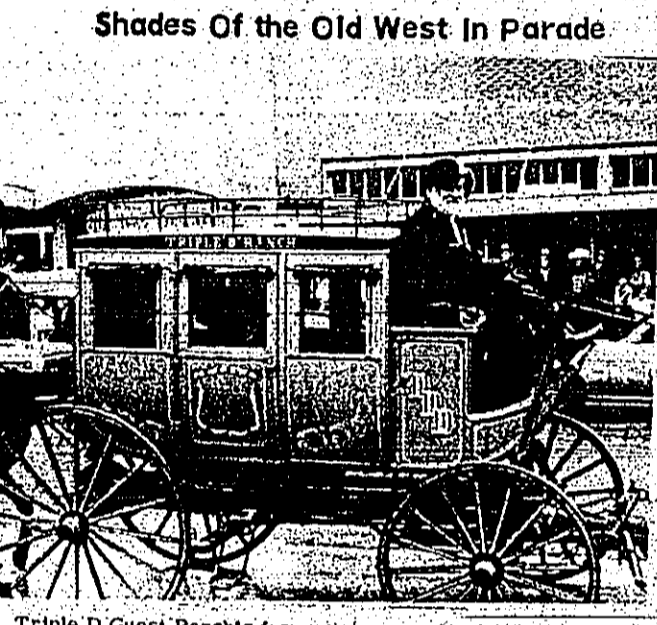
The \$500,000 in revenue bonds will be retired over a 30-year period from revenue from the services to Angelina Poultry through its \$20,315 minimum annual payment, an increase of \$1.00 in minimum water and sewer service with any deficit to be made up from revenue from the sales tax.

The interest rate on the bonds has caused some speculation, but interest rates are being reduced. David A. Feagin, president of First State Bank in Colmesneil, said the booster this week that his bank will be happy to purchase a part of the bonds at six percent interest.

Bankers of the bond issue say they feel a big part of the issue could be purchased by county firms and individuals since the interest from the municipal bonds will be tax free. However, Harry Fender of Tyler has assured the city council that the bonds can be sold at whatever the going rate of interest is at the time of their sale.

Location of the poultry plant here through the bond issue is being backed by most Woodville business firms who point out that the added payroll payments to chicken processors, and other expenditures by the poultry industry will give the county workers a round-the-year income.

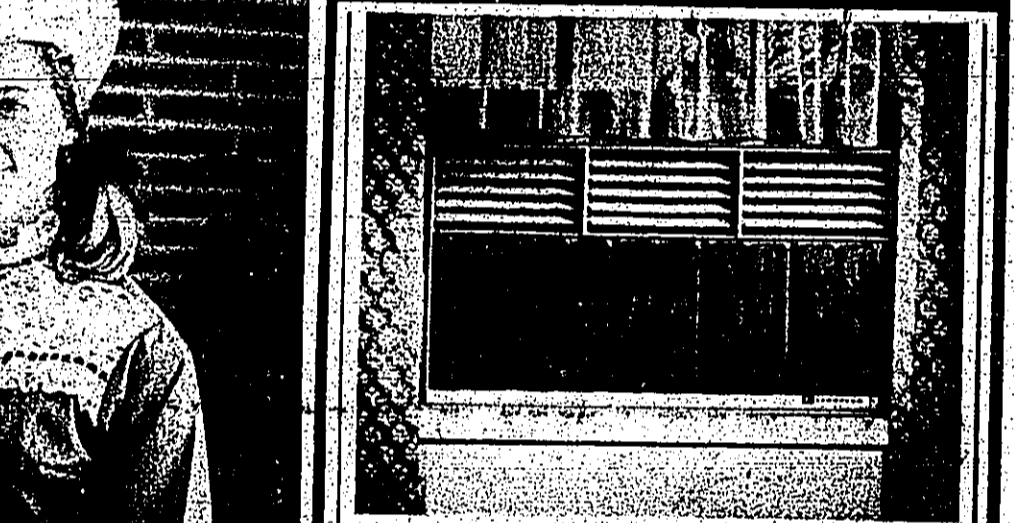

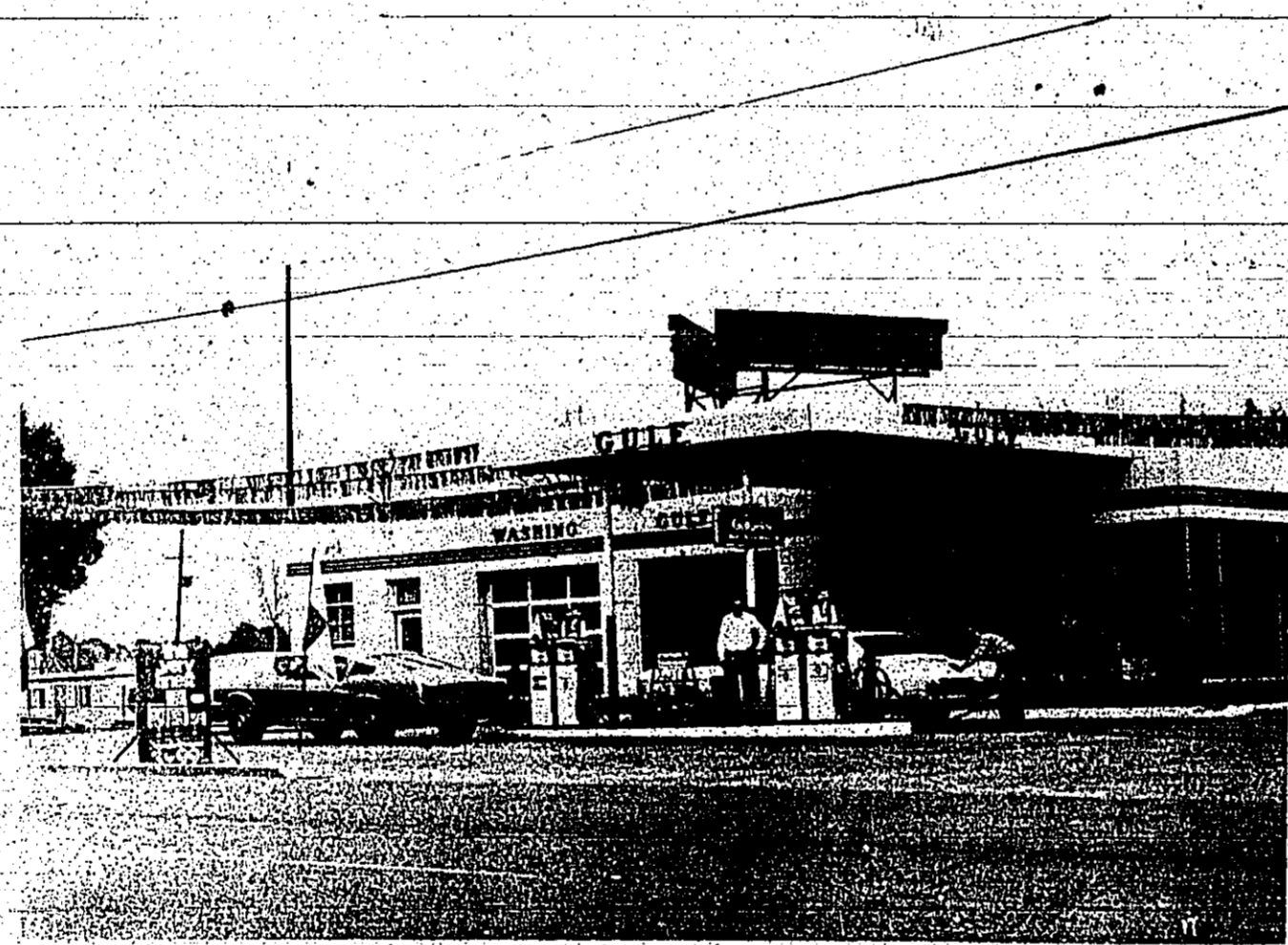

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q In there a Form 1040 and if so, where can I get a copy?

A The designation 1040 refers to the page number of the back of the first copy of the Form 1040. In the tax packages sent to all taxpayers this year, one will be found containing information on the new Form 1040. Other general instructions for Form 1040 continue on the back of the taxpayer's copy of the 1969 and 1970 instructions.

Q Do you have to itemize deductions to get any credit for hospital insurance premiums?

A Yes, you must itemize to claim this deduction. However, you may deduct half of your medical insurance premiums up to a maximum of \$150 even though your other medical expenses do not exceed 3 percent of your adjusted gross income.

Q I may someone to take care of my two girls while I work. Is there any deduction for this?

A You may deduct all or part of this expense when certain conditions are met. These conditions are explained on page 2-2 of the 1970 tax package you received in the mail.

Q I'm over 65. Do I still have to file a tax return?

A Yes, you are entitled to an additional \$600 exemption and therefore you are not required to file a return unless your gross income is \$1,200 or over. However, if you had net earnings from employment of \$400 or more, even if your gross income is \$1,200, a return will have to be filed and self-employment tax paid.

Q Are union dues deductible?

A Yes, these dues are deductible as an employee business expense if you itemize. For more details on these expenses, check page 1-2 of the 1970 instruction package.

Q My only income last year was from a summer job between semesters at college. To get a refund, can I just send in my W-2 or do I have to fill out a whole tax form?

A You must file a tax return to obtain any refund due. Copies of Form 1040 and instructions are available at local IRS offices as well as many banks and post offices if you did not receive one in the mail.

Q What's the tax difference between alimony and child support payments?

The sturdy panels (which won't dent, mar or scuff and can be damp-wiped clean) go up easily over the existing wall. In most cases, matching trim and moldings are available making it possible for amateurs to give a paneling job a professionally finished look.

Other frequent remodeling projects, according to the Bureau of Building Marketing Research, are: driveways, walkways, exterior painting, kitchen and bathroom modernization, and basement recreation rooms. Except for large-scale jobs such as new kitchens and bathrooms, homeowners do most of the work themselves.

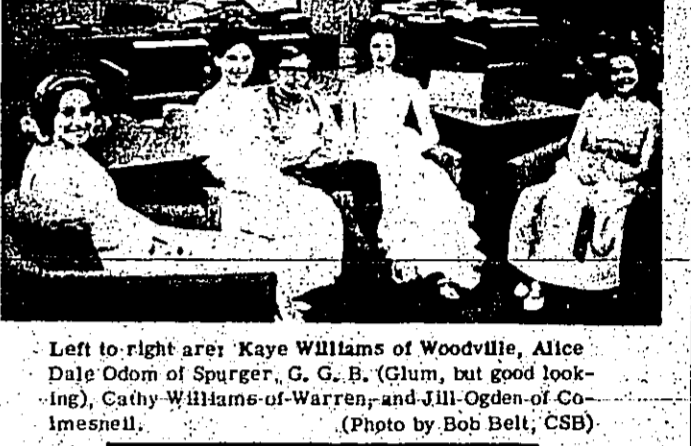
