

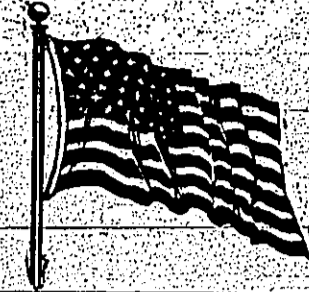

## Entries Sought For Miss Tyler County

Every young girl dreams of becoming Miss America. The girl who is selected Miss Tyler County Pageant queen could be the next Miss America.

Now is the time to decide for any young lady in the Miss Tyler County area who qualifies. Mrs. Harold Pryor, pageant director, said in calling for candidates to enter the pageant. Mrs. Pryor also announced that the pageant will be conducted Saturday night, June 5 at 8:00 o'clock at the Woodville High School Auditorium.

She called for civic and social organizations in the area to sponsor candidates and called for individual young ladies to submit their own names as entries.

To qualify, a young lady must be between the ages of 18 and 28 on September 1, must be a high school graduate by September 1 and must never have been married.

Talent will be considered in the judging and each contestant should possess some quality of talent, either trained or potential. In discussing the talent qualification, Mrs. Pryor stressed that the range is varied and that no girl must necessarily be trained in any specific field.

Mrs. Pryor pointed out that many entrants in previous pageants did not realize they possessed a quality of talent until they considered entering the contest.

She also pointed out that in almost every national Miss America Pageant conducted at Atlantic City, N. J., there have been state queens who have presented dramatic readings or comedy monologues as their talent presentations before a panel of nationally prominent judges.

Any potential entrant may also have a talent untried, Mrs. Pryor commented, adding that a young lady might be a delightful singer, for example, without ever having exhibited her singing ability before an audience.

In urging civic and social organizations to sponsor candidates, she said each member of the organization should consider the young ladies they know personally, relatives or daughters of friends, and should encourage the girls to enter the pageant. Judging of the candidates will be based on the same values as considered at the Miss Texas Pageant and at the national Miss America Pageant.

Polite, beauty and talent are the three major requirements. Each contestant will be judged in evening gown, in swimwear and in the presentation of her talent.

As an aid in attraction this year the Miss Tyler County pageant will have some future Miss Tyler Counties on the stage.

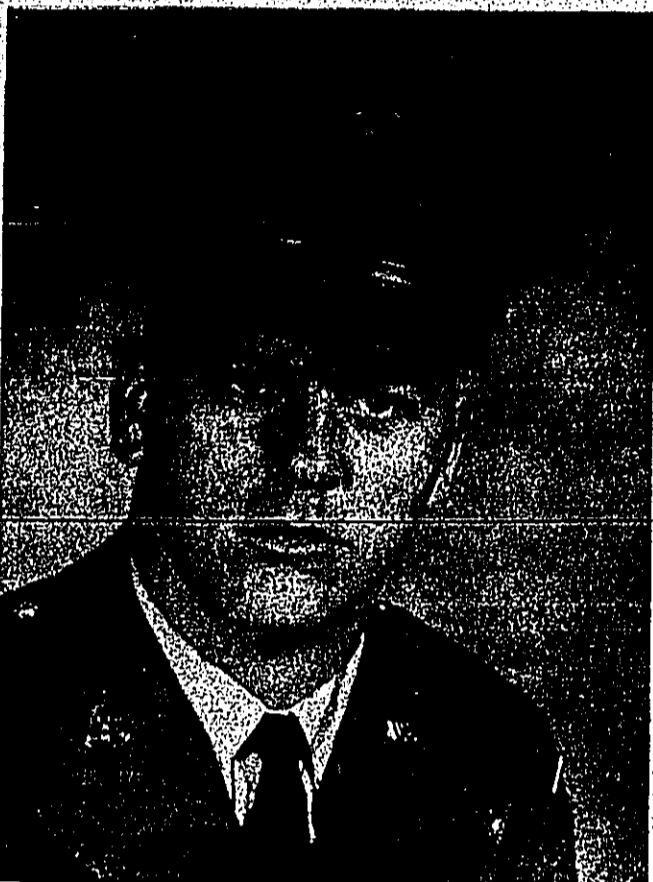
The girls will be divided into two groups. The younger group will be composed of girls who are four years old by June 1, 1971 through seven years old. The girls will appear in party dresses.

Funeral services for PFC Peter Louis Winter, 23, will be held in Edwards Funeral Home chapel at 2:00 p.m. Thursday with the Rev. James M. Brazelton, minister of the First Christian Church, officiating. Burial will be in Magnolia Cemetery in Woodville with full military service provided by a contingent from Fort Polk.

Pallbearers will be J. D. Taylor, Ronnie Cook, Sadler Syles-tine, Kenneth Walker, Wayne Kimbell, Berry Maddox, Oils R. Fortenberry and Robert E. Matkin.

PFC Winter died in Vietnam on April 1 as the result of enemy mortar fire. He had been serving in Vietnam since October 1971 with the 101st Airborne Division. His body was escorted home by Robert Browning, a longtime friend, now in the Navy.

A graduate of Kirby High School, PFC Winter attended Sam Houston State University for one year and Lee Junior College for a semester before being inducted into service.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Jo Carol Gallop Winter of Woodville; one son, Paul Louis Winter, also of Woodville; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Winter, Woodville; one brother, Milton Winter, Jr., three sisters, Miss Roxie Winter of Woodville, Mrs. Jack Gardner of Garland, and Mrs. Bill Lee of Richardson.

## THREE COUNCILMEN TAKE OATH FOR ANOTHER TERM AT MEETING MONDAY

The three members of Woodville City Council who were re-elected in the election April 3 were sworn in for another term by Harry Stafford, city attorney, at the regular meeting Monday night. They are T. L. Guley, Clay Miller and Gardner Parks. Other council members present were J. G. Anderson, and Leroy Davis, Mayor Jimmy Freeman, president.

City Secretary Walton Davis asked the council to approve a final payment of \$7360.15 to the contractor on the sewer project near Cobb Mill Road. This is the final payment on the project bringing the total to \$21,079.15 which was less than the bid price of over \$24,000. The council voted not to participate in payment of moving a private water line on Highway 190 west of Woodville Lumber Company. The line would be moved to provide more right-of-way on the highway which anticipates widening in the future. A city gas line in the same area will be moved at city expense.

Councilmen approved sending Fire Marshall Alva Cook Jr. and two other members of Woodville Volunteer Fire Department to the state firemen's school at Texas A & M University this summer. The school lasts for one week.

A new ordinance providing for payment of fines by installment when the offender is unable to pay in full was adopted. A recent supreme court

ruling made the new ordinance necessary. City Secretary Davis told the council that Tennessee Gas had indicated that, due to the shortage of natural gas, the city's total volume of gas will not be increased next year. The council adopted a policy of making no new gas connections outside the city limits until such time as the natural gas shortage is passed.

The council authorized Davis to ask for bids on a new pickup truck to replace a 1961 model now in use. It also authorized him to try to locate a used maintenance to replace the one in service in the city the past 17 years. If one can be found in good condition at a reasonable price, the council will authorize its purchase.

Three councilmen were named to a committee to assist the city secretary in preparing the budget for the coming year. They are Leroy Davis, chairman, J. G. Anderson and Gardner Parks.

## Computer Printout On County Given Chamber Commerce

Several Tyler County business and civic leaders received citations Friday from the Texas Industrial Commission and Governor Preston Smith for having made a "significant contribution to Texas' industrial development."

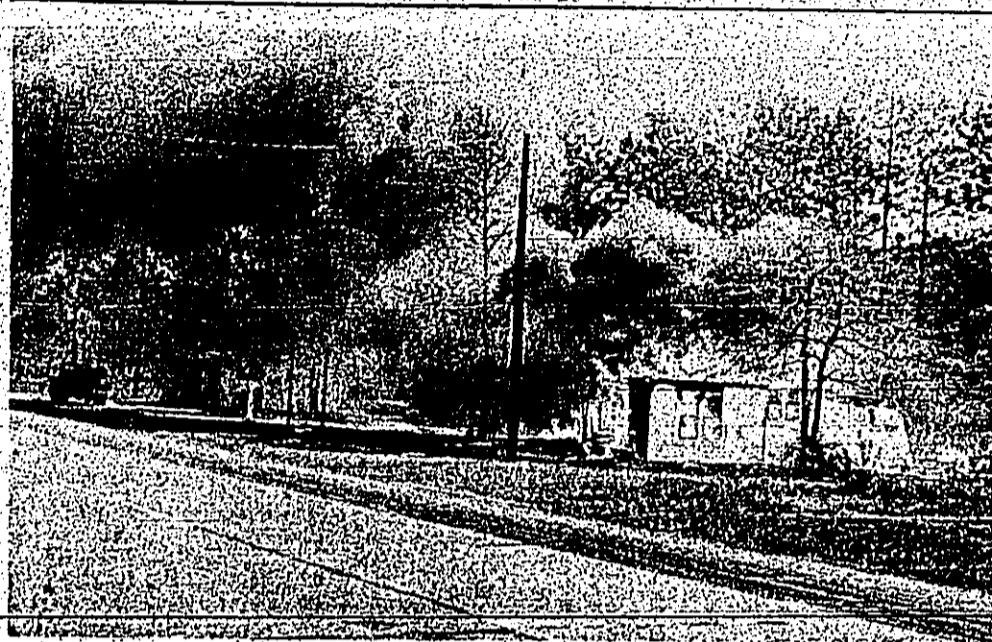
The citations were presented to local recipients by E. H. Sheffield, of the commission staff, at a meeting culminating nearly a year's work toward incorporating pertinent industrial location information into the nation's most sophisticated, computerized site location data bank.

Called "Insta-Site", the commission's computer program has already received two distinguished awards itself from the Southern Industrial Development Council, a professional society covering sixteen Southern states.

Participation of local leaders in gathering information for "Insta-Site", means that information on industrial sites here will be instantly available to all industrial firms considering new plant sites in Texas.

Sheffield presented the chamber of commerce a massive 88 page printout containing 1444 items of information on the area. Local award recipients (Continued on page 7)

Josiah Wheat, executive director of the festival association, commented that the 1971 festival was real good through both the western and coronation weekends, and extended thanks to everyone who had helped to make it a success.

Stressed throughout the meeting was the fact that too many people who might otherwise help seem to have the idea that festival jobs are by invitation only when in fact every year volunteers are needed to assist in its many phases.

Slips were handed out at the beginning of the meeting for those present to indicate in what job they would like to help in the 1972 festival. (A copy is printed on page 7. Those unable to attend Tuesday night are asked to check a job and mail to Mr. Wheat.)

Another slip asked what part of the festival this year was best and what was worst, and asked for written suggestions. Mr. Wheat said these would be taken up by the directors. A large number of those present turned in written suggestions. Another thing stressed was that work on the many parts of the festival needed to be started earlier in the year.

Among the suggestions and comments from the floor were: Some kind of entertainment for visiting duchesses on Friday following the rehearsals until time for the Kings Men's dance Friday night.

Starting a special event again following the parade for visitors to attend until time of coronation. Western Weekend this year started open roads and the coronation weekend crowd needs some kind of attraction to attend following the parade.

## Fires Destroy Two Homes In County

The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department has been called to two home fires, one on Friday and another Tuesday, in which both homes were completely destroyed.

Friday morning a house next to Harold Davis Food Market in Warren, occupied by the Tolbert family, was burned to the ground. The family was unable to save any of its possessions in the fire which was discovered about 9:30 a.m.

The fire Tuesday morning destroyed a home next to the Arnold Grocery about a mile north of Warren. It also was discovered about 9:30 a.m. The house belonged to Mr. and Mrs. Arnold who have operated the grocery for about two years. Woodville firemen stood by to throw water on the store which seemed to be threatened for a time due to a strong south wind. However, the distance between the store and house was far enough to minimize the threat to the store building.

The Tyler County sheriff's department has traced Roy Oliver Pritchard, who escaped from the county jail April 4 by squeezing through a ventilating duct, to Beebe, a small town in Arkansas, where his trail vanished.

However he has a brother living in Bentonville, Arkansas, and his wife lives in Mangum, Oklahoma. Officers think he might show up at one of these places.

According to Deputy Sheriff B. J. Vardeman, Pritchard evidently caught rides to High Island where he appeared at the home of a former employer. He told the man that he had served his time; The man was about to leave for Beebe due to an illness in the family and Pritchard said that if he didn't mind he would ride that far with him. His former employer, who has

not seen him in two years and had not heard of his parole revocation or escape from jail, let him ride to Beebe with him. After returning to High Island, the former employer was contacted by a relative of Pritchard who told him of the true situation. The man immediately called the Jefferson County Sheriff's department.

As of Tuesday, officers in Arkansas and Oklahoma had not picked up Pritchard's trail again.

Pritchard was convicted by a jury here of theft of a boat motor and given a six year prison sentence. He was awaiting action on an application for appeal when he escaped.

He was brought here from the state prison where he was serving sentences that would have kept him there until 1968 following the parole revocation.

District Four fire control crews of Texas Forest Service here were looking at the partly cloudy skies Tuesday and hoping for some relief with a promise of showers as a front moved across the state.

From Thursday through Monday crews in Tyler County had brought under control four wild fires which burned over 415 acres.

Thursday crews in Polk County brought under control a fire over 80 acres and in Liberty County a fire was controlled after burning 200 acres.

In Tyler County a fire last Thursday just north of Woodville burned over 100 acres before being controlled.

Sunday two fires in the Southeast part of the county were brought under control. One burned over 100 acres and the other 150 acres.

Another fire Monday in the same part of the county burned over 66 acres before being controlled.

District Texas Forest Service rangers say that the long dry spell has created a very serious fire condition throughout East Texas which only a good rain will ease.

Strong winds whip the fires through the underbrush at a fast clip and even the apparently green trees will burn. Fires will jump across fire lines and county roads in wind gusts.

All this makes controlling a wild fire difficult.

Everyone is cautioned to be careful with trash burning. Persons allowing a fire to spread to the property of others are subject to being fined.

Art Green, district forester, said that actually everyone should discontinue outdoor burning until after a good rain. The average rainfall registered at the gauge at district headquarters here January, February and March of 1967 through 1970 and the actual rainfall during these months in 1971 point up the increasing fire danger.

The average for each month followed by the 1971 rainfall in each month are January 2.80 (.88), February 3.38 (.23), and March 3.82 (1.59). So far in April there has been very little precipitation.

### GSU Reports Year-End Earnings

Gulf States Utilities Company reported year-end earnings averaging \$1.49 per share of common stock in 1970. The report, mailed this week to more than 23,000 shareholders. The earnings figure is an increase of 11 cents over the average of \$1.38 per share. A series of first-time achievements in company operations also were reported. Among them are the following: Peak load demand was 3,039,400 kilowatts, exceeding the 3-million kilowatt level for the first time. Average residential kilowatt-hour average with a mark of 5,044 kWh. Lewis Creek Generating Station, near Conroe, Texas, became the company's first Western Division generating facility when the No. 1 unit was placed in service. The station is the company's first entirely new power plant since 1959. A picture of the facility, taken from across the main dam, is shown for the plant in the cover page for the report.

### Consumers Want to Know

As a home sewer, I feel highly capped because information about the suitability of used fabric content is not available. Shouldn't textile manufacturers provide it?

Today, many manufacturers provide information on fiber content, as well as care instructions on the label, or hang the label into the bolt. However, this information remains in the store and the purchaser must rely on her memory. One who has taken the fabric home.

One fiber manufacturer has introduced a novel identification on a continuous paper tape. The instructions are printed, repetitively, every few inches. Bolls of this tape are inserted along the fold of the fabric, as it's wound on the bolt. No matter how small an amount of fabric is purchased in the retail store, at least one set of instructions will be with the fabric.

Can stained clothes be dried in a clothes dryer? The starch seems to powder out when I do this!

When drying starched clothes, start with a cold drum and don't overdry. That causes the starch to powder out. After drying, it's a good idea to wipe out the dryer drum with a damp cloth or sponge to remove starch particles that might be left in the drum.



# Industry Diversion To Smaller Cities Sought By TIC

Jim Harwell, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, has called for a centralized industrial expansion program to repopulate smaller cities and stop the trend of overpopulation of metropolitan areas.

Harwell outlined a three-pronged proposal to help 100 Texas counties that lost population in the last decade and close the growing gap between the average Texas towns and the national average.

Harwell pointed out that although Texas is a leader in industrial growth, the state is still suffering from a "brain drain" of 50,000 manufacturing jobs last year due to the "money and federal" subsidies program for the state's 21 industrial regions. He pointed out that the Commission is now able to match the needs of an industry with the assets of a city through a computerized program established within the TIC.

He also called for an incentive program to attract "high-paying" jobs to Texas. "We must secure better, higher-paying jobs for Texas. As an answer to the problem, the state industrial chief proposed a comprehensive planning program for the state's 21 industrial regions. He pointed out that the Commission is now able to match the needs of an industry with the assets of a city through a computerized program established within the TIC.

It is estimated that one million pounds of glass represents about two million containers—enough to meet the needs of a typical community within the industrial division.

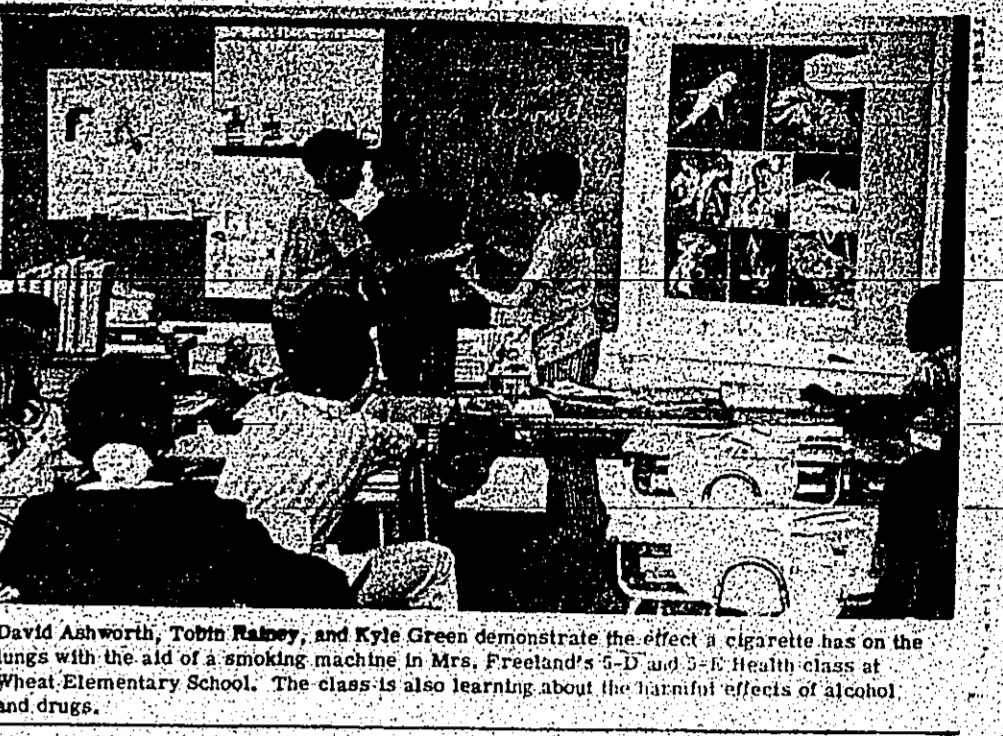

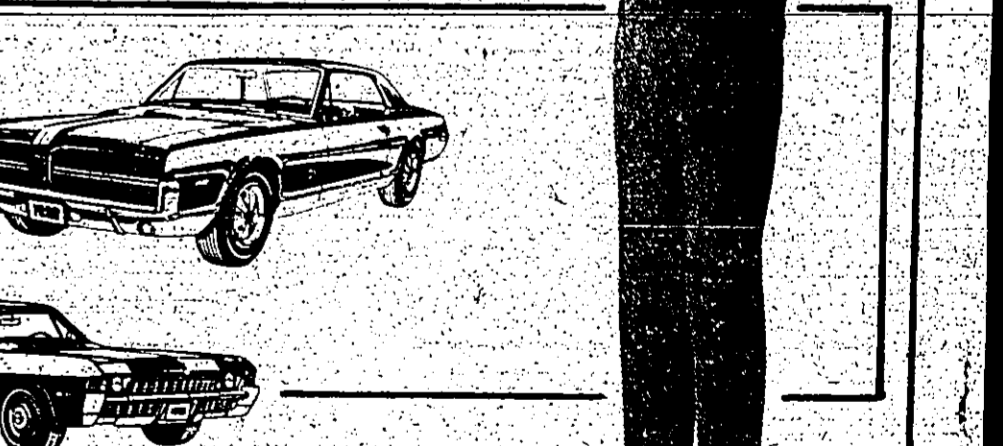

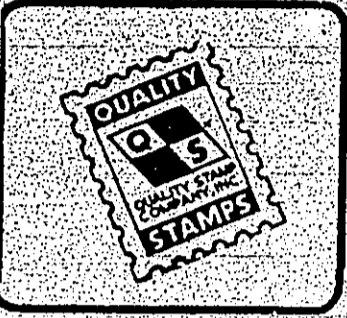
