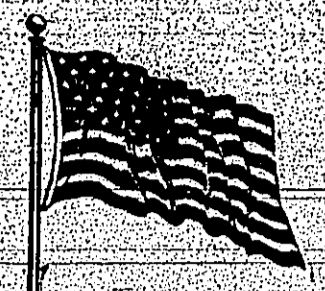

OPPONENTS SAY IT'S SUBTERFUGE . . .

Amendment One Not Needed

Last week's article on Amendment One to the Constitution of the State of Texas pretty well covered the arguments for its passage as summarized by Rep. Ben Bynum of Amarillo.

Opponents of the amendment charge mainly that it is a subterfuge which will allow legislators to set their own salaries which now must be done at the polls by the voters.

Since the members of the

legislature are responsible to the people of Texas, opponents claim that both the ethics of individual members and their pay raises can best be determined by the voters. The State Ethics Commission, to be established by the amendment, provides that it shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the

Lieutenant Governor at an amount higher than that of other members.

Texas Legislative Council's analysis of the arguments against Amendment One pretty well sums them up as follows:

(The council is composed of 17 members, five of whom are senators appointed by the Lieutenant Governor and ten are representatives appointed by the speaker of the house. Executive director is Robert Johnson, Austin, a non-member of the legislature. Its staff provides impartial arguments for and against amendments to the constitution among other duties.)

Why Schools Bonds Are Needed

Last week the Booster reported that the Board of Trustees of the Woodville Independent School District had called an election May 11 to determine whether or not school bonds in the amount of \$400,000.00 may be issued. The proposed bonds are for general school construction, improvement, and for the purchasing of equipment and sites.

A breakdown on the district's plans for use of the bonds, if approved, are given as follows:

A number of school building and equipment needs are now classified as urgent and will receive priority attention in order that as many of them as possible may be completed before the opening of the 1971-1972 term. The urgent needs relate mainly to the campus of the Woodville Elementary School and include the following projects: (1) covered walkways to link the two elementary buildings and to provide all-weather passages to buses, to the lunchroom, and from one building to the other; (2) construction of additional classrooms at the Woodville Elementary School so that this building can house all of grades two, three, and four; (3) conversion at this building of the former shop and home-making departments into a central library and audio-visual room, respectively; (4) conversion of the former library at this building into a classroom; (5) re-roofing of the Woodville Elementary School and the re-roofing of the ceiling in the auditorium of this building; (6) remodeling of the primary classrooms that house the kindergarten classes, special education rooms, and the first grade classrooms to include carpeting, sinks, storage cabinets, and interior kindergarten and special education equipment; (7) curbing and leveling of the playground areas of the Woodville Elementary School campus and the purchasing of outdoor playground equipment for the kindergarten, special education, and primary grades; (8) the remodeling of the Kirby gymnasium to include remodeled dressing rooms, quantum windows, new exterior doors, public restrooms, and additional dressing rooms; (9) the purchase of equipment for secondary-vocational programs, including office education and general shop; and (10) the painting and roofing of the Kirby lunchroom.

Although ostensibly the proposed amendment's major purpose is to bring about a legislative pay raise without going through the procedure of obtaining voter approval. Since members of the legislature are responsible to the people of Texas, determination of legislative salaries should rest with Texas citizens.

Texas voters themselves can best judge the conduct and ethics of members of the legislature and can so express their opinions at the polls by electing or failing to reelect a member to represent them.

An increase in compensation which the State Ethics Commission might recommend would further increase the costs of state government at a time when state finances are already overburdened in meeting the expanding needs of a growing population.

\$2,000 Reward Offered In Mobile Home Arson

Lamar G. McCormick of Houston has offered a \$2,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who burglarized and set fire to his trailer home at Lake Amanda near Colmesneil.

McCormick said that the trailer home was broken into and set afire Friday night. This is the second time the trailer home has been entered in a week and valuables were removed after the first burglary.

McCormick said that anyone with any information concerning the break-ins or arson should contact the sheriff's office in Woodville.

GOVERNOR'S CRIME-STOP PROGRAM . . .

Citizens Asked To Support Law Enforcement

Governor Preston Smith, who started a statewide "Crime-Stop" program, in which alert citizens participate by reporting suspicious activities to law enforcement officers, said this week that in addition to 22 towns and cities in which emergency telephone numbers have been established through which to report crimes or suspicious activities, a number have come to light which already have launched efforts to marshal citizen power against crime.

One of these, Beaumont's Crime Alert, is a combined newspaper police alert similar to the Governor's Crime-Stop program which was launched by Police Chief Willie Bauer through the Beaumont Enterprise and Journal in January, 1970. Since then, Chief Bauer says, individuals from all over the city have reported suspicious persons and circumstances which have led to arrests and convictions on offenses ranging from child molesting to burglary.

"The program, even with its problems, has been worthwhile," Bauer says. More than 150 calls were logged during the first month the Crime-Alert telephone number was in operation.

Other such programs in Dallas and San Antonio have been successful in stimulating citizens in participating reporting suspicious persons and events and providing information to officers after a crime has been committed.

The Governor points out that in Texas a burglary is committed every 4-1/2 minutes, a robbery every hour, in rural areas

the incidence of burglary has increased greatly with the overall rise of 14 percent in all crimes. Suburban area crime has increased 17 percent with a corresponding increase in burglaries.

While most rural residents may never witness or be the victim of an armed robbery they are urged to be alert; if it does happen, be cool and cooperative but do observe carefully so that a description may be given of the robber, his clothing, any distinguishing marks, etc.

Rural residents can be helpful in thwarting or reporting circumstances leading to burglaries. Suspicious circumstances to watch for are: an auto moving slowly up and down a street or road with the occupants staring intently at houses where it appears no one is at home; a stranger on foot who, after getting no response to a knock at the front door, then goes to the rear of the house; stranger coming out of house carrying furniture or appliances.

Neighbors should get description of persons, vehicles, license number if possible, direction of travel.

And don't advertise the fact that you are away from home. Don't allow newspapers, mail, or other items stack up in front of house—ask a neighbor to pick them up for you daily. Leave a light on somewhere in the house.

If you own a campouse that is isolated, don't leave valuables in it while you are away for long spells of time. This is an invitation to burglary.

This is the first of several articles in the Booster which will attempt to make the public more aware of the need to cooperate with law enforcement agencies in the fight on crime of all kinds and also will urge citizens to support the prompt trial and conviction of offenders in the court.

"We feel," said Chuck Stamps, editor, "that such stimulation of public awareness will bring about a reduction in opportunities for crime, and therefore a reduction in the crime rate."

Stamps, who was personally requested by Governor Smith to assist in coordinating a local informational campaign, said an effort would be made to enlist all community resources in Operation Crime-Stop. He specifically mentioned civic clubs, chamber of commerce, and schools, pointing out that Crime-Stop may have applications to the crime and narcotics education program now required in grades 5 through 12 of the public schools.
