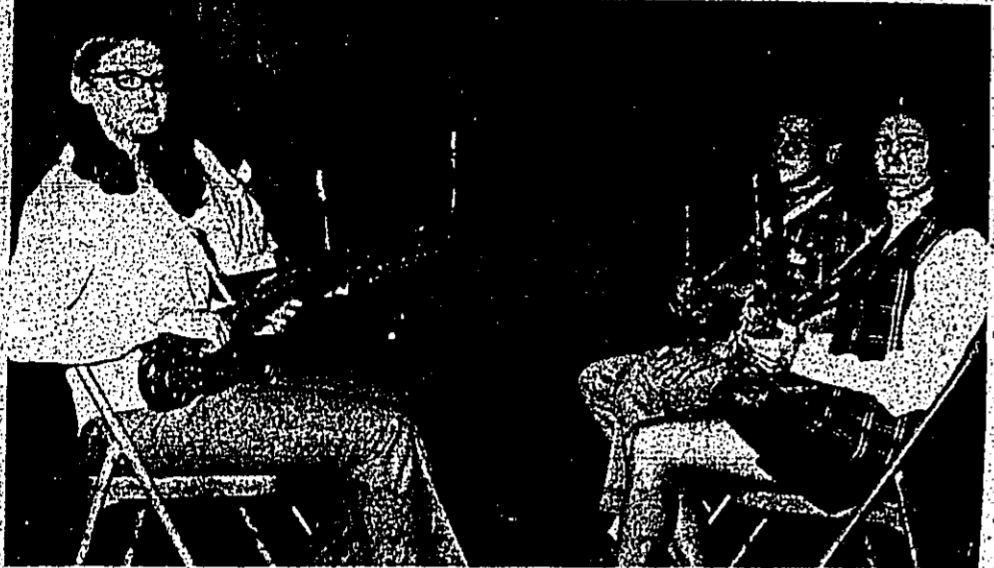

Wet Weather Breaks Drouth In County

The heavy bands of thunder-showers which crossed Tyler County around midnight last Thursday night brought from 1.5 to 2 inches of badly needed moisture to the area.

Texas Forest Service's rain gauge at the district station south of town measured 1.8 inches. Other rain gauges showed from 1.5 to 2 inches of rainfall.

Monday was the first day of March and the month came in with a little more moisture falling although the precipitation was barely measurable.

Tuesday was another wet day with little rain falling but a heavy mist continued into the night. A cold front was turning the temperature downward and the weatherman said it would become fair.

Meeting To Plan Cleanup

Plans for a gigantic cleanup effort in Tyler County before the Dogwood Festival will be made at a meeting Monday night at the Woodville Inn.

Representatives of the highway department, county commissioners, city officials from county towns, and service and garden clubs have been invited.

The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Heritage Room. The cleanup campaign will be under the chairmanship of Dr. Nichols, owner of Peoples Service Station.

Wyatt Bell, president of the chamber of commerce, said that Nichols will coordinate the various organizations in the cleanup.

Burglars Enter Bank, Ogden's

A burglar or burglars apparently took advantage of the thunderstorms early Friday morning to enter two places in Colmesneil.

First State Bank and Ogden Chevrolet Company were entered during the night, possibly after midnight in the midst of the booming thunder which would drown out any noise they might make.

The bank was entered by pushing open a rear door, forcing the door frame off the side which held the bolt of the lock. An inner door was then forced in the same manner.

An alarm bell outside the bank was tripped and had been ringing for an undetermined

length of time when it was heard about 3 a.m. by Mrs. Ogden.

Mrs. Ogden called Clyde Sturrock, cashier, and the Tyler County sheriff's department was notified. After it was determined that the bank had been entered the FBI was called and sent an agent to the bank Friday morning.

As far as could be determined all the burglars got to show for their efforts was \$2. They may have been scared off by the alarm bell before trying to open the vault.

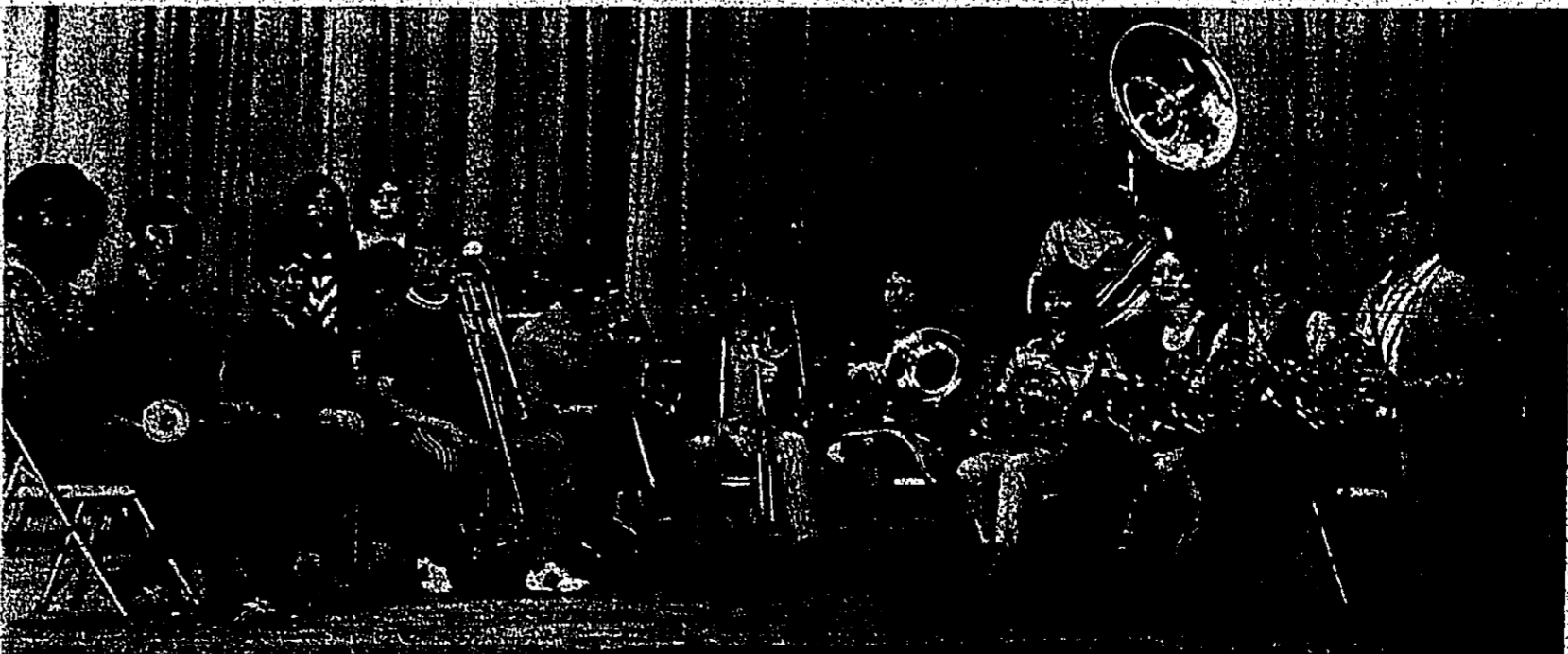
Coincidentally, Mrs. Ogden had gone to the Chevrolet agency to use the telephone after the bank break-in was discovered.

Two new tires were missed at Ogden Chevrolet. While the burglars tried to open the office safe they did not break in the cash register.

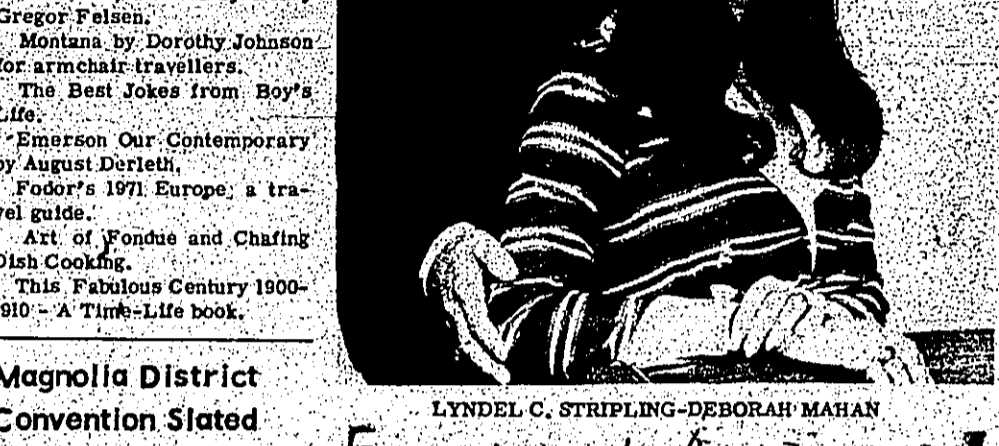

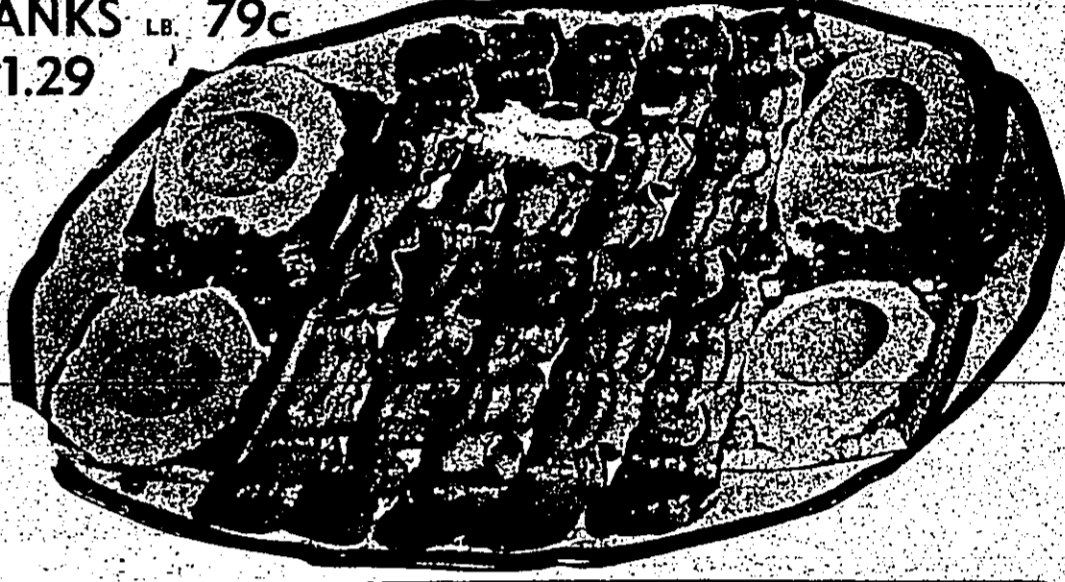

The 5-B class has been assigned to make interviews. At their class meeting they decided to interview helpers in Tyler County.

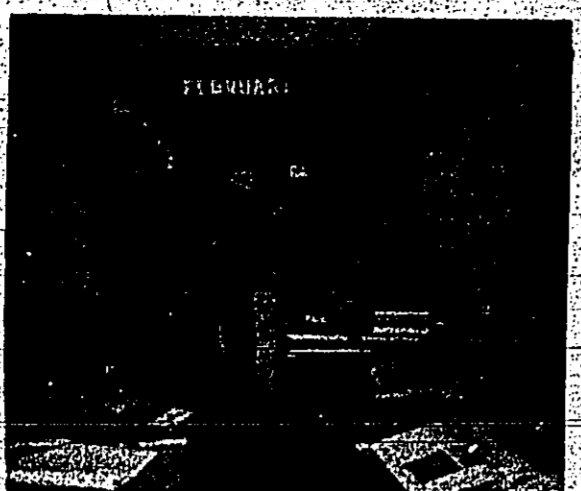

America Still Is... ONE WOMAN'S OPINION

America, without the consent of approval of vast numbers of its people, is still trying to be big brother of the world. It has not gotten very far with it. At the end of World War One, the Jubilent cry was "We have made the world safe of Democracy." Millions of words were spoken and written about the heroic dead and pictures of the white crosses, row on row, where American boys were buried in France. A great day was made in celebrating "Armistice Day" for some years. Now the younger generation of Americans, with admiration bearing the brand of H. HAYES KOWAL OF OUR LEADERS NEVER HEARD OF THE WORDS WRITTEN BY OUR FATHERS, who shall not become involved in foreign

...wars, civilization has not advanced very far if no other members of the world have developed. To read the daily reports of thousands dead, dying, imprisoned, and the number of those who have been killed, it is hard to believe that this is the world we live in. But I have just been reading from an old ledger of a heroic group, honorably trying to defend their own rights in their own country, not across the ocean. This account is of a group of Tyler County citizens that Woodville is one of the older settlements in East Texas. Why no uniforms and any type of farm horse available, the group was formed. Few historians mention the battle in the Big Thicket, they went forth to fight for what they honestly believed their free home right. And the trials and sufferings they endured should be known to our younger generation of today. History seldom repeats these isolated stories. But individual townships should be familiar with the history of those who founded and fought for our own locality.

At one stop they were imprisoned at Ft. Jackson in St. Louis, and from there were taken to Camp Chase at Columbus, Ohio. The camp was several miles from town and the Texans were marched under heavy guard, and crowded of people followed, taunting them. At this place they worked on a tunnel, planning to escape and Capt. Bullock set up all night, being bludgeoned for their expected escape. By next morning, then they were told they were to be exchanged, and were ordered out the gate, one at a time with all their possessions, which were promptly taken from them, blankets, coats. General Churchill made no protest when they literally stripped him, but when ordered to take his military gear, he refused so hotly that he was allowed to keep them. The Texans were placed in another camp where they suffered intensely with cold and little food. In the city of Philadelphia, they were marched from the boat to camp and crowded together, but instead of suffering sticks and other missiles at them. After many other trials and much suffering they were finally back on Texas soil, two men again, through such hardships and suffering, did the early men of Tyler

County and Woodville gave the way for the comforts and messages that we enjoy today. Let us not forget them. Texas was the spirit of America at its best. There should be a marker for them some place. They were fighting for what they thought was their rights and privileges. And then came World War I, which we thought would be the last.

And how we prayed, Lord, Let not His meaning cease, Let hate and greed be still'd, And love increase. Throughout the world, and War forever cease.

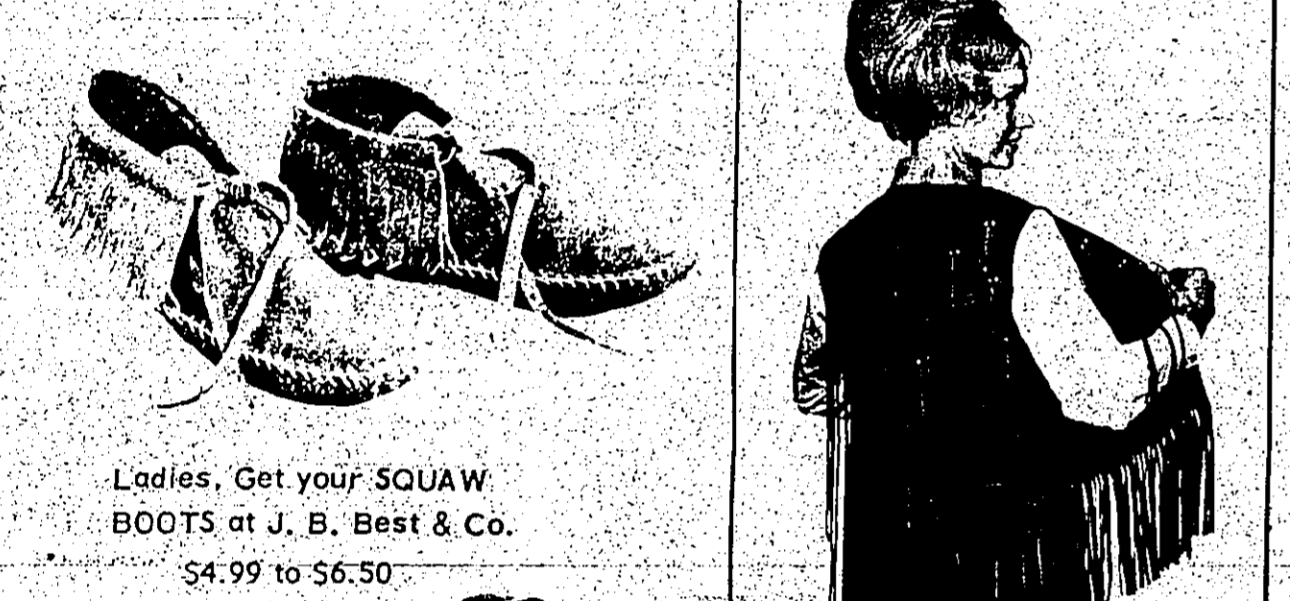
