

## Motorcade To Rally

A motorcade from Tyler County will leave the courthouse Saturday at 3:30 p.m., to go to Jasper County Airport where a fish fry, barbecue and rally will be held for Lloyd Bentson, candidate for the Democratic nomination for the United States nomination.

The fish fry and barbecue will begin at 4:15, and continue until 6:00 p.m. An invitation is extended to every member of the family, children included, to join in the fun.

Bentson will arrive at the Jefferson County Airport at 3:00 p.m. Saturday and depart in a motorcade for Jasper with stops in Sulphur and Kirbyville.

The motorcade from Woodville will leave promptly at 3:30 p.m. Saturday and go directly to the Jasper County Airport on Highway 190 west of Jasper. There is a parking area at the airport which will accommodate a large number of cars and should provide ample parking for all who come.

Bentson is seeking the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate seat now held by Ralph Yarborough. He is a former congressman from the Southern part of Texas and is a successful businessman.

## Daylight Saving Time Starts At 2 A. M. Sunday

Daylight Saving Time, to some and a curse to others, goes into effect at 2:00 a.m. Sunday. It will remain in effect until the last Sunday in October.

The best way to have your clock correct Sunday morning, unless you plan to be up at 2:00 a.m. is to set it ahead one hour before you go to bed Saturday night. That way you will arise bright-eyed and ready to go to church on time.

Remember that the clock must be set ahead one hour. If you retire at 10:00 p.m. Saturday night, set your clock 11:00 and come Sunday morning it will be right on time with the rest of Texas and other states in the Central time zone.

Of course, when you turn your clock ahead you lose an hour. But you will get it back the last Sunday in October.



## WEEKEND GARDENING

### Vines For Summer Account

Many vines have several advantages in the landscape. Most vines, trained or untrained, require very little "grooming" in them. In that they grow vertical, this is a real advantage for the small garden, or for limited planting areas.

Many vines are fast growing to provide a quick effect, or accent for the garden. The impatient gardener should plan for that fast lushness which is only achieved after a number of years with trees and shrubs. The annual flowering vine are particularly fast growing. Abundant vine bloom may be had from Morning Glory, Hyacinth Bean, and Cypress Vine, one growing season.

Many vines are used for quick shade, seasonal attractiveness, vines are often used for quick shade over sunny patios or at pool side. When a vine is selected for shading purposes, use one that will lose its foliage in winter to allow the welcome winter sun. Popular vines for this purpose include Sweet Potato, English Ivy, and Virginia Creeper.

Vines such as Wisteria and Common Honeyuckle, as lovely as they are, are often unwelcome in the garden due to their persistence and rapid growth.

Vines with fast growth often demand fast and routine control to keep them in their place. Some large twining vines such as Wisteria, may injure a tree by actually choking the tree, or cutting off the flow of food from the root area or trunk; therefore, should never be planted near a tree unless it is done so to cut light in the tree, or to prevent branch wounds on the trunk, or branches from drying out which may be indicative to rot. English Ivy does not feed off of the tree. Fast growing and dense vines should not be allowed to grow over the tops of arbors and trellises, or to climb up proper light and saturation.

The selection and effects are wide, and the planting time now in late spring is right. Why not plant a vine for summer accent?

A flowering vine such as Carolina Yellow Jessamine, Autumn Clematis, or Red Honey-suckle, make an interesting and attractive accent for a wall, or fence. This vine quickly climbs to the top of its support to start down with seasonal bloom.

There is a vine for every season, one that will provide a rich seasonal color. The early blooms of Carolina Yellow Jessamine, Wisteria, and Red Honey-suckle great the spring. Early summer, Star of Confederate Jasmine, perhaps the able to be followed by the summer blooms of Morning

Glory, Hyacinth Bean, Cypress Vine, and the vivid pink blooms of Rosa De Montana or Coral Vine. Autumn Clematis clings to support with white, come fall an effort to cut the vivid red fall colors of the native student Virginia Creeper.

Refrigerated unbaked breads, biscuits, pizzas, etc., need special care. The directions on the package state that these products need to be kept under refrigeration. It will rise when put into the oven. Read all the instructions on the package for more success with all these modern convenience foods. When they say to keep the dough refrigerated, the best place is on the second shelf rather than the floor shelf.

7. The older people need help to make use of their skills, teach them in their homes.

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




