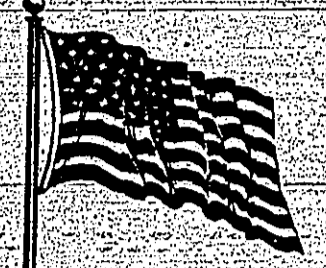

School Trustees Approve Auxiliary Personnel Monday

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District in its regular meeting Monday night accepted bids for two old school buses, approved the employment of auxiliary personnel (transportation and lunchroom) and accepted the resignation of two teachers. The financial statement for June was approved and the report on tax collections for June was given the board showing that 94 percent of the year's taxes had been paid. The bid of the First Baptist Church of Groves for the two old buses, totaling \$850, was accepted. Only one other bid was received. Resignations of Carol Jones and Betty McCully as teachers were accepted. Superintendent H. McGuire said that the faculty for the coming school year is complete with more applications than vacancies. The school calendar for the coming year was amended slightly but will not effect the dates for beginning or ending the school year. In discussing the lunchroom, Mr. McGuire said it was operating in the black at 30 cents per pupil per meal. He said the lunchroom program receives federal assistance of nearly \$80,000 about one-half of which is in surplus foods.

Jack Daniels Attending Conference Of Superintendents At Colorado U.

Jack Daniels of Warren is among 34 city school administrators from 15 states who are participating Sunday through Friday in the 22nd annual University of Colorado Conference of City Superintendents at Boulder. The conference is sponsored by the CU School of Education. Dr. Calvin Greider, CU professor of school administration and graduate studies coordinator, directs the conference. Dr. O. L. Plucker, Kansas City, Kan., superintendent of schools since 1962, is conference consultant. Plucker is chairman of the Mid-Continent Regional Education Laboratory board, a member of the American Association of School Administrators advisory board, and a National Schools advisory committee member. He has a doctorate from CU, and he was superintendent from 1954 to 1968 of Independence, Mo. schools. The city school administrators will discuss problems they have in common pertaining to curriculum and instruction; personnel administration; pupil personnel; assessment and evaluation; organization and administration; finance and business; school and community relations; and federal-state-local relations.

America Still Is...

ONE WOMAN'S OPINION By Mrs. Ethel O. Hill

America, in the summer time, is vacation minded, camping, look-out, tourism minded, and in some sections, still minded to carry on the old traditional, early American religion's camp meetings.

Perhaps the most outstanding of these was and is the cowboy camp meeting held up in the Davis mountains. Its history is a vividly colored page of Texas lore.

It began when a young minister, Rev. W. B. Floyd, of the mountainous section of Texas, because of ill health, sought a change of climate and settled in the small settlement of Coleman which consisted mostly of small dwellings of mud

and buffalo hides, or adobe houses and of course, a saloon, which was the best and biggest building in the town. Bro. Floyd began a renewal of health in the pure, unspoiled air of mountainous southwest Texas, began preaching his sermons of love and life everlasting in a room above the saloon, and his faithful flock soon had gathered the few children in the community and conducted a first and second grade school, soon Rev. Floyd was known far and wide and was called on to officiate at weddings, funerals, baptisms and for Christian consolation up to the most remote hamlets on the mountains. It was never too cold, too hot, too far, or too anything for the preacher to answer a call. Soon he was suggested that a camp meeting was a real need, to draw together the far-separated ranchers and cattlemen of the area.

The idea "hook hold" like a prairie fire, and the first gathering was public. It was in 1897. In true early American fashion it was to last a week. The place selected was at a spot called "Skillman's Grove" (which has a vibrant history all its own). The gathering was to be under a grove of beautiful live oak trees, and the preacher's stand was under a mammoth tree, now known as the prayer tree. As the people began to gather, oxcart, wagons, horse back, Bro. Floyd was there to greet them, his pulpit was an arched coffee-box, but it was graced by a Holy Bible and a worn copy of Christian hymns. Therefore, it was touchingly beautiful.

Around the pulpit the men arranged wagon seats and boxes for the growing, women spread colorful, home-picked quilts on the ground for children and babies, and the meeting was on. The women had worked for a week preparing the best clothes, and packing such needs as homemade soups, wells, some home remedies, etc.

Food enough for a small army consisted of: bones of chickens, fried, baked or stewed, great loaves of crusty bread, flour sacks full of cookies, jars of pickles, jelly and preserves, whole baked hams and big slabs of home-cured bacon, with quantities of potatoes, beans, peas, corn for extra biscuits or pancakes, jars of sugar and pounds and pounds of good fresh, crackly coffee.

It was the greatest and first community get-together for these far-separated ranchers, farmers, cowboys and trail drivers with a good number of people from the small towns nearby, meaning only a hundred or two miles from the mountain side. Unconscious of inconveniences or hard work, they listened, were heartened and refreshed in the joyful, heartfelt words of their beloved sky pilot as the cowboys often called Rev. Floyd, the first minister to preach in the mountainous region of Texas called the Big Bend, the top of the world.

In one can picture the scene it is epic—Miles from any other human habitation, the clear-spangled sky above, bonfires kept burning not only for light but for protection against savage creatures of the wild, the last strains of the doxology hymn "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow" seeming to linger on the gentle breeze.

There is a tender, humbly in the glances exchanged, as women lifted sleeping children from the quilts and tucked them into the fresh hay in the wagon beds and down beside them. Men wrapped their blankets around them and with saddles for pillows lay down under the wagon, their trusty guns cocked at hand.

The majestic mountains seemed to surround the small group as powerful, watchful guardians. The preacher surveyed his silent flock, and the last one to retire, spread a wagon seat on the ground and lay down beside his wooden box pulpit and slept. Peace was watchword of the night.

The mighty oak, the prayer tree, was their temple. This was started the cowboys' camp meeting in 1870 and is still going, though in vastly different conditions. Far from the brush harbor, erected the second year, the buildings both later and now modern in every

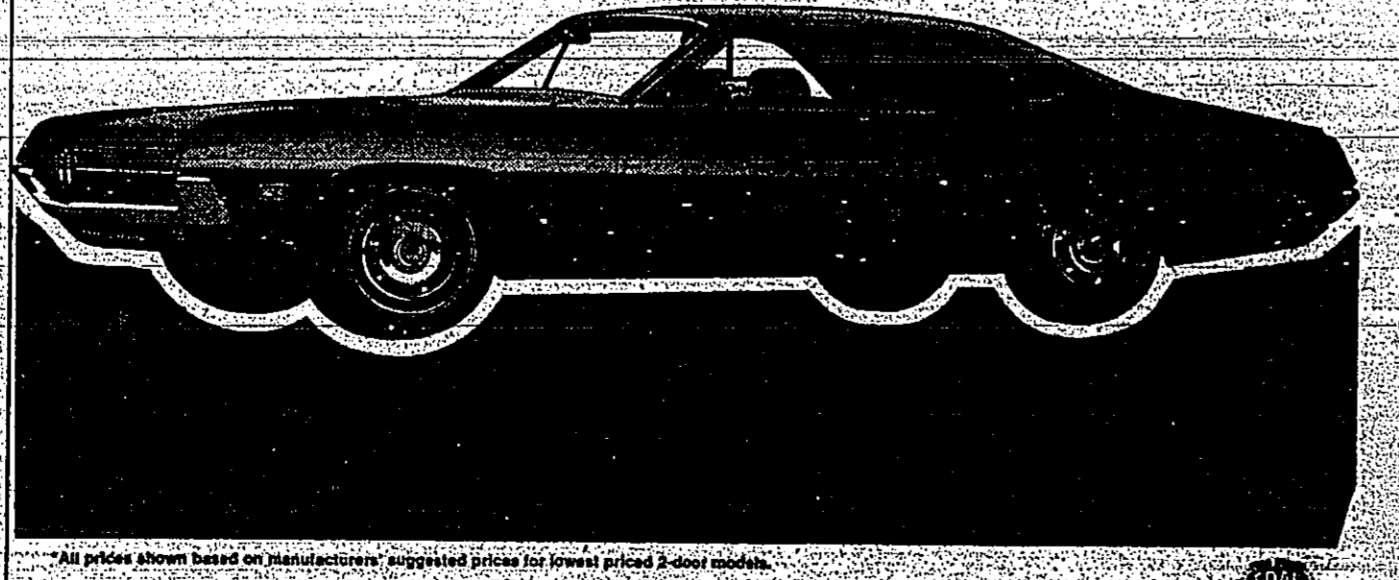

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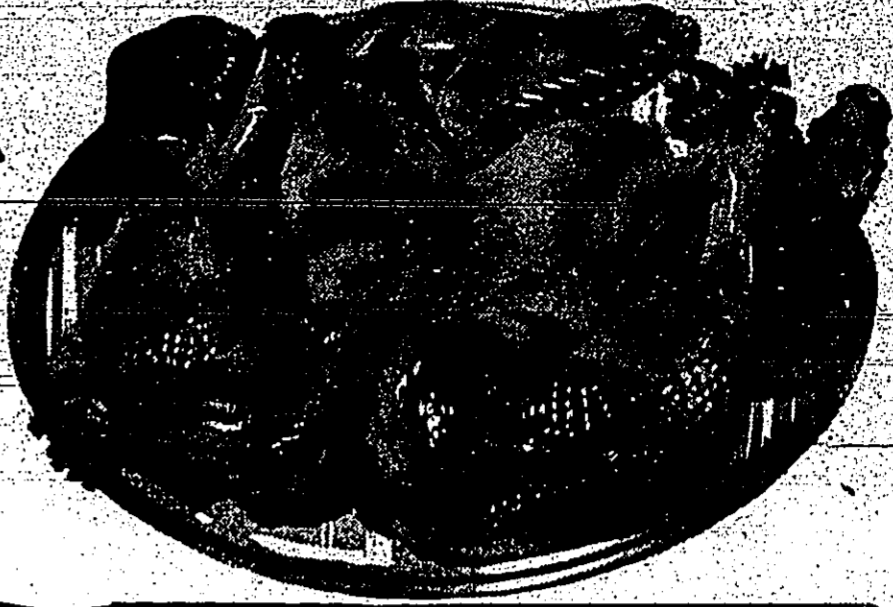
