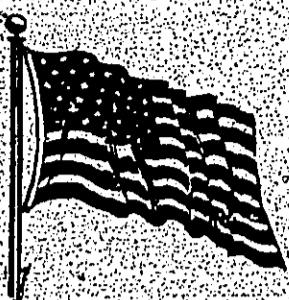

Dogwood Festival Parade, Coronation, Pageant Is Saturday

The second and final weekend of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival Saturday will feature the parade at 2:30 p.m. and the queen's coronation and the pageant beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the Dogwood Amphitheatre on the Woodville School campus.

As usual the parade will have the queen's float with the five princesses, one of whom will be queen, a number of bands, marchesses in convertibles, and other entries to make it one of the best parades in the history of the festival, according to Malcolm Collier, chairman.

Princesses from whom the queen was selected at the judging on March 23, with their escorts (one of whom will be king) are Debbie Walker and Glen Bradley of Chester, Cordrell Moore and Paul May of Colmesnell, Robbie Crawford and Rodney Barclay of Woodville, Lynette Standley and Jesse Ray, Warren, and Deborah Ann Phillips and Benford Hicks of Spurger.

The queen will be crowned by John Elliott, a professional football player with the New York Jets, who is a graduate of Warren High School.

The "Mr. and Mrs. East Texas" award will be made to Mr. and Mrs. Allan Shivers. Mr. Shivers attended school in Woodville as a youth and still owns his family's old homeplace west of Woodville. He was first inaugurated as Governor of Texas at the place, Magnolia Hills, in July 1949 following the death of Governor Beauford Jester.

He opened his campaign for his first election term in Woodville in 1950. Mr. Shivers served longer than any other Texas governor having been elected for three terms. He served until January 15, 1957.

During the time he was governor the family spent the summer months at Magnolia Hills with Governor Shivers commuting here on weekends. He and Mrs. Shivers have three children.

The coronation ceremonies will begin with the introduction of the 30 visiting duchesses and their escorts from area cities outside Tyler County. Four of the five princesses will be introduced with their escorts and when the runner-up, Princess of Tyler County, is announced, the audience will realize that the missing princess is the queen. Her identity is kept a secret until that time.

Following the coronation the pageant, "Sawmill Days in Tyler County," will be presented on the huge stage complete with a replica of a sawmill town including a barber shop, postoffice and sawmill. Also on the stage is a gazebo from which the royal court will emerge as they are introduced during the coronation.

At 10 p.m. two dances, the Queen's Ball and the Dogwood Dance, will conclude the night's program.

As many as 1500 horses and riders and a large number of wagons pulled by horses and mules made up the Western Day Parade last Saturday.

In the parade, the Tyler County Youth Riders received the first prize trophy. Second place went to Baytown Rough Riders and Wildwood Stables were third.

In spite of the cloudy weather the parade route was lined with spectators many of whom went on to the rodeo. All trailriders were invited to make the grand entry at the beginning of the rodeo.

Two recent choral compositions are being published and will be released this spring. He has served as a clinician and festival conductor in eight states.

The Glee Club performs a varied repertoire including folk songs, Broadway Show tunes, classical and sacred music, and the traditional songs for Men's Glee Clubs.

The 40-member Glee Club is on its annual tour, this year taking the Club through East Texas and Southwest Louisiana.

Vicky Karen Robertson, 17, a Kirby High School senior, died in Tyler County Hospital about 10 a.m. Tuesday from injuries received in a two-car accident about 8:00 a.m. Tuesday near Woodville. Lumber Company just east of the city limits on Highway 190.

According to Highway Patrolman William Bradberry, who investigated, the accident occurred when one of the cars, which were going in opposite directions, made a left turn into the path of the other vehicle.

Miss Robertson was alone in her car. Occupants of the other car were the driver, Carolyn Sue Melvin, and four children. Mrs. Melvin and one of the children were brought to the hospital for minor injuries.

Miss Robertson was a lifelong resident of Woodville. She was secretary of the Kirby High chapter of Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) and was an honor student. She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Woodville.

Funeral services will be held at 11:00 a.m. today (Thursday) in the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Dr. Raymond Parker, officiating. Burial will be in Mt. Zion cemetery.

- Special prizes for the most blue ribbons in horticulture, and the artistic display, Town and Country.
- Prizes for Town and Country: The Open House—Arrangement, suitable material.
- Country Kitchen—Composition, suitable material.
- Main Street—Line mass arrangement, contemporary.
- Country Gentleman—Arrangement in an adirack.
- Fledgling Farmer—Novice class, garden flowers only.
- Harvest Time—Composition of fruit or fruit with vegetables.
- Little Things in Life—Miniature, 3 to 4 inches.
- Horticultural Plant Section: Any annual or biennial, except an annual, 3 blooms.
- Perennial, 3 blooms.
- Clivage, 1 spike.
- Annual flower spike, 1 spike.

- Foliage plant.
- Flowering plant in bloom.
- Succession of each.
- Flowering shrub, 1 spike.

Bruised Feelings

"It's a boy," said the absent-minded doctor to the happy parents.

But it happened to be a girl. The following morning the doctor sheepishly acknowledged his mistake. However, the parents were so overjoyed by this turn of events that they determined to sue him for damages.

At the trial, the doctor protested. "I admit I made a careless statement, but I can't see any harm for a lawsuit. After all, I didn't really do them any harm."

"Physically," countered the parents, "but certainly did not to their mental peace. We want compensation for our mental anguish."

"Nevertheless, the court ruled with the doctor and dismissed the claim. The court said mere mental distress, not inflicted on purpose, are insufficient grounds for collecting damages."

Most courts agree. They fear that with no physical injuries to be checked and measured, it is too easy for a claimant to exaggerate his woes.

They also fear they might be flooded by all sorts of vague claims. In another case, a girl demanded damages for hair loss during the last year due to alleged gas pump fumes. Most courts, however, require a receipt for a new hair filter element every year, ideally in the spring, before you start "suing a long time."

The court in this case ruled in favor of the plaintiff, but the court's decision is usually a delicate situation. When feelings are more likely to be bruised than damaged.

A telegram to a businessman, warning him that his mother had died, was delivered three days late after her funeral. The man sued the telegraph company for his negligence.

And even though he had suffered only mental anguish, the court held the company liable. The judge said:

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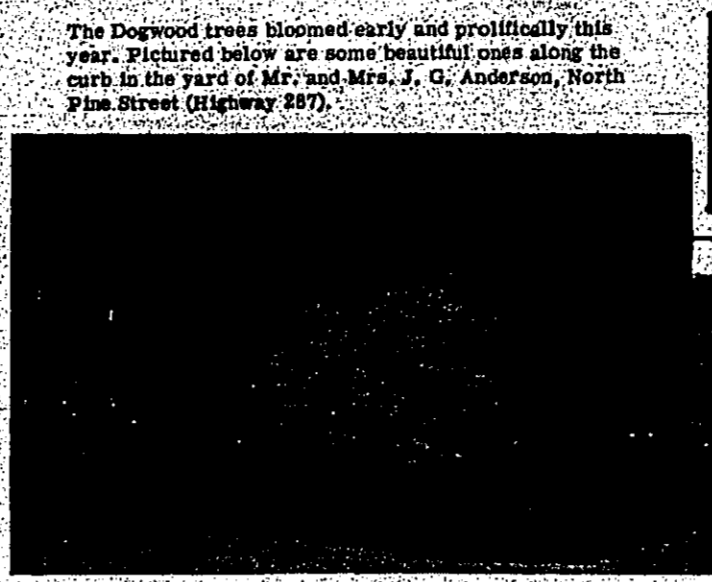
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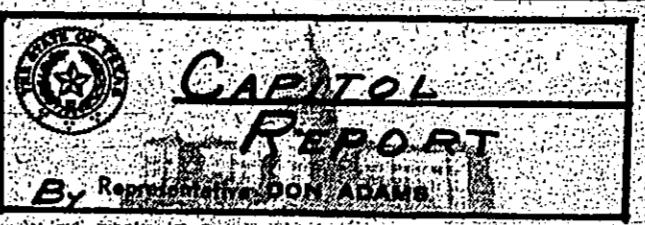

The 62nd session of the Texas Legislature is approximately one-half complete, and we have approximately ninety percent of the work yet to finish.

As of today, March 12, 1971, there have been over 1,400 bills introduced for consideration. Many of these bills affect the people statewide and the remainder are local bills affecting one county or one district. The Legislature has passed 500 laws to date, and most of these have been signed by the Governor.

Of the bills finally passed, the most important deal with teachers retirements and constitutional amendments. You will be voting on these constitutional amendments on May 18 of this year, and they are as follows:

AMENDMENT 1; ETHICS AND SALARY COMMISSION: This amendment is important as are all four amendments and it will set up, for the first time, ethical standards for elected officials. We have seen many reasons this year for to be some definite, written standards to conduct for governmental officials, and I believe these standards should be set by someone other than the Legislature. The Commission would also have the power to recommend changes in Legislative salaries. It is my personal belief that written ethical standards and adequate legislative salaries will bring about less special interest and lobby influence on the Legislature. Every day I serve in public office, I thank you, the people of my district, who have helped me be elected with independence from pressure groups. I would urge you to vote for this amendment.

AMENDMENT 2; SPECIAL SESSIONS: This amendment would allow amendments to the Constitution in special sessions of the Legislature. At the present time, Constitutional Amendments cannot be certified to you, the people, in special session. I would urge you to vote for this amendment.

AMENDMENT 3; STATE ASSISTANCE TO THE AGED, BLIND AND NEEDY: This amendment would remove the constitutional ceiling on expenditure of state money for old age assistance, blind people and disabled people. It will place a ceiling on dependent children. There is presently a maximum amount of money the state can spend on all types of public assistance and because of this, and some decisions of the federal government affecting state assistance, we will see a reduction in all public assistance if this amendment is not adopted. Regardless of how you feel about welfare, you need to know that if this amendment is not adopted, the old age assistance, blind assistance, disabled assistance and aid to dependent children will be reduced on or about June 1, 1971.

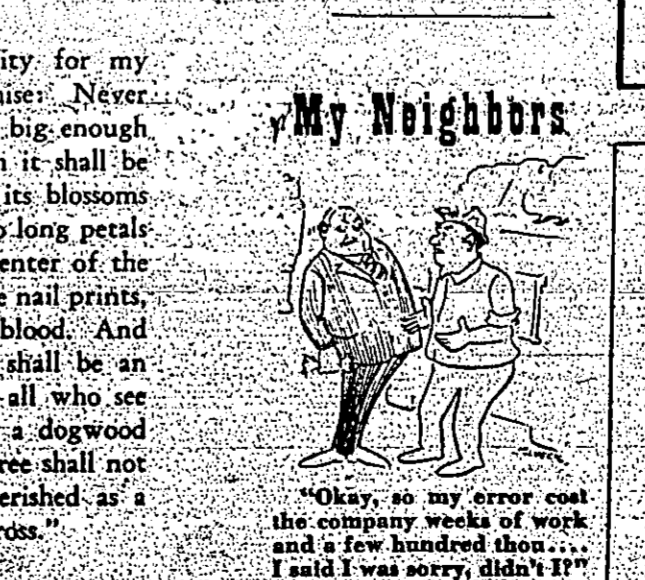
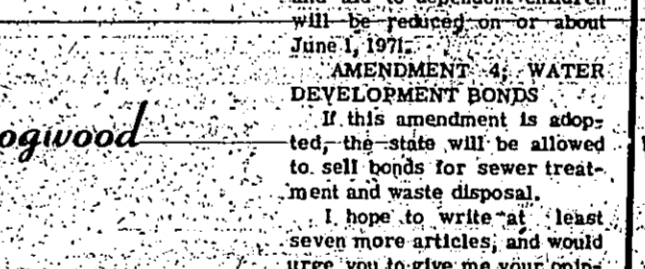
AMENDMENT 4; WATER DEVELOPMENT BONDS: If this amendment is adopted, the state will be allowed to sell bonds for sewer treatment and waste disposal. I hope to write at least seven more articles, and would urge you to give me your opinion on the three discussed. Also, I would like to have your opinions on any legislation introduced by the Legislature. My address is Don Adams, P. O. The Legend of the Dogwood

(Author Unknown)

At the time of the Crucifixion the dogwood attained the size of the oak and other forest trees. So strong and firm was the wood of it that it was chosen for the timber of the Cross. 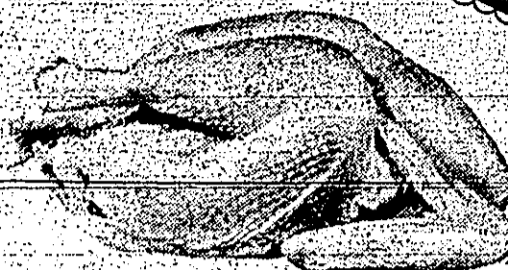
