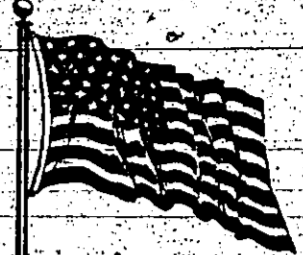

## TOP OF THE MORNING

We want to join all the people in this area who welcome the gospel singers and listeners to the Tex-La Neches Valley Singing Convention which will be held in Woodville this weekend. We hope you enjoy your stay here and that the good weather which we have ordered will greet you.

So that you may know more about Woodville and Tyler County we will list a few things here of which you may not be aware. Of course as you drive around you can see that we have many fine homes in each town in the county. The business districts in Woodville, Colmesneil, Chester, and the other towns are mostly well-kept and the streets clean.

These are things that you expect to find in any progressive town and we mention them here just to bring to your attention the fact that our people take pride in their surroundings.

But while we have many fine new homes and new modern business districts we have not forgotten our heritage. There are a dozen or more historical sites marked in the county through the efforts of the county's historical survey committee. You will pass one on your way to the school auditorium--the Silvers Library and Museum. There are two on the courthouse square. Another is located at Heritage Village about a mile west of town. This is the old Tolar kitchen (log cabin) which is an integral part of the 1890's and turn of the century village at Heritage Village.

Others in Woodville are at the First Baptist Church, the Cooper-Reid home at 702 West Bluff, and at the James Wheat home just south of the courthouse. Others include the old James Barclay home (first Indian agent) located 10 miles east and south of Woodville; the Kirby Museum at Chester; the site of an Alabama-Coushatta Indian Village on the old Splash Road; the Squire Cruise family cemetery just off Highway 190 about 19 miles east of Woodville; Fort Teran near Rockland; the Birch-Cable home at Peach Tree Village near Chester; and the home of David Charles Enloe and the Enloe family mill site near Colmesneil.

So much for the past. One of the area's favorite fishing and boating lakes is 15 miles east on Highway 190. It is known locally as Dam B or Town Bluff Lake. To the west is Heritage Village, which we listed above, and the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation 0.5 miles from Woodville. Near Colmesneil is a fine small lake for swimming and camping--Lake Tejas.

Many of you who come from Southeast Texas will know of our annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival. It features a western parade on the last Saturday in March and the dogwood parade, queen's coronation and pageant on the first Saturday in April. You can see the outdoor amphitheatre where this is held just east of the auditorium where the gospel singing is being held.

Now we know you came here to either sing or listen to gospel music this weekend. The reason we are bringing up these other attractions and events is that we want you to come back some time soon. We hope that Jess Harper, who is from Jasper, will bear with us while we write about the attractions locally. We will give him equal space to inform you of the many fine attractions in Jasper (we share Dan).

way 69 were as many as 20 large diesel-powered trucks stalled Friday. The worst congestion was between 4:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Friday. The highway was not officially closed but a highway patrol unit stationed at Colmesneil advised motorists not to travel the highway unless motorists heeded the advice.

A mammoth effort by the district highway department maintenance crews out of Woodville is credited with keeping the highway traffic moving as best it could under the icy conditions. The crews worked throughout Thursday night putting gravel on the hills and bridges and assisting stalled trucks by throwing gravel under the wheels so that they could move. Highway maintenance trucks had moved Thursday morning to gravel bridges on highways throughout the county when it became apparent that the sleet, accompanied by some snow, began to cover the highways, while who live in Chester, Colmesneil and Rockland found the highways almost impassable by Friday morning.

The highway patrol said that the highway maintenance crews cannot be praised enough for their efforts to keep traffic moving and the highways open as much as possible. There were no serious accidents during the period and maintenance crews were commended along with motorists for the safety record during a difficult driving period.

## Traffic Accidents In County Take 10 Lives In 1970

Sgt. C. L. Taylor of the Beaumont district of Texas Highway Patrol reports that 10 persons were killed on Tyler County highways during 1970. This compares with nine deaths on county roads during 1969.

Sgt. Taylor said that through December there were 156 rural traffic accidents in Tyler County compared with 152 in 1969. Injuries in 1970 totaled 60 persons, down from the 91 injured in 1969.

During the month of December the patrol investigated 11 traffic accidents in which one person was killed and 10 injured.

## City To Sell \$100,000 In Bonds

The Woodville City Council at its meeting Monday night voted to go ahead with a curb and gutter project on North Magnolia street, authorized the sale of \$100,000 in sewer revenue bonds, and passed a mobile home ordinance among other things.

The curb and gutter project on North Magnolia (Highway 69) was approved subject to getting agreements from property owners on each side. The school, which owns the property on the west side, has approved the project.

The sewer revenue bonds will be used for extending sewer service north from Highway 69 west to the Cobb Mill Baptist Church area. This project and another for the area north of Highway 287, including the Chesswood addition, were included in the Woodville voters approved.

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### It's a woman's world

"It can't happen here" are famous last words. At least, they're fast becoming so in relation to drug abuse. Back in the early 1960's, many thought drug addiction was confined to ghetto areas in big cities, mainly New York. But now, 1970 has become the year of the middle-class "junkie," says Dr. David E. Smith, founder and director of the High Ashbury Medical Clinic, San Francisco, California.

Speaking before a session in drug control at the National Association of Manufacturers' Congress of American Industry in New York recently, he said, "Every adolescent in the United States is a potential drug addict. The rest came from everywhere in the Union. And there was a dramatic increase in the number of middle-class white heroin addicts among them, he reports.

In New York City, the leading cause of death in adolescence is from heroin overdose, and 50 percent of the crimes of property theft by addicts involve money to support their habit.

In San Francisco, 50 percent of the high school seniors have had regular experience with illegal drugs, and 10 percent of the 8th graders have tried at least once. This is a pattern of drug experimentation that is sweeping across the country.

Only through intensive education in every community can this drug epidemic be brought under control, Dr. Smith claims. And every program should be balanced be-

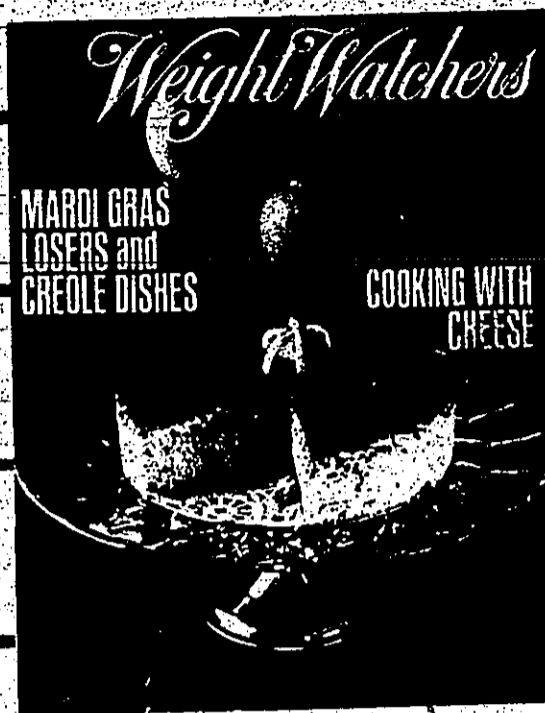
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### New Group of Teenagers Emerging With Special Comprehensive Needs

The medical world is beginning to see a new group of teenagers who have special physical and emotional problems. I am not talking about rebellious youth from suburban campuses nor school-age drug users.

I'm talking about the youngsters who would not have survived early childhood as recently as 20 years ago. Now, thanks to improved diagnosis and treatment, children with a birth defect called meningomyelocele have been given a lease on life that runs years beyond the previously allotted span.

Meningomyelocele is a congenital malformation of the back, usually in the form of an open spine. It causes damage to the spinal cord. This leads to malfunction of the bladder and bowel, and difficulty in walking. Before modern surgical techniques were developed, kidney failure was a common cause of death in these cases because urine would back up in the bladder, causing an eventually fatal infection.

Today, however, children born with this birth defect can undergo ileal conduit surgery, a diversionary, life-saving operation that prevents chronic kidney disease. Meningomyelocele, the most common of the major birth defects, does not of itself entail mental retardation. Frequently the child can walk without aid of braces or crutches.

**Emotional Problems**

Those of us working directly with these young people want to help them with more than regular physical examinations and prescriptions. As they approach adolescence, they inevitably experience a tangle of emotional conflicts. Social isolation ranks high, a factor which often impairs the young person's self-confidence and belief in his own ability to function in the everyday world. Frequently, they are over-protected by the family and have little informal, give-and-take contact with their peers, even in school. This, of course, height-



ens their sense of being different and alone.

My colleagues and I here at the March of Dimes Meningomyelocele Clinic have been particularly concerned about this. We know what potential these children have if given the right kind of support and direction.

Recently we finished a study of a small group of patients and families from the clinic to learn more about the social and emotional pressures these children face as they grow older. Much valuable information was uncovered and we have set up several new programs to deal with these needs.

**"RAP Sessions"**

Chief among them is a loosely structured club, or group session, for girls 11 to 15 years old. Eventually we will have mixed meetings, but we decided to start off with separate sessions.

It was the first opportunity that many had had to meet informally with others who shared their problems. It came as a great relief to the girls to exchange questions and ideas about such acute subjects as dating, school, family, meeting people and handling guests about their condition. They were particularly anxious to talk about the sensitive issue of the conduit operation that all had experienced.

A doctor, clinical nurse or medical social worker is always present at these "rap sessions."

The meetings also give them a chance to meet and mingle with high school and college volunteers from the New York chapter of the March of Dimes.

**Wide Application**

These sessions serve to support the family too. Already feedback from parents indicates that their daughters are opening up with them for the first time and beginning to discuss their problems at home.

Our work in this area is still quite new but it is becoming obvious that guidance and support for emotional adjustment are necessary elements in treating the older child with birth defects.

The significance of the program is that it serves as a model for developing comprehensive care to meet the special needs of an emerging group of young adults with any type of chronic disabling condition. This is true not only of those with meningomyelocele, but of patients with other handicaps, such as cardiac, kidney, metabolic or orthopedic conditions, that require chronic, long-term care by different specialists.

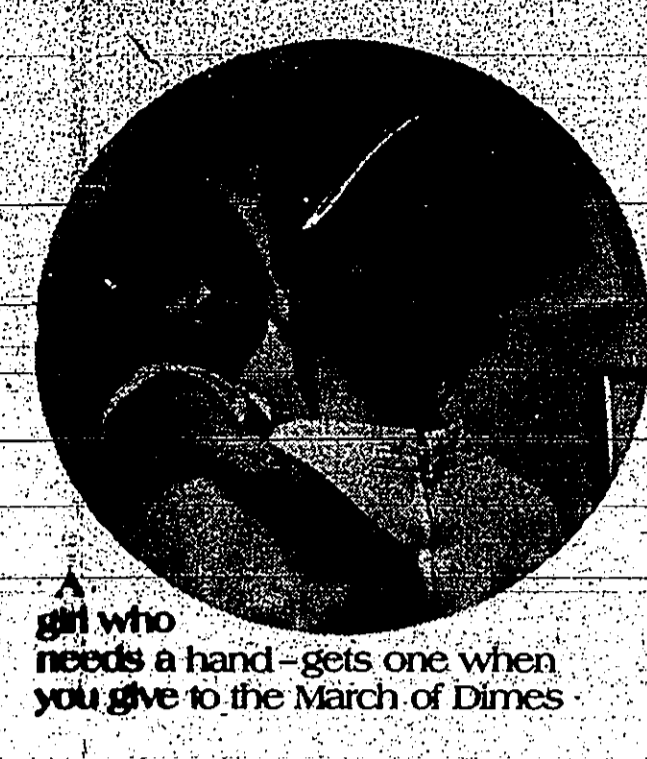

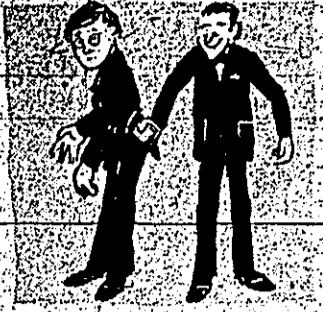
In due course, the fellow was arrested on a charge of larceny. At the trial, however, he came off with a defense.

"I admit I had theft in mind," he told the court. "But I never did get that wallet more than half way out of the man's pocket. Maybe I'm guilty of an attempt, but nothing more."

The crime of larceny requires both a taking (even for a short time) and a carrying away (even for a short distance). Nothing less will do. Thus,

But this time, the court held him guilty of attempt only, not larceny. The court said that because of the string, turning the



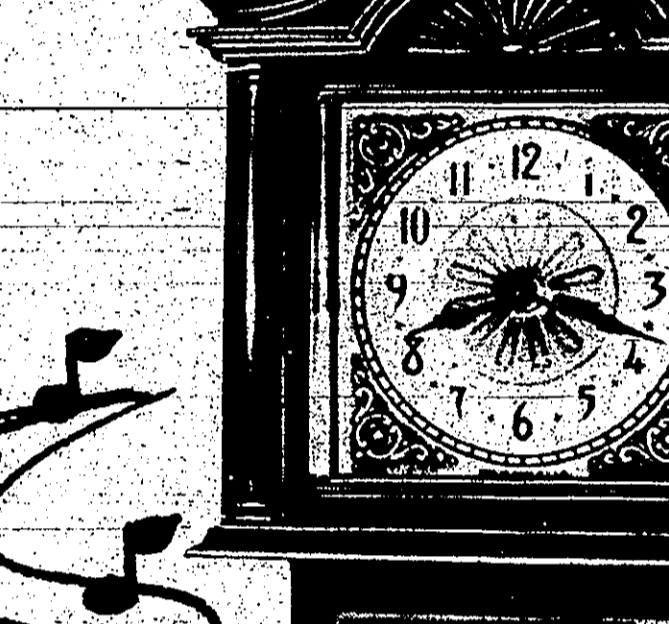
Nevertheless, the court found him guilty of larceny, as charged. The judge said the offense was complete when he took full possession of the wallet and began moving it out of the victim's pocket.

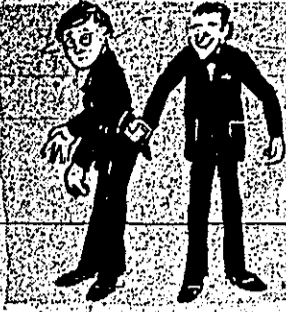

WHY CHILDREN DON'T EAT

Toddlers are full of surprises. One minute they're in the cupboard pulling out all the pots and pans and the next minute they're reaching up to hug you.

One of the surprises you should know about as a parent is not uncommon among all children. This surprise comes when the child is about 18 months old. At this time he may begin to eat less and even skip entire meals. There is no reason to be alarmed, since this is a normal occurrence.



During infancy your baby's growth and development is taking place at a rapid rate. In the first 18 months the average baby will gain over 17 pounds. This rapid growth requires generous amounts of food and getting your baby to eat at this time presents no problem.

However, in the next 3 1/2 years from about 18 months to the age of 6, growth slows down and so does the need for food. Since your child's body requires less food, his appetite will decrease. This reduced appetite is often misunderstood by parents because their child is so active. They often try to force their children to eat during this period without realizing that they just aren't hungry.

Like most stages of development, this period of reduced appetite is only temporary. Sometime between the ages of 6 and 8, most children enter another period of rapid growth and development. Appetites pick up again as the need for food increases. However, if your child has developed poor eating habits during the lull period, they could continue for a long time. This is why it is so important to develop good eating habits early in your child's life. Here are some tips on how to build good eating habits:

- AVOID BETWEEN MEAL SNACKS — Feeding and snacking do not create the demand

for food that growth does. So snacks — except for fruit and water — should be avoided.

**• MAKE MEALTIME CHERFUL** — To help your child associate eating with enjoyment, avoid lectures and arguments at mealtime. It also helps to prepare the food so it is attractive to your child. One example is to use bright-colored foods.

**• SERVE THE RIGHT FOODS** — Proper nutrition is the key to good health. In deciding what your child should eat, be sure to include plenty of high-protein foods, such as meats, cheese and eggs. Vegetables and fruits are important sources of needed sugar, starches and vitamins. Your doctor may also recommend a vitamin supplement, such as Poly-Vi-Sol vitamins, to make sure your child gets the vitamins he needs.

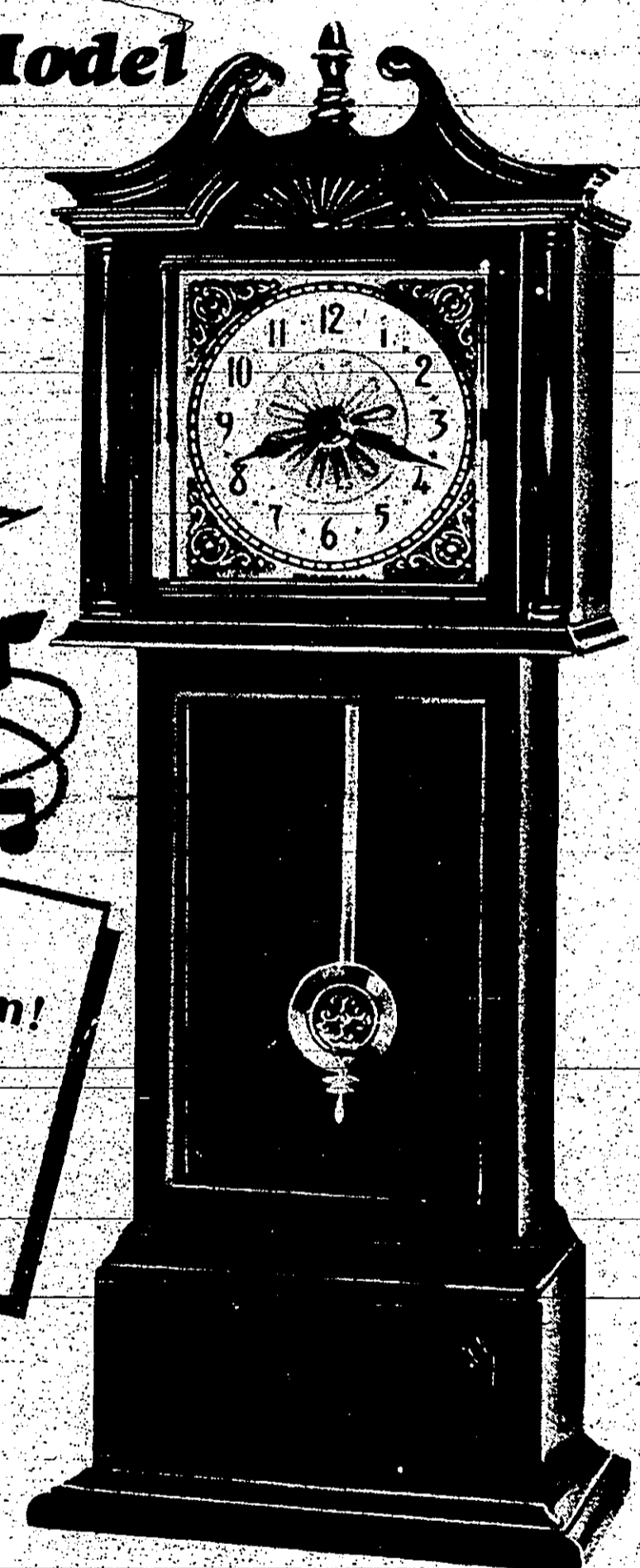
**• SELF-FEEDING IS IMPORTANT** — If your child can feed himself, he will gain a sense of responsibility. This permits him to eat without feeling forced.

**• SERVE A VARIETY OF FOODS** — An important step in getting your child to eat is to broaden their taste acceptance by introducing them to new foods. Mixing something new with one or two "old favorites" is a good technique. Another is to keep the servings small. Your child feels just as you do when facing a huge mound of food when you aren't hungry.



The main thing to remember in feeding your child during the lull period is that they have a relatively small need for food and, consequently, a small appetite. Once you understand this, small appetites will become easier for everyone involved.

A letter from the Texas Highway Department to Mr. Sawyer points out that the automated system's purpose is "defeated when special plates are received from different boxes and results in manual separation of receipts."

The letter from the highway department reads as follows: Dear Mr. Sawyer: The purpose of this letter is to confirm our observation that the policy of reserving special license numbers for motor vehicle owners is not compatible with our automated registration system implemented in Texas this year.

As you may recall, our instructions for the implementation of this system suggested that you assign certain series of license numbers for issuance with the renewal notice mailed to each motor vehicle owner and that you assign other series of license numbers for issuance to motor vehicle owners who, for one reason or another, did not receive a renewal notice, in which case, you were required to manually prepare a license receipt. Thus, issuing special numbers from each separate box of plates resulted in a mixture of automated receipts and manually prepared receipts, requiring separate filing and special handling of both the County and State level.

It is, therefore, our suggestion that the policy of reserving special license numbers for residents of your County be eliminated beginning with the 1971 registration year. Perhaps this was the intent of the Legislature when they enacted the law providing for "special personalized prestige license plates" for motor vehicle owners desiring such special numbers.

# A Message To Businessmen

**BURGLARY, THEFT AND ROBBERY**  
By ROSS L. BROCKMAN, County Attorney, Tyler County

**THE FOLLOWING STATUTES ARE HIGHLIGHTED FOR PARAPHRASED:**  
ART. 1389, 1390, 1397, 1408, 1410, 1421, and 1430 V. T. C.

Entering a building by force, threats, or fraud at night, or entering at any time and remaining concealed with the intent to commit a felony or any other crime, is burglary. The penalty is death or confinement in the penitentiary for any term not less than five years. If the means is assault or violence, the penalty is life imprisonment or imprisonment for any term not less than five years.

Robbery is the taking of property from another by force, which can be by violence or by putting the victim in fear of his life or bodily injury. If firearms are used, the penalty is death or confinement in the penitentiary for any term not less than five years. If the means is assault or violence, the penalty is life imprisonment or imprisonment for any term not less than five years.

Identification of property may depend solely upon the accuracy with which the victim can describe the criminals. Weapons must also be identified. Accuracy is again important, as your description as given in trial testimony may be compared with the actual weapon. The sooner facts are written down, the more likely they are to be complete and accurate. Filing out a form like the one shown in the Appendix can be of great help.

If you find it difficult to estimate height, compare the individual with a familiar object, which you can later measure, like a hat rack or filing cabinet. If you don't know the difference between an automatic pistol and a revolver, ask a policeman how to evaluate the difference.

IDENTIFICATION OF PROPERTY  
In the offense of receiving or concealing stolen property, an essential element is proving that the accused knew the property was stolen. The difficulty of this problem is the difference between a victim of positively identifying his property after it has been stolen. Without some means of positive identification, the merchant probably will not be able to testify that the property is his, and they will be unable to recover the property.

Since stolen property must be identified, you may want to consider this problem in evaluating your internal records and inventory control. It is wise to consider placing some stamp or unique identifying mark on articles of great value.

When articles bear serial numbers, these numbers should be accurately recorded from the moment the merchandise is received in the store. Next week - Part II of burglary, theft and robbery.

**USE OF FORCE FOR PROTECTION**  
Is homicide ever legally justified in protecting your life and property? The answer is a qualified yes. The safest rule is that one can take all in defense of himself or another. But the law is strictly applied, and all homicides are referred to a grand jury who will decide if they find an intentional killing not justified by law. We strongly recommend that you consult with your own attorney about the civil and criminal aspects of the use of force for defense before establishing procedures for yourself or your employees.

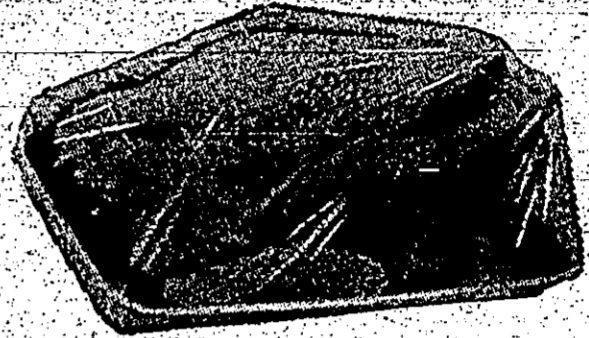

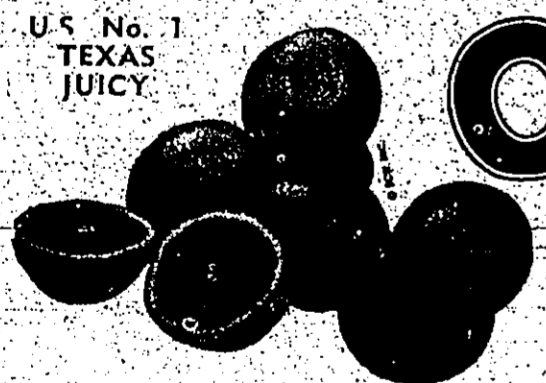
