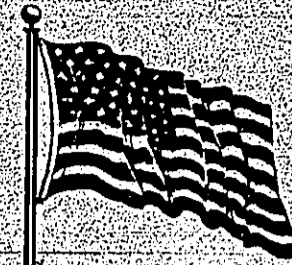

Mann Elected County Judge

Richard (Tom Dick) Mann, Democratic nominee for county judge, was swept into office in the general election Tuesday over his Republican opponent, James H. Dillion, by an unofficial vote of 2261 to 500 with all voting boxes in except Fred.

Late Tuesday night the Fred box had not reported and the Booster is forced to give the unofficial count minus that box which has from 100 to 200 expected votes.

The county judge's race was the only contested one in the county.

In state races, Lloyd Bentsen received 1696 votes to George Bush 1090 for United States Senator and Preston Smith carried the county over Paul Eggers 1013 to 130 for governor.

However, Eggers carried the Warren box 181 to 146 for Smith. He was the only Republican candidate to carry a box in the county.

U. S. Rep. John Dowdy, unopposed on the ballot, received 1553 votes. Two write-in opponents, Eugene Hoyt and Joe Funnels, received 274 and 120 votes respectively.

All seven of the proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot failed to carry in Tyler County with Numbers Two and Three being defeated decisively.

In other state races in which there were both Democratic and Republican nominees, the votes in Tyler County (minus the Fred box) were unofficially as follows:

Attorney General: Crawford Martin 2120; Edward Yurni 1425.

State Comptroller: Robert S. Culver 204; S. L. Abbott 140.

State Treasurer: Jesse James 2120; Robert F. Koenecke 154.

Land Commission: Bob Armstrong 1093; Harry Tribnet 560.

Commissioner of Agriculture: John C. White 1084; Danforth 592.

The commissioners were to meet Wednesday morning to make the official tally of the vote. This will be carried in next week's paper, if there are any significant differences from the unofficial tally.

DETDA Discusses Waste Disposal At Last Meeting

The meeting of the Deep East Texas Development Association (DETDA) discussed the problem of solid waste (garbage) disposal.

All out effort will be made by the Deep East Texas Development Association to coordinate the efforts of county commissioners. The Texas Highway Department and large landowners toward operating landfills in local communities.

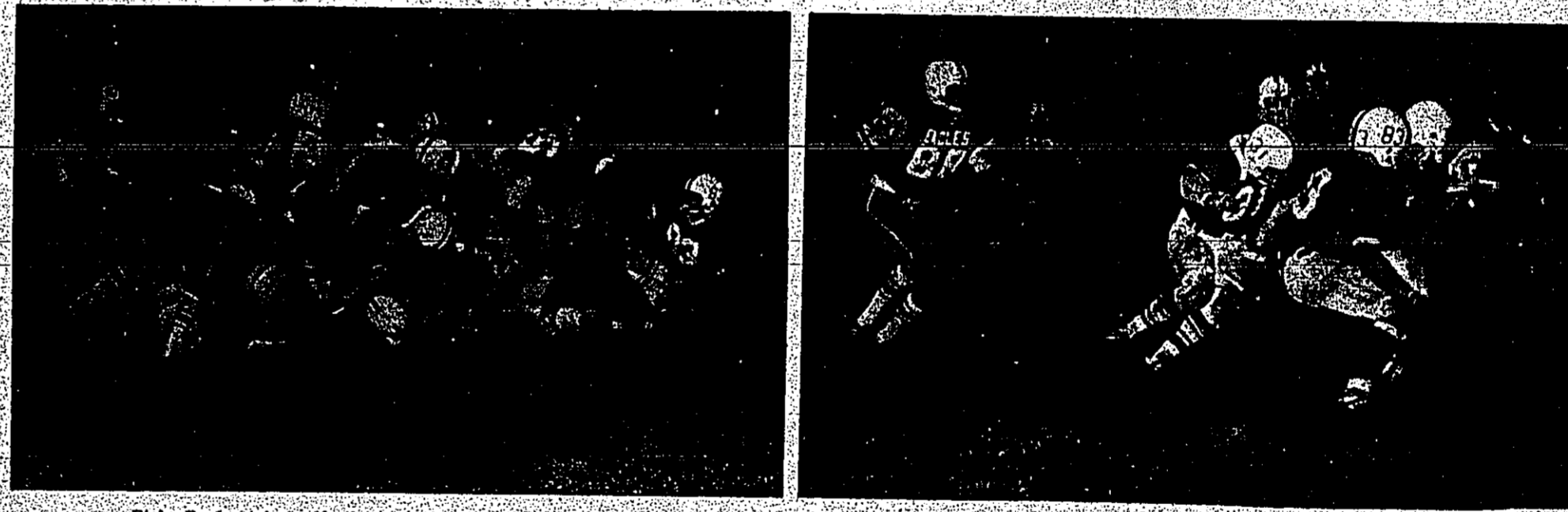

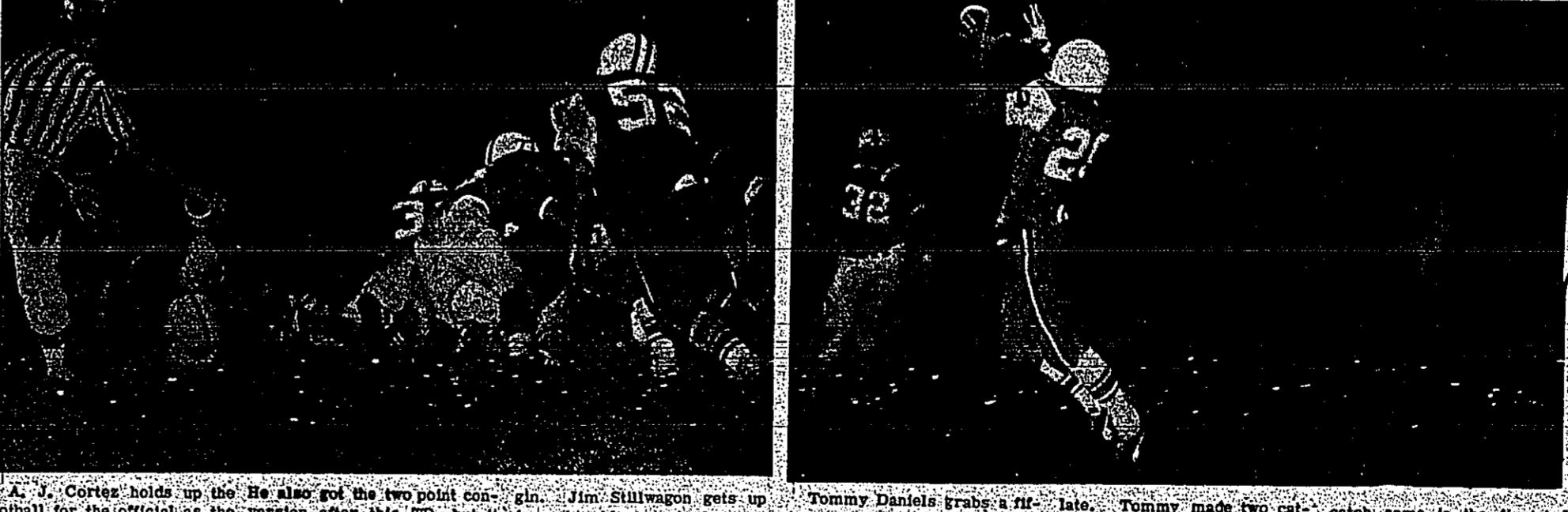
