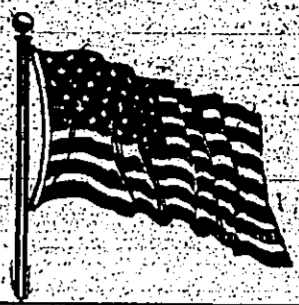

## Five Dogwood Festival Princesses Selected Tuesday

The King's Men Tuesday night picked the five princesses, one from each school in the county, from whom the queen of the 1971-Tyler County Dogwood Festival will be chosen.

The finalists are Cordrell Moore of Colmesnell, Robbie Crawford of Woodville, Lynette Standley of Warren, Deborah Ann Phillips of Spurger and Debra Walker of Chester.

One of the five will be crowned queen at coronation ceremonies at Dogwood Amphitheatre on the night of April 3.

The final judging will be held March 23 but the identity of the queen is a well kept secret until the coronation.

The five finalists from each school who will serve as train-bearers are Ladonna Gardner of Woodville, Marilyn Wilson of Warren, Debra Fowler of Colmesnell, Jan Woodrome of Chester and Cynthia Gay of Spurger.

John Elliott, who was reared at Warren and will serve as parade marshal on April 3 and crown the queen that night, was present at the judging Tuesday night. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and a star player with the New York Jets pro football team. John was kept busy Tuesday night signing autographs for the 16 semi-finalists and posed for pictures with the five girls who were chosen princesses.

## Countywide Trash Cleanup Slated For March 15-20

Plans were made at a meeting Monday night to conduct a massive drive to clean up trash and garbage piles in Tyler County towns and along rural roads during the week of March 15 through 20.

The drive will be coordinated to have trucks and volunteer workers available throughout the county to pick up the trash

and garbage on the final day, March 20.

The meeting, sponsored by the civic improvement committee of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, was attended by representatives of garden clubs, civic clubs, women's clubs, county officials and interested citizens.

Wyatt Bell, chamber presi-

dent, introduced Robert McCombs, chairman of the civic improvement committee, who in turn introduced Carl Nichols, who had volunteered to head the cleanup committee. Nichols explained the purpose of the meeting which was to gather ideas about a countywide cleanup campaign prior to the dogwood festival.

In open discussions those present commented on the problem and offered ways in which to conduct the clean up campaign.

County Judge Tom Dick Mann offered to coordinate the effort to enlist students from the county's schools to assist in picking up the litter. County commissioners Carl Shepherd and Leon Fowler said they would provide a truck from their precincts and felt sure the other two commissioners, who were unable to be present, would also agree to furnish a truck. Mr. Mann said that his truck can be used.

Mr. Nichols asked that any other's who can furnish a pickup truck and driver should contact him at Peoples Service Station or the county judge's office if unable to reach him.

Judge Mann said that the commissioners' court has been meeting with land owners to select a suitable site for a future sanitary landfill which is the recommended manner to dispose of trash and garbage.

It was decided, upon the recommendation of Mr. Bell, that each commissioner coordinate the pickup of litter in his precinct. Trucks and volunteer workers will in most cases be assigned to the precinct in which the truck owners and workers reside.

Mr. Mann will contact all schools in the county for student volunteers to aid March 20, and other interested persons may also volunteer.

Dan McKee, representing the highway maintenance department, said that they will do their best, as always, to keep the litter picked up from the major highways. He said that curbs and islands are now being repainted. He said the highway had a film on it which could be shown in county schools. An effort will be made to show the film in each school.

Mr. Nichols asked club members and others to help with the cleanup by reporting areas of dumping that need to be cleaned up on county roads.

The cleanup week for the dogwood festival, should be the start of a year-round effort to keep litter off the county's highways and roads. Mr. Nichols said, while the immediate problem is to get it cleaned up for the dogwood festival.

In the discussions concerning littering Judge Mann said that when litter is found and the responsible party is known that the county will prosecute following a first notice to stop.

He said everyone could help by reporting cases of littering on highways and dumping on county roads.

Mr. Nichols, at the conclusion of the meeting, said that all efforts will be made through next week to organize the campaign and locate areas that need to be cleaned up. Then on Saturday the trucks and volunteer workers will move under the direction of each commissioner to haul the litter.

## The Ugly American

A significant segment of the nation's solid waste problem is litter. "A National Study of Roadside Litter" by the Highway Research Board and the National Academy of Sciences, and a Gallup report entitled "Who Litters—And Why," reveal some staggering statistics, including the following:

Motorists drop 16,000 pieces of trash on each mile of primary highway every month. The cost of picking up this litter is approximately \$100 million a year.

Added to this the cost of cleaning up other public areas, and the figure reaches \$500 million a year.

Respondents to the Poll were quick to characterize the litterer as a "stob" who should

be arrested. Upon further questioning, however, these same respondents confessed themselves guilty of the evil to one degree or another.

This inconsistency throws some light on the litter problem and how it should be handled. Efforts to persuade the populace that litter is a problem are misdirected.

People are already convinced. What the individual litterer does not appreciate is that he is a part of the problem. As the Gallup report phrases it: "Until the individual citizen starts thinking of himself as a 'stob' if he drops a paper container on the street or highway, or throws a cigarette wrapper on the ground, laws are not going to resolve the problem."

## Census Gives Population, Other Facts

Tyler County's official population in the 1970 census was 12,417, up 16.4 percent from the 1960 figure of 10,666, the Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, reports.

The 1970 census counted 10,152 white persons in Tyler County, 81.8 percent of the total, 2,231 negroes, and 34 persons of other races. In 1960, 76.8 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 941 children under 5 years; 3,857 in ages 5 through 17; 6,194 people 18 through 64; and 2,025 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 6,306 married people, 693 who were widowed, 288 divorced, and 1,866 never married.

Tyler County's 1970 population was classified as 21.4 percent urban, and 78.6 percent rural.

There were 4,065 households, with 12,292 persons, including 724 one-person households. In addition 125 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 6,833 housing units in Tyler County, 3,151 of them occupied by owners, 834 occupied by tenants, and 1,748 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 54.0 percent, compared with 54.3 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 5,493 single family houses, 188 housing units in multi-unit buildings, and 137 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 12.5, compared with 16.4 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 3,334 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 751 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner-occupied houses in Tyler County was \$7,900, compared with less than \$5,000 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$41 per month, compared with \$37 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

## Jethro Celebrates 79

Jethro Holmes was 79 years young Monday.

To celebrate, he hooked up his famous team of oxen, Tom and Jerry, and drove them into town where he rode around the business district to receive congratulations on passing another milestone in a checkered career which includes, among other things, the manufacture and running of moonshine back in prohibition days.

Today Jethro keeps busy trimming trees, pouring concrete, and driving his yoke of oxen in any parade within a reasonable distance, which has been as far away as Waco.

Local residents have become familiar with the sight of Jethro and Tom and Jerry lumbering along city streets or highways but many an outland tourist has done a second quick look at this scene from an earlier day.

Tom and Jerry are gentle as oxen can be and the kids have a fine time riding in Jethro's green wagon or climbing atop one of the animals for a picture. Jethro still puts in a rugged days work—often outdoors men half his age in hard outdoor work. Laughingly he says he has to work hard to feed Tom and Jerry whose feed bill is over \$3.00 a day.

Jethro was born 17 miles north of San Augustine on the Atocayo River. He is the fourth generation descendant of Charles Holmes who received a

Spanish land grant on the Atocayo and who had the second water mill in Texas.

He came to Tyler County in 1886.

Jethro says he has broke (or trained) oxen since he was 17 years old. He began training oxen again eight years ago and besides Tom and Jerry he has another yoke, Sam and Jerry, which are Longhorns and are not as gentle.

He drove Tom and Jerry in parades in San Augustine and White Rock, and last year was in the 100th Jubilee parade at Kirbyville. He was in the dogwood festival last year driving Tom and Jerry onto the stage in the pageant depicting carrying passengers from Louisiana to Texas. He plans to be in Western Day parade this year with a float on his wagon featuring old-time square dancing and fiddling.

He also will be in the pageant hauling logs to saw mill in this year's pageant, he said.

In a film made at Heritage Village in 1965, a documentary on life in early Texas done for Time and Life, Jethro was shown driving the oxen through the pine timber. In 1967 he was in a film, also made partly at Heritage Village, depicting the legend of Santa Anna's lost gold.

Last year he was in a film made for Channel 10 in Waco with Tom and Jerry pulling a plow breaking land.

So, stranger, if you see an ox team pulling a green wagon, driven by a youngish old man of 79, yell "Happy 80th Birthday Jethro." You might as well because Jethro plans on having a big celebration next year.

A majority of the time, consumers are advised to buy goods and services that are made in the U.S. This is a commendable goal, but it is not always clear what the consumer is getting for the extra cost.

# TYLER COUNTY BOOSTER County Agent Reports

Now is the time to inspect woody ornamentals for insect pruning, but don't prune just because it is that time of the year or because you need the exercise.

"If you cannot justify the removal of a limb or branch, you better put up your equipment and go spend the garden for exercise," says Everett Jones, extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A & M University.

Some of the reasons for pruning include removing dead or winter-killed growth or branches, as well as storm or accident-damaged limbs, should be removed as soon as possible. Older shrubs can be rejuvenated by pruning the old branches. Cutting can help develop a desired shape or size, and sometimes can be used to induce better flowers and fruit.

John cautions against severe pruning and says that it is better to prune lightly and more often to prevent succumb to the sensitive inner branches. He also says not to leave stubs that invite insects and disease.

## Soil Testing and the Use of Fertilizer

Soil testing and the use of fertilizer, and in some sections, search and actual farm demonstrations show will pay good dividends, advises Clinton Currie.

The important thing now, adds the county agent, is to get the necessary plans made so they can be put into operation when the long expected break in the weather comes.

More farmers are fertilizing pastures. The number of farmers fertilizing improved pastures continues to increase. Livestock producers are realizing more and more the importance of growing good quality forage for increasing production from pasture acreage and producing more meat and milk products.

Fertilizer offers several advantages for the livestock producer. First, it improves the quality of forage animals can eat. Second, it increases the yield or forage production from the same acreage.

One of the most obvious benefits is the effect of the fertilizer on rainfall utilization. In the past, only three to five times more forage with adequate fertilization than when needed plant foods are not supplied. Now, fertilized pastures are preferred by livestock over unfertilized pastures. In the past, the increased interest among farmers and ranchers in pasture fertilization, Currie predicts considerably more acreage will be fertilized this year than last year provided the soil moisture situation improves.

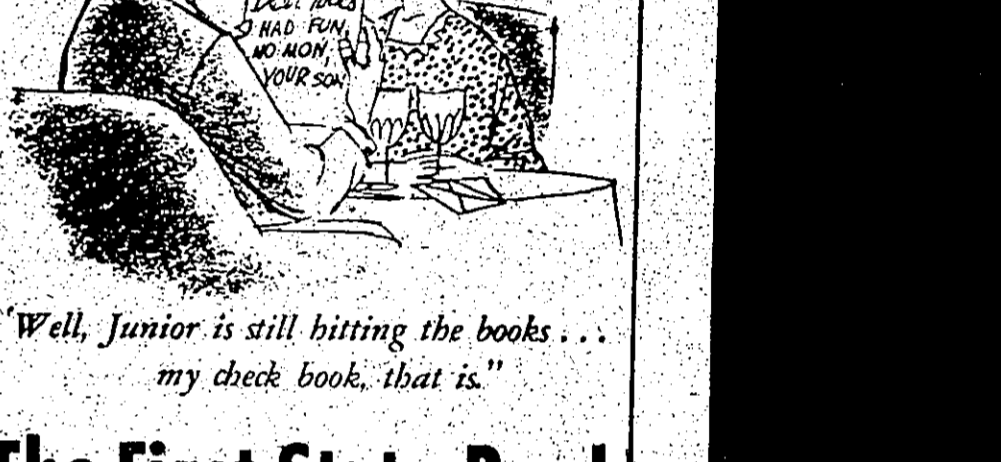

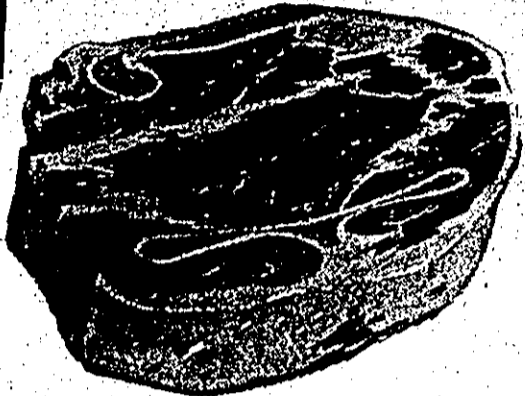
