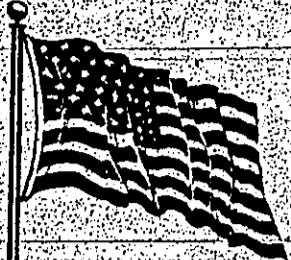

Vandals Overturn Gravestones

A LETTER FROM CAMBODIA

May 2, 1970

A shut out from a touring group in Vietnam.

In view of the bitter attacks on the President in recent days by the public and the press, I thought you might gain a few words of support and encouragement.

The young men who are fighting the war and stand to lose the most their lives are solidly behind the President's decision to go into the Vietnam sanctuary in Cambodia. Morale here was good but went to an all time high when the announcement was made.

They feel they now have an even chance at fighting Charlie at his own game.

They also feel that in the end lives will be saved and a quicker victory will be achieved on the battle field or at the peace talks. They honestly feel they can win this thing and now have the support to do it.

They are greatly disappointed in the reaction of the back home press, public and some of the politicians. As one young GI put it: "Fullbright must be worth 3 Divisions to the enemy. It's really hard for a young soldier to..."

Understand this kind of reaction to a White House announcement of more support for him and his buddies. These are outstanding young men and they deserve all the help and encouragement we can give them.

This letter was prompted by a young GI at the 3rd Field Hospital this morning when he said: "For God's sake let the President know somebody's behind him - us."

As I have toured the area the past few days I say what he expressed the same feelings. I have not found one man against the Cambodian move.

I promised the troops I would pass their support on to the President and figured this would be the best way.

Will be back in the states on the 16th and will do all I can to help the situation.

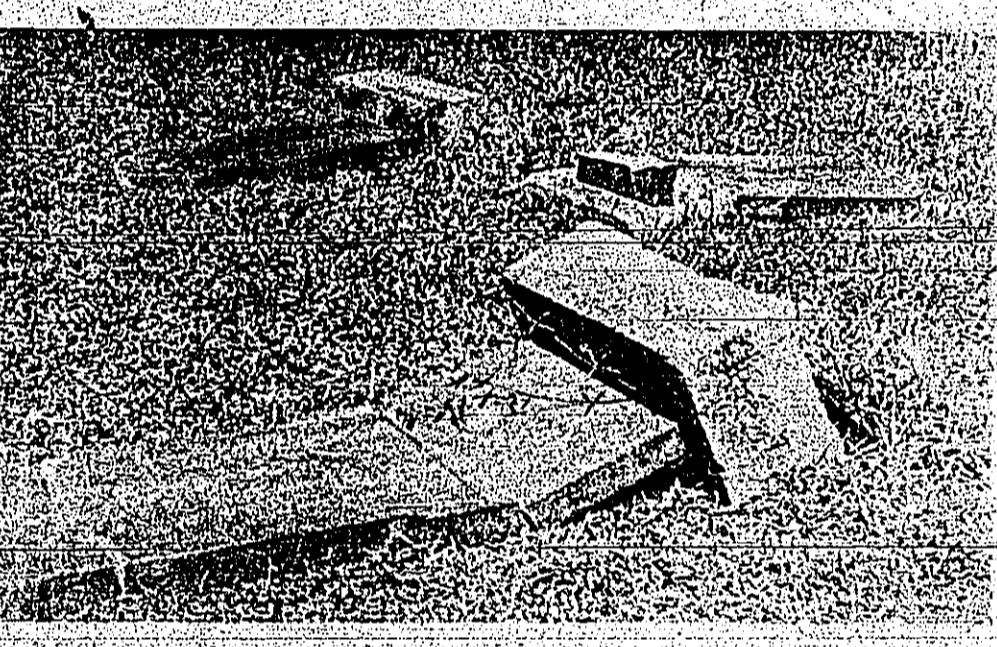
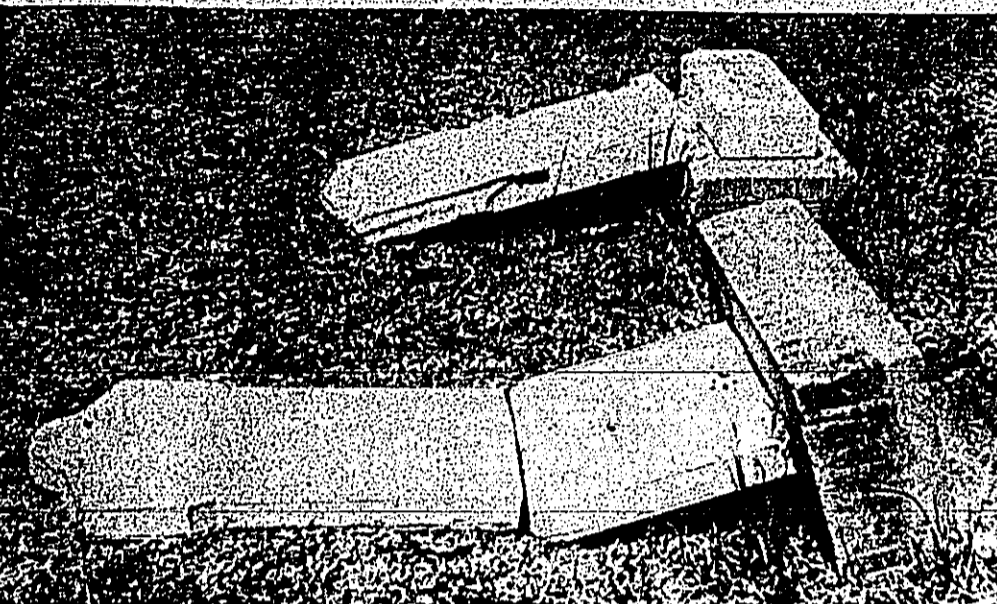

Dr. Abner V. McCall, president of Baylor University, will deliver a devotional message at the annual Prayer Breakfast July 2 at 7:30 a.m. at the Hilton Palacio del Rio Hotel. Chief Justice Charles W. Barrow of the San Antonio Court of Civil Appeals will preside.

Some 50 convention speakers will include U. S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell; Bernard C. Segal of Philadelphia, president of the American Bar Association; Texas Attorney General Crawford C. Martin; Justice Joe Greenhill of the Texas Supreme Court; Judge Walter Ely of the U. S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals, Los Angeles; and Gordon Fulcher, Atlanta publisher and chairman of the Texas Water Quality Board. Fifty-year members of the legal profession will be honored at the President's Buffet Dinner Thursday night, July 2.

Convention entertainment will feature Miss Jaye P. Morgan and Frank Sinatra, Jr.

Bar president Wheat will be succeeded by Morris Harrell of Dallas at the close of the San Antonio meeting. The two officials will open a post-convention seminar in Mexico City on Monday, July 6. A 400-member delegation will fly from San Antonio to the Mexican Capital for the legal study.

Vandals have pushed over and broken some 25 or 30 gravestones in the old part of Magnolia Cemetery during the past two months. Many of the markers are small but several larger stones have been pushed over.

The age of the older gravestones makes it difficult if not impossible for them to be repaired. Some are very old.

The vandalism was noticed at least two months ago when several small headstones were pulled over and many of them broken. From one to four or five have been found pushed over nearby every week since that time.

Efforts to find the vandals at work has been unsuccessful so far, and it is not known whether it is the work of the same persons or if others are involved at different times.

Magnolia Cemetery has a chain-link fence the gates are not kept locked and anyone can enter the cemetery at any time. The vandals are thought to be sneaking along a path in the west side.

Families who have moved long ago and who have relatives buried in the cemetery do not know of the vandalism and some of those still residing in the area do not plan to replace the gravestones until the vandalism is halted.

Persons living in the proximity of the cemetery have been asked to report to authorities anything suspicious, they may see or any noise coming from the cemetery at night. It is impossible for law enforcement officers to patrol the cemetery except occasionally.

If the vandalism continues some families with deceased relatives buried in the cemetery are talking of putting a watchman in the cemetery on an irregular schedule in an attempt to catch the vandals at work.

Bentsen Endorses Big Park Bill

Lloyd Bentsen, Democratic nominee for United States Senator Tuesday made public letter to Sen. Alan Bible, chairman of the Senate subcommittee on parks and recreation, in which he endorsed a Senate bill by Ralph Yarborough for a 100,000-acre Big Thicket National Park.

In the letter Bentsen urged the subcommittee to take written testimony until June 26. "Those who oppose the big park have arguments which should be considered by the subcommittee," he wrote.

The timber industry is vital to the Texas economy, he noted, and pointed out that the companies with land considered for the park have refrained from timber cutting in those areas.

Bentsen defeated Yarborough in the primary election. Yarborough has been pushing for a 100,000-acre national park while timber and forestry officials favor the 35,000-acre strip of Jasper county, Texas.

Learned said that researchers have come up with a vaccine that will prevent certain types of cancer in mice and presented a detailed research report to the delegates.

District 10 is comprised of 21 Southeast Texas counties: Don Coats, field representative of ACS said, and 16 of them are active with successful campaigns, six won awards for reaching high goals, two lung cancer conferences were held with good attendance during the year.

ORGANIZATION TO OPERATE WOODVILLE NURSING HOME

Rev. L. D. Kramer, president of Challenge Homes, Inc., a non-profit religious oriented nursing home organization, announced today the acquisition of a lease-management arrangement for the Woodville Nursing Home with the owners, Woodville Nursing Center, Inc. effective July 1, 1970.

Woodville, a 68-bed facility was built in 1968 and has operated as a skilled, and intermediate type II home under the Texas State Welfare Program, caring for all people, regardless of race, color, creed or national origin.

Challenge Homes Inc. presently maintains by ownership, lease or management contracts, 39 facilities in 10 states. The newest outreach of Challenge Homes is the construction of facilities to care for retarded

children, the first one being established in Austin, Minn. Other homes in various states will be added.

Still another outreach of Challenge Homes is challenge ministries, and evangelistic programs designed to carry the message of the gospel to the nations. To accomplish this goal a weekly TV program known as "A Challenge of Truth" is telecast over thirteen TV stations with a viewing audience of over 650,000 each Sunday morning.

Rev. Kramer stated, "It is a privilege for Challenge Homes to come into Woodville and serve with love and care of the elderly folks. It is our greatest desire that all church denominations join in strengthening the spiritual life of those in the Woodville home."

Challenge Homes is not church affiliated or sponsored, but depends entirely on efficient management and operating at full bed capacity, he said. Each home, although an independent operation, enjoys central control of accounting, purchasing, and public relations.

The operations at Woodville has been under the management of Paul Dupuis, Jr., who will remain as administrator, and Mrs. Betty Bafaman, director of nursing. Rev. Kramer said, "We do not anticipate any changes in the staffing of the operations of the home from the previous ownership." Kramer continued, "We are looking forward to a very happy relationship with all the fine people in the Woodville area."

In Case You Did Not Know, That Was A Mud Snake

The mystery snake pictured in the Booster last week has been identified as a mud snake (Amphispeltis). A number of readers called in to identify it as a mud snake or water snake.

According to "A Field Guide to Reptiles and Amphibians of Eastern North America", borrowed from Allan Stivers Library, the mud snake is found in Southern swamps and lowlands and feeds chiefly on earth-like salamanders which are maneuvered into better swallowing position by being pricked with the snake's spine like "albeit harmless" tail.

The book goes on to read that the mud snake when first caught may press its tail against the hand. This behavior earns it the names of horn snake or stinging snake and its habit of lying in a horizontal coil associates this species with the fabled hoop snake.

Its shiny black back causes many persons to mistake it for a water moccasin when seen in the water. According to the book it is non-poisonous.

Tower To Dedicate First Mutual Home

Senator John Tower will dedicate the first Mutual Help Homes built in the State of Texas on June 26 at 12:15 p.m. at Texas' only Indian Reservation 15 miles west of Woodville.

Mutual Help Housing is a Department of Housing and Urban Development project for low income families in which the families actually buy houses. Each family works 500 hours helping to build the house as a "sweat equity" down payment. Then they pay 20% of their income monthly for sixteen years. At the end of this period they become owners of the homes.

Forty of this type houses are being constructed on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation 15 miles west of Woodville.

Walt Broemer, superintendent of the reservation, said, "This is one of the finest HUD housing programs because the participants have to make an effort to acquire the house and since they are the owners, they take more pride in caring for the homes than in low-rent and rent-subsidy programs."

The Senator will be made a life-time honorary member of the Tribes by Chief Milton Battise during the ceremonies.
