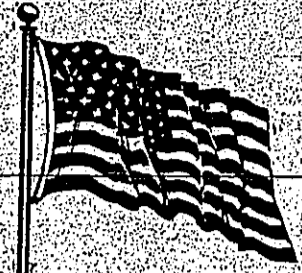

## TOP OF THE MORNING

Since the early centuries when man discovered that he could reason logically enough to guide his hands into carving crude objects out of stone and wood his inventions have brought him both a better life and considerable woe.

He discovered how to carve a bowl from stone and arrowheads from flint, to build a fire for warmth and for roasting meat, to fashion a bow and spear with which to harvest wild game as well as for defense and for offense against neighboring tribes, to erect crude shelters from the heat and cold.

Many of his inventions have changed the course of his history. The wheel brought progress in both transportation and crude manufacturing. He harnessed the ox and the horse, finally invented the carriage. The steam engine provided energy with which to turn the wheel easier and faster.

Man's inventions have released him from drudgery (unless he is a newspaperman) and allows him to live in more comfort than he enjoyed back in his caveman days.

Of course man's inventions also have had compensative effects. The automobile affords mass transportation which is offset to a great extent by bringing death and maiming. So it is with a major part of other instruments of progress.

The invention of the safety razor and its continuing refinements made obsolete the old straight razor. This was the exception for the fact that it also made obsolete the razor strap. Not too many years ago the man of each household took a great deal of pride in his straight-razor and fine-leather strap with which he kept it sharpened.

The razor strap had another use in most homes, probably the majority of homes. It made a fine leather strap with which dad could paddle his unruly son (or daughter, we suppose). It was used for this purpose as often as for putting a sharp edge on the razor. The strap usually was made with two pieces of leather fastened with a tapering piece as a handle on one end and a hole on the other to hang it while honing the razor. A lusty blow with the strap stung as it hit and the two pieces of leather popping together made a fearsome noise. It sounded as though the recipient was being hit much harder than he actually was. The razor strap was a convincer in two ways.

We can't help but feel that the age of permissiveness began with the disappearance of the strap from the home. Hanging beside the washing stand as it did it was readily available. When dad confronted you about some mischief you knew that he knew where the convincer was hanging.

The man who invented the safety razor did us a good turn, no doubt. But he sure dealt a sad blow to discipline in the home.

## Second Immunization Clinic Set

A second immunization clinic for diphtheria-tetanus will be held Sunday, December 6 from 10:00 to 6:00 p.m. This will be primarily for those adults and pre-school children requiring their second injection for the basic series.

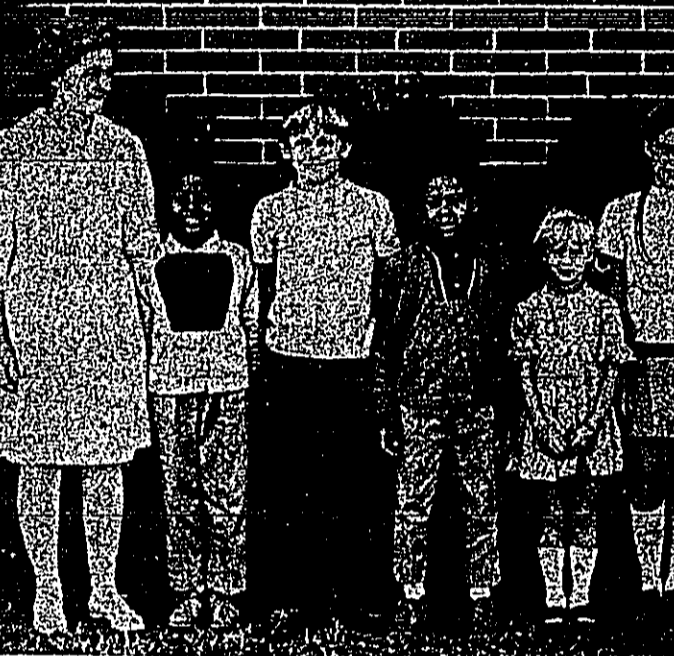
For adults the basic series is two doses, a month apart, followed by a third dose one year later. Boosters are then given every 10 years unless in an epidemic area or when an injury breaks the skin.

For pre-school children the basic series is three injections, each a month apart, followed by an injection a year later, and a booster just before starting school.

For the majority of the children now enrolled in the school systems, the booster given on Thursday, October 29th is sufficient.

Rubella (German measles) vaccine will also be given to pre-school children at this time, Sunday, December 6.

These clinics are under the direction of the Texas State Department of Health.

## City Water Supply Approved

The State Health Department has certified that the water supply of the City of Woodville is safe and sanitary.

The city has received signs to post at the city limits announcing that its water supply has been approved by the State Health Department. The signs were erected by city street department employees this week.

Woodville's water supply has been safe to drink all along but the city water system, with some dead-end lines, failed to live up to requirements of the health department.

With the recent addition of new wells and the elimination from use of the city well tower just north of city hall the department approved the water supply. Its evaluation of public drinking water takes into consideration the origin, treatment, distribution and storage of the water and its qualities as it flows from the tap.

In granting the approval of the system, the agency says that the water supply does more than meet the minimum requirements of the U. S. Health Service drinking water standards and State Health Department regulations.

Some 450 public water supplies across the state have been certified as safe and sanitary, according to the health department.

## Huntsville Man Brings in Second Widest Antlers

L. B. Hanks of Huntsville killed an 8-point buck on Wolf Creek which had an antler spread of 18 inches to take second place, so far, in the Booster's wide rack contest in which \$100 in prizes will be given for the four widest racks on deer killed in Tyler County this hunting season.

Lewis Cravens of Colmesneil killed a buck with a 17-1/2 inch wide rack to presently hold third place while Tom Kincaid of Warren is challenging for fourth prize with a 16 inch antler spread.

First place so far is held by Clyde Frazier of the Dies community with a 19-1/2 inch spread on an 8-point buck.

However, with a little more than five weeks to go in the contest, it is possible that entries will be made to surpass all four of the current leaders. This is especially so if some of the hunters manage to bag any of the large bucks they report seeing.

Antlers on deer killed this season have been well formed for the most part but have not had unusually wide racks.

The contest for the widest racks offers \$50 for the widest and prizes for the next three widest of \$25, \$15 and \$10. Along with the Booster, the contest is sponsored by local business firms.

Hunters may live anywhere but to be eligible the deer must be legally killed in Tyler County.

Hunters may bring the entire deer, by for measurement and a picture or just the antlers, as long as it is evident that it is freshly killed.

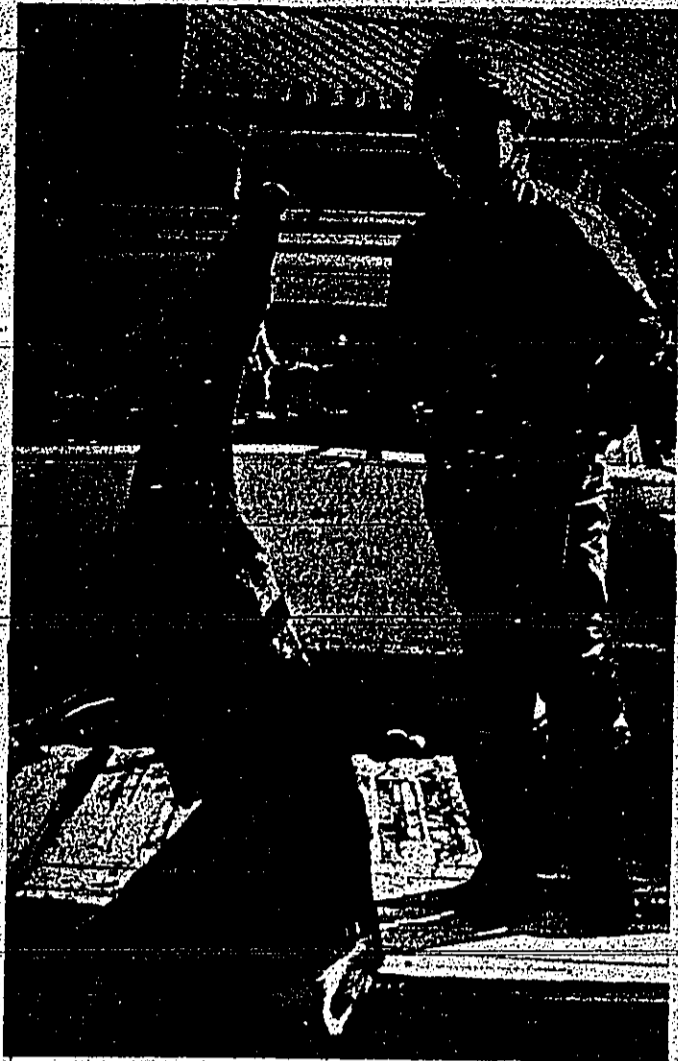

NEWS FROM EAST OF DOUCETTE

Every so often, someone points with alarm to the increase in women alcoholics. The truth is not that more women are becoming drunks but that more women are admitting their alcoholism. The problem is merely coming out into the open. It used to be that if mama was fond of taking a nip, the family called it nervous headaches and kept it secret. Now they admit she's crooked and try to do something about it. Women are no more apt to become alcoholics than men. The best statistics show that one out of every sixteen Americans, either male or female, uses alcohol abnormally. Yet women alcoholics are harder to treat than men, because too many people still consider a woman drunk as something shameful. Both women who drink and their families too often consider it a kind of degradation. Women have the mistaken idea alcoholism is a moral problem. Alcoholism is a disease, and it's a family disease in a sense, because everyone connected with the alcoholic needs education. For instance, only six percent of those who drink become alcoholics. The difference between one who drinks and an alcoholic is when the drink becomes important to the drinker, when the cocktail before lunch, overeating or heavy smoking but so-so, will accept a fat woman or one who smokes heavily while looking down on a woman drunk far more than a man drunk. The patient must admit alcoholism, make her own diagnosis, before she can be helped. People who are becoming more aware of this, but too many women can be a source because they don't realize this is a disease and you must know the disease before you can treat it. The alcoholic's life is quite literally bottle-centered, and there is a treatment but there is no cure for this. I think there are as many recovered alcoholics in the country as there are alcoholics. The recovered alcoholic is the one who never takes a drink, because he knows that just one drink, just one drink will make him an alcoholic again. Since women tend to be more emotional than men, the woman alcoholic may be more dependent on her drinks than a man. The problem in treatment is to teach her that she can be happy while sober because alcoholism

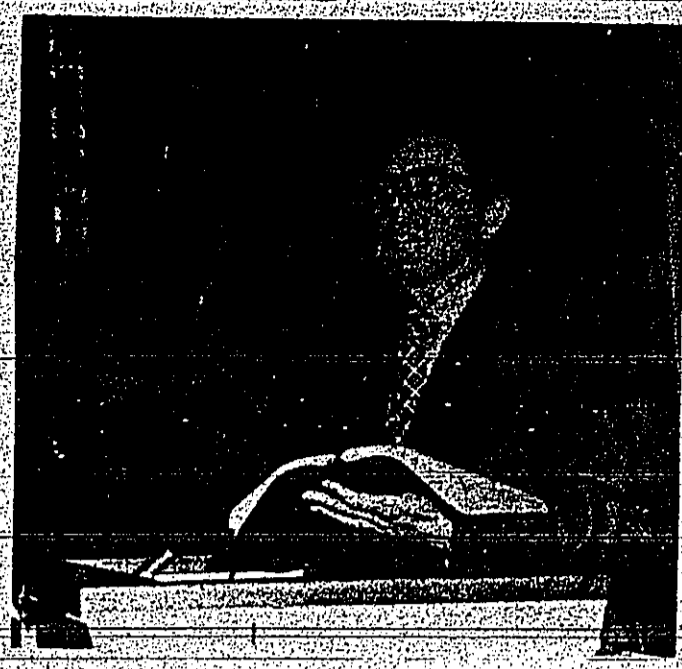

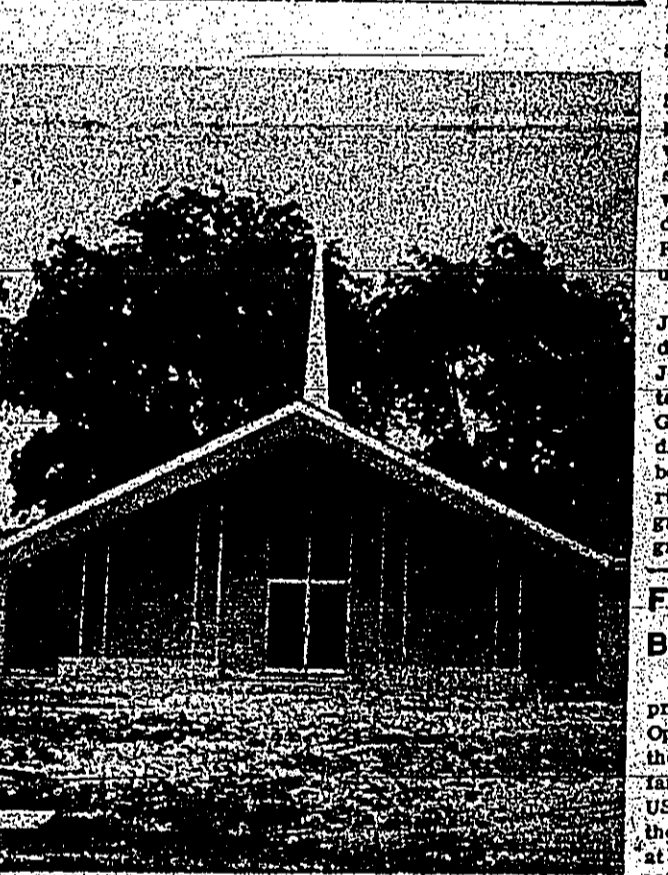

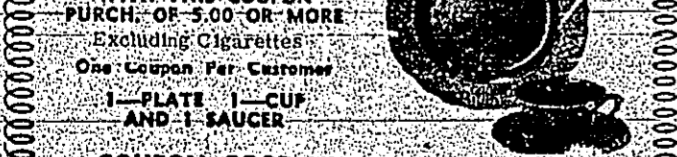
