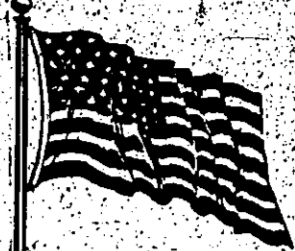

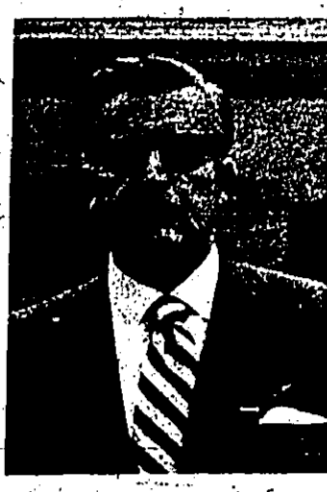
Gospel Singing Convention Stated Here January 15-17

Mayor Jimmy Freeman has proclaimed Gospel Singing Convention Week in Woodville to be observed January 11 through 17 and Gospel Singing Convention Days to be observed January 15-17 in recognition of the big Tex-La Neches Valley Singing Convention which will be held at Kirby school auditorium Friday night, Saturday and Sunday of next week.

The three day convention is designed to give every age group something special. Beginning at 7:30 p.m. Friday, January 15 the singing will be concert with all special groups participating. Such known names in gospel music circles as the Harris Family of Lufkin; the Shaw Family of Baton Rouge, La.; the Tinsley Sisters of Beaumont; the Conn Family of Dallas; the Sons of Calvary of Dallas; the Holleys of Houston; Woody Woodrone Trio; Maw Baxter of Stamps-Baxter Music Co.; the Glad Tidings Trio; and Patsy Dickens and the Singing Taylors will sing for the enjoyment of all.

The matinee Saturday, January 16 at 1:30 p.m. will be a Youth Session under the direction of Gary Davis. Saturday evening and all day Sunday will be 'convention gospel singing'. A devotional service will be held at 11:45 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 17.

The Texas-Louisiana Neches Valley Singing Convention had its beginning in 1936 in Huntington and was known as the "Seven-County Singing Convention". The seven counties were Polk, Trinity, Angleton, Tyler, Jasper, Hardin and Jefferson.

Burl Carter served as a president of the convention until his death in 1969.

The convention grew in popularity until it encompassed almost all the counties of East Texas and became known as the "Neches Valley Singing Convention" with conventions held quarterly.

In 1941 a delegation of singers came to the convention from Louisiana and asked that West Louisiana be included in the area covered by the convention. This was acceptable to the convention and it was decided to meet only twice a year, once in Texas and once in Louisiana.

In 1969 it was decided that a permanent convention site be picked and conventions held once yearly.

January was decided upon as the time for the convention and Woodville was chosen as the permanent convention site.

All music lovers are urged to attend the 1971 convention as it promises to be the best ever Harper said.

Monday Holidays Begin This Year

Congress passed a bill in the last session to make five holidays extra long by moving them to Mondays and 45 states, including Texas, have adopted the new schedule.

The new extra-long holidays created by Congress will begin this year with four old ones being moved to Monday and another one, Columbus Day, added to the legal holiday list.

Forty-five states including Texas have gone along with the new idea.

Most federally approved holidays will be observed along with a number of state holidays, such as Sam Jackin' Day, in Texas.

The nine holidays set up by Congress are:

New Year's Day, still Jan. 1.

Washington's Birthday, the third Monday in February.

Memorial Day, the last Monday in May.

Independence Day, still July 4.

Labor Day, still the first Monday in September.

Columbus Day, the second Monday in October.

Veterans Day, the fourth Monday in October.

Thanksgiving Day, still the fourth Thursday in November.

Christmas, still Dec. 25.

In adopting the Monday holiday idea, states added a few variations. All 45 that have acted went along with Washington's Birthday but only 37 adopted Columbus Day, the new holiday, according to the Discover America Travel Organizations, a prime backer of the new law.

Local merchants usually observe about five holidays annually. The chamber of commerce has not as yet set those to be observed this year.

The Outdoor Enjoyment Show to be held on Sam Rayburn Reservoir has stirred interest all over the nation. Already exhibitor contracts have been forwarded, on request, to Indian Industries, Inc., Evansville, Indiana; Tackle Industries, Shreveport, Bisco, Inc., New Orleans; Burke Flexo-Products Co., Traverse City, Michigan; Globe Fishing Tackle Co., Boston; Four Rivers Tackle Co., Greenwood, Mississippi; Elray Plastics, Beaumont; Deer Me Products, Co., Anoke, Minnesota; Creme Lure Co., Tyler; Camp & Trail Outfitters, Inc., New York; Wallace Leisure Products, Inc., Philadelphia; Ithaca Gun Co., Inc., Ithaca, New York; Knight Sporting Goods Mfg. Co., Tyler; Chevrolet Motor Div., General Motors Corp., Houston; and Ford Marketing Corp., Houston.

The drive to attract exhibitors has just begun with all indications pointing to a great outdoor exposition.

Plans for the show were announced late last year by the Deep East Texas Development Association.

Located in scenic terrain on the shores of Sam Rayburn Reservoir, the show is expected to draw over 100,000 visitors to view exhibits and demonstrations of a wide variety of outdoor enjoyment equipment.

Good highways and parking for 30,000 automobiles make the site easily accessible by land, but many visitors are expected to make use of the 1000 yards of shore line and travel by boat from other camp grounds on the huge lake.

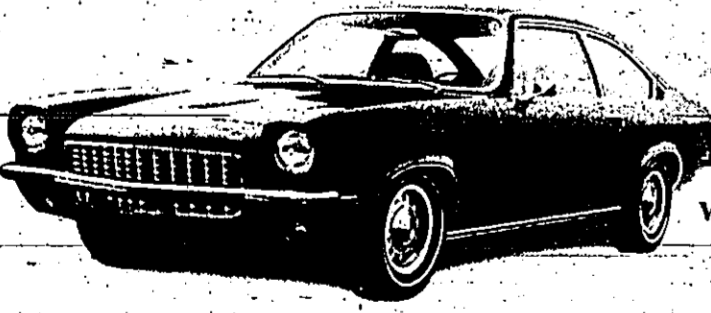

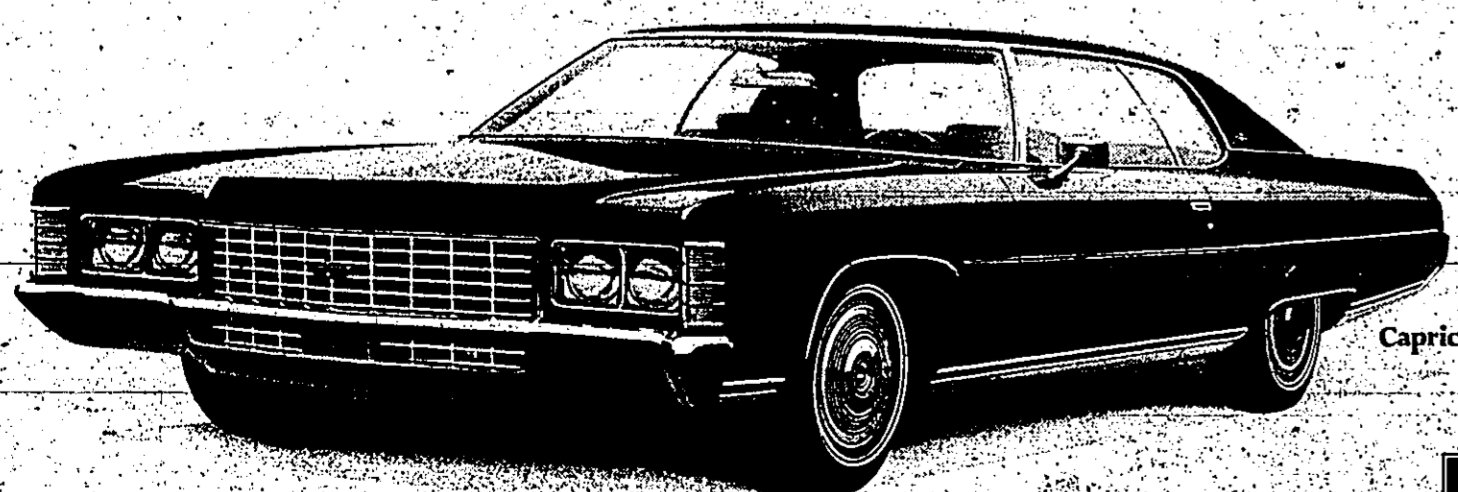

ed the soldier a frozen piece of fish. A friend I gift a special good Christmas. They went inside the tent, warmed themselves at the portable stove, fried the fish, and with army rations, enjoyed a Christmas dinner. The Eskimo was his over-night guest, simply lying down on the earthen floor with the layers of fur clothing, sufficient to keep him warm.

And New Year's Eve is a time for parties. My son has told me of his most memorable New Year party in World War Two. His company was to leave at daylight, destination unknown, but they knew it was to be "where the action was." Two other boys and the only two purses on the staff, had gathered in a night tent for a farewell talk and goodbye, all knowing they would probably never meet again. It was anything but a happy group, and they began recounting New Year parties of other years.

I think of the soldier stationed at a lone outpost in a treacherous region, at the time he was in deep sleep and ice as far as the eye could see. He thought of his home folks, of all the Christmas's of his youth and recalled that his mother often remarked, "My children, I hope that you will always be able to have a tree at Christmas, and will always want to have one." So he determined to have a Christmas tree.

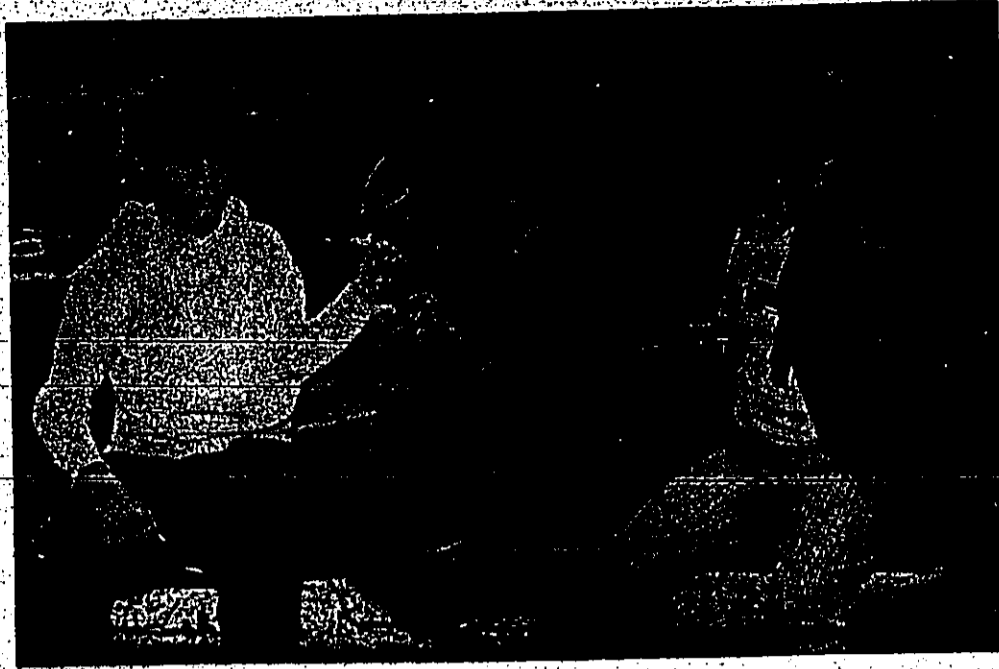

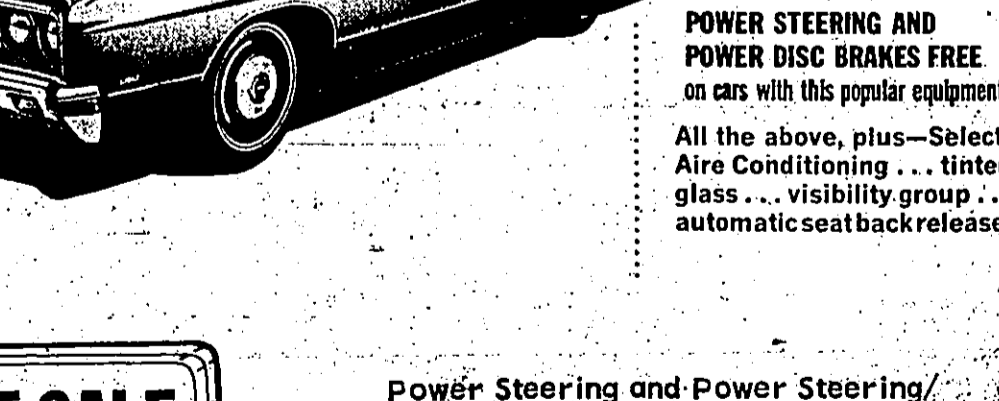
Good (But Foolish) Samaritan
