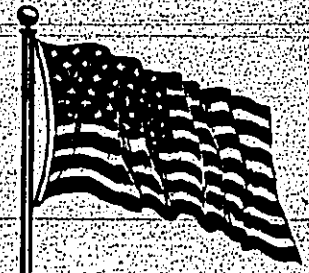

Smith Resigns From Hospital Board

Governor To Be At Reservation For Groundbreaking

Governor Preston Smith will visit Texas' only Indian Reservation Friday at 4:00 p.m. for groundbreaking ceremonies. The project is the construction of a dam, lake and camping facilities to provide Texans and out-of-state visitors an opportunity to camp in the Big Thicket and on an Indian Reservation.

The project will cost \$470,000 in which Federal, State and Tribal funds are involved. Governor Smith will represent the state government; Millard Neptune, area director of the Economic Development Administration, will represent the Federal government, and Chief Fulton Battise will represent the Tribal members.

As part of the ceremonies the governor, who is an honorary member of the Tribes, will assist the chief in making the Texas Commission of Indian Affairs chairman, Dempse Henley of Liberty and Commissioner Victor Fain of Nacogdoches, honorary lifetime members of the Alabama & Coushatta Tribes. The Indian Commissioners have served the Tribes five years and have been instrumental in securing the necessary funds to construct the new camping facilities, which will be open for the public by April of 1971.

It was announced today that Cecil Smith of Woodville had retired from the board of managers of the Tyler County Hospital District.

In his letter of resignation to the Commissioner's Court of Tyler County, Mr. Smith stated that for the past few years, his health had limited the amount of his participation in the management of the Tyler County Hospital, therefore, he felt it was necessary to step aside for someone who can be more active.

Mr. Smith was originally appointed to the board when the County took over management of the hospital from the Baptist Church in 1954.

Other members of the original board were James Wheat, R. C. Fairchild, L. P. Hicks, S. H. Reid, Jr., and Judge E. D. Walker, ex-officio member. At the organizational meeting on February 17, 1955, Mr. Smith was elected permanent president of the Board of Managers of the Tyler County Hospital.

Mr. Smith's devoted leadership and outstanding service has been instrumental in the hospital growing from the 23 bed facility of 1954 to the modern 49 bed medical facility it is today.

In his letter announcing his retirement, Mr. Smith thanked the commissioner's court, the board of managers, the medical staff, the employees of the hospital, and the people of Tyler County for their help and co-operation over the past sixteen years.

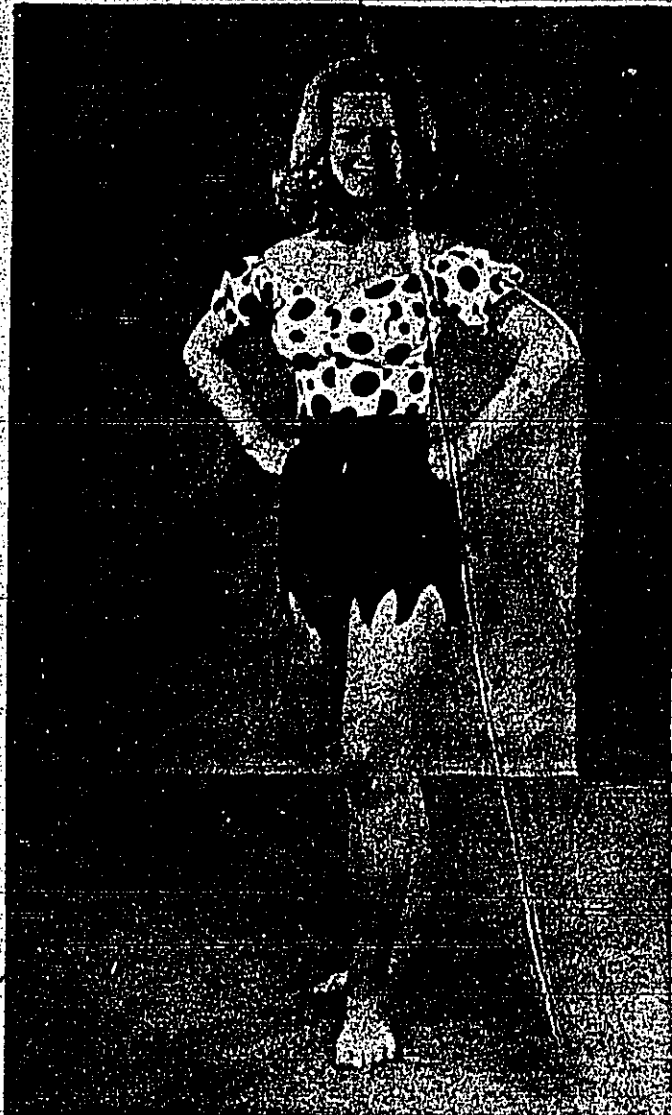
Johnny Harris has been appointed by the commissioner's court to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Mr. Smith.

Commissioners Set Tax Rate At Meeting Monday

Tyler County Commissioners Court at its meeting Monday had some good news for taxpayers when they approved a tax rate for 1970.

The county tax rate was set at 80 cents, which is four cents lower than last year. They also lowered the RW Interest Sinking Fund one cent to .14, and eliminated the .03 airport fund.

The special road and bridge rates remain the same. The lateral road special remains at .30 and the hospital district tax rate remains at .23.

In other business, the commissioners approved the 1970 tax roll as presented by Tom Sawyer, county tax assessor-collector, and the budget for 1971 as presented by County Judge Jeff Mooney.

Commissioners accepted the resignation of Cecil Smith from the board of the Tyler County Hospital and appointed Johnny Harris to replace him (see separate story). The reappointment of L. P. Hicks, Carl Fairchild and Roy Peterson to the hospital board.

Commissioners asked for bids on a car for the sheriff's department, asking for bids on a 1970 model and alternate bids on a 1971 model. These bids will be opened Friday at 10 a.m.

They also voted to hire Clyde E. Smith, Jr. as attorney to institute right of way condemnation suits where needed on Highway 59 in precinct one and Highway 287 in precinct two. This is in connection with work on widening the right of way on these two highways now under way by the state highway department.

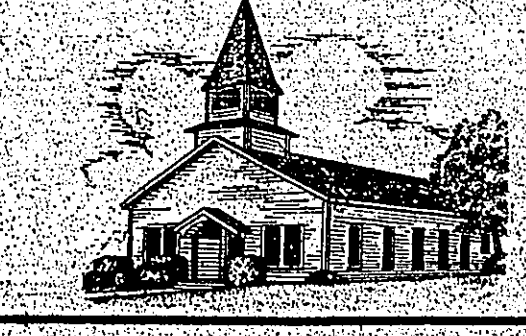

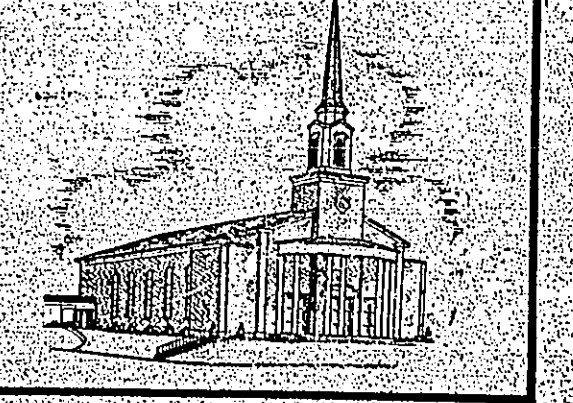
