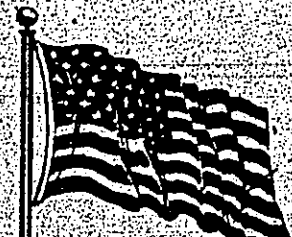

TO BE HONORED AT NACOGDOCHES

County Gold Star Boy And Girl Named

Jeanene Stanford and Roger Ogden were named Tyler County 4-H Gold Star Boy and Girl for 1970, the highest award given on the county level, at the Tyler County Awards Banquet at the Woodville Lions Den, Saturday, October 10. They will also be honored at the District Gold Star Banquet on November 3, at Stephen F. Austin State University, Main Ballroom, Student Center, Nacogdoches.

Roger Ogden, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Ogden of Colmesneil, merits this award for the outstanding work he has done in 4-H. He has been in 4-H work for 6 years and has served on many committees. The demonstrations Roger has conducted are: dairy, poultry, soil and water conservation and dairy judging three years. Roger participated in a county-wide food and nutrition campaign led by County Extension Agent and Science Teachers.

He caught a calf in the Houston Livestock Show Calf Scramble in 1968 and received a \$200 certificate from his sponsor. He purchased a Brown Swiss heifer from Lloyd Whitfire of Normangee. Roger fed and cared for his Brown Swiss heifer under the direction of his County Agricultural Agent. He showed her at the South Texas State Fair in 1968 and placed second. He showed his heifer in the Houston Livestock Show in 1969 and she placed third in her class.

Roger is active in school and community activities. He is a member of the Colmesneil First Baptist Church.

The theme of the National 4-H Club week "4-H Cares" describes the Gold Star Honorees for Tyler County this year. Jeanene Stanford, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Benjie Stanford of Woodville. She has been a member of 4-H for 6 years.

Jeanene merited this award this year by carrying demonstrations in clothing for five years, Food and Nutrition for four years, home improvement for four years, safety, one year and junior leader, one year.

Jeanene has participated in county and District Food Shows and Dress Reves. She has modeled in South Texas State Fair 4-H Dress Revue for three years.

The Woodville Junior 4-H Club was organized with assistance of Jeanene. She serves as a junior leader in this club. She has helped conduct clothing workshops, record book workshops, community projects for both clubs.

Jeanene attended Junior Leadership Lab in 1970. She has served as president, project leader and song leader in her local club.

She is a member of MYF and sings in youth choir at Methodist Church.

Jeanene is a member of pep band of Woodville High School, a member of Spanish Club, F.H.A., and High School choir.

She serves as a candy stripper in Tyler County Hospital. Also, she assists in Red Cross Drives.

Jeanene will be honored at a special banquet November 3 to be held at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches.

Squirrel Season To Open

Council Rescinds Poultry Plant Contract

PLANE SETS DOWN AMONG COWS



A single-engine Cessna Skyhawk plane piloted by Bob McBride of Beaumont set down in a hay meadow in the Dies community Monday afternoon after flying into bad weather on the way from Palestine to Beaumont with a planned stop at Tyler County Airport. McBride's wife and two children were with him. Tuesday morning Lee Sheffield, operator of a flying service at Beaumont Municipal Airport and owner of the plane brought a pilot to the site of the landing in the Eaves pasture and flew it back to Beaumont.

The Woodville City Council at its regular meeting Monday night voted to pay raises of \$15 per month to office employees, Mrs. Lorraine Lee and Mrs. Easter Mann, authorized a sewer line from the treating plant to Cobb Mill Road, and rescinded a contract offer made to supply utilities to a proposed poultry processing plant.

The contract offer, to Angelina Poultry Company, had not been acted on by the company. Mayor Jimmy Freeman said that since the contract was written, containing rates for gas, water and sewer service to a proposed plant, economic changes have occurred which makes it necessary to renegotiate a contract if the poultry company is still interested in a plant here.

City Secretary Walton Davis said that a regular monthly meeting of the Deep East Texas Water Utilities Association will be held here tonight (Thursday) and that the city will host a regional meeting of Texas Municipal League on November 19.

County Has Calm Weekend Except For...

Only a few minor accidents occurred in Woodville and Tyler County during the peak weekend traffic mixed with rainswept highways and streets. Highway patrolmen and other officers were relieved that motorists for the most part were taking it easy on the wet roads, and that otherwise it was a fairly peaceful weekend.

The only serious incident occurred in Warren where a Negro, Charlie Robinson, was killed by a blast from a shotgun.

Charged in the shooting was Warren Allen Griffin, a former Warren resident now living in Dallas. He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Joe Loggins and made bond Sunday.

Highway Patrolmen and city police walked in on a brawl just beginning at a dance at Woodville Inn Saturday night but quelled the fistfights before anyone was seriously hurt. No one was charged there but a Jasper man was jailed later when he came to the sheriff's office and threatened a deputy sheriff who had helped restore order at the dance.

And, except for the jailing of two or three persons for excessive consumption of alcoholic beverages, it was a pretty calm weekend in Tyler County.

Mrs. Will Wilson, chairman of the Jefferson County Historical Survey Committee, will make the dedicatory address for the official Texas Historical Marker at the James E. Wheat home at 107 West Wheat street in Woodville. The block on which the house is situated and the house itself has an interesting history dating back to the early days of Texas.

On March 3, 1838, the Board of Land Commissioners of Jasper, Texas, issued to Dr. Joseph Wheat land certificate No. 14 for two thirds of a league of land. George F. Wood, Governor of Texas, issued a patent to Dr. Wheat, Nov. 24, 1848. On January 1, 1847, Dr. Wheat donated 200 acres of this tract, Abstract 657, to the County of Tyler on the condition that the County site would be located on said tract of land.

This tract was platted into blocks and lots and Dr. Wheat reserved for himself block No. 14, just south of the block reserved for the Court House.

Lots 6, 7, 8 and 1/2 of 4 & 5 were sold to Wm. G. McDaniel September 28, 1848. Mr. McDaniel built the present house in that year, 1848, and he and his wife formerly Nancy Prescott, lived there until his death in 1881.

Before his death he conveyed the house and lots to his daughter Anna M. Rock and her husband, Wm. S. Rock.

Wm. S. Rock and his wife completed the house until Jan. 1st 1896 when it was conveyed to Emma M. Durham, a widow. Ten years later on May 7, 1896 Mrs. Durham sold the property to W. A. Brooks and he

sold it to F. V. Smith April 10, 1908 and in the same year, November 27, 1908, Mr. Smith conveyed it to T. C. Mann. On November 22, 1909, the property was acquired by Joe W. Thomas and he sold it to J. E. Wheat April 23, 1918.

T. C. Mann was the father of Thomas Mann who was recently Ambassador to South America. Mr. Mann erected a small building in the Northwest corner of the property which he used for a law office. This building was also used by Mr. Thomas and Mr. Wheat for the same purpose.

This house was built by Mr. G. McDaniel and was composed of four rooms, two upstairs and two below. There was a porch in front with an upper gallery. During court sessions, there being no other accommodations available, the jury slept on the upper gallery.

In 1894, a man named James Wilson was convicted for killing a Negro slave, the property of Anderson Barclay, and sentenced to be hanged at a place of public execution. The upper gallery of this house was used as a grandstand for a favored few to witness the execution.

This was the one and only public execution in Tyler County. Mr. Wheat lived in this house from 1918 until his death, October 10, 1968, at age 81. The four original rooms of this house, built of long leaf yellow pine, still exist. The front porch has been remodeled and extended to the width of the house with the upper gallery omitted and additional rooms have been added in the rear. The construction is colonial.

Mr. Wheat and his wife, Ruby Nolan Wheat, have three children: James Edward Wheat, Jr., Ruth Wheat Steinhauser, and Josiah Wheat.

Mr. Wheat was president of the Woodville School Board from 1920 to 1949, was Chairman, Secretary and a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee of Texas, the Texas Prison Board and was the first Mayor of the City of Woodville when incorporated in 1929. He was the first chairman of the Texas Historical Foundation, and founder of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival. He researched and reported on most of the history of Tyler County in the pages of the Handbook of Texas and the Annual Bulletin of the Dogwood Festival Association. He was a member of the Texas Centennial Commission in 1936 and did the historical research in connection with the location of the Centennial markers in Tyler County. He was Captain of Company C of the 8th Bu. of Texas National Guard which was sworn into federal service in front of this house in 1918.

The National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Club, Inc., which initiated National Business Women's Week in 1928, was founded in 1919 to promote the interests of all working women. The membership extends to all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

County Gets Heavy Rain

The heavy rains that accompanied the turbulent weather in Southeast Texas Sunday afternoon and night dumped from 2.96 to 3.5 inches on Tyler County—depending upon where it was measured.

The Texas Forest Service gauge south of Woodville measured 2.56 inches on its pluviometer but other rain gauges in the county caught up to 3.5 to 4 inches with one measuring 5 inches.

The heavy showers Thursday left nearly an inch, 90/100s, of an inch at the Texas Forest Service.

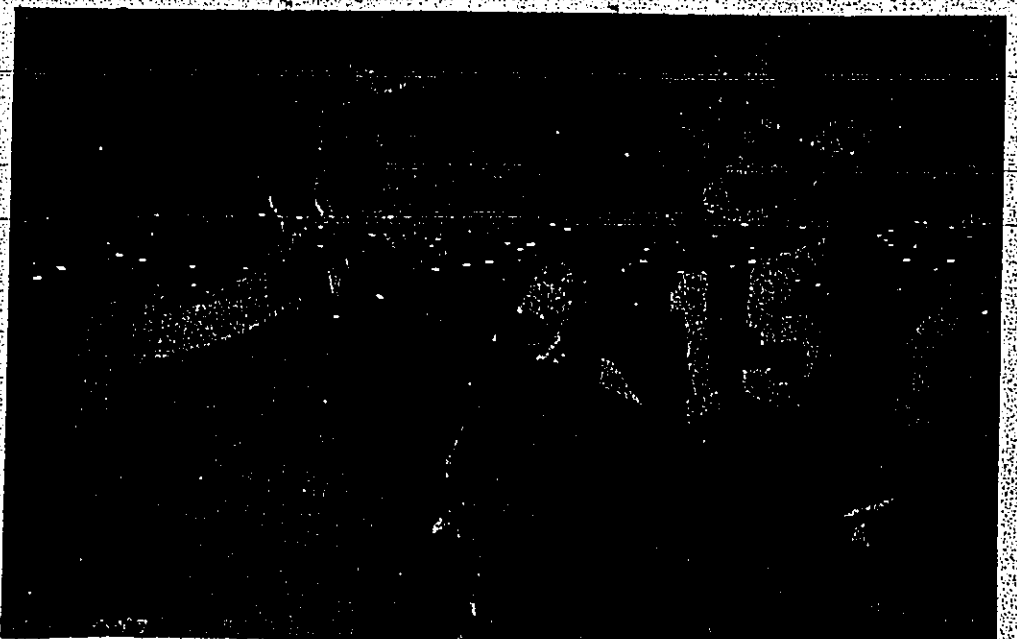

Barbers Hill Racks Warren Warriors 53-8

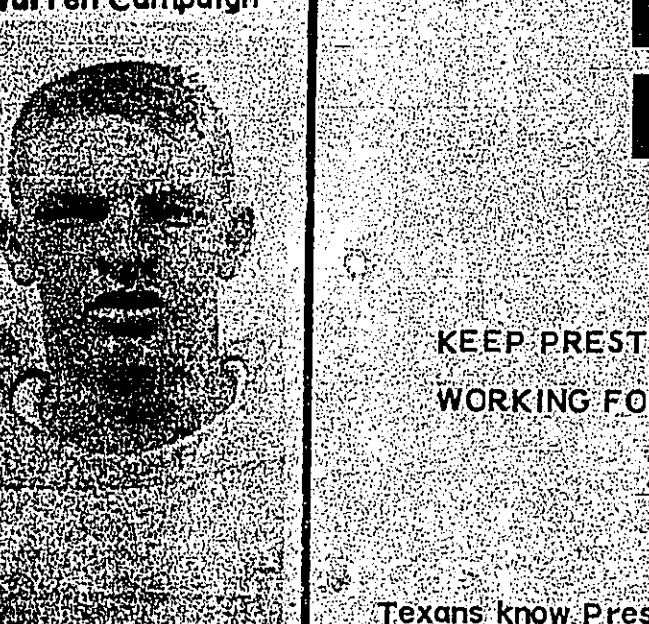

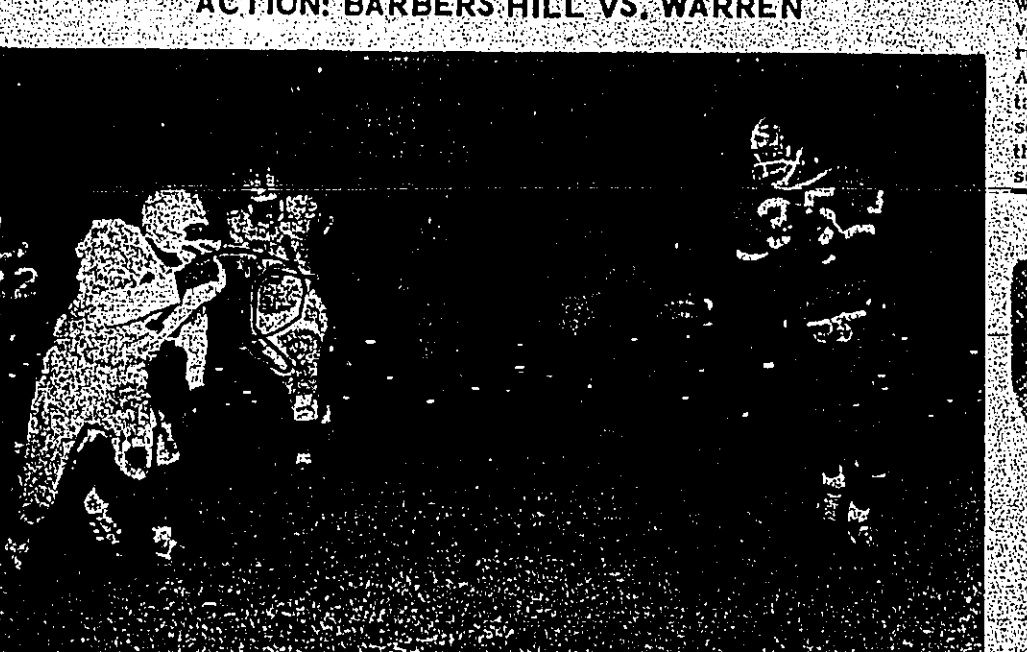

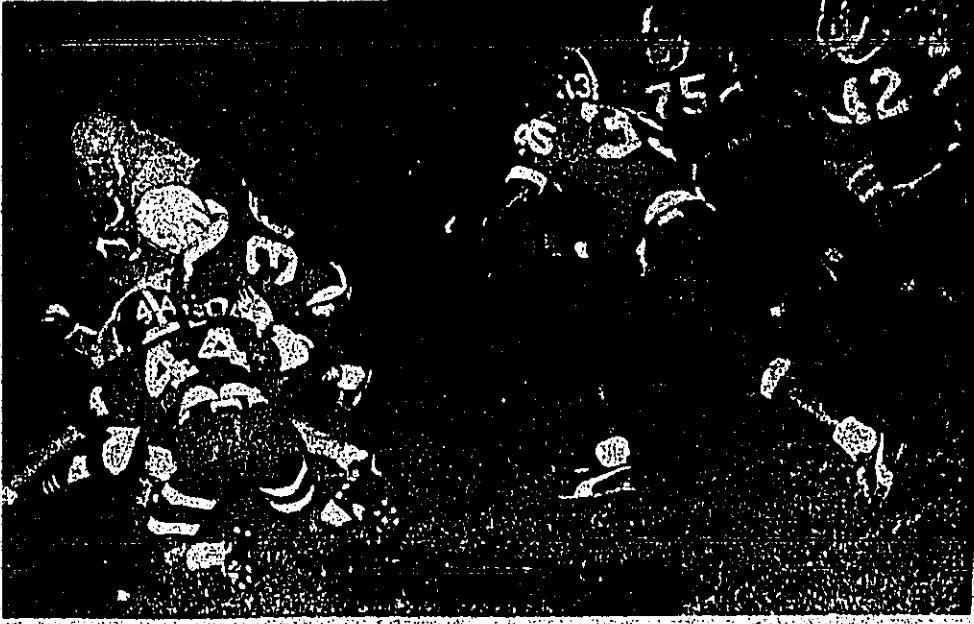


ACTION: BARBERS HILL VS. WARREN

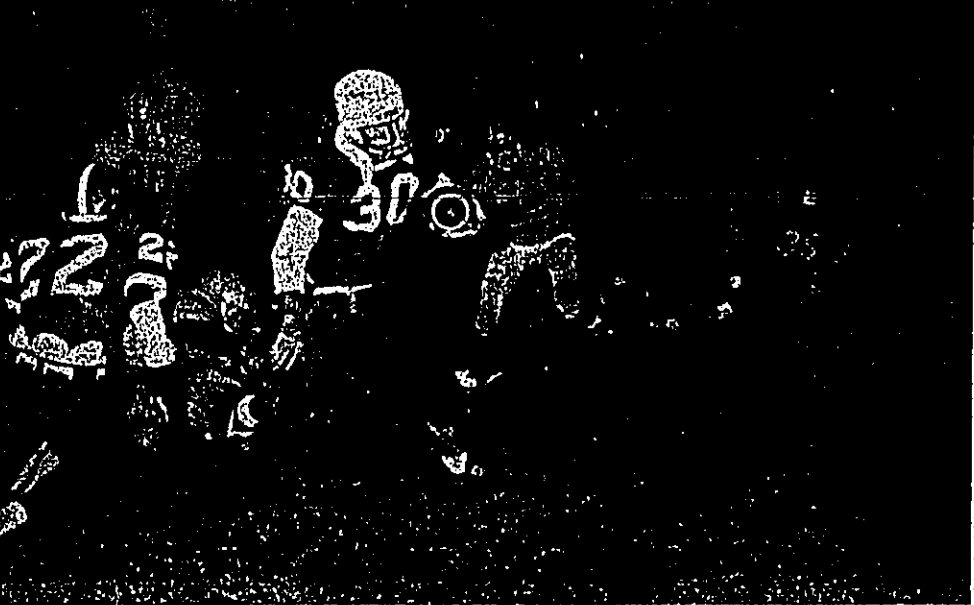

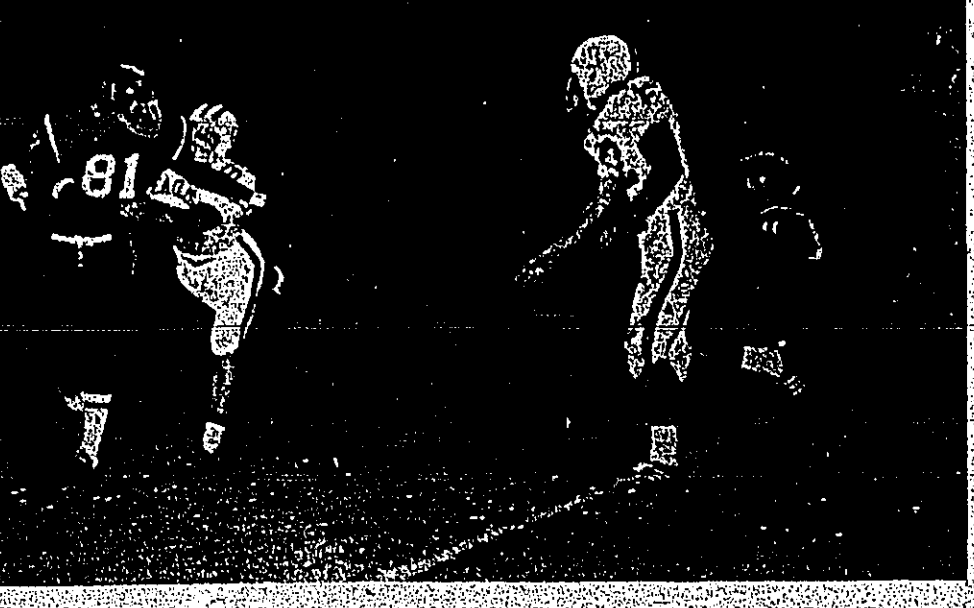

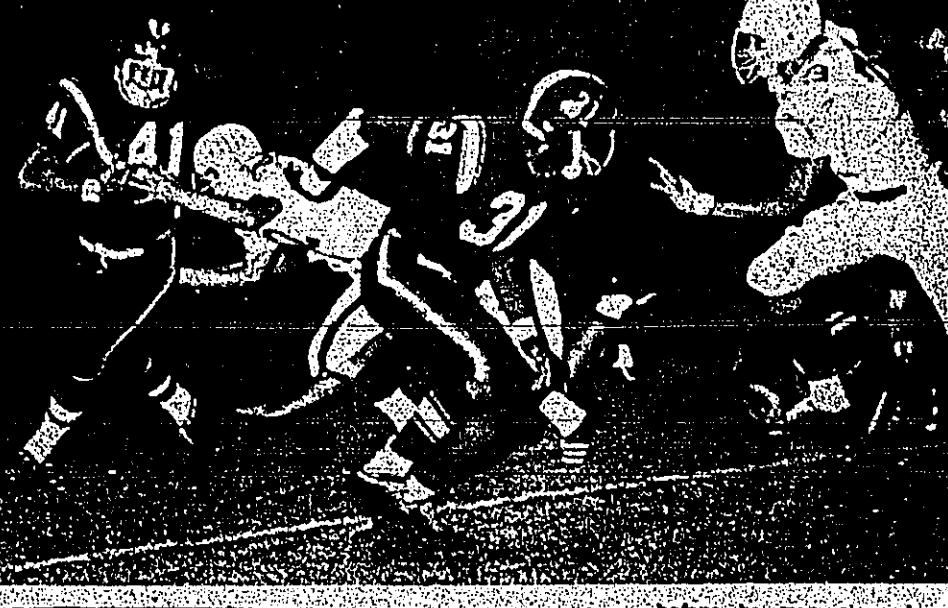
