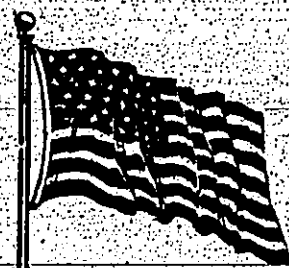

## Transfer Of Howard Suit Denied

A plea of privilege for the transfer of a lawsuit from 88th District Court to a Houston district court was heard Tuesday by Judge H. A. Coe who denied the petition.

The transfer was asked by the defendant, General Motors Corporation, in a suit against it by Hugh Howard, former Chevrolet and Oldsmobile dealer here.

## Justice Court Is Busy

One of the busiest offices in the county courthouse is that of Justice of the Peace precinct one, currently occupied by E. A. Sturrock.

Since he took office January 1 through May, there have been 682 criminal cases filed in the justice court, 16 civil cases, 25 arraignments in felony cases which were sent to the grand jury, and nine inquests.

It is the latter that bothers Judge Sturrock the most. Since he has been in office, five months on May 1, there have been five traffic fatalities in the county in which the victim was dead at the scene. Regardless of the time, the law requires an inquest by the county coroner which, in Tyler County, is the justice of the peace. It is not the time of day or night that bothers the justice so much—rather it is the fact that so many of these accidents are caused by carelessness or speeding and usually both.

Of the 682 criminal cases filed Sturrock estimates that about 70 to 75 percent of them are traffic violations such as speeding, passing in a no-passing zone, etc. These are filed by the highway patrolmen stationed in the county who file all such charges in precinct one. Game law violations are also filed in his court.

Of the criminal cases filed, Judge Sturrock has disposed of 595 so far this year.

Civil cases filed in the court include revocation of drivers licenses for the delinquent, licenses, forcible detainers, and the like.

Sturrock said that beginning May 1 he had set a standard fine of \$20 including court costs in traffic violations.

With all this goes the record keeping on all fines assessed plus the work of county registrar which entails registering all births and deaths and reporting them to the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Department of Health, Education and Welfare. A monthly report of fines and court costs and well fees is made to the county auditor.

The justice of the peace office assesses fines totaling around \$2500 a month on the average. This money goes into the county treasury.

## County Board Of Equalization Sets Dates For Hearings

The commissioners court sitting as a board of equalization at its meeting Tuesday set dates for meetings with the various groups of taxpayers.

Representatives of the big land and timber companies will meet with the board on June 22; utility companies at 10 a.m. on June 23 and railroads at 1:00 p.m. the same date; pipeline companies on June 24; oil companies on July 7, and individual property owners on July 8.

Members of the equalization board, all of whom were present Tuesday, are County Judge Tom D. Mann, Commissioners Joe I. Best of precinct 1, H. M. Parks of precinct 2, Leon Fowler of precinct 3, James R. Jordan of precinct 4, and County Clerk Allen Sturrock, who is secretary.

### GSU To Ask Rate Increase

Gulf States Utilities Company will petition the city council of Woodville, Colmesnell and Chester for an 8.5 percent rate increase which would take effect October 1.

Wyatt Bell, local superintendent, pointed out that this is the first rate increase that the company has asked for in 18 years. The new rates, applicable to all residential, commercial, industrial and other users of electric service in the company's service area would provide additional revenue needed to meet the company's higher operating costs and the increasingly higher cost of obtaining new capital from public investors to build new power plants and other major facilities to meet the growing demand for more power.

As an example of the increase in residential rates, if the present monthly summer bill is \$5.01 the resulting monthly bill would be \$5.44; present \$10.01 bill would increase to \$10.92 and a \$20.01 electric bill would increase to \$21.72 for the same amount of power.

Floyd Smith, GSU president, cited the following factors which prompted the rate increase request:

The company's payroll rates have increased 36 percent since 1955; production facilities, 29 percent for transmission and 38 percent for distribution.

Interest rates have more than doubled since the company first issued bonds in 1946 and reached an all-time high in 1970 when the company had to pay approximately 8.5 percent for bond money.

The peak demand on the Gulf States electric system was slightly over three million kilowatts in 1970. A peak of over five million kilowatts is estimated for 1975.

In order to meet the growing demands of industrial, commercial and residential users, the company now has under construction three 500,000 kilowatt fossil-fuel plants and plans to add five more units. These would be followed by a nuclear power plant before the end of the decade, as gas and fuel oil will not be available in sufficient amounts to generate all the electricity needed. (Coal as a fuel would not enable us to meet air pollution standards.)

The cost of the new major equipment, like power plants, will total about \$750 million in the five years ahead.

Present power plants comply with air and water pollution regulations. Some of the power plants projected will cost more in order to comply with environmental standards.
