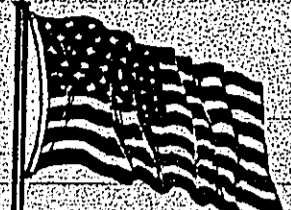

PRECINCT LINES CHANGED

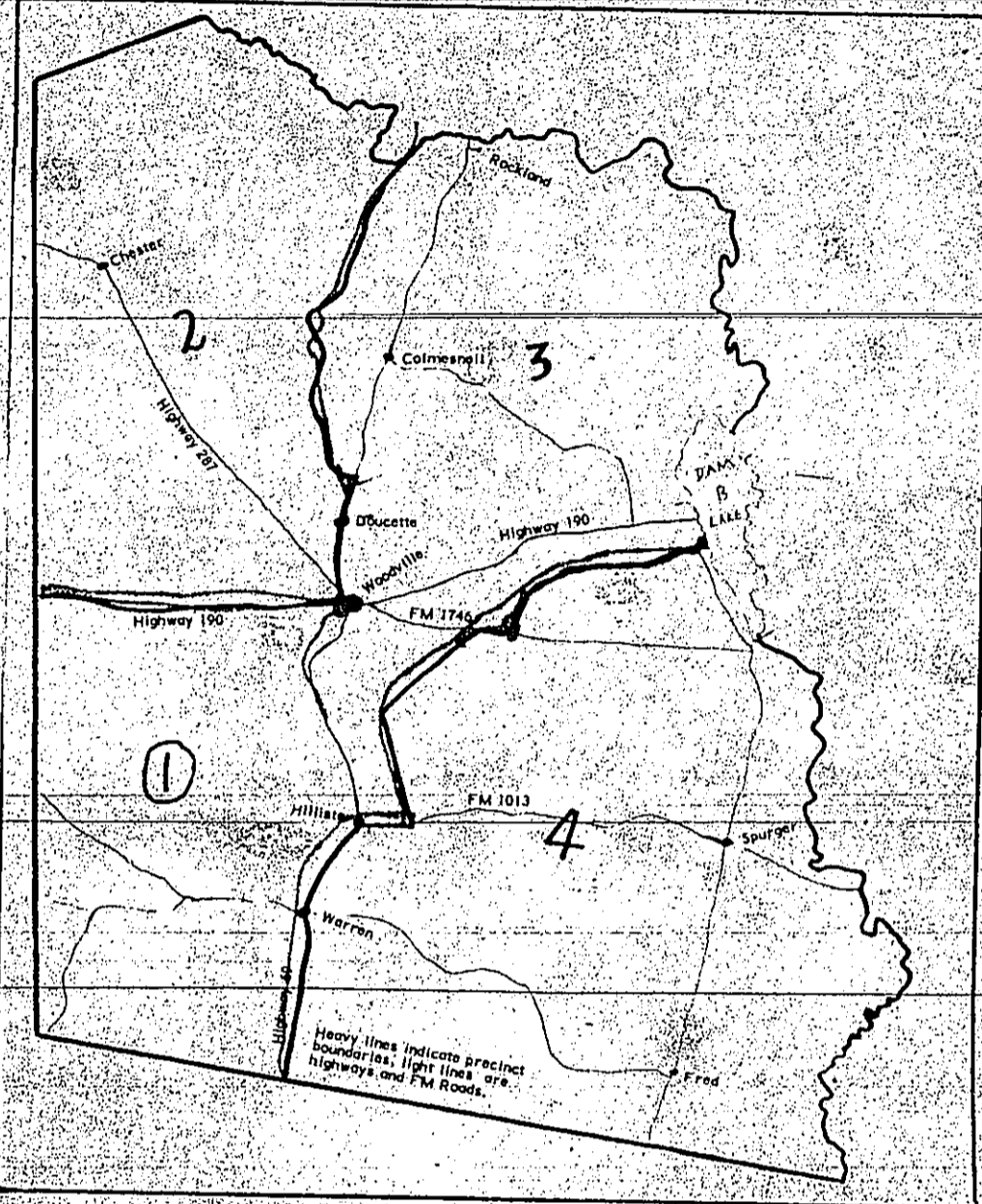
Commissioners Redistrict County

The commissioners court of Tyler County at its October meeting approved the new boundary lines for the four commissioners precincts as required by the Supreme Court's ruling, commonly referred to as the "one man-one vote" doctrine, that political subdivisions must be divided according to population.

In order to equalize the number of residents in each precinct in Tyler County, the commissioners approved new boundaries that places parts of the city of Woodville in precincts two and three. Formerly all of Woodville had been in precinct one.

Using Highway 190 west from Magnolia to the Polk County line as the dividing line the redistricting plan adopted by the commissioners places all Woodville residents living north of Highway 190 and west of Highway 69 in Commissioner's precinct two. Those living south of Highway 190 will remain in precinct one.

Precinct one's eastern boundary will be Highway 69 from the Hardin County line north to Hillister, east about three miles on FM 1013 to Turkey creek and meandering along the creek northwest about four miles, northeast to FM 1744 at Brush Creek, east to Double Creek Branch, north to Rush Creek and follows Rush Creek to the Neches River. This is also the west and northern boundary lines for precinct four. The north-south boundary line between precincts two and three starts at the intersection of Highway 190 and 69 in Woodville and goes north on Highway 69 past Doucette to the county road turning west at Boyette's Store and follows this road to Bell's Creek, up Bell's Creek to Williams Creek and up Williams Creek to the Neches River. A roughly drawn map showing the approximate boundary lines is printed here and as soon as a detailed map is completed it will be printed in the Booster.



The new boundary lines will become effective January 1. The present boundary lines will continue to use the same voting box as in the past in the general election November 3.



Remember that hour that you lost the last Sunday in April when you ran your clock ahead for Daylight Saving Time?

Anyway you do it, the nation returns to Central Standard Time at 2:00 a.m. Sunday. So run that clock back or you could be an hour early at work or at church Sunday.

Mrs. Ethel Hill Named Garden Club Woman Of The Year At State Fair Tuesday

Mrs. Ethel Osborn Hill of Woodville and Port Arthur was honored at the State Fair of Texas Garden Club Day in the Garden Center Tuesday as "Garden Club Woman of the Year."

Presenting the silver bowl inscribed "In recognition of outstanding achievement in garden club service to the State of Texas," J. B. Rucker, Jr., executive vice-president and general manager of the State Fair, recognized Mrs. Hill as a great conservationist and naturalist. Mrs. Hill was guest at the flower arrangement demonstration by Norman B. Wessman of Western Springs, Illinois and a luncheon which followed.

Although Mrs. Hill is a mem-

ber of the 24 year old Woodville Garden Club, she belongs to all garden clubs because of her staunch support of civic beautification and insistence on conservation of natural beauty such as the Big Thicket. It is here she maintains a home in her log house called "Dogwood Den" and continues to commute to Port Arthur for apartment living in the winter. Mrs. Hill joined the Blue Bonnet Garden Club in Port Arthur in 1920 and was president twice. She helped establish the Blue Bonnet Park for which the deed is in her name. She helped preserve the "Tracy Oak" at Austin by writing of its valuable history.

In June, 1968 the Big Thicket Association named her "Mrs.

Big Thicket" or "Ma Thicket" and presented her with a plaque so inscribed for she not only assisted in organizing the association in 1930 but helped revive it in recent years to preserve this area. She helped Woodville become a bird sanctuary, organized a garden center at the Allan Shivers Library and Museum, assisted with annual "Dogwood Festival," and currently serves as Tyler County Anti-Pollution chairman. Mrs. Hill has been a naturalist from youth, believing "The Beauty of the simplest leaf almost passes man's belief," one lesson learned from the late Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, president of Iowa State College at Ames, Iowa, where she was born November 3, 1878. He la-

ter became Secretary of Agriculture and she a devoted employee as Rural Home Supervisor and Family Counselor for 12 years in Jefferson, Liberty, Orange and Chambers Counties. For 22 years she continually attended summer short courses at Texas A. & M. University, serving as president of the Texas Agriculture Workers Association and the Texas Agricultural Writers.

She is a writer and poet, beginning professional writing early in life. She moved with her parents in 1897 and attended Fort Worth University, married and had four children, Paul, Harold, Helen, Chester and Kitty. Widowed in 1920, she moved to Port Arthur but kept writing

for Holland's Farm and Ranch, a syndicated column for 80 Texas newspapers. She studied journalism under John Kind, editor of the Dallas News, and her first feature on the Big Thicket and the Chief of the Alabama Indians was published in the Houston Chronicle in 1931. She has been a friend to the Indians on the reservation where she is a welcome visitor. One article on the Big Thicket was published in the Congressional Record in May of 1970. She has had three books of poetry published, and is a member of the Texas Women's Press Association and the Poetry Society of Texas.

Mrs. Hill preserves many interesting treasures from the Big Thicket in her cabin where

the fireplace is set with fossils of sea urchins which the Smithsonian Institution officials estimate to be two million years old. Her collections serve as educational exhibits for classes of students who visit her cabin and her apartment often. She had a display for the meeting of the National Council of State Garden Clubs in Dallas in 1968. She lectures and teaches at camps and other gatherings, and records on tape her knowledge of the Alabama Indians for the young members. She continues to replant and share seeds of wild fruits and berries of the Big Thicket and is a friend of wild animals and birds, having once kept a pet white squirrel which the Indians called "Spir-

it Squirrel."

Her work with garden clubs brought her honor as a Life Member of Texas Garden Clubs, a gift from District III who made a donation to a scholarship fund. She is a life member of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and Poet Laureate of the Magnolia District. Her work with mental health and crippled children prompted her to work as director for the Hughes School and Home for Crippled Children of Port Arthur after retiring at 75.

She supports the Friends of the Library and the Hospital Auxiliary, the Tyler County Historical Society, and the Methodist Church. At 92 she visits nursing homes to cheer senior citizens and was appoint-

ed in 1970 to Governor Preston Smith's Advisory Council on Aging. A patriot who loves and believes in her country, Mrs. Hill writes a weekly column for the Tyler County Booster and Pineywoods Press. "America Still Is... One Woman's Opinion." Her forthcoming book will be "God's Children: All The Red, The White, The Black." Mrs. Hill's family includes Raymond Hill, Chester Hill and Mrs. A. C. Smith of Port Arthur with Mrs. Helen Weaver of Los Angeles, California; one grandson, a great-granddaughter and four great-grandchildren whose ages are from four to 14 years.

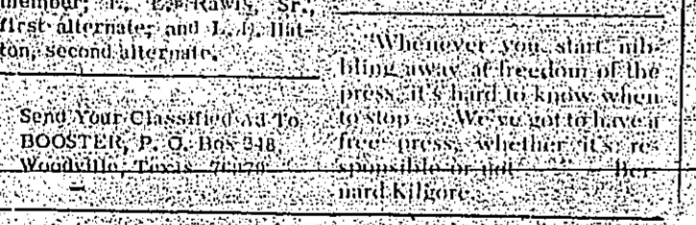

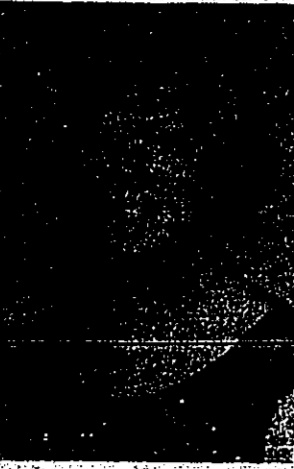

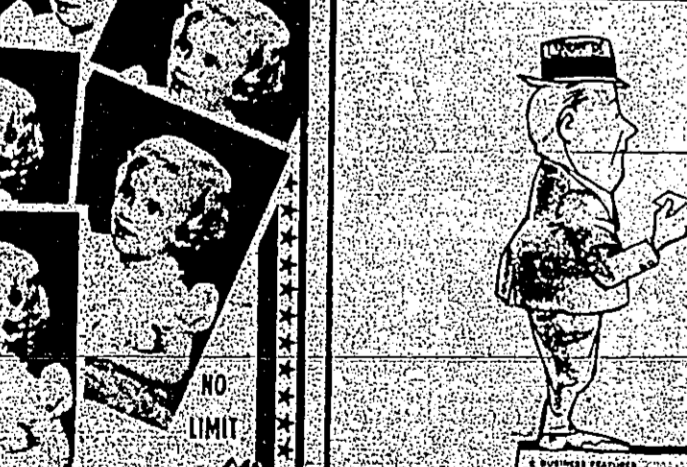

WEEKEND GARDENING

With the cool moist days of late October, comes the important time to prepare the lawn or lawn grass for winter. Simple maintenance activities, which are often neglected, are important in keeping the existing lawn grass that you have worked so hard on during spring and summer, in good condition.

From Tyler County Extension Service

Layers of fallen leaves block sunlight from the lawn grass, hindering the normal ability of the grass to remain green and healthy as it goes into dormancy. The leaves which pack with moisture, tend to rot off and your soil is deprived of the nutrients of the grass. The grasses demand warm days and moisture for proper germination of sprouting. Young seedlings may be injured or killed by frost and cold.

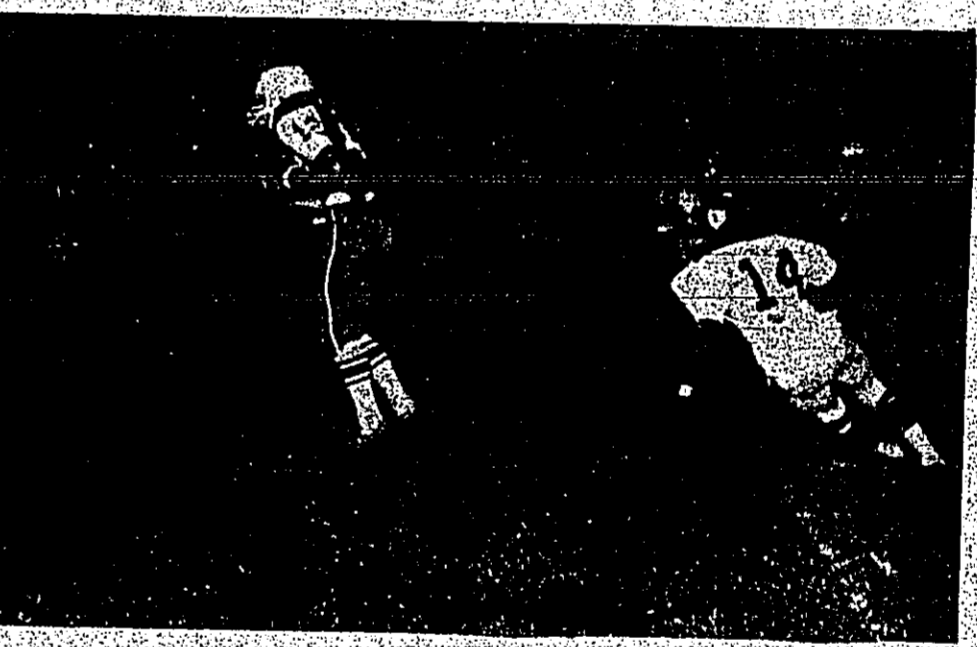

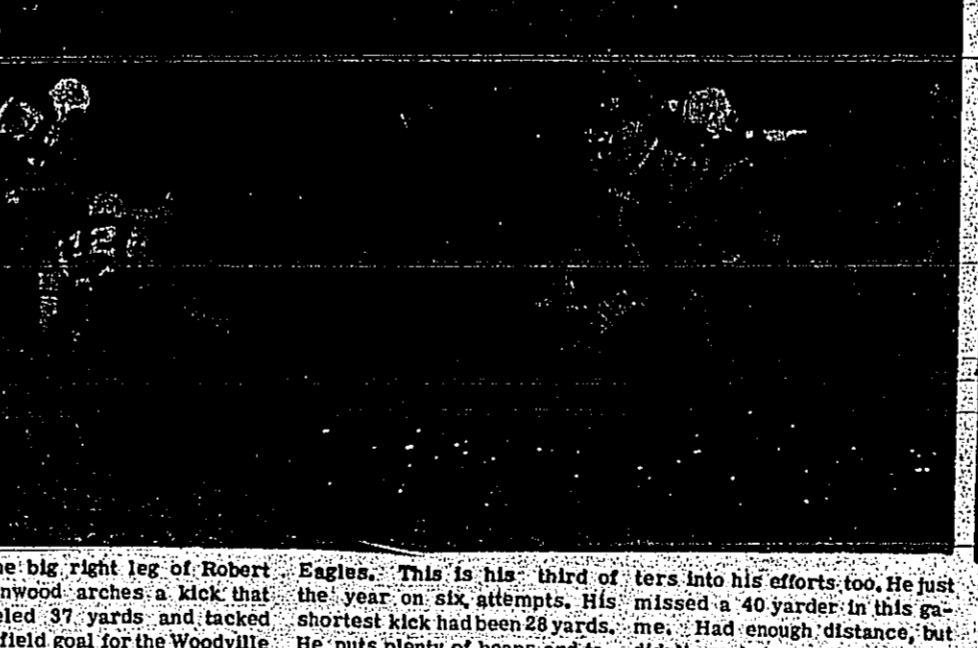
