

Firemen To Give Out Into Stickers



Woodville Volunteer Firemen will call at residences to hand out stickers to be placed on telephones showing the number to be called and information required to be given in reporting a fire starting at 9:00 p. m. Tuesday.

Donations for the Fire Department are being solicited at this time. Those wishing to make a donation, please be prepared to do so when the firemen call to deliver the phone stickers, or mail donations in to them at city hall.

Anyone living outside of the city limits wishing to make a

donation and receive a sticker can drop by city hall.

One piece of equipment the fire department is in need of is a smoke ejector.

As you know, the fire department is made of the men who give their time and effort free of charge. They do the best job possible with what equipment they have been able to secure. These men have answered 39 fire alarms since January alone, and meet monthly for fire drill.

All donations, regardless of the amount, will be appreciated, firemen said.

Voters in the Woodville Independent School District will decide on the approval of the issuance of \$400,000 in bonds which the board of trustees have designated for general improvement and constructing new facility as well as additional classrooms to existing buildings.

Among the improvements the board of trustees declare are urgently needed by the start on the 1971-1972 school year are a number at the Woodville

Elementary School. They include covered walkways to join the two elementary buildings as well as all-weather passages to the lunchroom and to buses; additional classrooms so that the building can house all of grades two, three and four; remodeling of the former shop and homemaking departments into a central library and audio-visual room, respectively; conversion of the former library into a classroom; re-roofing the Woodville Elementary School and making repairs to the ceiling in the auditorium in this building; remodeling of the primary classrooms that house the kindergarten, special education rooms, and first grade classrooms to include carpeting, sinks, storage cabinets, and interior kindergarten and special education equipment.

Chamber Hears Report On ETCC Tourism Meeting

Members of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce were given a resume of subjects covered at the recent East Texas Chamber of Commerce Tourist Development Conference in Nacogdoches by M. F. Alford.

Mr. Alford said that when new industry is visualized most people think of smokestacks and that tourism is big business without the smokestacks and is something that can be developed here.

Wyatt Bell, president, presided at the meeting. He introduced Mr. Zane who is in procurement for Georgia-Pacific and is moving here to attempt to establish a timber base in the area. He pointed out that the firm is building new mills throughout its areas of operation and that one will probably be constructed in this area of East Texas if a timber base can be established.

Mr. Bell welcomed the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation as a new member of the local chamber of commerce.

Other matters taken up at the meeting were the anti-litter poster contest in county schools, report on the retail merchants meeting April 27 where a program on "Why People Buy" was presented by the Small Business Administration; and a proposed map suggested by Jim Dillon showing trails and drives of scenic spots in the area.


