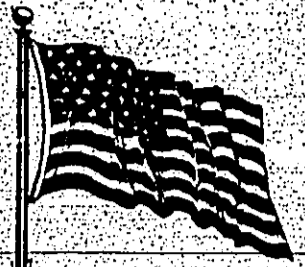

Wyatt Bell Is East Texan Of Month

When the name "Wyatt Bell" is mentioned in the Tyler County area, people stop for a second to listen. Wyatt has the reputation of "getting things done."

Charles Wyatt Bell moved to Woodville in 1965 as superintendent of the Woodville district of Gulf States Utilities Company. He immediately became an active member of the community through civic, church, and municipal affairs. Before being elected president of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce four months ago, he had served as director and as vice president of the local chamber of commerce. In the

last few months he has established himself as a "live wire" president.

Wyatt is very active in youth activities. He is a strong supporter of the V.L.C.A. program and in 1970 was instrumental in raising the funds to send the local chapter, winner of the state contest, to St. Louis, Missouri, for the national contest.

Presently he is a member of institutions sponsoring four Boy Scout units, and he is chairman of the health and safety committee of the Dogwood District of Boy Scouts.

A member of the Woodville Methodist Church, he is Sunday School coordinator of the youth department. He is a member of the nominating committee of the church, a member of the Methodist Men, and has served as program chairman. Also he has served as chairman and as a member of the official board.

Currently he is serving as a director of the Woodville Rotary Club, and for a number of years he was chairman of the youth committee of the organization. Wyatt has completed his fifth year on the board of operating directors of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival, which continues as one of the outstanding spring festivals in East Texas. (Recently a letter addressed to "Dogwood," Texas, was delivered promptly to Woodville.)

Other civic interests of Wyatt Bell include membership on the water resources committee of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the board of directors of the Deep East Texas Development Association, treasurer of the Tyler County Salvation Army, chairman of the finance advisory committee of Pine Hills Country Club. Also he has served on the board of the Housing Authority of the city of Woodville.

Prior to locating in Woodville, Mr. Bell worked in Gulf States offices in Beaumont, Dayton, and Liberty.

He is well remembered in Liberty, where he was president of the Liberty Lions Club, chairman of the Little League program—manager of the Tri-Nity Valley Exposition—Liberty Chamber of Industry and Commerce. County Fair—chairman of safety and health committee of Trinity, Neches Council of Boy Scouts of America. For five years he was assistant chairman of the National Foundation of Muscular Dystrophy, as well as chairman of Liberty County Chapter of the American Cancer Society.

In Liberty he served on the Board of Stewards of the Liberty First Methodist Church and was superintendent of the Sunday School.

A native of Rule, Texas, Bell is a graduate of Warren High School. He is married to the former Jean Abbott of Colmesneil, and they have two sons: Allen and Tommy.

"Total Involvement" is Wyatt Bell's philosophy of life, and the East Texas Chamber of Commerce is pleased to name him "East Texan of the Month" for May.

Postage Rates To Go Up Sunday

Postmaster H. M. Durham said today that increases in most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the new United States Postal Service begins its task of achieving self-sufficiency as requires by the Postal Reorganization Act.

Mr. Durham noted that general postage rates have not been increased since 1967 when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

He pointed out that, earlier, request for rate increases were proposed to Congress in 1969 by both President Johnson and President Nixon. In addition, President Nixon proposed an increase again in 1970 although

none of the proposed increases was acted upon. Mr. Durham noted that the temporary rates which are in effect on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes will raise first-class letter rates from 6 to 8 cents an ounce, and airmail letter rates from 10 to 12 cents an ounce. Post cards will go from 5 to 6 cents each and airmail post cards will go from 8 to 9 cents each.

The increases will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 percent of first class and airmail is from commercial users.

In addition to increases in first-class rates, second and third class rates will also go up on May 16. However, the full increase proposed by the Postal Service will not be put into effect on a temporary basis, in second and third class, since the postal reform legislation contemplates that such increases be phased over 5 years, or ten years for non-profit organizations—provided Congress appropriates the necessary funds to ease the transition to full rates.

Because of the phasing provision, the increases to become effective May 16, for second and third class will generally be only 1/5 of the total increase which has been proposed by Postal Service.

No charges are made in the rates for parcel post, which is the principal component of fourth-class mail. However, initial increases will be made in the "book rate" which is classified as fourth class.

The new temporary rates also make changes in other postage rate categories and special service fees, such as special delivery and registered mail.

The Postal Service advised the public in February that it intended to make the temporary increases in the Postal Rate Commission did not make the recommended decision within 90 days of the request by the Postal Service.

Recently the Rate Commission confirmed that it will not be able to make a decision within the 90 days, and Sunday, May 16, was selected as the date on which the rates would become effective.

When the domestic changes go into effect, there will be conforming increases in letter rates to Canada and Mexico.

The day will visit an established Dallgrass and S-Clover pastures, Coastal-Bermuda, Crimson Clover, Common Bermuda, and Bahla. The beef herd on Dr. Byram's ranch consists of F-1 and registered hereford cattle.

George Atwell, pasture specialist, Wayne Taylor, area farm management specialist and Dr. Randall Grooms, beef cattle specialist, all from Texas A & M University Research and Extension Center at Overton will give the program.

This is an opportunity to learn the most modern techniques in pasture and beef cattle management, county agent Clinton Currie said.

Rains Break Drouth in County

The rain gauge at Texas Forest Service district headquarters south of Woodville measured .85 of an inch of rain from the thundershower which passed through Woodville Tuesday afternoon.

This is the same amount of rainfall that was measured during the entire month of April.

The drouth here was broken last Thursday afternoon when heavy thundershowers dumped 2.45 inches of rainfall as measured on the FES gauge up to 8 a.m. Friday morning. The Thursday afternoon downpour was accompanied by hail at some places. The dark clouds reduced the afternoon light to near darkness as the storm's intensity increased and the weather service placed the county under a severe weather alert.

Another .46 of an inch was measured Sunday and .47 of an inch Tuesday morning.

The time for decision on four proposed constitutional amendments, two of them controversial, will arrive Tuesday as Texans go to the polls in a statewide special election.

The Texas Constitution of 1876 has been amended an even 200 times beginning in 1870 and ending with the nine adopted in 1970. There have been 320 amendments proposed during that time.

The four to be voted on Tuesday are briefly:

Amendment No. 1: Establishing a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the legislature, state officers, and legislative officers and to investigate violations; to recommend compensation for members of the legislature and the Lieutenant Governor; and to recommend improvement and economy in the legislative process.

Amendment No. 2: Providing that the legislature may propose amendments to the Constitution in called as well as regular sessions of the legislature.

Amendment No. 3: Removing the limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy blind, and the needy disabled, and setting a limitation on total state appropriations during a fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

Amendment No. 4: Authorizing the issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes; providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program; and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6 percent.

Some Voting Boxes In County Have Been Changed

The voters of Texas will decide on four proposed amendments to the state constitution in a special election which will be held next Tuesday, May 16. Many Tyler Countians will need to decide where their voting precinct is located.

In Tyler County all 12 of the new voting precincts, established by commissioners court along with new commissioner precinct lines, will be open for balloting for the first time.

The new voting boxes or precincts are listed in the table on this page. Voters can find where their voting boxes are by looking in the top left of their registration slips under "voting precinct number" and then consulting the table which lists each voting box number and its location along with the name of the election judge in each voting precinct (or box if you prefer).

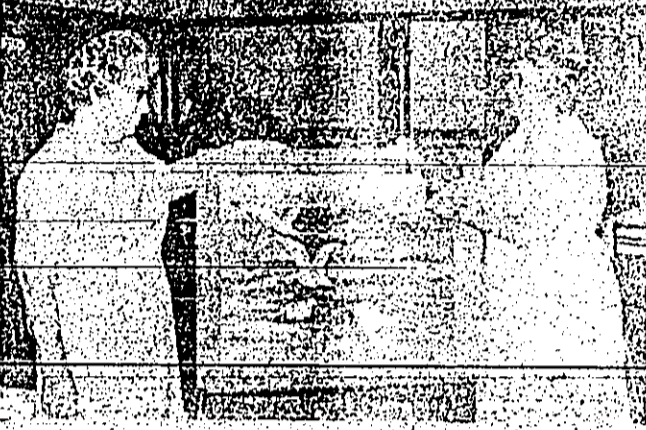

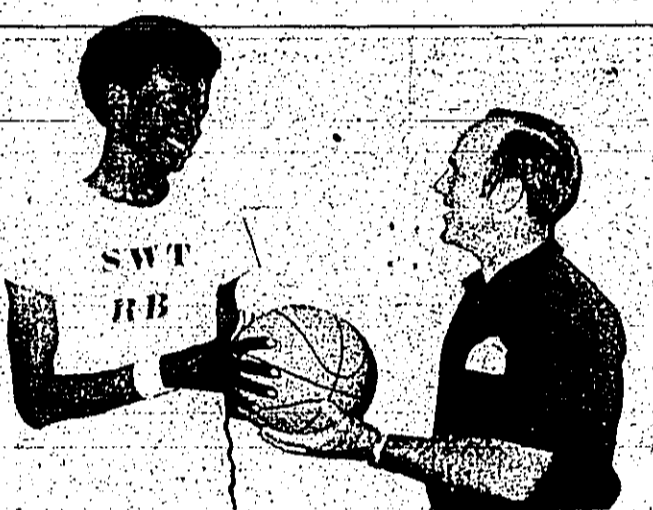
I remember the room upstairs which I shared with my sister. A dressing table with long gathered skirt, bearing a child's hatbox and mirror.
