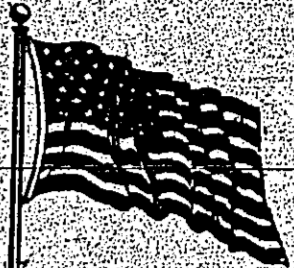

Immunization Clinic Against Diphtheria Slated Thursday

A case of diphtheria in the Woodville schools was confirmed Monday, and Monday afternoon the board of trustees held a special meeting with local doctors to plan an emergency immunization clinic here today (Thursday).

The State Health Department was notified Monday morning of the confirmation of the case, and will be represented at the immunization clinic Thursday. All school children in the county will be immunized Thursday. Pupils from other schools in the county will be brought by bus to the immunization clinic here.

Dr. John Gilchrist, county health officer, said that while the confirmation of the case of diphtheria here poses a serious threat he hopes that the prompt immunization program will avert an epidemic such as the one in San Antonio.

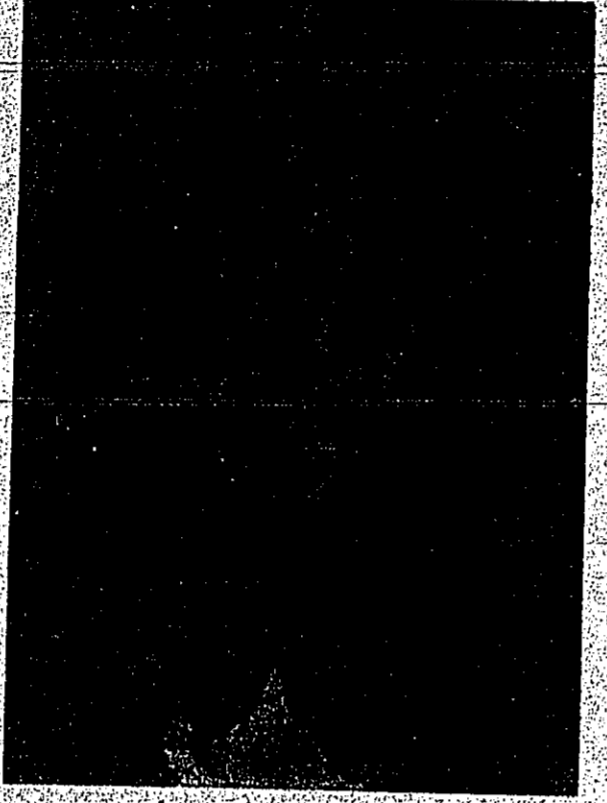
Monday afternoon an immunization clinic for all adults who desire it will be held at the gym from 1 to 3 p.m.

TO ELECT SENATOR, GOVERNOR

General Election To Be Held Tuesday

Texas voters will go to the polls Tuesday to elect a United States Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor as well as a number of other state officials and Congressmen.

In some local races, the traditionally Democratic state also has Republicans contesting for office. In Tyler County,

there is one candidate for a county office.

Statewide polls indicate that the United States Senate race between Democrat Lloyd Benen and Republican George Bush will be close as will the Governor's race between Democrat incumbent Preston Smith and Republican Paul Eggers in the 1968 general election. Eg-

gers ran a strong race against Smith.

In addition to the contested state races, Texas voters also have seven proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot. The booster has a comprehensive review of these amendments in another article.

In Tyler County, voters will cast their ballots in the same voting boxes as in the past.

Band Wins Two More Trophies

Seven Amendments To Be On Ballot

On General Election Day, November 3, Texas voters will face a heavier than usual responsibility. In addition to casting ballots for the candidates of their choice, they will also be voting for or against seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Some of these have the potential for far-reaching effects.

To aid voters in understanding of the proposed amendments, the Texas Legislative Council of the 61st Legislature of Texas has prepared "Analyses of Proposed Constitutional Amendments." This publication gives background information on each of the seven measures and cites arguments for and against each of them.

Among the seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which voters will consider on November 3 is Proposed Amendment Number 1 which relates to the removal, retirement, or censure of justices, judges, and justices of the peace under prescribed circumstances.

The proposal is an amendment to Article V, Section 1-8, of the Texas Constitution and would alter Subsections (3), (6), (7), (9), (11), (12), and (13). The present section covers the retirement and compensation of justices and judges.

"The proposed amendment was drawn to enlarge the jurisdiction of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission and to enlarge its powers to censure and removal from office of all state and local justices, judges, and justices of the peace whose conduct is deemed inconsistent with the proper performance of the duties of the court," according to the Texas Legislative Council.

World Vision is an international organization which supports more than 250 orphanages the world over. Money collected will be used by this organization to clothe, feed and care for children in these orphanages.

Following the trick-or-treating, which will last about an hour, the young people will return to the church for fellowship and refreshments.

"1. Every judge is charged with the equitable enforcement of law. The responsibilities of the judges of lower courts are no less sacred than those of the justices of the appellate courts; therefore, they should be answerable to the same rules dealing with retirement, removal from office, and public censure or private reprimand."

The following argument against is taken directly from the analyses made by the Texas Legislative Council.

"1. Except in rare instances, the judges named in Subsection (6) are elected by the people and therefore answerable to the people at the polls. Therefore, the expansion of the article is unwarranted. Increasing the power and scope of the commission might also lead to "witch hunts" and such action could subsequently discourage qualified persons from seeking election to the bench."

Proposed Amendment Number 2 would repeal that part of Article XXI, Section 20, Subsection XVI, Section 20, Subsection (2), of the Texas Constitution, which prohibits the open saloon and which empowers the legislature to define that term and enact legislation against it.

"The proposed amendment substitutes a new provision empowering the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis," according to the Texas Legislative Council. The proposed change leaves unaffected the part of Subsection (a) which gives the legislature the power to "regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a state monopoly on the sale of distilled liquor."

The following arguments for:

"1. The proposed amendment is not a wet-and-dry issue because the sale of alcohol has already been sanctioned by a majority of the residents of this state; also, a non-binding referendum during the 1968 primary elections resulted in a 40,000-vote margin for mixed beverages out of a total vote of 1.4 million.

"2. The proposed amendment would not force mixed drinks on any locality since it requires that any mixed-drink law be on a local option election basis.

"3. Adoption of the proposed amendment and passage of subsequent enabling legislation would:

"1. Lead to stricter control of liquor sales to minors, an end to the subterfuge of private clubs, a decrease in alcohol consumption, a reduced crime rate, and fewer traffic accidents."

The following arguments against are taken from the same publication of the Texas Legislative Council:

"1. The proposed amendment would make alcoholic beverages more readily available."

"2. The proposed amendment would lead to an increase in crime and in traffic deaths."

"3. Although enabling legislation for the proposed amendment could be designed to raise needed new revenue through the taxation of mixed beverages, this revenue would be negligible in comparison with resulting problems such as broken homes, juvenile delinquency, drunk-driving, criminal assaults, and other crimes."

Proposed Amendment Number 3 would authorize the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands based upon the capability of the lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops.

The proposal is an amendment to Article VIII, Section 1-d of the State Constitution. The amendment differs from the present section in several respects according to the Texas Legislative Council. The present section is limited to land owned by natural persons as opposed to corporations or any other type of ownership, while the proposed section contains no such limitation.

The Council said that the present section is applicable to land designated for agricultural use. Agricultural use is defined as "the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner." Similarly, the proposed section is applicable to farm, ranch, and forest land, but no reference is made to the primary occupation of the owner.

The following arguments for are taken directly from the analyses made by the Texas Legislative Council:

"1. Farm real estate taxes per acre have increased by more than 22 percent according to data compiled by the Economic Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, and there is a need for the tax relief for owners of such property which the proposed amendment would authorize."

Rains Hit Southeast Texas

Heavy thundershowers Tuesday morning dumped up to 3 inches of rainfall on Sprurger and 3.27 inches was measured at Warren. For a time early Tuesday the underpass at Warren was flooded with water following a 2.5 inch downpour that began about 4 p.m.

The heavy rainfall did not come on into Woodville early Tuesday as the Texas Forest Service registered only .30 of an inch up to 1:00 p.m. However, a heavy thundershower moved through the county and Woodville Tuesday afternoon with at least one inch measured in some areas.

The showers were triggered by a cool front which Monday night and early Tuesday brought turbulent weather in north and east Texas.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at 6:45 a.m. Tuesday had issued a special weather statement that heavy thundershowers could be expected Tuesday and Tuesday night in the extreme Southeast Texas area. At the time a thundershower was in progress at Warren and a line of showers extended from Livingston to Houston and were moving eastward.

Deweyville recorded 17.5 inches as the front moved through Monday night and Tuesday.

More thundershowers were forecast as this was written (6:30 p.m. Tuesday) and it is possible that more rainfall will be recorded by the time this appears in print.

The Texas Forest Service rain gauge here recorded 2.5 inches Friday and Saturday with 1.10 inches measured Friday and 1.40 inches Saturday for the previous 24 hours. Some areas of the county recorded at least 3 inches those two days.

elections. The newly redistricted precinct lines and voting precincts will take effect January 1, 1971. The voting boxes for the November 3 election are shown in another story in this issue.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m.

Absentee ballots voted and mailed out indicate that the number of voters participating in the general election will probably be about 60 percent, although this is only an estimate. Up until Tuesday, about 75 ballots had been voted or applied for at the office of county clerk Otha Milles. The absentee voting period ends Friday.

Other Democratic nominees who face Republican opposition are Crawford Martin, attorney general, opposed by Edward M. Yurri; Robert S. Calvert, comptroller of public accounts, opposed by S. L. Abbott; Jesse James, state treasurer, with Robert F. Koennecke, Republican candidate; Bob Armstrong, land commissioner, opposed by Harry Trippet, and John C. White, agriculture commissioner, opposed by Daniel C. Heath.

In the lieutenant governor's race, Ben Barnes is opposed by a political novice, Byron Fullerton, who has been making a hard campaign for the office.

Statewide candidates with no Republican opposition are Ben Ramsey, railroad commissioner; Jack Pope, Rust C. Walker, and James Denton, Democratic nominee for associate justices of the supreme court, places one, two and three respectively; John F. Olson, presiding judge, court of criminal appeals; and Truman Roberts, judge court of criminal appeals, place 1.

John Dowdy, Democratic nominee for Congress, second congressional district, has no Republican opposition although three write-in candidates are campaigning for the office.

State Representative Don Adams is unopposed as are Carl Morgan, for member of state board of education and Quentin Keith for associate justice, court of civil appeals, district 9. For Tyler County offices, the only Democratic nominee with a Republican opponent in the county judge race, where Richard (Tom Dick) Mann is opposed by Republican James H. Dillion.

Other Democratic nominees are Hilda Coats for district clerk; Allen Shurrock for county clerk; Fletcher Boyd for county treasurer; and B. M. Minter for county school superintendent.

Precinct Democratic nominees are E. A. Shurrock, justice of the peace, and Herman Nolen, constable, in precinct one; H. M. Parks, county commissioner, and Clarence Woodrums, justice of the peace in precinct two; and James R. Jordan, county commissioner in precinct four.

Two Men Receive Two Year Terms For Burglary

Two young men entered pleas of guilty and were sentenced to two years straight time in prison by Judge H. A. Coe in district court here Monday.

They are James Douglas Franklin and Robert Allen Weaver, both of Beaumont, charged with the burglary of Bob's Prescription Shop.

One man charged with DWI entered a guilty plea and was fined \$250 and court costs. Judge Coe issued one contempt citation in a child support case and granted one divorce.

The jury commission met to draw names for the jury panels for the December term of court, and Judge Coe also accepted the report of the grand jury.

The newly incorporated City of Colmesneil will have its first municipal election Saturday, November 7, to name its first city officials.

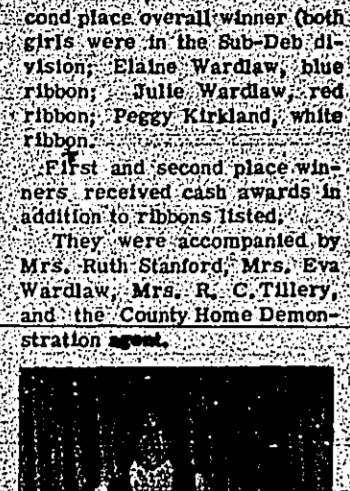
The election will be held at the community center with the polls open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.



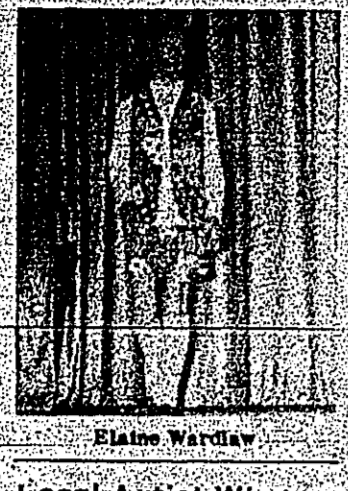

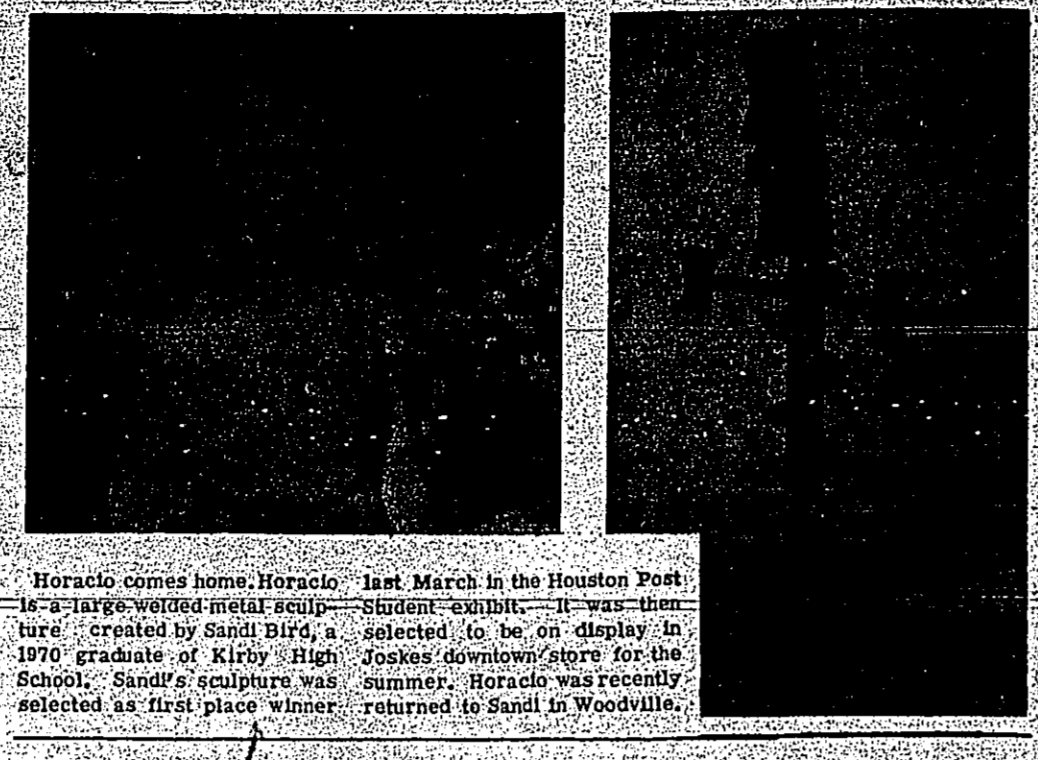

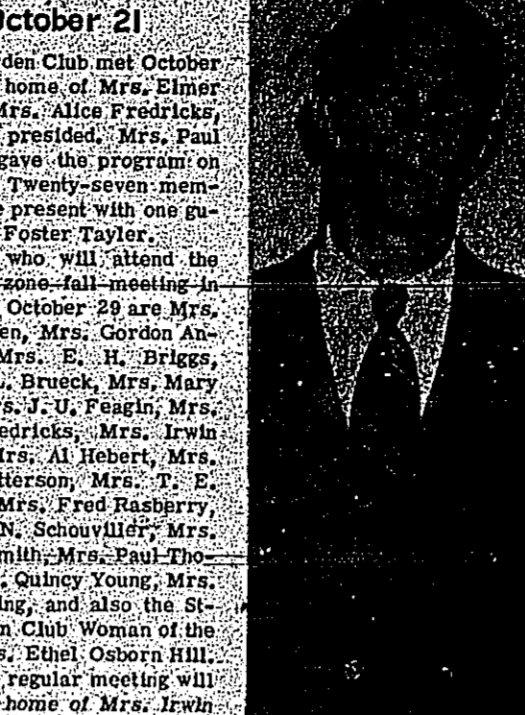

This doesn't protect those who really need it. It provides a guaranteed annual income without the proper work incentives and job training to get these additional millions of people off the welfare rolls. Lloyd Bentsen believes the welfare program should be reformed. But he opposes a guaranteed annual income, and he wants real work opportunities instead of a costly new program that solves few problems. Lloyd Bentsen believes in guaranteed opportunity, not guaranteed income. President Nixon's welfare plan, backed by George Bush, is not the answer.

Texas needs Lloyd Bentsen... a Democrat who will be free to support the policies that he thinks are right for Texas but who can oppose those that he thinks are wrong. For example—gun control. One of the great controversies of our time has been the extent of Federal control over the firearms and ammunition of private citizens. George Bush voted for the Gun Control Act of 1968. It requires dealers to keep detailed federal records on purchases of guns and ammunition. This is a foot in the door to gun registration. Lloyd Bentsen opposes gun control legislation that uselessly penalizes law-abiding sportsmen but fails to curb criminals.

"Crime is clearly a major problem..."

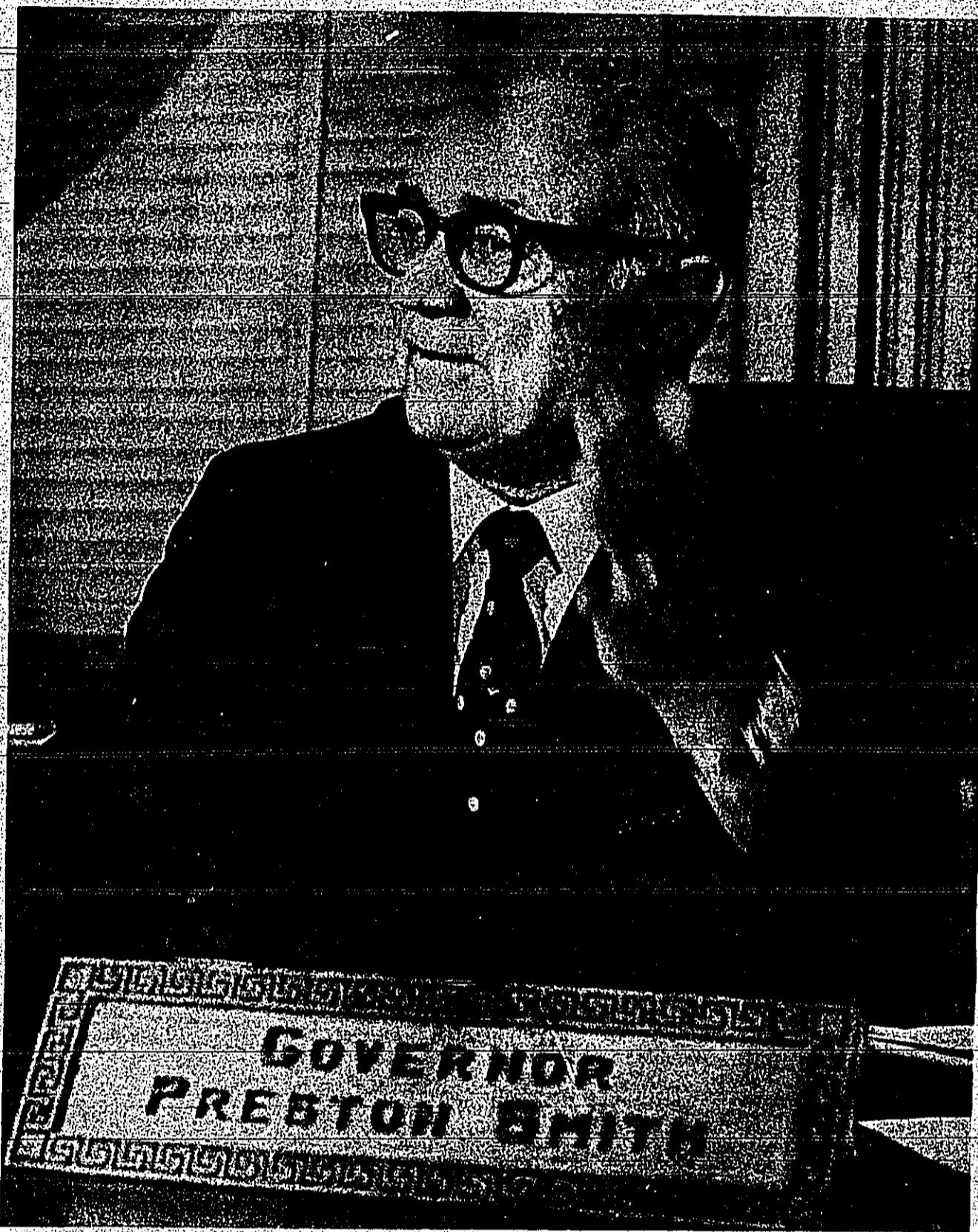

Better Jobs For More People

Vocational Guidance Week Is Oct. 25-31

VA Pensioners Due Questionnaires

F. J. Mims, director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Houston, said recently two million veterans and dependents who get monthly VA pension payments will receive income questionnaires with payments received on or about November 1st.

Pensioners receiving the special income questionnaires must complete and return them to VA not later than January 15, 1971. Mims said that 1971 pension payments will be determined from income information furnished on the questionnaires. Unless they are returned by the deadline set by VA, payments will be stopped.

VA pension is paid to veterans who are totally and permanently disabled from non-service connected disabilities. Widows and children of deceased veterans may also be eligible for VA pension. Income limitations set by law.

The income questionnaires will request information about the 1970 income as well as the expected 1971 income from each pensioner.

Mims emphasized that if the questionnaires are not returned to VA by the deadline, only one year's payments, but also will be required to refund payments received in 1970.

Veterans and widows who receive one check on Social Security, Box 808, Lufkin, Texas and ask for amount received for 1970. And bring that letter to M. Pitts, Sr. when you bring your questionnaires. One dollar over each \$100 allowed may be a loss of \$30.00 for the year.
