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Small School Workshop Slated In Austin July 5-10

What are 86 things that a small school district can do to provide services generally expected only from large districts? This One is to get together with other small schools and work out 85 other ways to strengthen curriculum or administrative capability.

That idea will bring an expected 800 schoolmen and women to Austin July 5-10 for the annual summer workshop of the Texas Small Schools Project, to be held at the Jester Center of The University of Texas at Austin.

The Small Schools Project is the problem-solving focal point for 130 districts in Texas which have fewer than 100 students in 12 grades. It is sponsored jointly by the Texas Small Schools Association and the Texas Education Agency, which provides a traveling staff to carry ideas from district to district throughout the state. In 10 years the project has grown from just 18 participating districts. Area districts participating include Chester, Colmesnell and Spurger.

Eighty-six is just a thin-air number — the workshop will range through so many topics that participants could go home with many more ideas, counting combinations and permutations.

Keynote speaker will be Dr. Benjamin Carmichael, director of the Appalachia Educational Laboratory, Inc., Charleston, West Virginia, and Dr. Lorrin Kenamer, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

A series of special sessions on education about the environmental crisis is scheduled for Wednesday, July 8. Other timely topics include non-graded elementary schools, the use of teacher aides, new laws in the state's Foundation Program, crime and narcotics, and kindergarten in the 1970's.

Twenty-one special interest groups will range from teaching specific levels in elementary school through subject matter areas in high schools.

The Summer Seminar for Talented Students is scheduled in conjunction with the workshop. In this small school program each participating school sends two students to Austin to take part in a variety of activities arranged by a coordinator and The University of Texas.

More than 400 Texas districts are eligible for the Small Schools Project. However, participation requires a definite commitment of effort and resources.

Dale Carmichael of the Texas Education Agency is director of the Small Schools Project. Other Agency staff members working with the small schools include Mrs. Betty Gurtman and Charles Merrill, both consultants.

DETDC Meets At Reservation

The annual meeting of the executive committee and board of directors of the Deep East Texas Development Council was held Thursday (June 25) at the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation west of Woodville.

Progress reports, budget for 1970-71, and the election of officers for the coming year were among the items on the agenda. Josiah Wheat, Woodville, was elected president. Other officers for 1970-71 are Judge Peyton Walters of Livingston, vice president; Archie Scroggins, Nacogdoches, secretary; and Mickey Riley, Corrigan, vice president.

Neal Pickett, executive director of the 13-county development council composed of the following counties: Angelina, Hardin, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity and Tyler, gave the executive director's report.

The executive committee recommended several amendments to the by-laws be amended.

The executive committee approved a budget for 1970-71 of \$118,000.00. Income will be obtained as follows: EDA \$35,000; HUD \$12,000; State \$17,500; Texas Criminal Justice Council, \$15,000; Texas Water Quality Board \$10,400; legal cash, \$20,500; local in-kind \$7,700. The executive committee voted to request EDA not to reduce the budget at this time and it is recommended that we apply to EDA for the same grant that we received last year," Pickett said.

Members of the natural resources committee met with John Kinkaid, state conservationist and Claude Compton, area conservationist and others June 17 in San Augustine and recommended that plans be made to make application for a resource conservation and development project. Another meeting will be held July 20 in Diboll when further plans will be made.

Richard Thomas and Dr. Robert Singer made a progress report on Goals for Texas. Several projects "very important to us in Deep East Texas" will be submitted at a later date. Ed Grisham, state planning coordinator has written, "We have your goals in our office and they appear to be in good shape."

Judge Peyton Walters has announced the organization of the Polk County Planning Committee, to be headed by Walter Bremer. This committee will be responsible for organizing a Polk County Housing Authority and a Polk County Solid Waste Disposal Authority.

IRS Says Income Tax Practitioners Exams To Be Held

Tax practitioners who seek to qualify for enrollment to practice before the Treasury Department may get full information on the Special Enrollment Examination from the Internal Revenue Service District Office at Austin.

The Special Enrollment Examination is not an examination to obtain employment with IRS. It presents an opportunity each year for those who are not attorneys, certified public accountants, nor qualified former Internal Revenue Service employees, to establish proof of competence. This is required of tax practitioners who seek to acquire enrollment status in order to represent their taxpayer clients at all levels of procedure before the Service. The program is of special interest to public accountants of the Nation.

District Director R. L. Phinney said that it is not too early for persons so interested to request application forms and instructions for this annual examination which will be conducted again in Austin on September 28 and 29, 1970. The examination will be similar in content to that held in 1969.

Deadline for filing application to take the examination is August 31, 1970. Requests for forms and information should be addressed to Chief, Administration Division, Internal Revenue Service, 300 East 8th Street, Austin, Texas 78701.

"I am urging all Texans to adopt the Drive Safely and Slowly during this holiday and to avoid unsafe practices which contribute to accidents," Spair said.

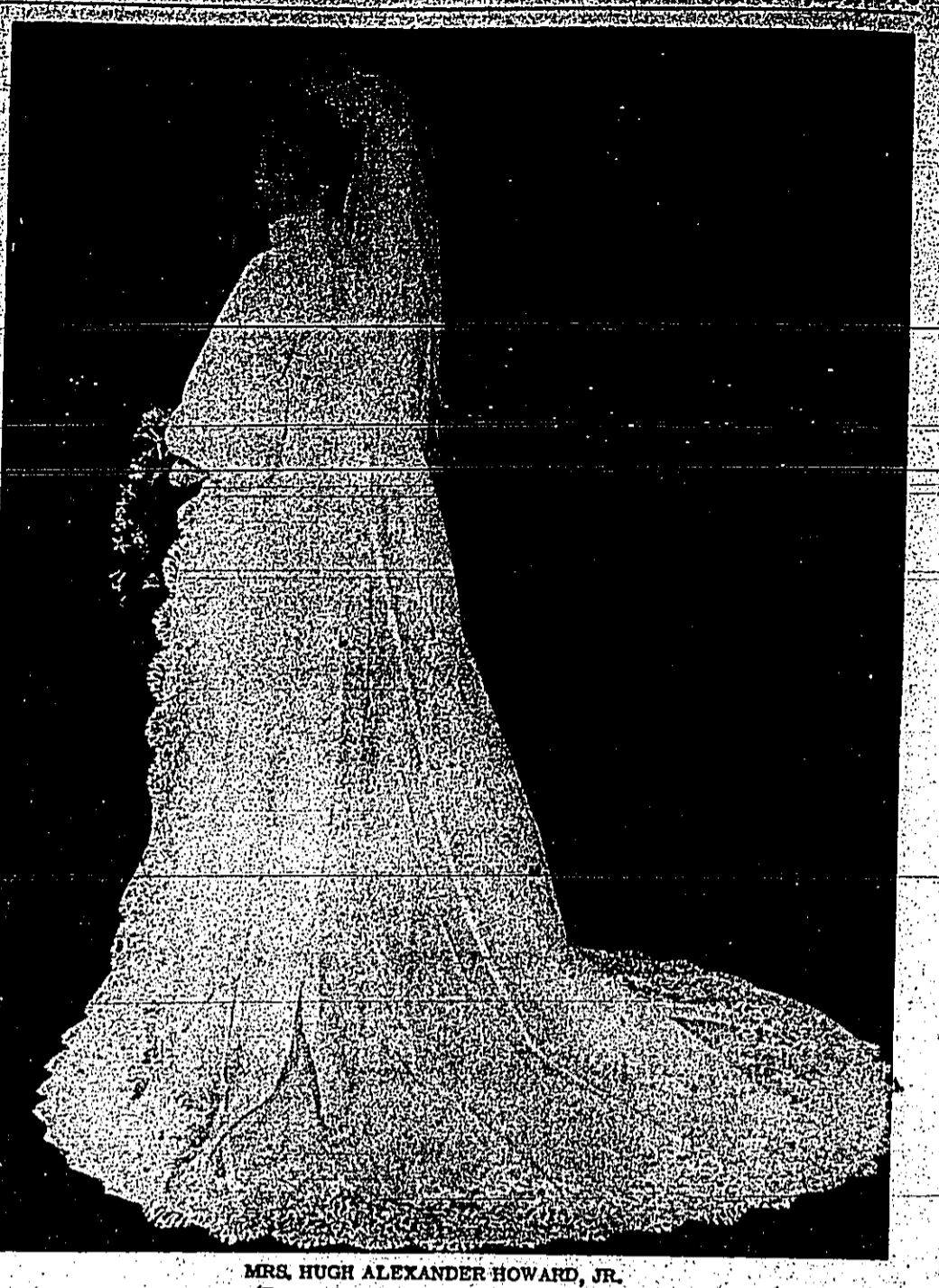

Ag Notes

Farm animals for some unexplained reason, seem to have a liking for small bits of wire, nails, scraps of hardware, screws and bolts. Many owners have been made aware of this fact.

Remove wire fences before small bits of the wire drop into the grass and become a hazard to grazing livestock. After a construction job in the backyard, it is worth the time and effort to sweep the area thoroughly or drag it with a sweep of serrated magnets.

With warmer weather, insect pests will increase and this means, says County Agent Clinton Currie, insecticide use will also become more widespread.

Early spring is the time to begin a fertilizer program. Water-temperature should be 60 degrees F. When the first application of fertilizer is made, most Texas waters respond to an initial treatment of 100 pounds of 20-20-5 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatments of 50 to 100 pounds per acre.

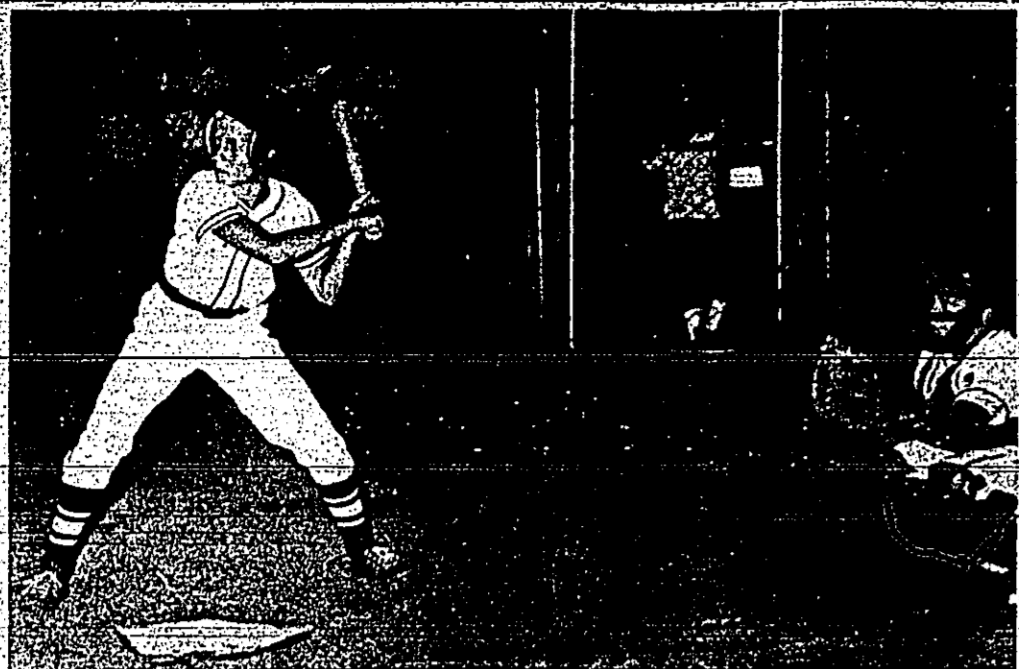

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Homemaking Hints

Time to stock up with no-meat fruit goodies. Jelly, jam, conserve, marmalade and preserves can all add new "meats" to your diet. They also provide a good way to use fruit not at its best for canning or freezing, such as the largest or smallest fruits and berries and those that are irregularly shaped. Preserve your family with a batch of sparkling, colorful jellies, jams or preserves. You can make good use of fresh fruit now available and others coming to the market soon. Basically all of these products are much alike, all of them are fruit preserved by means of sugar and usually all are jellied to some extent. Their individual characteristics depend on the kind of fruit used and the way it is prepared, the proportions of different ingredients in the mixture and the method of cooking. Many have asked what is the difference among preserved fruit products. Jelly is made from fruit juice; the product is clear and firm enough to hold its shape when turned out of the container. Jam is made from crushed or ground fruit, tends to hold its shape but generally is less firm than jelly. Conserves are jams made from a mixture of fruits, usually including citrus fruits of ten raisins and nuts are added. Marmalade is a tender jelly with small pieces of fruit distributed evenly throughout, a citrus marmalade commonly contains orange peel. Preserves are whole-fruit or large pieces of fruit in a thick syrup often slightly jellied. Pectin, acid and sugar form the jelly trio. Pectin is the natural substance found in fruits which makes the jelly "jelly". The amount varies in different kinds of fruits. There are no set rules in buying vegetables because they all have individual characteristics and values. Most are most often featured include chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, and ground beef. In the pork department, look to shoulder roasts and steaks, rib and loin chops, picnic and canned ham as good choices, price wise.
