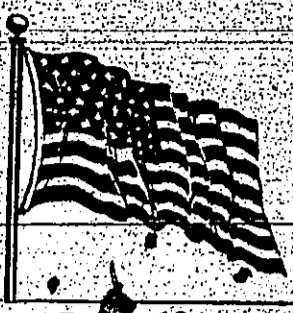

MISS TEXAS PAGEANT

Former Miss America To Emcee

The former Miss Anne Jayroe, who was Miss America in 1967, will be mistress of ceremonies for the Miss Texas Pageant at Will Rogers Auditorium.

Now Mrs. Paul Henry Petersen, she will present the 66 contestants vying for the state title during the three nights of preliminary competition beginning at 8 p.m. Wednesday, July 15 through Friday, July 17. She also will emcee the coronation program beginning at 8:30 p.m. July 18, to be televised regionally beginning at 10:15 p.m.

Featured for the second year will be singer Joe DeVito who will make his third appearance on the Miss America Pageant telecast in September in Atlantic City. The young entertainer was graduated recently from Rider College in Trenton, N.J. He will sing during a dance by Linda Pate, last year's Miss Tyler County.

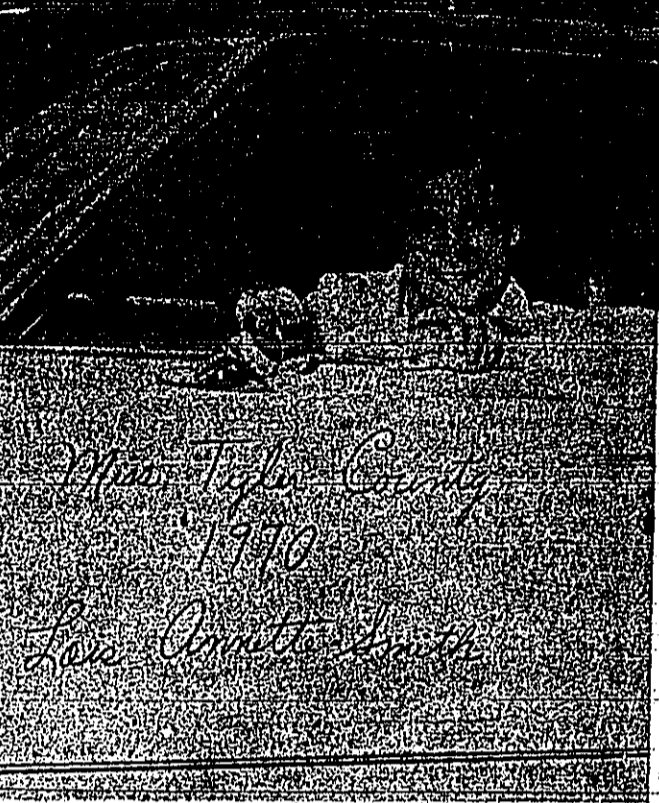
He will be backed by five popular contestants from last year's pageant, including singer Janis Lacy, Miss Center 1969 and Miss Panola County 1969. Other dancers will be former Misses Sherry Daniel, Miss Gladewater, Sherry Smith, Miss Southwest Texas State University, and Dianna McClain, Miss East Texas State University.

Contestants for the 1970 title will not take part in production numbers, although Dana Dowell, the reigning Miss Texas, will. Choreographers will be Joy and Dale Riley. Musical director will be John Giordano and conductor, Lew Gillis.

Janet Anne Jayroe remembers her tour of Vietnam as the highlight of her reign as Miss America. She was later welcomed at the White House by former President Lyndon Johnson.

Representing Oklahoma at the 1967 Miss America Pageant, the brown-haired, green-eyed beauty was a music major at the University of Oklahoma. She married Paul Petersen, an Oklahoma school student, in August, 1968.

Man Hangs Self

The body of S. A. Brandt, about 45, was discovered hanging from a tree in front of a room at Willis Motel about 6 a.m. Tuesday.

Justice of the Peace J. H. Loggins, who conducted an inquest, said the man left a note directing persons to be notified. He had checked into the motel about 5 p.m. Monday and had apparently occupied the bed for some time before hanging himself from the tree.

Brandt was a salesman working out of Yoakum for a saddlery firm. He was driving a pickup truck with a cover in which he carried saddles and other leather goods. An address on his truck keys gave a Shreveport address and in this note he used that address to notify Mrs. S. A. Brandt, presumably his wife.

However, he directed that a Yoakum funeral home be notified to come for his body. He also directed that his employees at the saddlery firm be notified of his death.

Judge Loggins said that prescription medicines in the man's luggage indicated that he apparently was in ill health—possibly with heart trouble.

Firemen Have Busy Week

Woodville's Volunteer Fire Department has had more than its quota of fires during the past week.

The volunteer firemen have answered 11 calls from Thursday through Monday. No calls were received Tuesday up to 3:30 p.m. as this was being written.

Monday's rash of fire calls, four in all, were rural and kept the fire department's rural truck on the run.

The busy week for the firemen began last Thursday with a call to a residence in town where a stove was thought to be overheating. Two grass fires Friday and two Saturday were answered with the rural truck, and another Sunday morning north of Doucette in which residences were threatened by woods fires.

Monday's four calls started with a run to a bridge fire on a county road one mile south of Triple D Guest Ranch. Firemen reported that the wooden structure had apparently been set on fire about the center.

A woods fire west of Woodville on the old Pure Oil road just west of Harmony threatened some buildings and the fire destroyed one storage shed.

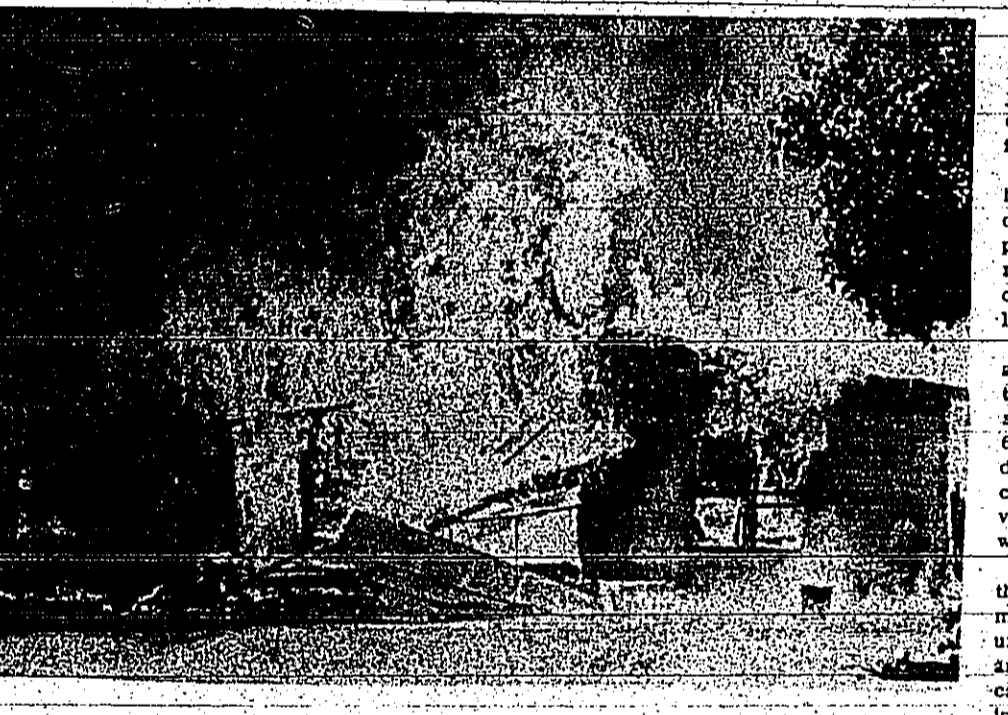
Monday's third call was to a house fire three miles east of Doucette. The house and a pickup truck parked nearby were destroyed. The house was occupied by the Arthur Settler family.

Later Monday the firemen answered a call to a pulpwood truck fire about seven miles south of Woodville on Highway 69. A dragging chain evidently hit the truck's gas tank causing an explosion. The driver jumped from the truck and was apparently unharmed.

Firemen caution everyone that the extremely dry weather makes the fire danger high and urge caution in burning trash and leaves. Any outdoor fire can quickly spread to adjoining grass or brush to cause a woods or grass fire which can endanger dwellings and other buildings.

The Texas Forest Service's district office also is pointing up that dry conditions can cause wild forest fires, which can burn across several acres before being brought under control. Only two large fires have been controlled by the Forest Service in the past few days. One was in Polk County which burned 20 acres and another in Hardin County which also burned 20 acres.

Unless some rain falls the fire danger will become greater as the dry, hot weather continues.

be highlighted at the state convention. Jerry Brown is director of the KHS band.

Gray said he needed one that has not been sided with asphalt or other material and that was in good condition.

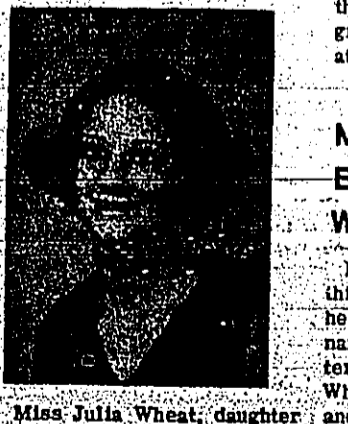
New Rotary President Takes Office

Rotary Sweetheart

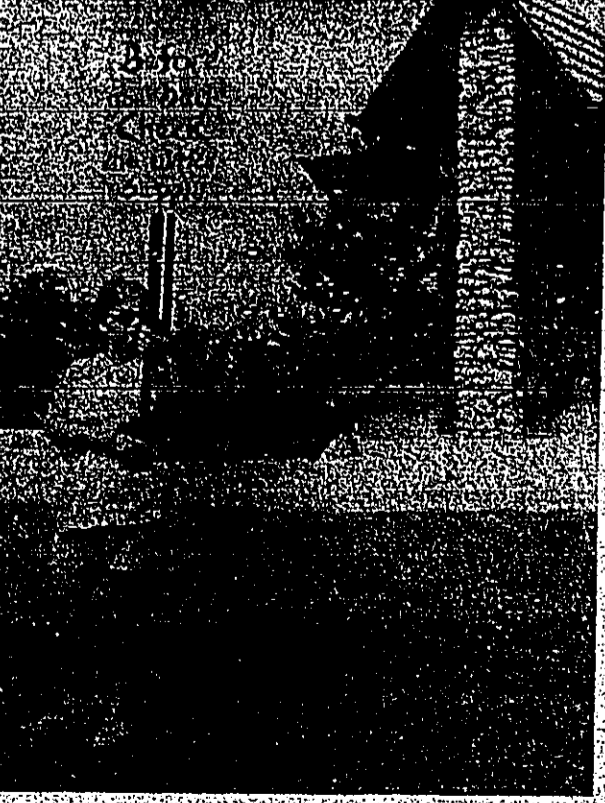

Lake Ivanhoe Has Water Woe

Residents of Ivanhoe, Land of Lakes, a subdivision just south of Woodville, were picketing the entrance gate over the Fourth of July holiday in a dispute over the lack of pressure in the water supply system.

The picketing led to a hearing in justice of the peace court Tuesday morning on a complaint filed against one of the residents of the subdivision for destroying personal property, a sign which she allegedly took down after it had been put up in rebuttal to the pickets' signs.

Two pickets carrying signs reading "Before You Buy Check the Water Supply" paraded before the entrance at Ivanhoe over the weekend. The manager had placed the destroyed sign on a "Stop" sign at the entrance to the subdivision and when one of the pickets pulled it down he filed the complaint alleging destruction of private property, a misdemeanor since the sign was valued at less than \$50.

About 20 residents of Ivanhoe crowded the county court room where Justice of the Peace J. H. Loggins had set the arraignment of the woman. She entered

a plea of not guilty and asked for a jury trial.

Attorney Clyde E. Smith, who had been asked to sit in for County Attorney Rols Brockman, who was on vacation, explained the proceeding to the defendant and spectators. He told them this was merely an arraignment and that the defendant could enter a plea and that a jury trial could be held later.

However, he suggested that as neighbors, the defendant, other Ivanhoe residents, and the manager try to get together and iron out their differences. Other Ivanhoe residents spoke up in support of this suggestion.

The manager agreed to the meeting and also withdrew the charge against the defendant. Residents of the subdivision complained that the owners have failed to keep the water system geared to the number of homes built there and that times there is not enough water pressure "it's wet a toothbrush." They said previous complaints about the inadequate water system have been ignored.

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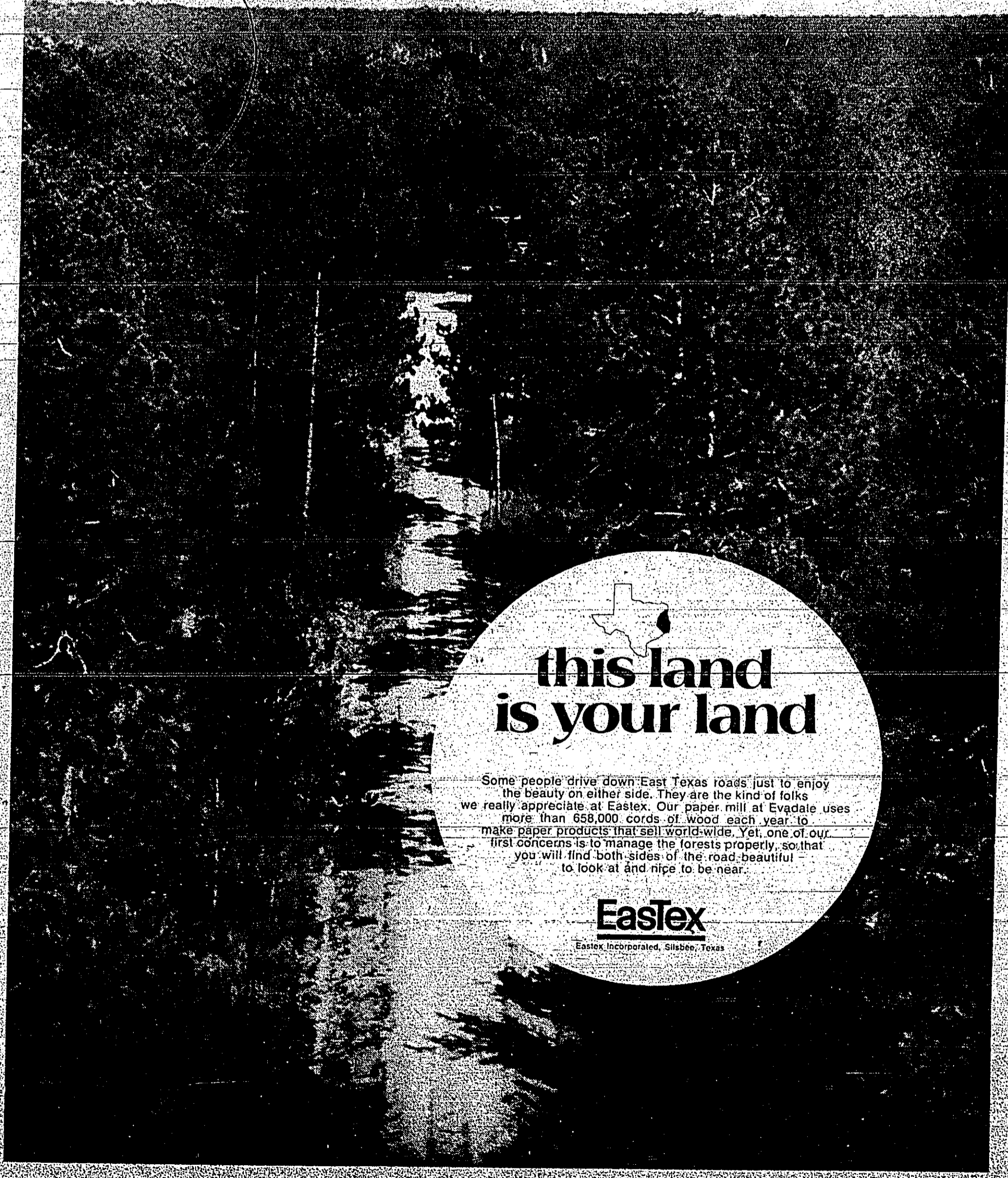
