## Seminar Slated For Businessmen

A seminar on "Why Customers Buy" for retail businessmen will be held Tuesday in the Community Room of the Citizens State Bank with speakers furnished by the Small Business Administration, according to Wyatt Bell, president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce.

The one-night seminar will begin at 6:30 p.m. and will conclude at 9 p.m., Bell said.

Speakers will include Bruce W. Hanson, management assistance officer, who will discuss why people want things and buying motives; W. S. Richard, Service Corps of Retired Executives, who will talk on motivation research, use of sales psychology and product preference.

Mr. Hanson will also review where to shop, the importance of price, and why people don't buy.

Mr. Richard also will speak on customer relations and selling techniques.

There is no admission charge, Mr. Bell said.

## Daylight Saving Time Starts Sunday

Daylight Saving Time, established by Congress in 1967 under the Uniform Time Act, begins at 2:00 a.m. Sunday in all states except three whose legislatures voted to exempt their states as provided by the act.

However, Texas was not one of the three and Sunday at 2:00 a.m. you will have to run your clock ahead one hour in order to have the correct time.

This can be done simply by running the clock up one hour on retiring Saturday night thus having the correct time on awakening Sunday morning.

Or if you are one of those who will be up at 2:00 a.m., you can simply turn the clock ahead to 3:00 a.m.

Or if you want to do it the hard way set your alarm for 2:00 a.m. and when it goes off get up and run all your timepieces ahead to 3:00 p.m. Then return to bed and to sleep (if you can).

Seriously, those who want to be on time for church, or to meet the fellows for that fishing trip, or whatever, set the clocks and watches in use in the household ahead one hour upon retiring Sunday night.

And if you wonder where that hour you lost went, it's being saved for you. You'll get it back the last Sunday in October.

If you don't want to lose an hour, just leave your clocks as they are but remember that everyone else is going to be running their time one hour faster than yours. That way you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you have the right time while other people's timepieces are an hour fast. Knowing that, you can still meet your appointments.

And we know of one elderly lady who does just that.

But for the rest of us, maybe we better run that clock ahead an hour Saturday night. Then we won't have to remember that everyone is out of step on the time except us.

## Dowdy Criticizes Calley Verdict

Rep. John Dowdy this week issued a statement on the case of Lt. Calley following the receipt of a number of petitions in his behalf from Tyler County. His statement follows:

The decision in the Calley trial has caused a further division in our Nation. Vietnam is like no other war in history. The enemy is not in uniform, and there is no distinction between friend or foe. No training can be given to our servicemen to prepare them to differentiate between innocent villagers and highly trained North Vietnamese. Our pilots drop bombs on targets which may well kill innocent civilians. This is the horror of war. Who, then, should be tried for war crimes? Lt. Calley answered this question when he said "It is the whole idea of war that convicted me, and not the crime I have been convicted of."

I fear that Lt. Calley has been made a scapegoat, having entire responsibility for the war placed on his shoulders. It is hard to believe that a soldier would be required to fight for his country, and then be court-martialed for carrying out his apparent orders. In modern war, it is regrettable true that many civilians lose their lives, but this is the first time a single soldier has been selected to pay for it.

The President should grant clemency to the Lieutenant.

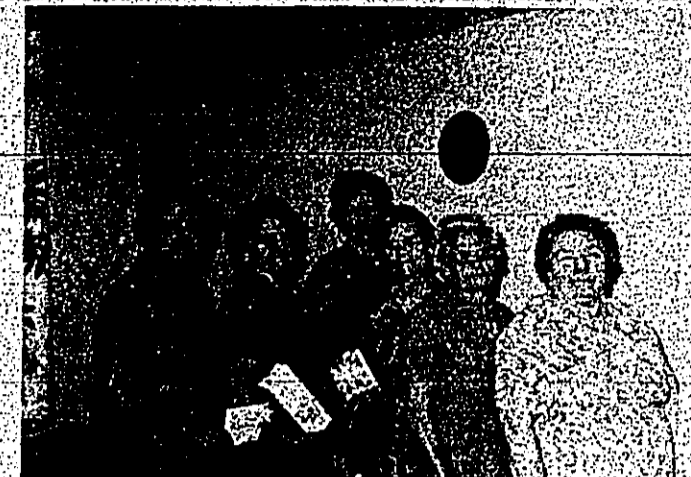
### Beech Creek HD Club Has 30th Birthday

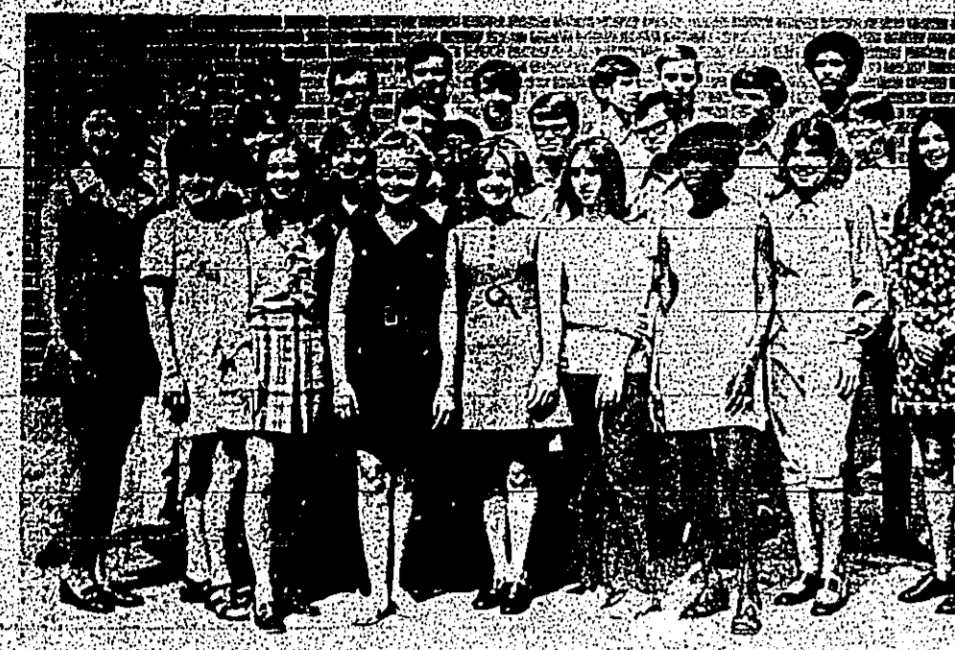
