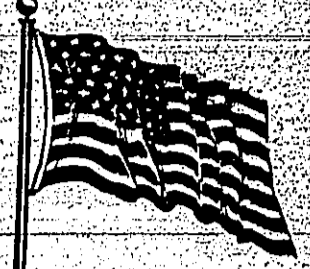

## The Incredible Flying Machine

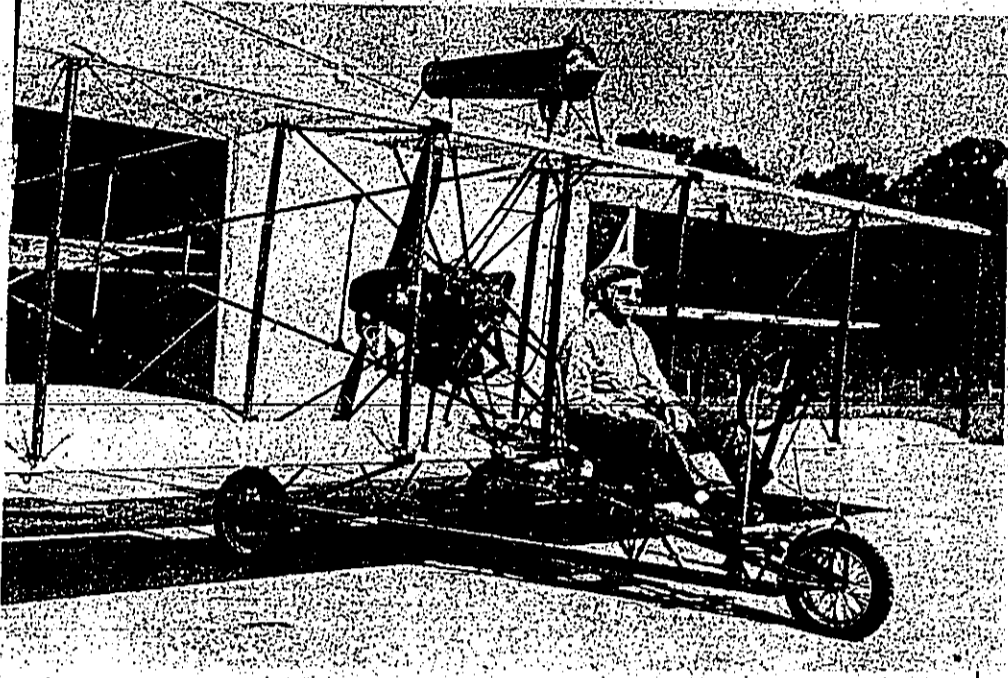
Persons near Tyler County Airport last week might have done a double-take if they saw the queer-looking craft which landed earlier in the week and took off again Friday evening.

The plane was a replica of the 1912 model Glenn H. Curtiss aeroplane built and flown by John D. Pruett of College Station. He landed the plane here early last week on the way from Crosby, Mississippi, to College Station and left it in one of the hangars until Friday when he took off for Huntsville and College Station.

Pruett, who works for Texas Forest Service, has built two of these replicas. The first, the Pruett Pusher Number 1, was completed in 1962 and flown more than 100 hours by Pruett. It was sold in 1964 to Frank Tallman and Paul Mantz for movie and TV work. It was used in the Blake Edwards production "The Great Race" by Warner Brothers. It was sold in the Talmantz dispersal sale in 1968 and later bought back for future use in the motion picture industry.

Pruett Pusher Number 2, the plane now being flown by Pruett, is an improvement over the first both in appearance and flying-qualities. In the summer of 1968 Pruett completed a 1000 mile tour in it making 23 scheduled stops and two unscheduled ones in just over 22 hours flying time. The plane has a 10 gallon gasoline tank mounted atop the upper wing and Pruett must schedule his stops accordingly.

When Pruett built the first

replica, no plans were available and it turned into a two and one-half year job. He measured the original in the Smithsonian Institute and received tips from others who had built replicas but, in the end, it was a mixture of design features from books and flying awake nights trying to figure out how to make some things work, Pruett says.

In the first model the wings, which are 26 feet, six inches long, were a duplicate of the original in construction technique in that the ribs were laminated to form from thin

wood strips. The Pusher Number Two has 11mm wings and are braced with over 300 feet of modern high strength aircraft cable, as was the first model.

Pruett says it is quite a thrill to fly the replicas of the 1912 Curtiss aeroplane. While modern, stronger materials were used, the plane retains an aura of antiquity. One concession was a modern control system.

Pruett says there are five or so Curtiss replicas now operating. He says a flight in a

plane of this type is considered more than an interesting experience and a profound lesson in aircraft evolution. In his Pusher Number One he climbed to an altitude of as high as 8300 feet which, he says, was quite a thrill to say the least.

Since Mr. Pruett was not available when the pictures were made at the airport, one of Woodville's Wright Brothers (Gilbert) posed in the pilot's seat. However, he did not volunteer to fly the machine. But it will fly and it's a tribute to the pioneers in aviation. We didn't ask for a ride in it.

## Woodville Earns Reduced Key Fire Insurance Rate From State Board

The State Board of Insurance has reduced the key rate for fire insurance in Woodville from 41 cents to 25 cents, a six cent rate reduction which will mean savings for insurance coverage for the next year.

The state agency arrives at the key rate through a system of charges for fire hazards and credits for fire prevention practices in a city.

Woodville had a total charge of 38 cents, due to deficiencies in the water works water mains, fire hydrants and building laws and structural conditions. The city also had charges for having a wholly volunteer fire department, no fire alarm system, over 40 per cent of the streets less than 70 feet wide and overhead wires in the mercantile district, and frame ranges in the mercantile district.

Then the city got a number of credits. They were two per cent for having at least two extra 100-gallon booster tanks above requirements, one per cent for use of the National Electrical Code, three per cent for teaching the methods of fire prevention and principles of fire insurance in all public schools, and two per cent for maintaining an arson reward. This totaled eight per cent of credit, equaling three cents, making the total key rate 35 cents.

### Savings Bonds Sales In June Total \$2581

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$2,581 according to Tyler County chairman David A. Feagin. Sales for the first five months totaled \$26,926 or 11 percent of the 1970 goal of \$250,000.

Texas sales during the month were \$13,658,647 compared to \$11,549,134 during June of 1969, a rise of 18 percent. Year-to-date sales totaled \$90,771,252 for 50 percent of the 1970 goal of \$179.5 million.

New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Bonds amounted to \$465 million—a 26-year peak—while sales for the first six months of 1970 were \$2,514 million, 1 percent above 1969. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$123 million were reported for the first six months which represents a 31 percent increase over exchanged through June 1969.

As of June 30, 1970, \$52.6 billion in United States Savings Bonds were outstanding, which is 23% of the privately-held portion of the public debt.

### Three Men Burned In Explosion At Well Near Midway

Three men were burned two seriously, Sunday night in an explosion at the Gulf Production well near Midway west of Woodville off Highway 190.

Two of the men were listed as critical Monday in St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont. They are Joe Hutchison, 32, of Liberty and Howard Teel, 20, of Saratoga. The other man, David Frogia, 25, of Batsion was listed in satisfactory condition.

The men were brought to Tyler County Hospital by private automobile and later transferred to Beaumont by an Edwards Ambulance.

### Twenty Years Later... Kirby High School Class of 1950 Holds Reunion



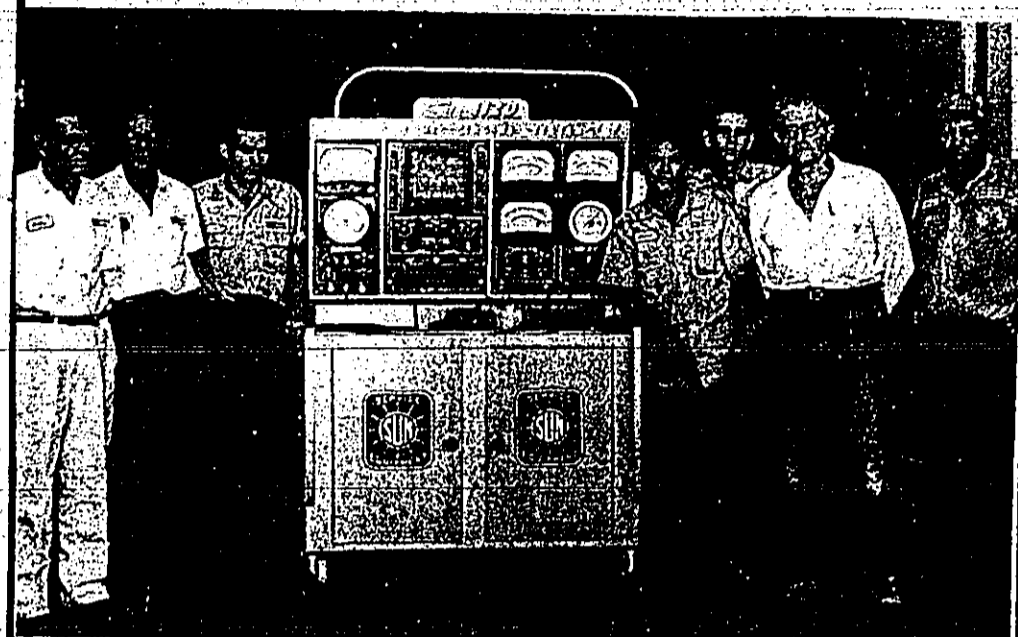

Biologist To Be In Woodville

Dennis Haag, graduate biologist, is available for on-site technical assistance to landowners and operators in the Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District. 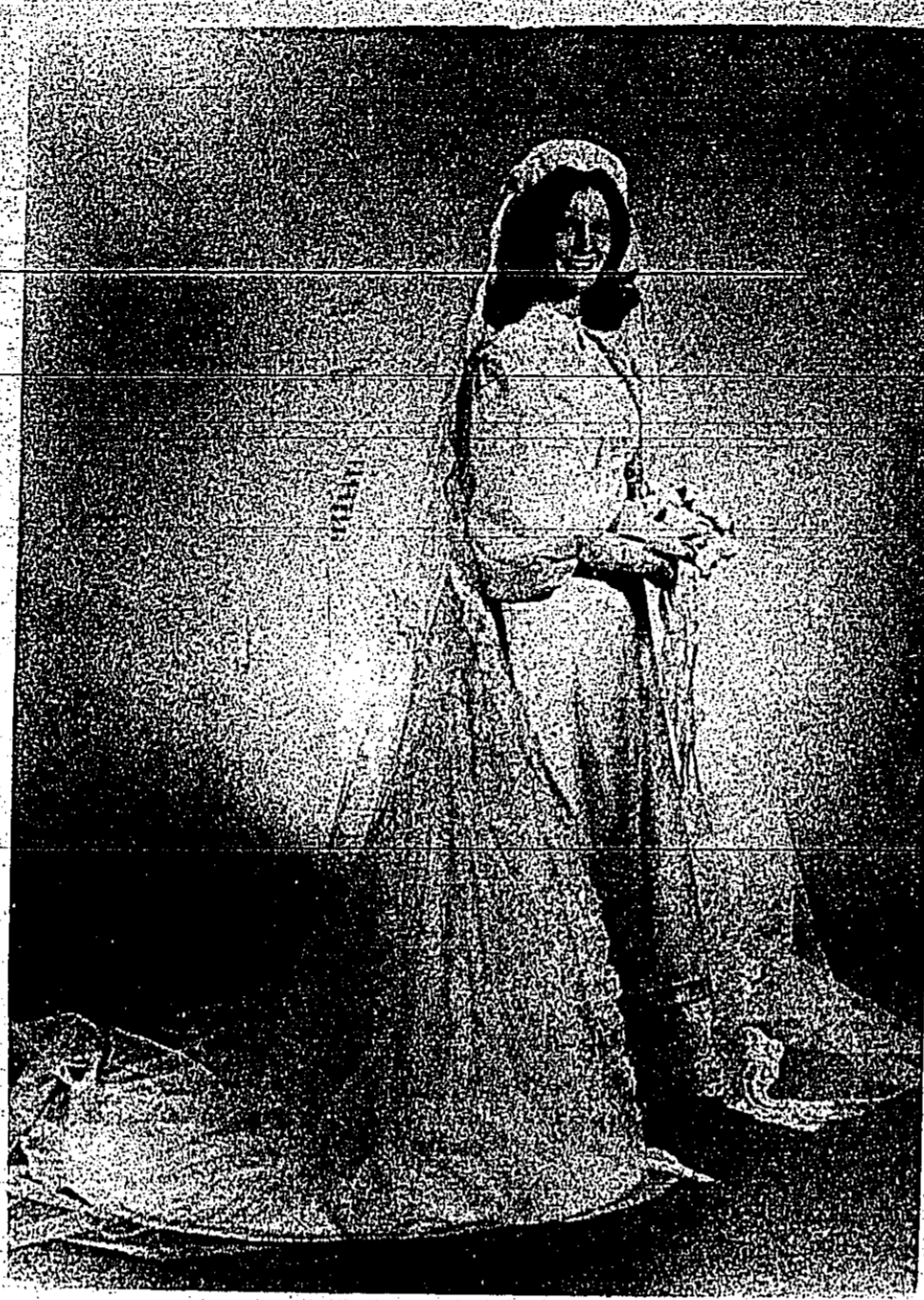

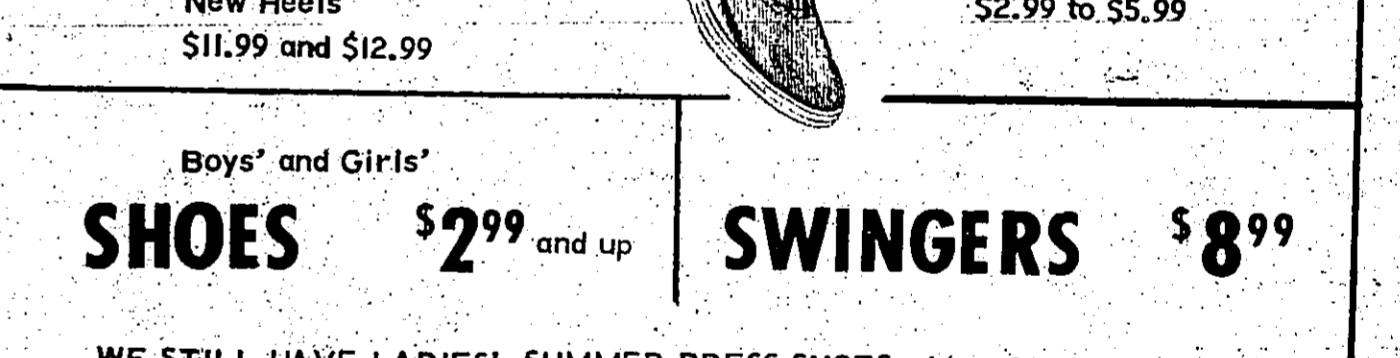

**Pollution Control Subject Of Meeting**

Problems of pollution, solid waste disposal, conservation of natural resources, and methods of solution were discussed at a joint meeting of the Deep East Texas Development Council, Natural Resources Committee and directors from five East Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

At the meeting held in the D.E.T.D.C. office in Diboll and presided over by Dr. Laurence Walker, Stephen F. Austin State University, Nacogdoches, a temporary committee, composed of C. E. Rlter, director of the Shelby County Soil and Water Conservation District,

chairman; J. D. Nixon, Lower Neches River Authority, vice chairman; Dr. Laurence Walker, head of the Forestry Department, S.F.A.S.U., secretary; Ellis Parrish, director of Nacogdoches Soil and Water Conservation District, member and J. A. Best, Davy Crockett-Trinity Soil and Water Conservation District, member; were elected to make application to the Soil Conservation Service of the United States Department of Agriculture for the establishment of the Piney Woods Resources Conservation Development District. The project will cover Houston (part), Angelina, Trinity, Nacogdoches,

Shelby, San Augustine and Sabine Counties.

The purpose of this project is to provide local leadership required for developing and carrying out a plan for the orderly conservation, improvement, development and wise use of natural resources there by improving the economic opportunities within the Piney Woods Resource Conservation Development area consisting of Shelby, Piney Woods, Upper Neches, Davy Crockett-Trinity and Nacogdoches Soil and Water Conservation Districts and part of the area covered by the Deep-East-Texas-Development Council.

It is hoped that the committee will be able to finish the application by the middle of September.

D. N. Beasley, chairman and president Jostah Wheat of the DETDC commended Area Conservationist Claude Compton and his staff for their past accomplishments and pointed out that combined with the Council, all of the important soil conservation needs of Deep East Texas could be met. "Combining the leadership of these important agencies, said president Wheat, is certainly a step in the right direction because it will save the time of busy men and women because it will devote full time to problems such as natural resources, pollution, solid waste disposal and other important mat-

ters."

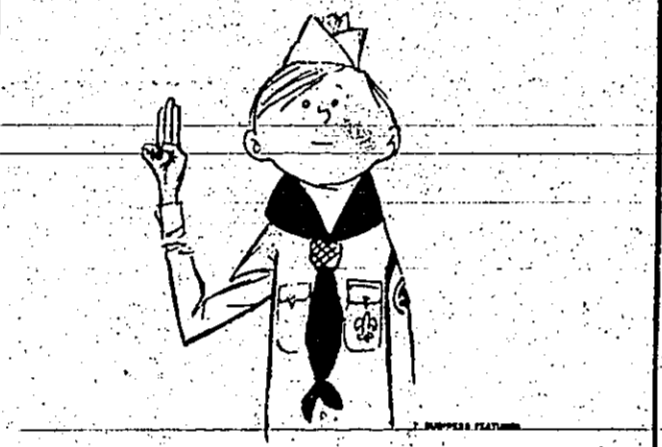

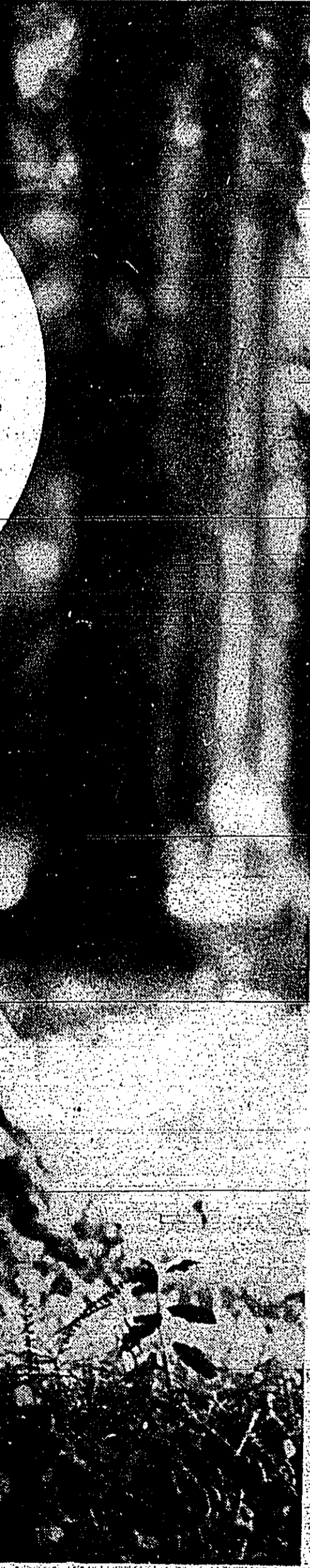

These three meetings of forty and fifty year olds were so vibrantly inspirational, so wholesomely human and so typically Texas, that I hold it to God-given privilege to have been allowed to participate in them.

I left Fort Worth by bus on a sunny morning, and before nightfall saw my first mountains, miles of wispiness, a ribbon with rivers and greenery on each side and on the left miles of chalky cliffs, with screeches and open plains.

My only visit to the cowboy camp meeting, as described in last week's column, and never quite the desire to go again. That visit to the rancher's roundup, another antique Texas institution, meaning to the ranchers of that vast section of West Texas what the A&M shortnose means to the agriculturists of this section of the state.

That, at one time, was also a unique gathering comprising boys and girls 4-11 clubs, women and men's farm assemblies, agriculture writers, editors, rural pastors, religious singer groups, always a few-ists from Washington, almost always a governor and a few legislators. It was said to be the only gathering of its kind anywhere in the world. I have written enough stories of it to fill a book. For twenty two years I did not miss a session. For some years now it has been broken down into various group meetings, each with its individual interest. The overall music meeting became too heavy.

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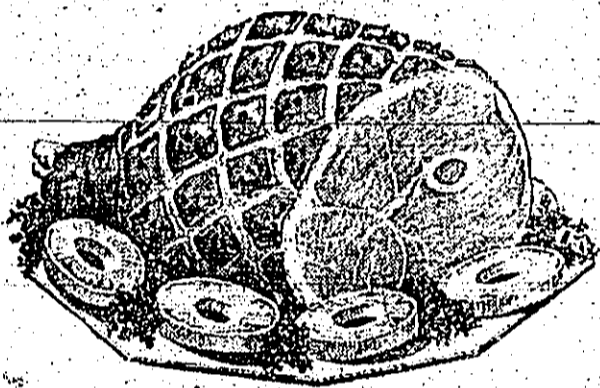
