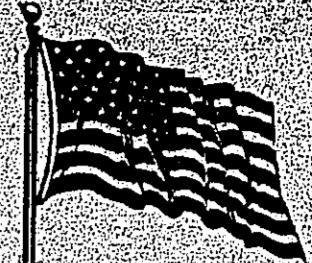

Fullerton Speaks At Dinner Tuesday

Byron Fullerton, Republican nominee for lieutenant governor, was the principal speaker Tuesday night at a fund-raising dinner at Woodville Inn. The dinner was sponsored by the Tyler County Republican party and was arranged by W. A. Coats, county chairman for the party. Mr. Fullerton was introduced by Harry W. Stafford, Woodville attorney. Over 100 persons, some of them from neighboring counties, were present to hear Mr. Fullerton express his views on state spending, welfare, pollution, drug abuse solutions, and other matters.

Mr. Fullerton declared that he believed a strong two-party system in Texas would benefit Texans in curbing state spending, speeding welfare reform, and giving the state a more efficient government.

He challenged Barnes on statements Barnes had made against a two-party system, quoting Barnes as saying that he had looked at two-party states and wouldn't trade Texas for any of them. He pointed out that Barnes had tried in the last legislature to extend the sales tax to groceries. Fullerton said that he was absolutely against a sales tax on groceries.

Fullerton also differed with Barnes on Barnes' recent statement that it is going to cost a lot of money to fight pollution. Fullerton declared that he believed that the man who caused the mess should pay to have it cleaned up.

Fullerton called for an impartial study of the drug problem, pointing out that about 50 percent of those arrested on drug charges are under 18. He declared that drug education should start with the parents and differ with Barnes on mandatory jail sentences for youthful offenders. He pointed out that about 200 Texas counties have no facilities for juvenile offenders and no probation system. He recommended a massive educational program to help combat the problem.

On state spending, Fullerton said that the next legislature is going to have to spend several million dollars to pay for expenditures obligated by the past legislative session. He said that instead of finding new ways to tax the people the legislature should do as individuals do—when they don't have the money, tighten the belt, and make do with what they have.

On welfare, Fullerton said that he found in traveling across the state, many jobs open with no one willing to take them. He declared that one thing that will help with the welfare problem is matching people and jobs. He said that he is again raising the constitutional limit of \$80 million on welfare until Texas' welfare system is reformed.

Fullerton spoke at a noon meeting of supporters in Lurkin before coming to Woodville Tuesday. He was to be in Beaumont Wednesday.

In Lurkin, he told his audience that Barnes had reacted to voters' apathy with a call for automatic voter registration. Fullerton declared that he wants to see steps taken to make it easier for people to vote, perhaps with a longer registration period, but declared that solid, foot-proof safeguards against fraud is mandatory.

In a Beaumont television interview Wednesday, Fullerton said that the automobile insurance situation in Texas is fast reaching proportions of crisis for policyholders. He said auto owners, with their backs to the wall with state laws requiring liability insurance, are at the mercy of insurance companies and that those companies are showing no mercy. He said their soaring rates are indefensible and that cancellation of policies at their whim borders on business piracy.

Marker For Wheat Home To Be Erected Oct. 17

An official Texas Historical Marker for the home of James Edward Wheat will be erected at 10 a.m. on October 17, according to George W. Barclay, chairman of the Tyler County Historical Survey Committee. The marker will be placed at the Wheat home at 107 West Wheat street in Woodville. Dedication plans will be announced in the near future.

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by the Tyler County Historical Survey Committee.

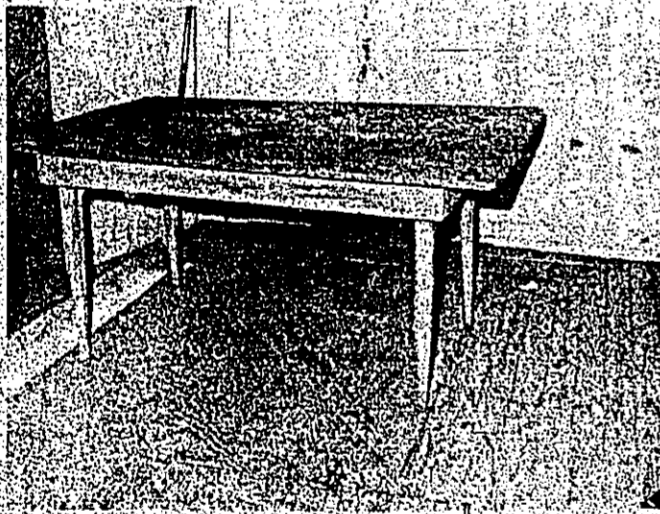
The inscription on the marker reads: Located on a 2,952.3-acre tract of Republic of Texas land

awarded in 1836 to Dr. Josiah Wheat, an early settler of Tyler County, and donor in 1847 of 200 acres for county seat, soon named Woodville. Site for this residence was acquired by William G. McDanel, who built earliest part of house (two rooms downstairs and two upstairs) in 1848. Most memorable feature was gallery over the front porch. On this gallery jurors used to sleep when housing was scarce during sessions of the county court.

The several owners after 1881 included T. C. Mann, father of 20th century U. S. Diplomat Thomas Mann.

In 1918 the house was purchased by James Edward Wheat (Jan. 6, 1887-Oct. 10, 1969), son of Light Nowlin and Martha Bryant Wheat, and great-grandson of Dr. Josiah Wheat. James Edward Wheat, an attorney, was president of the Woodville School Board (1920-49), first mayor of the city after its incorporation in 1929, and member of Texas Centennial Commission, 1936. He served on Texas State Prison Board, 1942-48; was secretary (1950) and chairman (1951-52) of the executive committee, state democratic party; also first chairman of Texas State Historical Survey Committee (1953-59). He enlarged and improved this house on his ancestral land.

Gun Collection Recovered



A suspect being questioned about the theft of 11 guns from the J. T. Winters home in the Campground community admitted taking the guns to Justice of the Peace Joe Loggins Saturday night. He then led deputies to an unoccupied house in the Harmony community where the guns were hidden under the floor of one room. The guns were taken from the Winters home Friday afternoon between 1:00 and 3:00 o'clock while Mr. Winters was at work and Mrs. Winters was away from the home. The gun collection included four shotguns and seven rifles.

The suspect was seen driving in the area of the Winters home about the time of the theft and

was brought in for questioning by Deputy Sheriffs Adnell Odum, John Wayne Davis and George McKee.

In the top picture is shown the floor of the room in the house. Looking closely, a triangular piece of plywood can be seen fitted into the flooring (left foreground). This plywood when raised revealed the cache of guns, bottom photo. The guns had been covered with a tarpaulin under the plywood.

The 22-year-old suspect, a resident of the Harmony community, is employed by a construction company in Texas City. He told Mr. Loggins that he didn't know why he took the guns.

Bass Club To Be Formed In County

Ernest Robisheau urged the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce to sponsor the formation of a bass fishing club at the regular monthly meeting Monday night at Woodville Inn.

SOIL CONSERVATION NOTES

Reducing pollution is one of the benefits of woodland conservation practices being applied by land owners and land users.

One of the forms of pollution that "adequate stands" of trees decrease is noise. Wide belts of taller trees, preferably evergreen (such as pines) give year-round effectiveness. A recent study near Lincoln, Nebraska, showed up to 65% decrease in noise.

In order to keep trees in an effective condition, periodic thinning is needed to maintain a good top growth. The owner benefits by periodic income, the neighbors by a noise abatement and local government by property taxes.

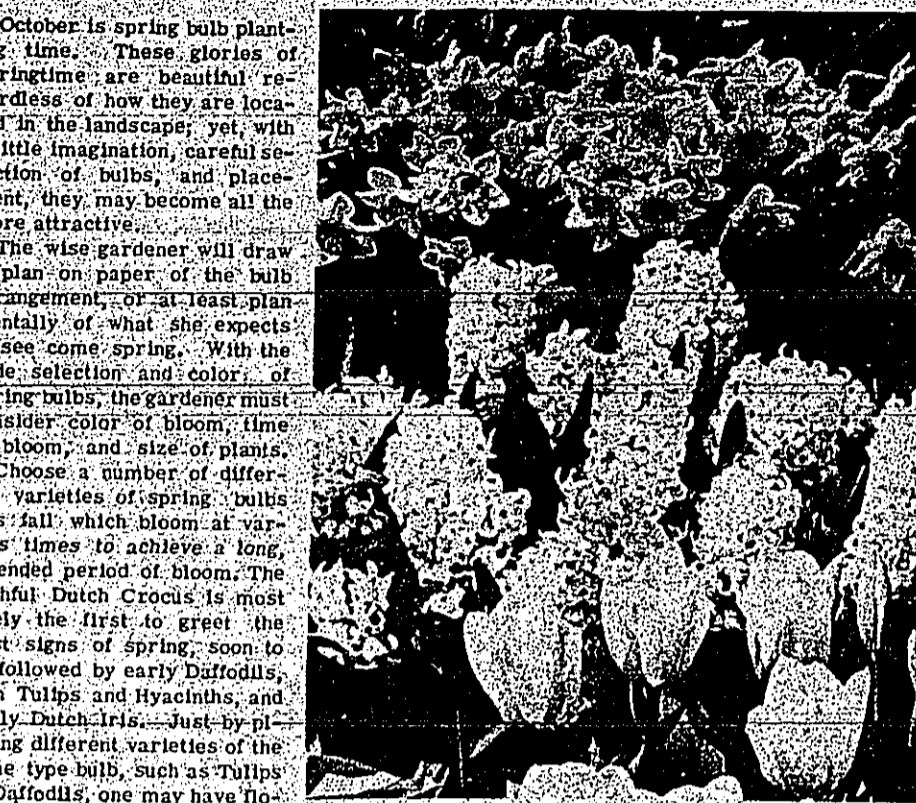

WEEKEND GARDENING

October is spring bulb planting time. These glories of springtime are beautiful reminders of how they are located in the landscape. If, with a little imagination, careful selection of bulbs, and placement, they may become all the more attractive.

The wise gardener will draw a plan on paper of the bulb's placement. He should mentally of what she expects to see come spring. With the color, selection and color of spring bulbs, the gardener must consider color of bloom, time of bloom, and size of plants.

Colorful bulb blooms stand out in a garden. They are played with a contrasting background. For example, Daffodils in a groundcover bed of English ivy or parrot tulips against a clipped evergreen hedge, or red tulips standing tall above a blanket of yellow pansies.

All good things must come to an end, therefore, plan ahead for a nice substitute for the spring bulbs once they have faded by interplanting spring and early summer annuals and perennials. Good companion plants for bulbs include evergreen groundcovers such as Agapanthus, Hosta, and English ivy. Flowering plants may include: Dianthus, Alyssum, Moss Phlox, or Thymus. Ribwort's Violas, Oxalis, and native Spring Phlox.

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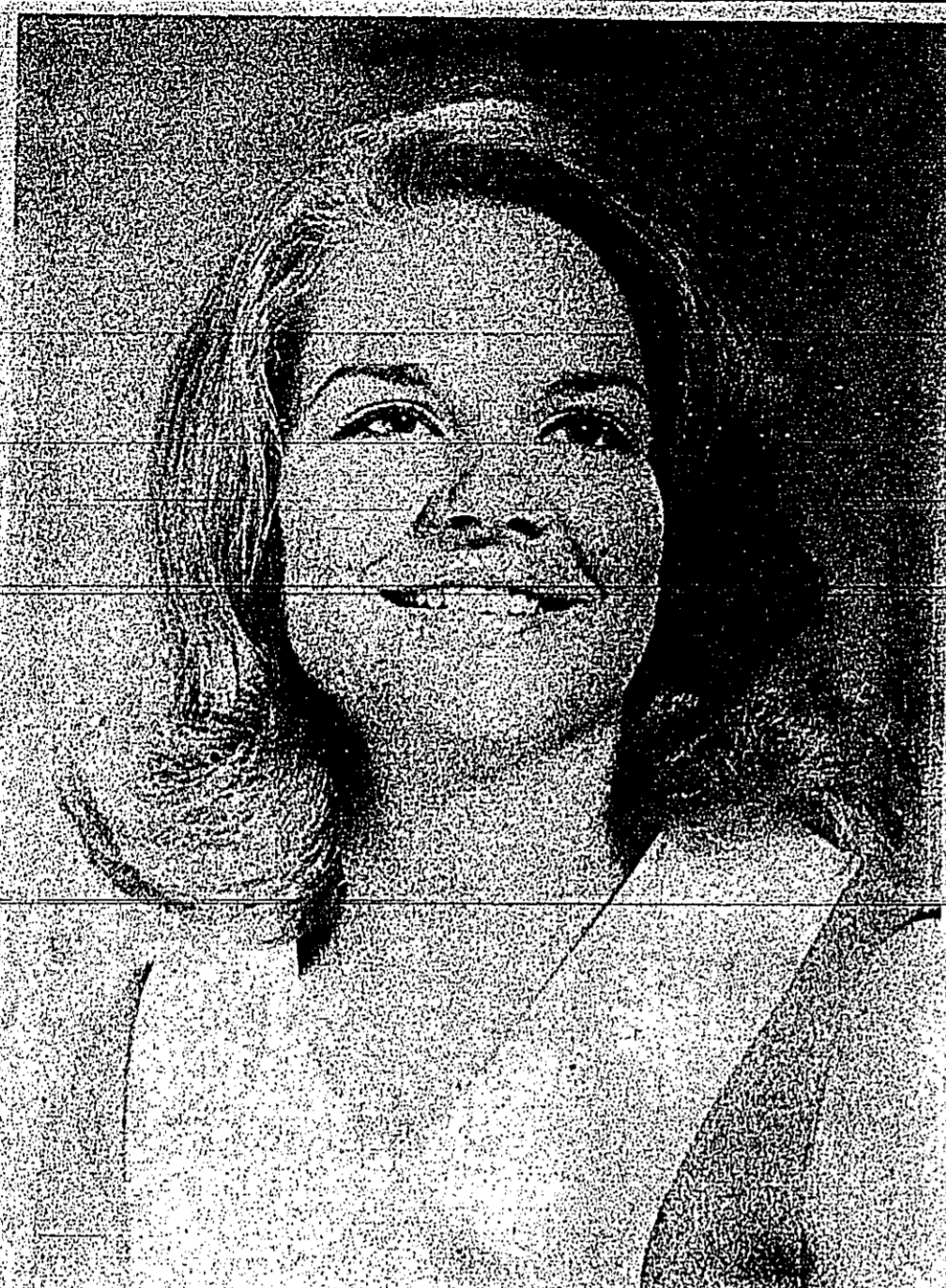

America Still Is... ONE WOMAN'S OPINION

America has thousands of bird lovers, leaved ornithologists, and just plain caretakers and feeders of birds, especially during the migration season. For some birds migration has already occurred. But during the warm fall weather of East Texas, thousands of birds are still lingering along the way, often stopping over for a rest, an area where food is plentiful. Personally I have not found any species when there are no birds in the area. In this section of Texas, our wonderful Texas, cardinals, blue jays, huffed titmouse, chickadees, and others stay with us. I have found that my own invention rail-proof, see-through feeder is a favorite feeding place for many birds this year. The construction is very simple. Two pieces of glass are placed in a wooden frame. A metal tray or piece of plywood, the upper edge of the glass held together by a strip of adhesive tape and the edges, on the base, secured by two strips of wood glued to the base. Place a container for water inside, throw the seed in from either end and then enjoy watching the birds flutter in or out. The birds and birds can see out as they eat, which they like to do. These feeders can be placed on a garden table, bench or any place.

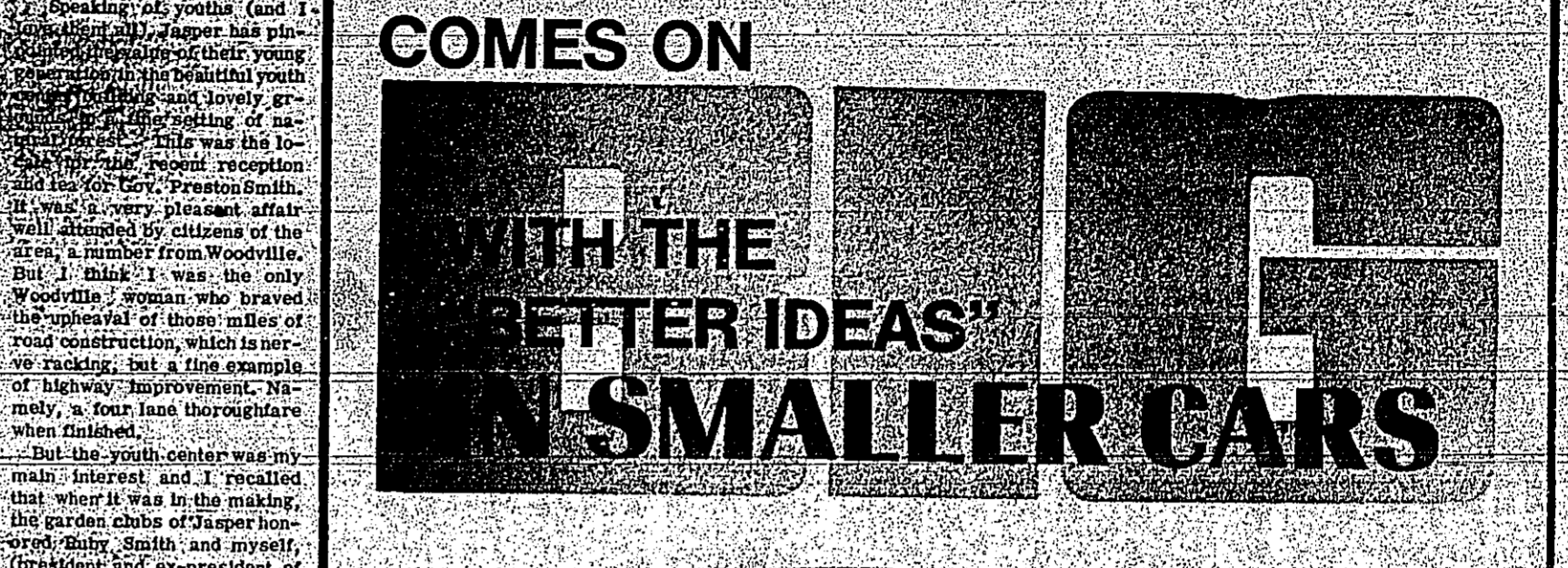

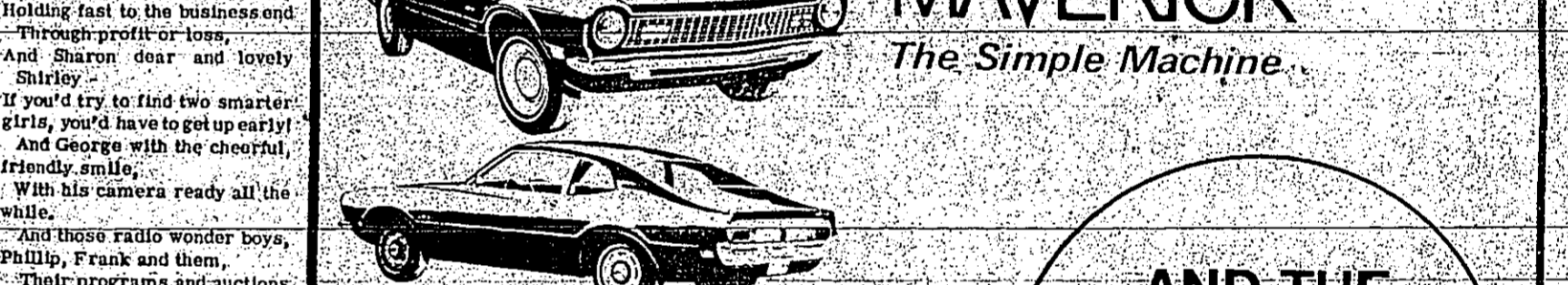
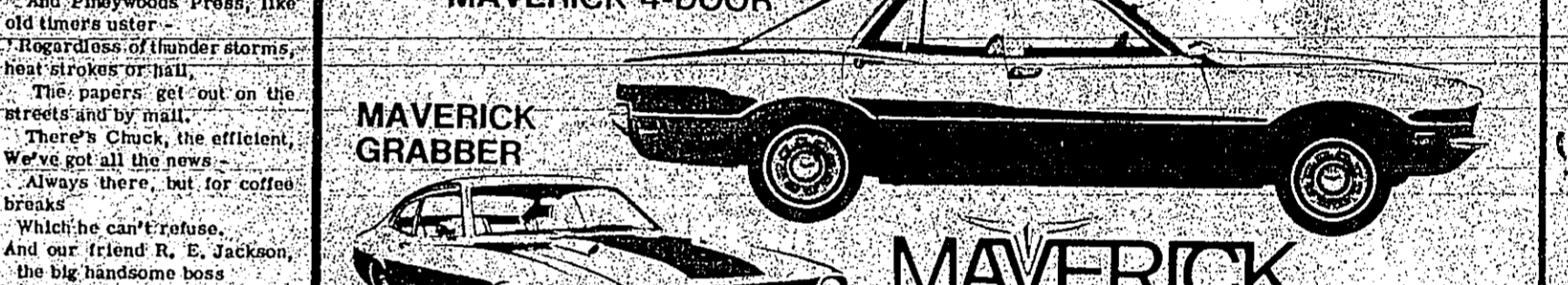

COLMESNEIL TAKES IT ON THE CHIN 30-12

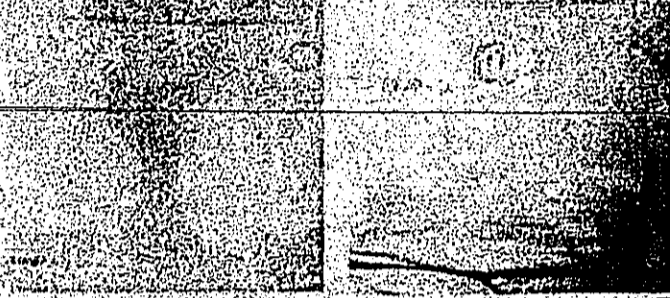
Colmesneil's Bulldogs dropped their second straight loss and third out of four decisions as the High Island Cardinals led them by 30-12.

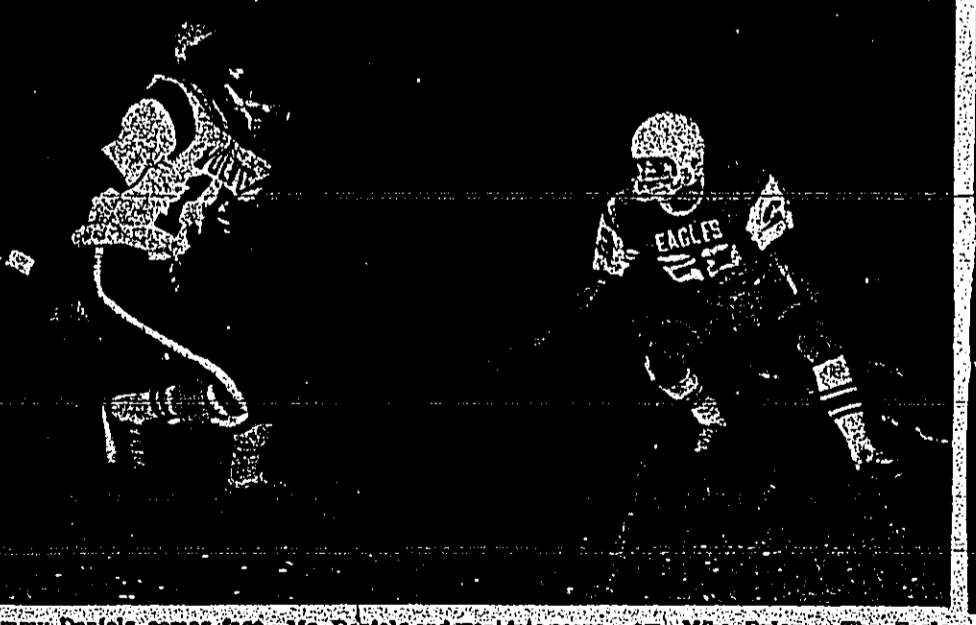
