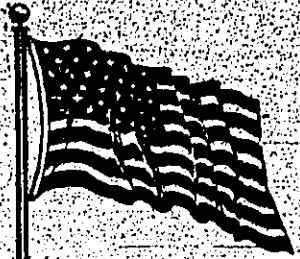

Spurger Reading Program Aids Pupils

Pictured using the cassette console are six members of the fifth grade reading class at Spurger Elementary School. Taped stories of famous authors played on the console is only one part of a four-phase reading program in operation at Spurger. Old favorites like Mark Twain and Rudyard Kipling are among the hundred tapes available. The console accommodates eight students at a time, and does not interfere with other activities of the class.

Phase two is the reading kit produced by Science Research Associates, commonly referred to as SRA. SRA is used throughout the elementary school. It is a color-coded set of stories on which the students have a self-administered test. After taking the test, they immediately check their answers which acts as reinforcement.

The third phase of the reading program is one of the most important because it trains the eye to phrase read, consequently to read faster as students progress through the program. Here the students read a story silently as the Control Reader projects it on a screen. The machine is adjusted to project 20-50 words per minute depending upon the particular class. As the words appear one phrase at a time the student is not allowed to regress, which is the chief cause of poor readers. Regression is the subconscious action of the eye to re-read phrases. It is not uncommon for a student to double his reading time and comprehension in a six weeks session.

Supplemental readers form the fourth part of the Spurger Elementary program. Students read these books whenever one of the other three techniques are not being used.

"When our students go into junior high school," H. K. Pitts, principal, states, "we would like for them to have a strong reading background and we think the four-phase program is the most effective way to teach reading."

Easter Seals Fund Aided 21,000 In Texas Last Year

Because of the steady growth in numbers of crippled children and adults in Texas, the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas has stepped up its rehabilitation services.

According to Toby Spurlock, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Tyler County, over 21,000 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in past years.

Quoting the annual report of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, he said that 20 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas. They include treatment and rehabilitation centers, sheltered workshops, recreation and educational programs, and many others.

"Through these programs, persons with a wide variety of handicaps receive the help they need to live normal lives," Mr. Spurlock said.

The largest group served includes those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis and stroke. The Easter Seal Campaign, which provides funds for continuation of these services, begins March 1 and continues through April 11, Easter Sunday.

Commissioners Have Busy Two Days

Tyler County commissioners court held a busy two-day meeting Monday and Tuesday morning at which they named the county depository, appointed election judges for county voting boxes, placed the county's group health policies, accepted a bid for the county's oil and gasoline among other things.

Monday morning they heard talks by Ed Green, manager of the Deep East Texas Development Association, and Jack Calhoun, chairman of the Polk County Housing Authority. Green spoke on solid waste programs for counties and offered the association's services to the county. If the need arises, Calhoun explained the procedures in establishing a county housing authority.

Representatives of the Kodak Company and the 3-M Company explained their respective recording systems proposed for the county. Later representatives of Southern Microfilm explained that company's recording system.

The court voted to accept the bids of Citizens State Bank as the county depository.

The commissioners voted to accept the hospitalization plan offered by Allen Fortenberry for Bankers Life of Des Moines. Complete minutes of the meeting will be printed next week.

City Delays Cobb Mill Sewer Line

The Woodville City Council Monday night voted to hold up in letting a contract for the sewer line west along Cobb Mill Road until the chance of securing a federal grant to help pay for the line is investigated.

The representative of the city engineering firm, Charles R. Haines Associates, told council members that it was possible the city might be able to get such a grant, and councilmen decided to delay the start of the work for 30 to 60 days.

The council approved a street light on Anderson street on the request of six residents.

The city secretary was authorized to hire a firm to conduct a survey for gas leaks which is now required by the federal government. A survey of business buildings is required each year and residences once every five years.

A used street sweeping machine which is for sale in Beaumont will be examined by a mechanic chosen by the city secretary at the council's request. If it seems in useable condition, the city council indicated it would authorize its purchase.

City Secretary Davis told the council that the city has about 100 utility customers whose bills usually run past due and require sending a disconnection notice by mail. He asked them to approve a 10 percent penalty on past due bills and a \$5 charge for reconnection of those which were turned off because of non-payment. The councilmen approved the request.

Davis reported that city tax collections for this year are approximately 90 percent.

Voter Registration Extended By State

Governor Preston Smith signed a bill Friday extending the voter registration period through February, Tom Sawyer, tax assessor-collector, said Monday.

Marvin Dies Jr., secretary of state, notified all county tax assessors by telegram that they should continue the registration period through February. It had expired January 31 under the old law.

Mr. Sawyer said that persons qualified to vote in the county who did not register during the first registration period may now register at the tax office on the courthouse square.

Angelina County Singing Convention will meet in Zavalla in the school auditorium Saturday night, February 13, at 7:30 p.m. and on Sunday, February 14, 10:00 a.m., according to R. B. Ritts, president, and J. T. Caillies, vice president of Lufkin.

This convention is one of the largest in Angelina County. Saturday evening and all day Sunday will be "Convention Gospel Singing."

There will be several special groups participating in this convention. One of the most known names in the gospel music circle is the Conn Family of Dallas (the young and the old). Others to attend are the Glad Tidings Trio of Jasper, Harris Family and The Waymakers of Lufkin, and Rev. Ray Darby and his wife from Oklahoma. Rev. Darby is a fullblood Kiowa Indian.

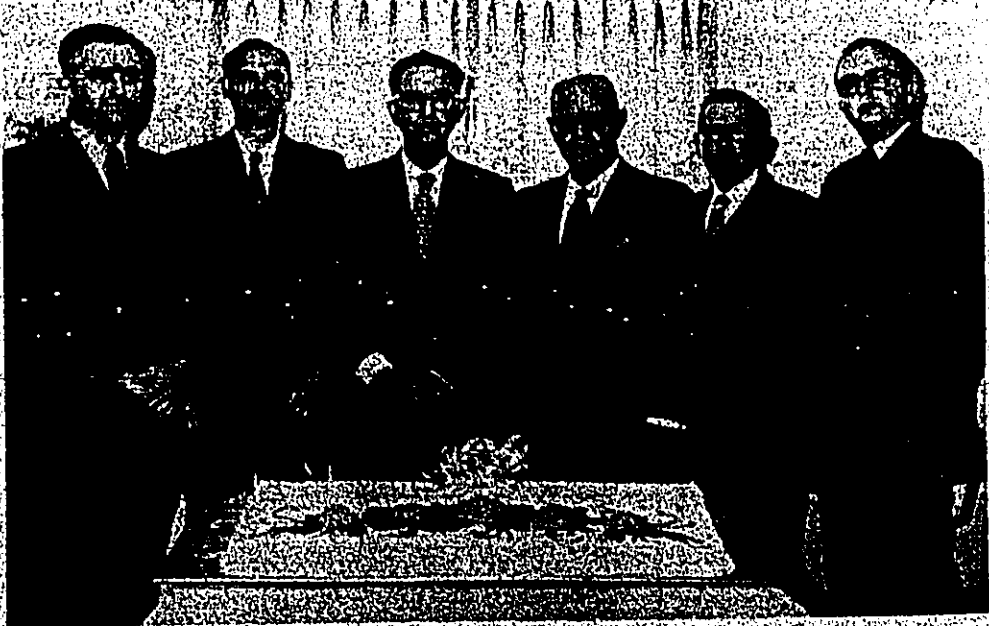
A devotional service will be held at 11:45 a. m. by Rev. Darby. Drinks and lunch will be catered at noon.

Rainfall Thursday, Friday and Sunday fell on thirsty Tyler County and East Texas but in this area only a little over one-half inch was measured during the three days.

The rain gauge at Texas Forest Service District headquarters south of Woodville measured .15 Thursday, .28 Friday and .16 of an inch Sunday. This was a total of .57 of an inch.

Some parts of the county may have received more precipitation than fell. Right in the Woodville area, the rain was heavier in some parts of East Texas than in others. Houston received two inches Friday while Lufkin measured one-half inch.

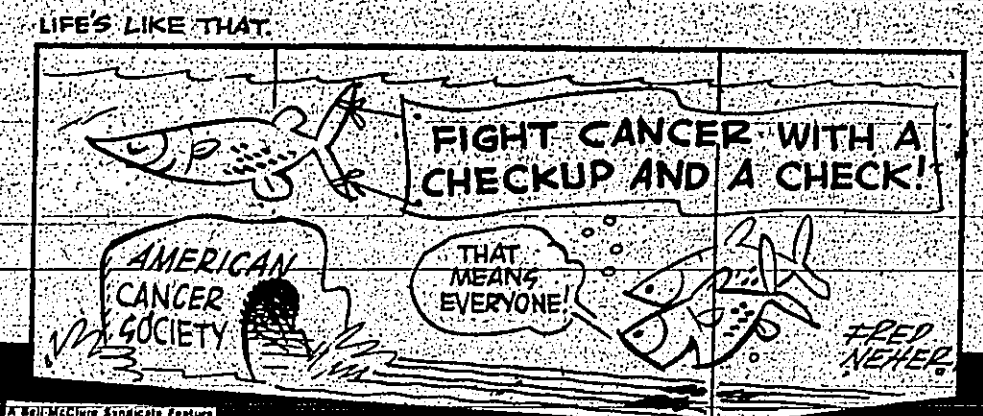

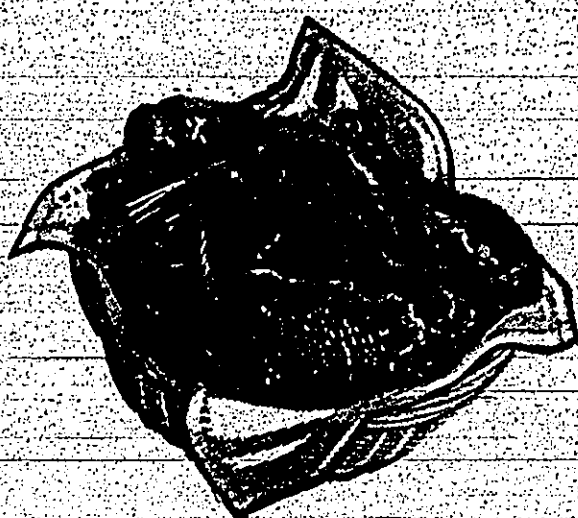

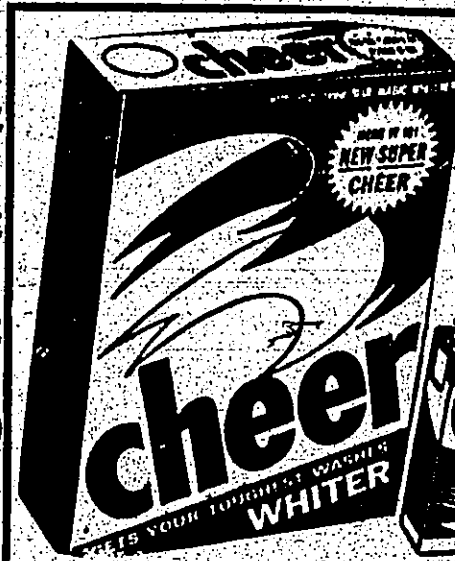
