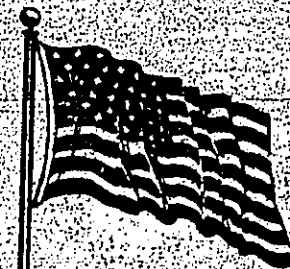

## TOP OF THE MORNING

Ho-hum. Whatever may happen this week will be anticlimactic to the past weekend. The Dogwood Festival, the bond election, and school trustee elections were too much, actually, for just one Saturday. We hope our lackadaisical attitude isn't glowing too brightly.

Anyway, it was an interesting Saturday—especially in Woodville. Those who were not all wound up about the elections were sweating out the preparations for the coronation and pageant.

It is a tribute to "labor omnia vincit" (labor conquers all) to view the beautifully decorated amphitheatre, the resplendent magnificent throne area, the smoothly functioning coronation and well-executed pageant.

Those of us who see the bare stage and undecorated props on a Saturday morning are always astounded at the speed in which the thousands of artificial flowers are put in place and the throne area's finishing touches are made.

Behind all this excellent work, of course, are months of planning and sometimes unheralded labor. This begins in January when the women begin making the flowers, through February and March when the Kings Men secure the booklet advertising and choose the queen and the pageant script is prepared. The queen's court committee, too, is busy inviting towns and cities to send duchesses, and the children are selected for flower girls and ring bearers and parade entries are planned and made.

This is only a brief and incomplete summary of the many things that go toward a successful Dogwood Festival.

A whole bushel of judos is due to the faithful who labored both physically and mentally to bring about another successful festival. And less we forget, to those who made the Western Weekend and Youth Rodeo the previous Saturday a whopping success.

This is one year we can't complain about the dogwood trees coming into full bloom at the right time. They were in full blossom and were enjoyed by the thousands of visitors. We have found that many visitors come here Sunday following the festival to just drive the roads to view the dogwoods in bloom.

We did hear one complaint. Groups on two chartered buses could not get into Heritage Village because of insufficient parking area. We inquired about it and Clyde Gray said they had to turn away a large number of cars both Western Weekend and last Saturday. He needs more room to expand both the museum and parking and said he is working to remedy that situation. He said that otherwise they had very successful weekends March 28 and April 4. Those old-fashioned meals served at the Tolar cabin were really appreciated.

## School Trustees Re-elected

The four incumbents on the board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District were re-elected in the election Saturday.

In a record vote for the district, Dr. W. S. Nichols, W. S. Jarrott and Dr. L. G. Burton were named to full terms. James W. Galney, appointed to fill an unexpired term, was elected for the one

year remaining in the term. Nichols in Place Three was opposed by Mrs. Bennie Ruth Stanford, who received 278 votes, and F. L. Campbell who polled 48 to Nichols' 204.

W. S. Jarrott received 761 votes to 463 for John Spanbanks in the race for Place Four.

For Place Five, L. G. Burton received 855 votes to 345 for Robert Gillespie.

For Place Seven, Galney received 685 votes while E. L. (Gene) Boykin received 472 and Mrs. Jerry Stephenson 45.

In the referendum for multiple voting boxes in the district, the proposal carried by a good margin.

## CITY COUNCIL TALLIES VOTES

### Bonds Carry By Slim Margin

The Woodville City Council met Monday night to make an official canvass of votes in Saturday's election and to again consider the requested rate increase by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

In the city election for mayor and aldermen, the canvass showed that Jimmy Freeman received 529 votes for mayor,

J. G. Anderson 456 and Leroy Davis 461 for aldermen. The three were unopposed. They were sworn in for another term.

In the revenue bond election, the official count showed that on proposition one for the issuance of \$210,000 in water revenue bonds there were 288 for and 237 against in property owners voting, and 49 for and 16 against in the non-property owners votes. Proposition two, issuance of \$290,000 in sewer revenue bonds, 281 voted for and 243 against in property owners box and 49 for and 15 against in non-property owners ballots.

Jack Martin and Mr. McGrenner appeared for Southwestern Bell to discuss once more the requested rate increase for telephone rates. Councilman Clay Miller asked if the company could furnish a financial statement each year for the Woodville and Spurger exchanges and Mr. McGrenner agreed that it would be possible.

Councilman Leroy Davis proposed that the telephone company, which says it is losing money on the exchanges, take an increase to \$10.50 for business phones and \$5.50 for one-party residences. The telephone company representatives said that the company would continue to lose money here at those rates and they were sure the company would not consider it. Another motion for \$11 on business phones and \$5.50 on one-party residences was seconded by Gardner Parks. It was specified that this was only an offer to the company and was not an ordinance.

## Chamber Discusses Brochures, Ads At Monday Meeting

Members of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce at the regular monthly meeting Monday night heard discussions on a wide range of topics including publishing a new brochure, securing a doctor for the county, a park at Fort Teran and the feasibility of a distributive education program at Kirby High School, among others.

The chamber has two small brochures for distribution to persons visiting the county or to prospective visitors. One is in four color printing while the other is printed only in black.

Mrs. Loy Conner, office secretary, said the office was getting low on both.

The brochures are about five years old and in some aspects, are out of date, Chamber President Jim Galney pointed out, and it was suggested the new brochures should be secured in a smaller quantity. Estimates were given on the cost of both brochures by Peterson Printing Company.

## Jill Ogden Is Dogwood Queen

Miss Jill Ogden, 17-year-old Colmesnell High School Senior, was crowned queen of the 1970 Tyler County Dogwood Festival in coronation ceremonies Saturday night at Dogwood Amphitheatre.

The crown was placed on her head by Lt. Governor Ben Barnes who added an extra touch—a kiss on the cheek. Barnes had previously crowned the king, Larry Fondren, also of Colmesnell.

Joshua Wheat, president of the festival association, presented Miss Ogden with the dogwood ring, the traditional gift of the dogwood festival to the new queen.

Cathy Williams of Warren was selected Princess of Tyler County, next highest honor to queen. Her escort was James Slau.

Kay Williams was introduced as princess of Woodville with her escort, Charles Spurlock, and Alice Dale Odum was Princess of Spurger, escorted by Jim Brown.

The new queen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Ogden of Colmesnell. In high school she is head writer and has been a band member for seven years. She was elected

"Most Likely to Succeed" and "Most Beautiful" at Colmesnell High, and is the high school choir pianist. She has been a 4-H club member since she was nine years of age and was a Future Homemaker for two years. She was recipient of the DAR citizenship award and is organist at her church. She plans to attend Angelina Junior College.

An interesting sidelight is that her mother, the former Georgia Hucklebee, was a princess when she was in high school and her escort was Jill's father, Jill was a flower girl in the 1958 festival.

Religious music and period music during the pageant was by the French High School Choir of Beaumont, directed by Mrs. Carol Whitton. Coronation music was played on the organ by Jason Summey of Nacogdoches and Dr. Jim Jinnette of Woodville.

The traditional solo, "Trees," was sung by Mrs. Melvin Houston of Woodville. Miss Kaye Owens, queen of the 1969 festival, was introduced and made her farewell speech. Dr. Arleigh Templeton, who was named Mr. East Texas 1969, made the presentation of the Mr. East Texas 1970 award to Arthur Temple, Jr. It was accepted by Buddy Temple, son of the honoree.

Miss Suzanne Gardemal, duchess from Lufkin, was chosen as the queen's lady-in-waiting. Her escort was West Newsome. Song to the queen was by Billy Vanderlind of Beaumont.

Trainbearers to the queen were the four finalists, Miss Cindy Folk of Woodville, Karen Lamb of Warren, Lolita Payne of Spurger, and Charlotte Bell of Colmesnell, along with Ramelia Williams of Woodville.

Children of the court were James Crowell of Spurger, ringbearer to the queen; Robert Alan Morgan, Chester; crownbearer to the king; Don Freeman, Woodville, crownbearer to the queen; Ellen Gave-Findley, Warren; and Kimberly Freeman, Colmesnell, flower girls to the queen.

The girls of the court entered through a Spanish patio with flower garden behind the archway. Bougainvillea, hibiscus, and other tropical flowers were "growing" there. The front of the huge stage was banked with azaleas of varied shades and the fringes of the bowl were colorful with both white and pink dogwoods and peach trees.

The magnificent throne area was formed with an 18' high and 18' wide gazebo-like canopy topped with curlicue glittering with diamond dust. Garlands of wisteria covered the posts holding the umbrella-shaped canopy and pink running roses fell from the top. Butterflies 3 1/2 inches across and patterned with sequins also were used in the decor.

Dark Orchid metallic cloth formed the back drape falling from the high point of the throne and pink cushions were in the throne chairs. The steps leading to the throne area were covered in pink. The color scheme was further enhanced with a grouping of Japanese magnolias arranged on the side of the throne area facing the audience.

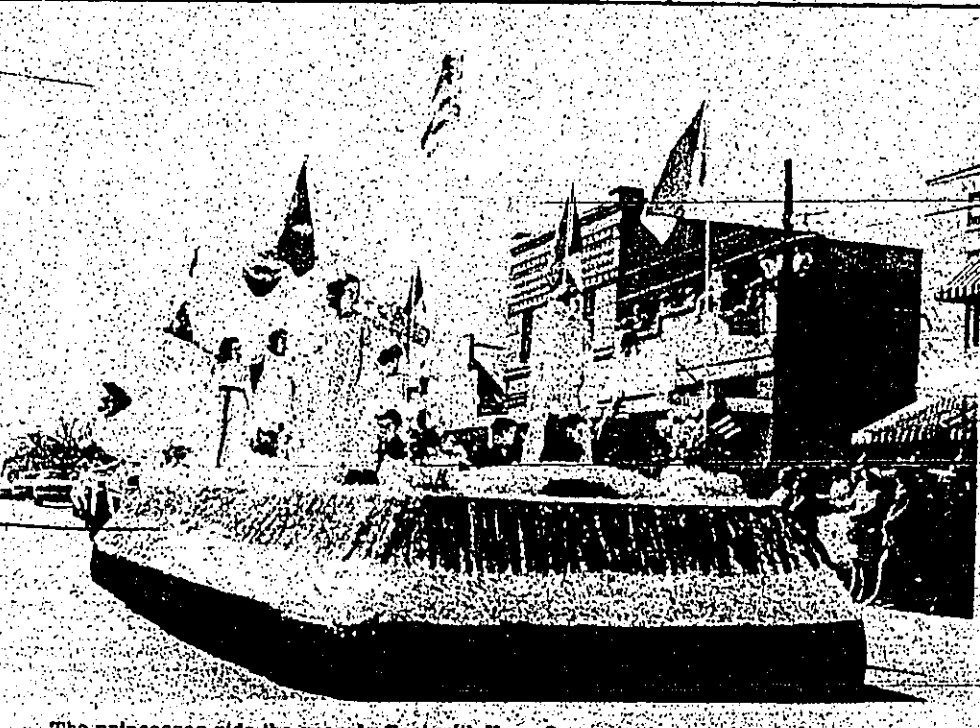

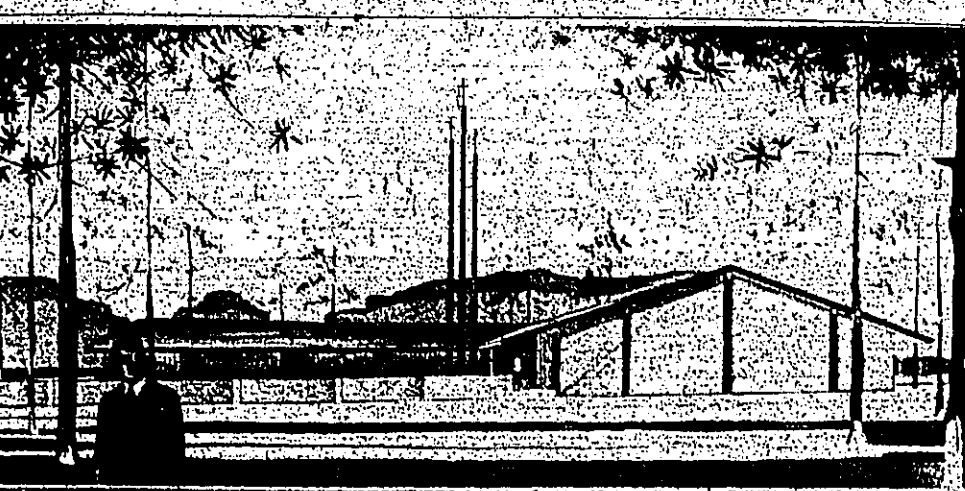
The princesses ride the queen's float with Kaye Owens in the parade Saturday.

Dowdy Reports

By U. S. REP. JOHN DOWDY

On March 4, 1970, I was invited to appear before a Grand Jury sitting in Baltimore, Maryland.

And that time, I presented to the Grand Jury personal records and answered all the questions thoroughly and satisfactorily.

In fact, many of the questions were about matters that were already known to me. Having tried to correct about this matter involving Nathan Cohen and Mervyn Clark, I submitted it until yesterday when I was notified by the U. S. Attorney that I would be indicted today, March 31, 1970.

I am absolutely not guilty of any wrong-doing or of violating any laws of the United States. As a former District Attorney myself, as Chairman of the Special Select Subcommittee, I have fought crime both in Texas and in the District of Columbia.

Of course, I have incurred powerful and influential enemies in the District of Columbia and it is my considered opinion they would do anything to smear me, which in turn they would hope would make the further efforts of the House District Committee, ineffective in ferreting out infeasance, malfeasance and misfeasance of government.

I am aware in a vague manner of some of the perjury, slander and libel committed against me in the United States Grand Jury, and it is to my complete surprise that Mr. Stans would voluntarily give verbal garbage that is uttered by his main witnesses, who are being convicted criminals and professional "team" artists.

I will be glad to command further when I have more to discuss. I now intend, with the help of the House District Committee and the Special Select Subcommittee, to reach and clear up the District of Columbia. When obstacles such as these are thrown up to block me, I will promptly show them what I will and can do.

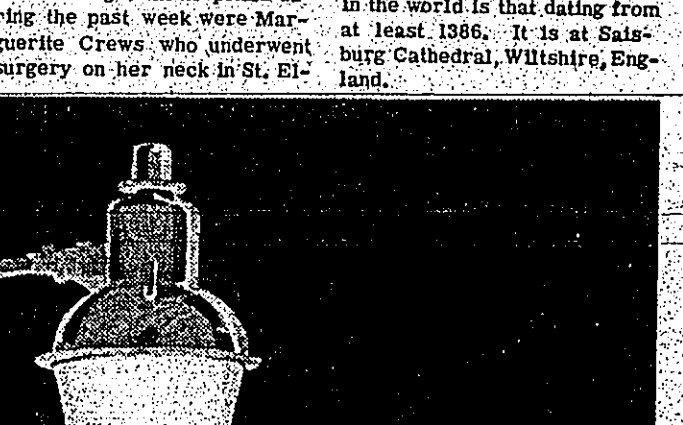

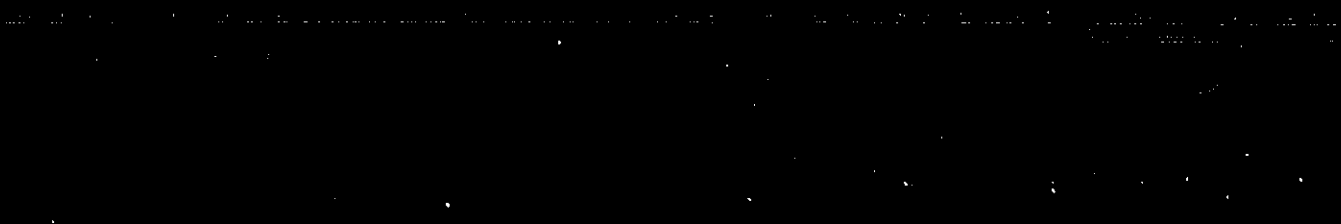

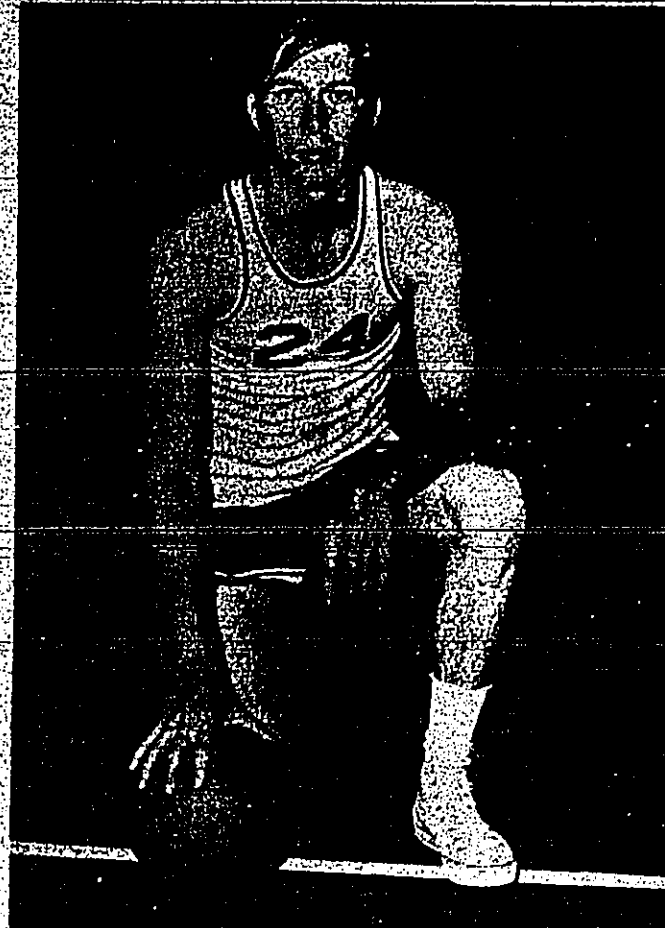
