City Council Lets Contract On Sewer

The Woodville city council at its meeting Monday night approved the letting of a contract for the construction of a sewer line to serve business firms and residences from Highway 69 west to Pecan Street on Cobb Mill Road. The line, including a lift station, will continue eastward to the city's sewage treatment plant.

The contract was let to the low bidder, John Morrison Company, for \$24,176.50. Plans for the new line and lift station were drawn by the city's engineers, Charles R. Haller Associates.

Other bidders were the Bell Company, \$25,464.78, and Barclay-Owens, Inc., \$37,550. David Pinell, representing the engineers, said the low bidder would be notified Tuesday so that the firm could get materials and equipment on the job as soon as possible.

The council also approved, subject to action by the school board and property owners concerned, a proposal by the State Highway Department for curbs and gutters on each side of Highway 69 (Magnolia street) from the 500 block north to the intersection of Pine street.

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Miss Sarah Tolar, 86, pioneer resident of Tyler County, recalled the early days in the area when she visited her former home, now part of the complex of Heritage Garden Village. The cabin, a Texas historical medallion home, was built in 1866 on the Tolar homestead at Hillister and was used until 1960 by Miss Sarah and her older sister, Miss Betty, as a kitchen. The two, who prepared all the meals for their family and the many daily guests, cooked only on the fireplace.

Miss Tolar is now a resident of the Woodville Nursing Home. Guests of hers on the trip to Heritage Garden Village were Mrs. Emma Sawyer, also a Tyler County pioneer, and Mrs. Amanda West, both of whom are in the Home's rooms, of which there are supposed to be only five still in existence. It was manufactured by the prisoners at Huntsville when Governor Hogg instituted the program of furniture making at the prison, hence its name.

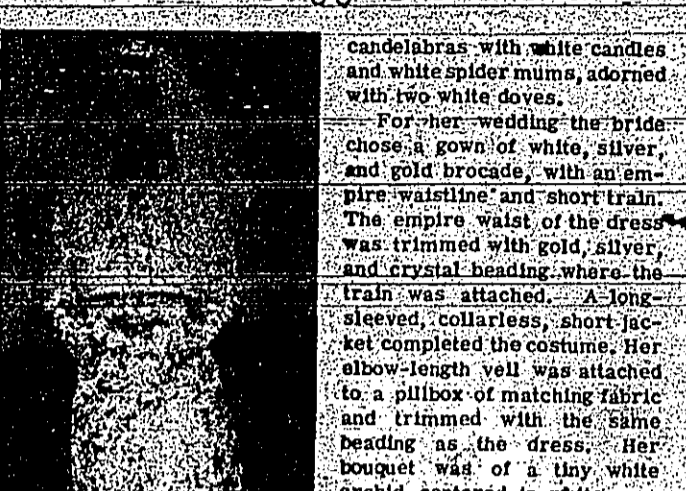

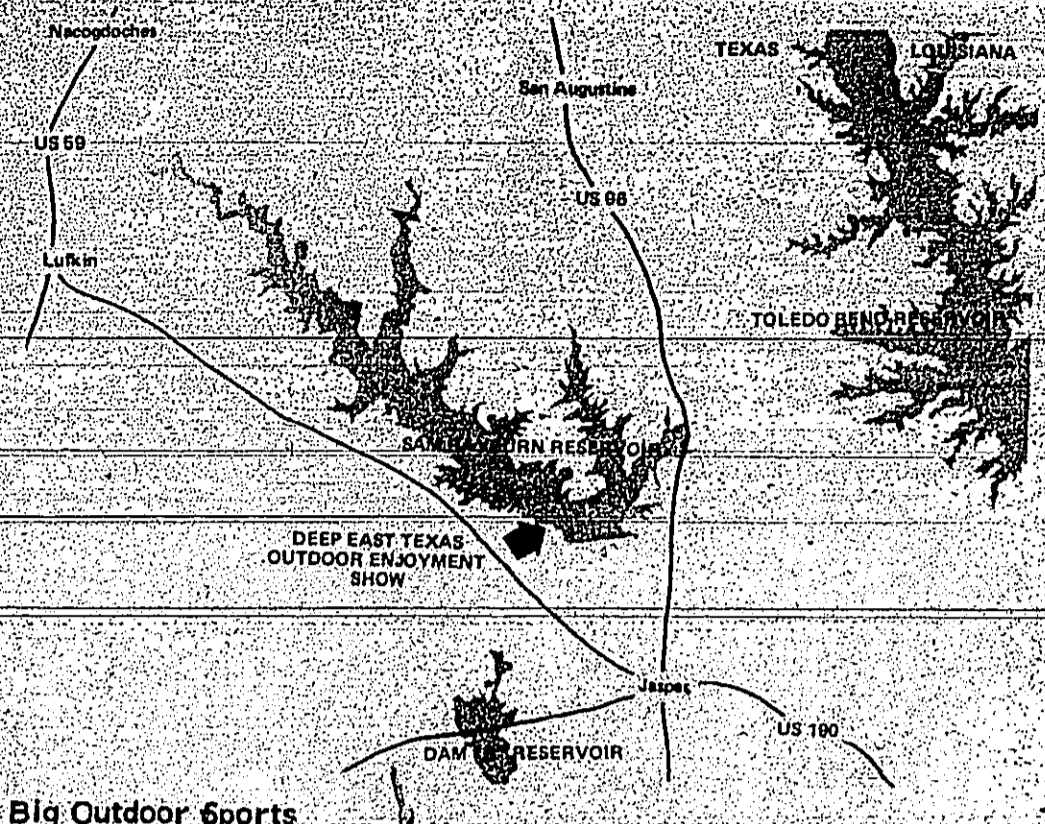

Each school may have a family who find it difficult to pay for lunch. The Tyler County Board of Education has approved a plan to provide free lunches for these children. Representatives of Temple Industries, Inc., Southwestern Lumber Co., and the National Forest Service announced the project noting that they have in the past and intend to continue providing sites for sanitary landfills on their property. An array of assistance in the form of plans, specifications, soil test, layout and surveying of the sites was offered by various agencies present at the meeting. Sam F. Collins of the Sabine River Authority of Texas presented a letter to commissioners in the Toledo Bend area of Tyler County, and prepared the site if the county would select and maintain the site. A publicity program to encourage area citizens to support the establishment of and use these landfills will be launched immediately by the Deep East Texas Development Association. Finally, and perhaps, most noteworthy was a report of the board of directors of the Foundation to grant \$10,000 to the first county in the area to establish an economically feasible and working county-wide garbage disposal program.

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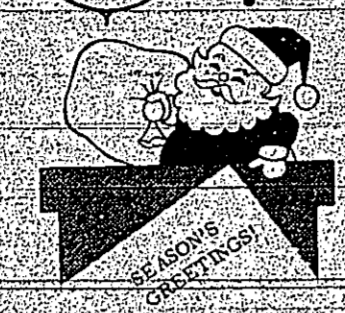

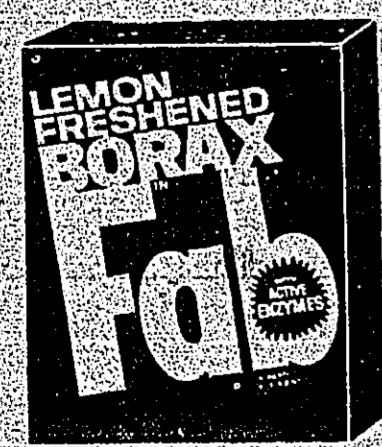
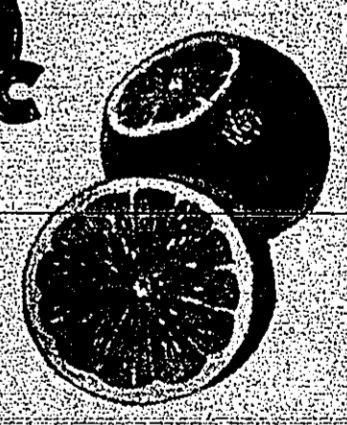
