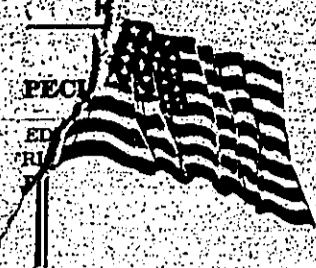

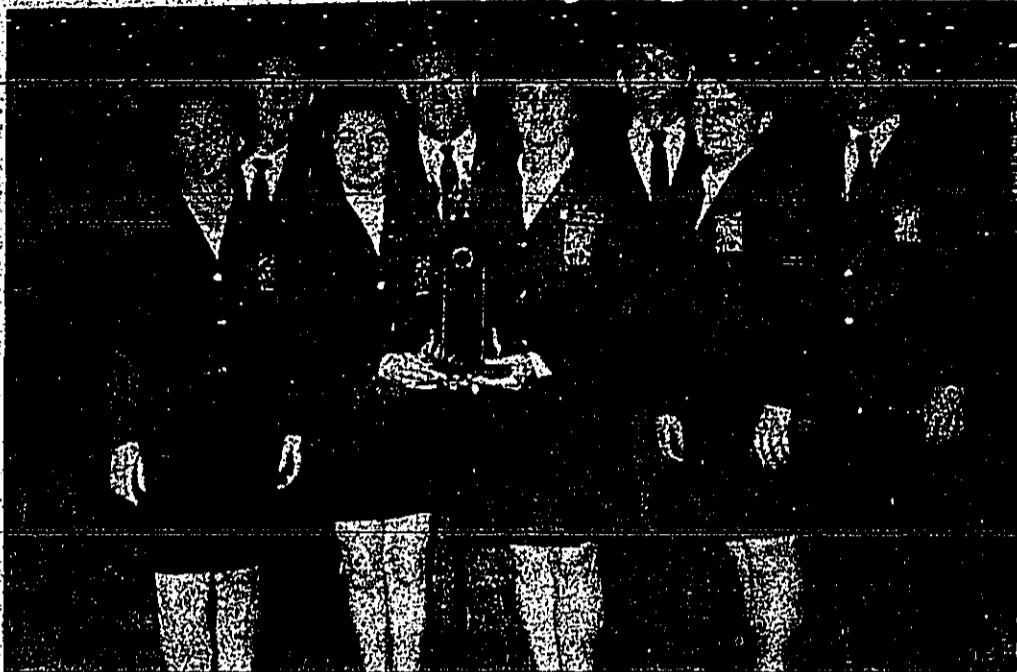

Daylight Saving Time Starts At 2 A. M. Sunday

Daylight Saving Time, a boon to some and a curse to others, goes into effect at 2:00 a.m. Sunday. It will remain in effect until the last Sunday in October.

The best way to have your clock correct Sunday morning, unless you plan to be up at 2:00 a.m. is to set it ahead one hour before you go to bed Saturday night. That way you will arise bright-eyed and ready to go to church on time.

Remember that the clock must be set ahead one hour. If you retire at 10:00 p.m. Saturday night, set your clock at 11:00 and come Sunday morning it will be right on time with the rest of Texas and other states in the Central time zone.

Of course, when you run your clock ahead you lose an hour. But you will get it back the last Sunday in October.

Local FHA Members To Attend Meeting In Austin April 24-25

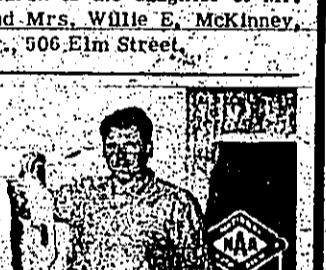

Robbie Crawford

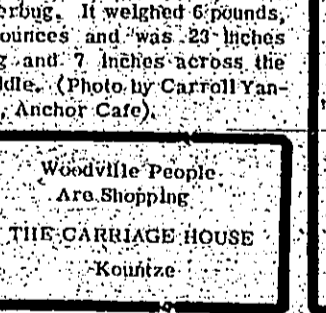

Spurger School To Enroll First Grade, Kindergarten

Henry K. Pitts, principal of Spurger Elementary School, announced today that children of the Spurger School District will enroll in kindergarten and first grade next school year. The enrollment is the school cafeteria Monday morning May 4 at 9:00 a.m. The first grade will begin a one-week pre-school training clinic immediately following registration. Parents are asked to bring their children. After Monday, children will ride the bus if the parents so desire. The purpose of the clinic is to give the new first graders an introduction to classroom conditions and group instruction. It is designed to help the children become familiar with the school year, a kindergarten will be offered the educationally deprived children of the Spurger Independent School District who are five years and five months old as of September 1, 1970. Educationally handicapped for the purpose of kindergarten enrollment is defined as children whose children who can not speak, read, or comprehend the English language to the extent that they are not familiar with the common English words that are necessary for normal progress in the first grade. Eligibility will be determined by the administration through the use of standardized tests, written work, and/or personal evaluation.
