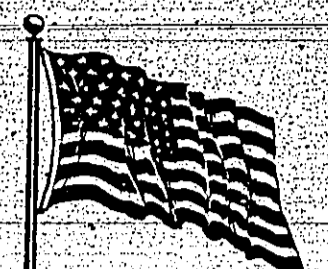

## To Vote On Seven Amendments

Texas voters will approve or reject seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution at the General Election in November. The 1970 constitution has been amended 195 times over the years while voters have rejected 125 proposed amendments.

The seven amendments to be voted on in November include two that have generated some heated interest. The most controversial is Number Two on the ballot which would authorize the legislature to enact a law permitting mixed drinks to be sold on a local option basis.

Another proposed amendment, Number 3 on the ballot, is causing some concern to local school and governmental agencies, especially in East Texas. It provides for a uniform method of assessing ranch, farm, and forest lands based on the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than on the value of such lands and the crops growing on them.

The present section is limited to lands owned by natural persons while the proposed section contains no such limitation. Too the proposed section removes the limitation that the owner is using the land as his primary occupation and source of income.

Briefly, the other amendments proposed are:

Number 1: Enlarge the powers of the Judicial Qualifications Commission to censure or remove lower court judges and justices of the peace as well as district and appellate judges;

Number 4: Make the State Building Commission a three member appointive agency;

Number 5: Permit counties to issue road bonds up to one-fourth of their assessed real property valuation on a majority vote;

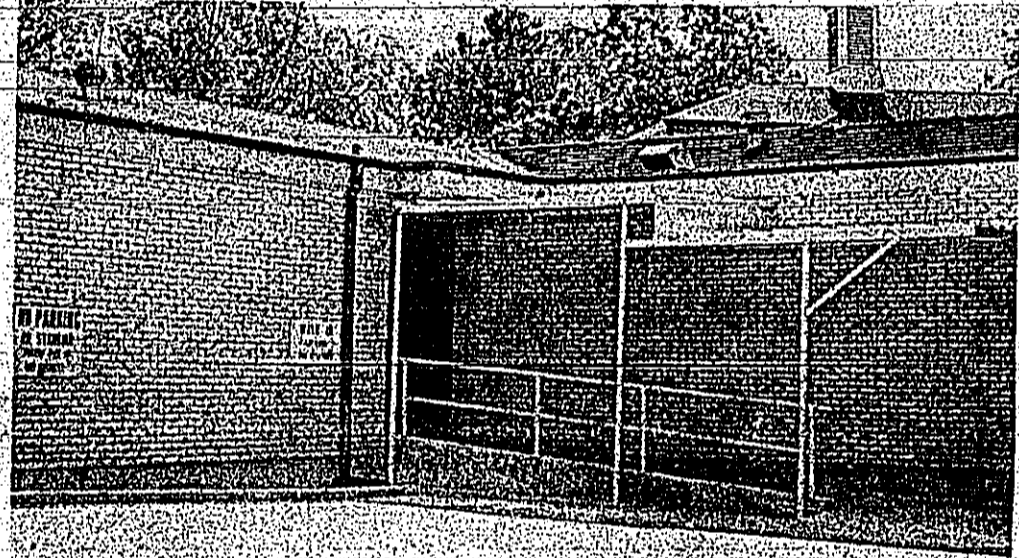
Number 6: Make town or city homesteads of \$10,000 and less exempt from forced sale. The present limit is \$5,000;

Number 7: Allow the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions by contract between the political subdivisions in any county.

Wet and dry forces are already circling for a battle over proposed amendment Number Two, the mixed drink proposal. It will be examined more closely in succeeding articles as well as the other proposed amendments.

Amendment Number Three also will be spotlighted in a subsequent article since in East Texas a major portion of the land used for forest purposes is owned by corporate subdivisions, of paper and lumber mills.

## New Patient Entrance Ready At Hospital



The Board of Managers of Tyler County Hospital announce that the new addition consisting of an emergency room and entrance at the rear of the hospital has been completed for the convenience of both ambulatory and emergency patients.

Patients may be taken to the door by driving through the entrance from Bluff street to the rear of the hospital where they may ask for a stretcher if needed. Inside the doorway a button may be pushed to alert nurses of the arrival of a patient. A waiting room is available where nurses may determine a patient's immediate need and a laboratory is available for tests.

Patients may be taken into the hospital or in case of need wheeled directly to surgery without going through the hospital proper.

The setup with the emergency room at the entrance will be especially useful in auto accidents with more than one person injured, and in other cases of emergency treatment.

Persons bringing patients to the hospital need only follow the signs at the back of the hospital (see picture). They can stop inside to push the button to alert the nurses, or a patient may do this for himself when possible.

The Board of Managers have made this handy emergency entrance available for the further convenience and proper treatment of patients, they said.

## Woodville Schools To Open August 31

The opening day for the schools of the Woodville Independent School District has been set for Monday, August 31, according to B. H. McGuire, superintendent. Registration of first grade pupils and senior high school pupils will be conducted Friday, August 28. Other elementary pupils and junior high school pupils will report for registration and instruction Monday, August 31. Buses will operate a half-day schedule, from 8:30-11:30; Friday morning, August 28, to transport first grade pupils and senior high school pupils who will require this service for registration. Regular bus schedules will begin Monday, August 31.

School lunchrooms will begin operation Monday, August 31. Price of lunches will be \$1.25 for a five-day meal ticket, or 40¢ per pupil if paid on a daily basis.

Teachers of the Woodville schools will begin a pre-school work conference Monday, August 24.

The calendar for the 1970-1971 school year calls for 180 days of instruction and 10 days of teacher work conferences. The calendar provides for holidays on September 7, November 26-27, and April 8-9. Christmas holidays begin December 23 and end January 3. First grade pupils must present birth certificates and vaccination certificates at the time of registration. Pupils born on or before September 1, 1964 are eligible to enter the first grade. A kindergarten program will begin the initial stage of operation at the beginning of the school year. Five year old pupils born between September 2, 1964 and April 1, 1965 will be eligible to attend the kindergarten, provided they meet one of the two following qualifications: (1) family annual income of \$3,000.00 or less; or (2) must be educationally handicapped to the degree that normal progress in the first grade would be in doubt. The kindergarten program is part of the state program and there are no fees. Beginning with the school year 1977-1978, all five year old pupils will be eligible to attend.

Pupils who have not been registered or who are entering the Woodville schools for the first time are urged to register prior to the opening of school by calling at the office of the principal of the appropriate grade level.

AG NOTES

The history of chancery frequently causes severe injury to pecan orchards. Although present throughout the growing season, the activities become especially serious in pecan orchards during the late summer.

The mature chancery is an inconspicuous, dark, small moth that lays eggs on young nuts and leaves. On hatching, the larvae gnaw into the nuts, destroying the inside of the green pecans.

There are several generations each year and the last one finds the shells of the nuts too hard to penetrate and so mines throughout the softer husk surrounding the shell.

As a result, nuts are slower to mature and kernels do not develop properly. Pecan varieties differ in the degree of resistance they show to chancery.

Chemical controls should begin about mid-August with an application of EPP or azinphosmethyl (Guthion) insecticide. (Note: These insecticides are not recommended for trees around homes.) Two or three applications should follow at 10 to 14 day intervals.

The spray solutions should be mixed so as to contain 1/2 pound of active insecticide ingredients to 100 gallons of water. After the final spray, three weeks must be allowed before harvesting to insure that insecticide residues are below acceptable levels.

Where azinphosmethyl is used, livestock may not be grazed in treated orchards for three weeks.
