

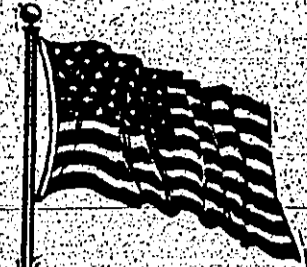

Insurance coverage on the school buildings and contents was the principal business transacted by the board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District at the regular meeting Monday night.

Texas Forest Service Warns Of High Fire Danger In Woodlands

The Texas Forest Service announced that 81 forest fires have occurred in Polk, Hardin, and Tyler Counties since the first of the year.

All citizens are reminded that the lack of rainfall and low humidity has increased the fire danger. A wildfire during this time can spread over a large area in a very short time and can cause extensive damage to timber as well as buildings and equipment.

When burning brush have a good firebreak around the area that you intend to burn. Firebreaks can be constructed with a tractor using a plow or disc or hand tools if a tractor is not available.

When burning trash choose a safe place to burn. Use an incinerator or barrel with a good tin or wire cover to prevent sparks from escaping to the nearby area.

It is a violation of state law to allow fire to escape to the property of another person so remember, never leave a fire until it is dead out.

Dr. R. E. Swearingen, chairman of a subcommittee to meet with the three insurance agencies in Woodville on companies are reluctant to accept school insurance due to the losses incurred across the country due to arson and heavy losses by fire. None of the companies represented locally would bid on all the coverage for the school but agreed to take a part of blanket coverage.

He said that companies represented by Globe-Mann will take one-half and those represented by Peagin Insurance and Clemmons Insurance one-quarter each. Their combined bid was \$14,051 for blanket coverage on the buildings and contents for \$2,400,000.

The board voted to accept the bid. The board had budgeted \$12,500 for the insurance program but had used \$800 of this to insure the school's musical instruments. Previously insurance coverage for the buildings and contents had cost the district \$9,000 for a blanket policy.

The financial statement for the month of January was approved. In this connection, Monroe Prescott, of the administration office told the board that the lunchroom was in good financial condition at the present but might be strained later in the year. Under new federal regulations relating to school lunchrooms the number of pupils from low income families receiving free meals is now close to 400.

Bob Bell, director of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival who is in charge of Western Week activities, appeared before the board to get a clarification of policies relating to the use of school yards during the two weekends of the festival. Board members, on a motion of Dr. Swearingen, voted to allow equal use on both weekends of school facilities with the stipulation that any decorating or preparatory work and cleaning up be done on Saturday morning and Sunday so as not to interfere with school activities.

Bill Jarrott, board president, presided at the meeting. Other members present were Dr. W. S. Nichols, Dr. R. E. Swearingen, Jim Gaikey, Harold Allison, Jr., Dr. L. G. Burton and F. M. Archer.

HOMEMAKING HINTS

An adult is responsible for every child accidentally poisoned. Who would want to hurt a child? Certainly not you. And yet, each year an estimated one-half million to one million children accidentally ingest medicines and commonly used household products such as furniture polish, cleaning agents, kerosene, paint thinner and pesticides, found in the kitchen, bedroom, bathroom and garage. Someone other than the child is responsible for each of these accidents.

When Colonel Edwin Aldrin returned from his historic voyage to the moon, he reasoned that one of his motivations was "man's" insatiable curiosity. "I, no longer the unknown," this inherent trait is manifested in man's earliest beginnings. An infant lying in a crib is examining, probing, "tasting" and "smelling" his surroundings. Unlike the adult who approaches the unknown with caution and discernment, the young child blazes a trail into this basic fact of a child's life. It is extremely important that this basic fact be developed by thoroughly appreciating a young child's five years of age and under is constantly exploring his surroundings. When the youngster is first starting to crawl, he reaches, touches and inevitably tastes what is within his reach. Quite naturally, then, the products most often involved in accidental poisoning among this age group are those stored on the floor or in floor-level cabinets such as these household items: Pesticides, household cleaning and polishing agents, and petroleum products are most often the substances which you are aware of. March 31 Last Medicare Chance

For Some Must make up an over long-time signing up for the doctor's bill insurance part of Medicare. But K. R. James, social security district manager, warns that for some who have not signed up by March 31, the final deadline, they will have to pay for Medicare retroactively from October 1, 1969, but before October 2, 1969. James says, "This is a year you have to sign up for Medicare. If you were born in the last three months of 1968, or in 1969, or 1970, and missed an earlier opportunity to enroll, this general enrollment period is open to you."

James explained that every person reaching age 65 can sign up for the medical insurance part of Medicare, which is paid for by a monthly premium during a period starting three months before his birthday month and ending three months after that birthday month. But people who miss that initial enrollment opportunity generally have three general enrollment periods, which are set by law during the "January," "February," and "March" of every year.

The current period, closing March 31, is the last chance, he related, for those people who became 65 in the 12 months closing October 1, 1968. The social security office in Houston will accept applications by telephone. "Just call 634-2553," James said.

Contributions Deductible On Income Tax

Tax deductible contributions can consist of either cash or other kinds of property, according to Wesley G. Belschner, administrative officer of Internal Revenue in Jasper, Texas. "Contributions must be made to qualifying organizations such as the Red Cross, Boy Scouts, United Funds, churches, non-profit schools and hospitals, and war veterans groups," he said. "Gifts to individuals cannot be deducted even though they are made to needy persons," he said.

Although outright gifts can be deducted, payments to charitable organizations can also be deducted as contributions. This includes amounts paid for transportation as well as reasonable payments for necessary meals and lodging while away from home rendering such services.

However, a taxpayer may not deduct expenses incurred while attending a church convention unless he is an official representative of the church in that capacity. Under certain conditions, a taxpayer may deduct the cost of maintaining a full-time 12th or lower grade student in his home. The student must be a dependent or relative. He may be a foreign or American citizen. This is true whether or not he is a member of the church. "Out-of-pocket" expenses incurred in rendering services without compensation to charitable organizations can also be deducted as contributions. 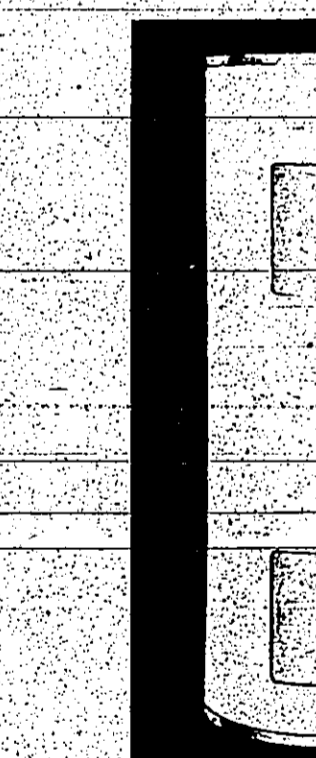

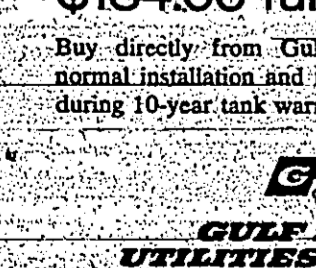

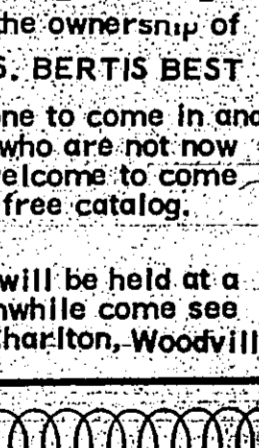
