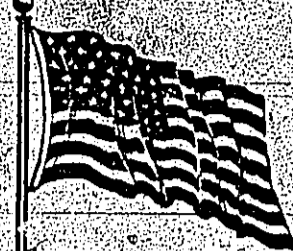

Deer Season Begins Saturday

Junior Blakeney Returns To Station After 10-Day Leave



Blakeney in Vietnam

Returning to Fort Stewart, Georgia, this week after a 10 day leave with his parents was Elmer T. "Jr." Blakeney, Junior, is now stationed there to complete his Army duty. He enjoys participating in football there, where he is quarter back.

Junior spent one year in Vietnam. He was Soldier of the month while over there. He was awarded two Purple Hearts, two Bronze Stars, one with "V" device, the Army Commendation Medal with "IV" device and the Army Commendation Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Air Medal and Combat Infantry Badge. He worked as team leader of the Hunter-Killer team for 8 months along the DMZ before moving to Reconnaissance in the Americal Division to complete his year.

Junior is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Blakeney of Colmesneil and will be returning there in January where he plans to commute to college. He graduated from Colmesneil High School in 1968, played football all four years and was all-district in football, basketball and track.

The citation Junior received with the Army Commendation Medal with "IV" device read as follows:

For heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam: Private First Class Blakeney distinguished himself on 25 July 1969 as a member of a reconnaissance team with Company E, 1st Battalion, 11th Infantry in a night ambush position in an area of known enemy activity. At approximately 2400 hours the team heard movement near their position. An estimated platoon-size enemy force entered the kill zone and the team immediately engaged them, killing two. The remaining North Vietnamese Regulars returned a heavy volume of fire, wounding the team leader. Realizing his team leader was wounded, PFC Blakeney continued directing a high volume of fire on the numerically superior enemy force. His quick reactions contributed greatly in repulsing the enemy's counter-attack. When a relief team arrived, PFC Blakeney joined them in pursuit of the fleeing enemy. His aggressive actions under fire contributed immeasurably to the defeat of a numerically superior enemy force. PFC Blakeney's actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

Raising Catfish In Cages To Be Topic

Dr. Homer Schmitt, wildlife specialist in the field of fish production, will speak here November 24 on raising catfish in cages. The meeting will be held in the vocational agriculture building at Kirby High School here beginning at 7:00 p.m. Anyone interested in raising catfish in cages is urged to attend.

Deer hunting will begin in Southeast Texas Counties Saturday and continue through January 3, giving hunters an extra four days in which to bag their legal limit of two bucks. This applies in the counties of Hardin, Harris, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Montgomery, Newton, Orange, Polk, Trinity, Tyler and Walker. In Houston County the season opens Monday, November 16, and ends December 31.

Deer are reported to be fairly plentiful throughout the Southeast District Counties although in some, such as Tyler County, there is no big surplus. Hunters are reminded that deer stalking their deer they must purchase their special deer tags which must be fastened to the antlers immediately after a deer is killed. Hunters should also be careful to have the permission of landowners before hunting on land belonging to others. They are also reminded that it is unlawful to shoot from or across any public road or from a moving car on a public road.

Rifle ammunition (such as .22 caliber) is also unlawful. In many of the counties a good part of the land is leased by hunting clubs which allow only members and sometimes guests accompanied by members to hunt. However, there is much land where the hunter may obtain the landowner's permission to hunt without a fee. Most hunters who are residents of the areas are aware of the areas where they may hunt.

Timber companies, such as Kirby Lumber Company, have acreage set aside for public hunting. Kirby has maps showing the location of acreage open to the public and these may be obtained from the company's offices in Siblee.

Justice Clyde Smith Resigns From Court

Associate Justice Clyde E. Smith, a member of the supreme court of Texas for the past 20 years, announced in Austin this week that he is resigning in order to devote his time to judicial reform.

Judge Smith, whose home is in Woodville, submitted his resignation to Governor Preston Smith with the stipulation that it takes effect as soon as a successor can be nominated by the governor and confirmed by the state senate. At the earliest this will be in January 1971 when the legislature convenes.

The last time Judge Smith was in Woodville he told the Booster that he would not seek another term. He is 73 years old. His present term had two more years, but in resigning the justice said that he wanted to begin efforts toward reform of the Texas judicial system. Justice Smith served as county attorney and at the time of his appointment to the supreme court by Governor Allan Shivers in 1950 he had served as district judge since 1943.

"Texas really needs a constitutional convention," he said.

City Council Has Short Session At Monday Meeting

The Woodville city council met in regular monthly meeting Monday night with a short agenda requiring its attention. Two persons appeared regarding street conditions in their localities and members discussed a sewer line problem with the city engineer.

City Secretary Walton Davis showed council members a sample garbage disposal bag now being used in Jasper. The plastic bag fits within a regular sized garbage can and helps keep the can clean, makes garbage easier to pick up, and is resistant to scattering of garbage by dogs.

Also authorized were 10 trash receptacles which fasten to poles. These will be used in the downtown and adjacent areas if they are successful in helping keep the streets cleaner.

More may be ordered, council members indicated. Council members were reminded by Mr. Davis that the district meeting of Texas Municipal League will be held here November 19.

Mayor Jimmy Freeman presided at the meeting. Present were councilmen Leroy Davis, Clay Miller, Gardner Parks, T. L. Gully and J. G. Anderson.

One Amendment Favored In County

Only one of the seven proposed constitutional amendments on the general election ballot received a majority in Tyler County. It was Number One on the ballot and related to the removal, retirement and censure of justices, judges and justices of the peace. It carried by 14 votes with 1210 favoring it and 12-2 voting against it.

The other amendments, all of which carried in the state except Number Three, and the votes for each in Tyler County were:

Number Two, repeal of prohibition against open saloons, received 639 votes for the 2220 against.

Number Three, relating to assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands, 564 for and 2163 against.

Number Four, reconstituting the state building commission, received 712 for and 1542 against.

Number Five, authorizing issuance of road bonds by majority vote, 865 for and 1621 against.

Number Six, increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale, 870 for and 1019 against.

Number Seven, authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions, etc., 870 for and 1591 against.

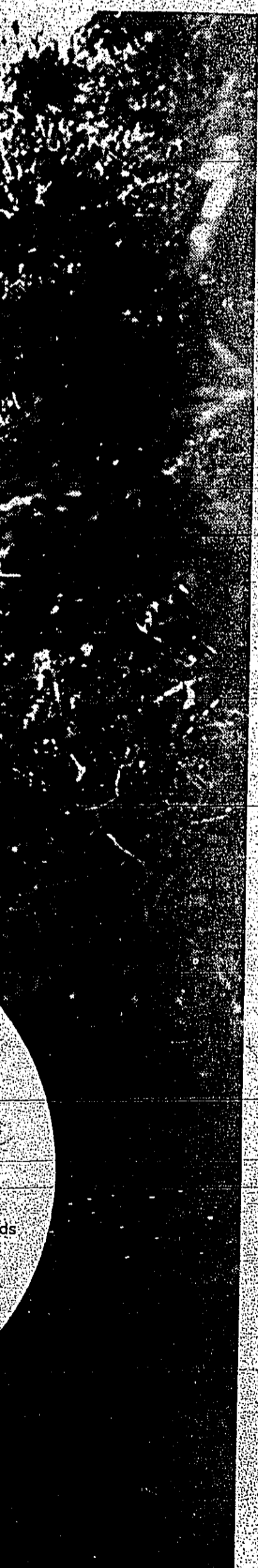

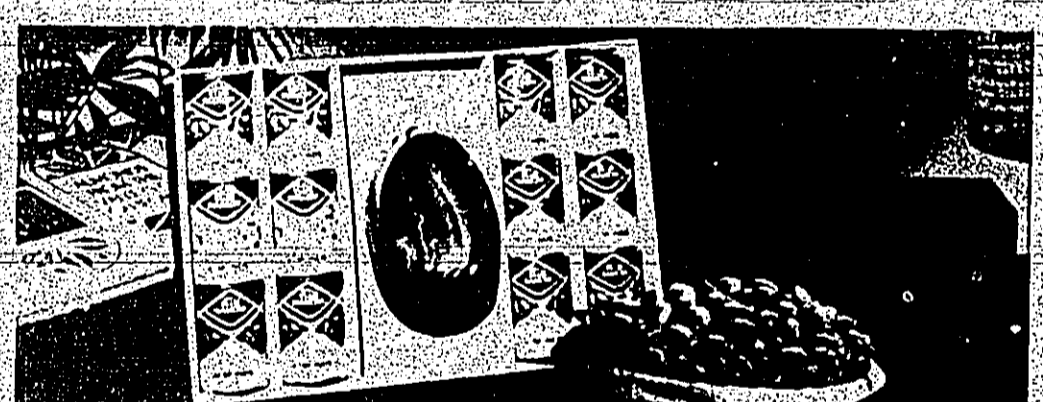
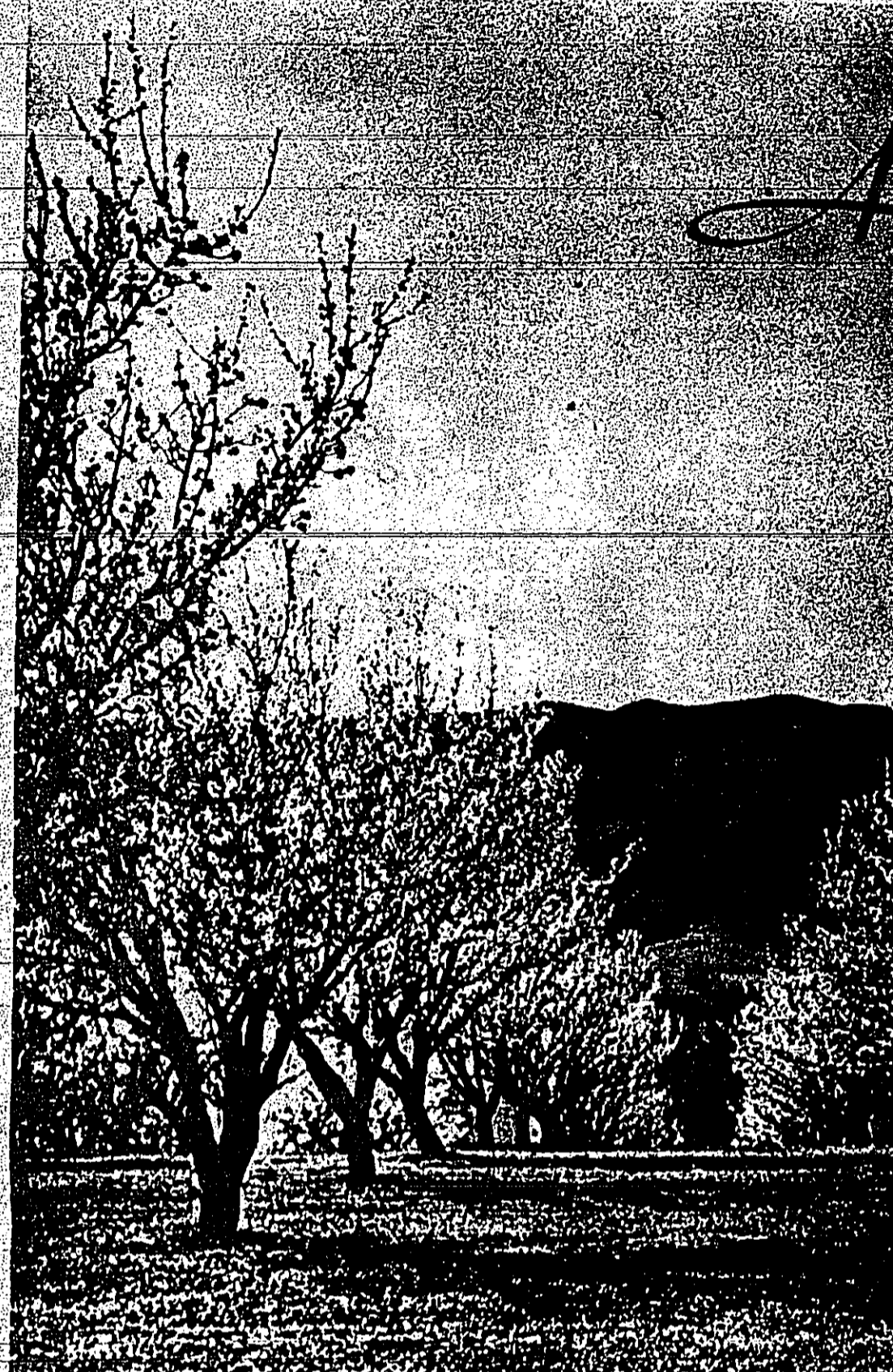

Chester Yellow Jackets Roll Past Goodrich 42-12 Walker And Walker Lead Newton 34-0

Walker, and this was not Hamilton, was a big game factor as the Newton Eagles beat the Woodville Eagles to the tune of 34-0 in district play last Friday night.

Tommy Walker and Jimmy Walker are the Walker we speak of as each man scored two touchdowns to lead the Eagle scoring parade. Tommy, a big strapping fullback, bulled his way into the endzone twice and Jimmy scampered once on the ground and once receiving a pass.

For Woodville it was another night of frustration when the attack faltered, getting only 59 total yards all night. Rod Barclay and James Moyer net stuff

resistance from a very stingy defensive unit of Newton's. Both boys gained 30 yards rushing, but it took Rodney 11 times and James 16 to get it. Defensive tackle Tommy Bowers, middle linebacker Don Cochran and free safety Louie Byrly, seemed to be everywhere. Of course, Woodville didn't know these boys by name during the game, but when it was over they were referring to them as "Mr. 75", "Mr. 55" and "Mr. 44".

Woodville riding the arm of A. J. Cortez, the Eagles enjoyed their best night of the year. Cortez completed 16 of 26 passes for 153 yards and proved that the airways were the only way that Woodville would move this night. A J's favorite receiver proved to be Vernon Gallier who caught 7 passes for 77 yards, but dropped a sure touchdown right in his hands early in the game. Woodville missed a field goal early in the contest and in the words of the official, "If the pole (goal post) had been straight, it would have been good".

John Moyer caught 4 passes for 41 yards, but he dropped some very important ones. Rod Barclay latched onto three and Tommy Daniels caught two.

This week the Woodville Eagles take on the Hemphill Hornets.

This will be that last game this year and the starting time is 7:30 p.m. Everyone is urged to get out and back the Eagles.

Chester clinched at least a tie for the district title and clinched a playoff berth by defeating Goodrich 40-12. This win enabled Chester to gain at least a tie because they have yet to lose a game. The only blemish on their record is a tie with Ewaldale. They beat Ewaldale the first time the two teams met and that was the only loss the Rebels have. But by virtue of that one win, Chester would advance to district even if they lost the next game.

Both teams swapped early touchdowns with the Jackets getting the first one. Kent Barries scampered 12 yards for the first one. But Goodrich came right back and tied the score. Van Hamilton put Chester in front once more with an 11 yard run, but again Goodrich tied up 12-12. It was Hamilton's halfback pass to quarterback Gus Marshall on a flea flicker pass play that put the Yellow Jackets out in front.

The score at halftime read 18-12.

The second half was all Wayne Berry's. The unheralded member of the Chester back-

field scored three times on runs of 30, 52 and 25 yard runs. Berry was the leading rusher with 125 yards on 7 carries for an 18 yard per run average. Hamilton was right behind him with 124 yards on 15 carries. Both boys used fine blocking from their offensive ends Charles Barnes and Brigham Bigby. Wayne was a shining star on defense as he swiped three passes from his defensive halfback spot.

This week Chester plays Colmesneil for their homecoming game. Starting time is 7:30.

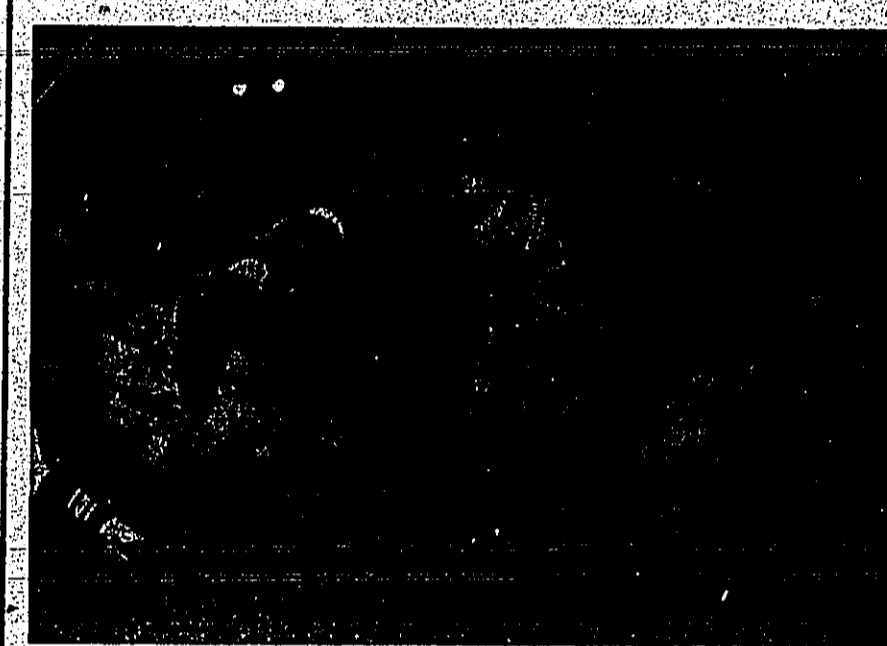

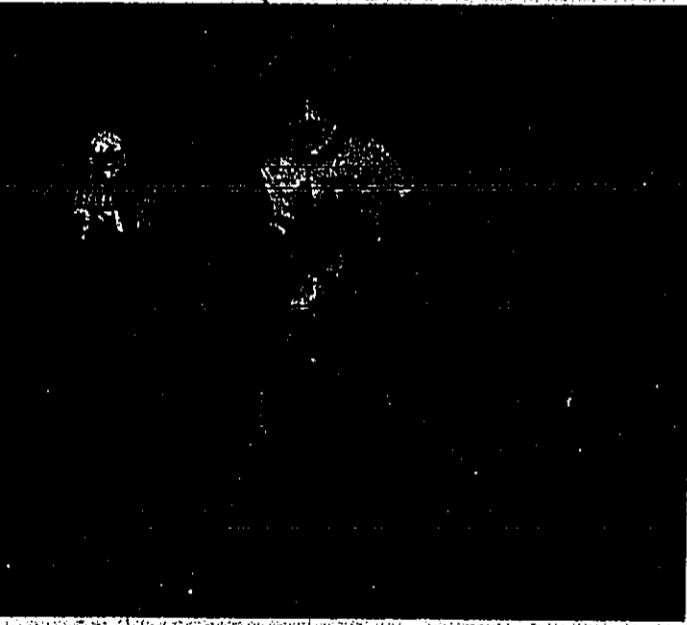

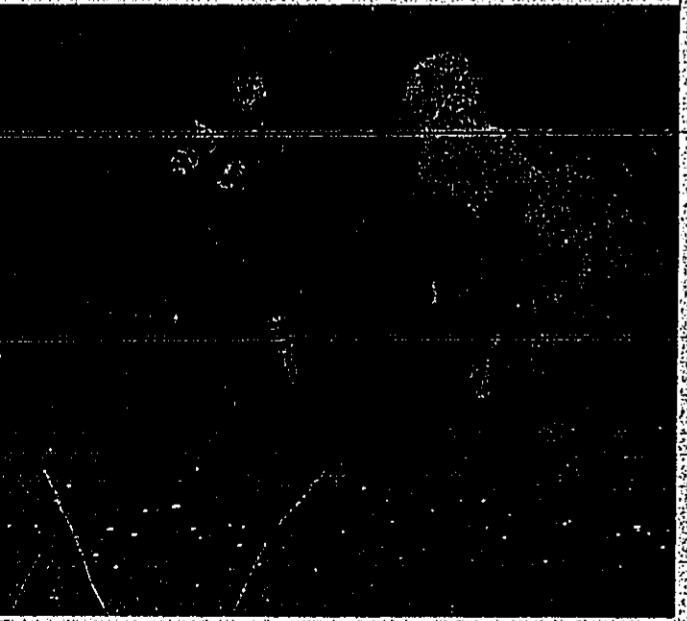

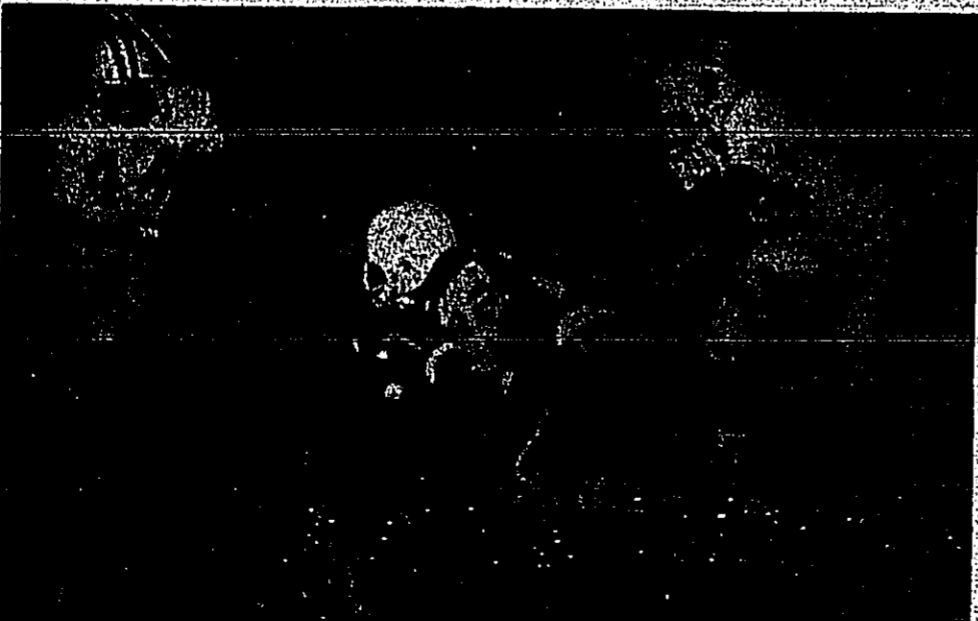
