## A loss, not a gain

The Supreme Court's 6-to-5 decision to permit publication of articles on the origin of the Vietnam war based on top secret Pentagon documents represents a net loss for freedom of the press.

The Houston Post defends the rights guaranteed by the First Amendment. Free speech and a free press come to the same thing—the right of the people to be informed, to dissent. But to be a free press means to accept the responsibility of being a free press.

As Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes showed long ago, the First Amendment's protection cannot be unlimited. We are guaranteed free speech, he said, but we cannot falsely cry "Fire!" in a crowded theater.

Newspaper editors are not employees of the government, but they must share with the government the responsibility of protecting the people. When editors set themselves above not the law but the security of the country, the country may be endangered.

Publication of the Pentagon documents is too grave a responsibility for decision by any editor acting alone. It is impossible for an editor to know what is sensitive and what is not sensitive in the government's operations.

But an editor can ask if a document affects the nation's well-being; a procedure exists for declassifying documents that may no longer be sensitive. The newspapers concerned did not ask if the documents were sensitive, if they could be declassified.

The question does not concern the government's embarrassment but whether the vital interests of the people were endangered.

In this case, Chief Justice Warren E. Burger wrote in his dissenting opinion, "The imperative of a free and unfettered press comes into collision with another imperative, the effective functioning of a complex modern government and specifically the effective exercise of certain constitutional powers of the Executive."

To me it is hardly believable that a newspaper long regarded as a great institution in America would fail to perform one of the basic and simple duties of every citizen with respect to the discovery or possession of stolen property or secret government documents. That duty, I had thought, perhaps naively, was to report forthwith to responsible public officers. This duty rests on taxi drivers, justices and the New York Times.

Thursday, Secretary of State William P. Rogers appealed to the press to withhold voluntarily publication of any of the Pentagon documents that would "harm the security of the United States." He added that "the government remains ready to lend its assistance in identifying any documents which, if disclosed, would result in such harm."

The New York Times twice and the Washington Post once condemned what each has now been granted the right to do. Of the Openka case involving a member of the State Department who in 1963 delivered confidential State Department files to the Senate Internal Security Committee, a Times editorial said:

"Orderly procedures are essential if the vital division of power between the legislative and executive branches is not to be undermined. The use of underground methods to obtain classified documents from lower-level officials is a dangerous departure from such orderly procedures."

The Washington Post concluded that "if such a practice were to continue, the executive branch of the government would have no security at all."

Again, when Stewart Alsop co-authored an article describing deliberations of the National Security Council, the Times said in an editorial: "What kind of advice can the President expect to get under such circumstances? How can there be any real freedom of discussion or dissent, how can anyone be expected to advance positions that may be unpopular or unpopular?"

Are the statements of these two distinguished newspapers less applicable to the present case than to the former ones?

## Drouth Hurting Farming, Ranching

Farmers and stockmen are facing a critical situation with the dry, hot weather and lack of adequate rainfall during the first half of the year.

Pastures and hay meadows are turning brown in some areas of the county. Hay meadows need a rain in the very near future if stockmen are to get a second cutting from their grasses.

Records at the district office of Texas Forest Service show that only 14.27 inches of rain has been registered on the rain gauge there. Some areas of the

county have had more and others less with the scattered thundershowers that have fallen lately.

The average annual rainfall for Tyler County as recorded by the weather bureau at its Rockland station is 49.85 inches. But during the last decade rainfall has been significantly below this norm and groundwater supplies have dwindled considerably.

The year started off really dry with only .68 of an inch registered. February was wet in comparison with 2.91 inches, and March had 1.57. April was dry, registering .85 of an inch, and May was about normal with 6.92 inches. June had 1.97.

Even the heavy rain in May did not make much dent on the drouth because of the long dry period ahead of it.

There has not been any large scale selling off of cattle in the county but if the dry weather continues many cattlemen and farmers say their stock will have to go. One big reason for this besides poor pastures is the drying up of stockponds. Some cattle raisers have had to transfer cattle from one pasture to another because of the critical shortage of water in stockponds. In other words many stockponds have become mudholes.

Usually winter and spring rains fill stockponds but the dry fall and winter months added very little water to most ponds. Even creeks that run all year around are drying up in some areas of the county.

As it comes to the point that cattle raisers are forced to sell off their herds it will cause a severe economic loss to the county.

According to the latest information available Tyler County farmers and stockmen realize \$2,285,000 annually from the sale of livestock, mostly from small herds. However, if producing herds are sold off and they have to replace them they will lose both the income from the calf crop and the loss in the difference from the sale of the cows and their replacement cost.

If it does rain soon many farmers will lose one cutting from their hay meadows because the drouth has extended into the baling season. Some pastures cut in June have not made any growth since and it will take plenty of moisture to get the grasses started growing again.

A good general rain would not only help the pastures—it would brighten the spirits of most cattlemen and farmers.

## C Of C To Meet

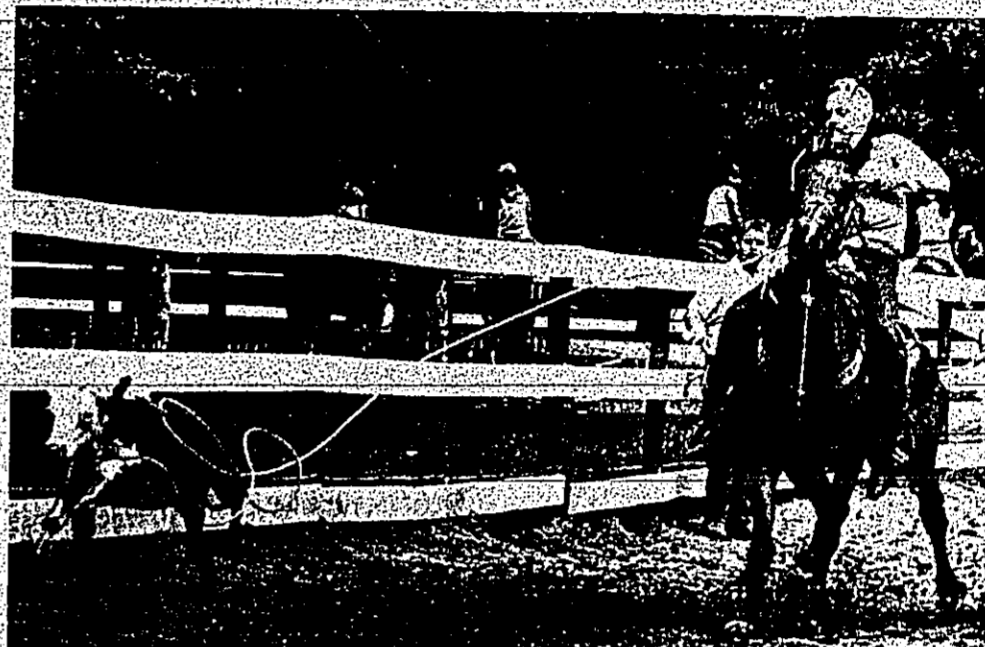
### At Noon July 12

## IN ALL ELECTIONS

## 18-Year-Olds Can Vote

Martin Dies, Jr., secretary of state, notified County Clerk Allen Sturrock this week that with the ratification of the 26th amendment all persons 18 through 20 years old registered to vote in federal elections may now vote in any election.

Those in the 18 through 20 age group had been given the franchise to vote in federal elections and the 26th amendment was proposed and passed by Congress to give them the right to vote in state, city, or other political subdivision elections. Enough states have ratified the amendment to put it into effect.

Mr. Dies said that as of July 1 any registered 18, 19 or 20 year old is qualified, thereby making the minimum voting age 21 years.

the league contention. The second game will have the Cards meeting the Red Sox.

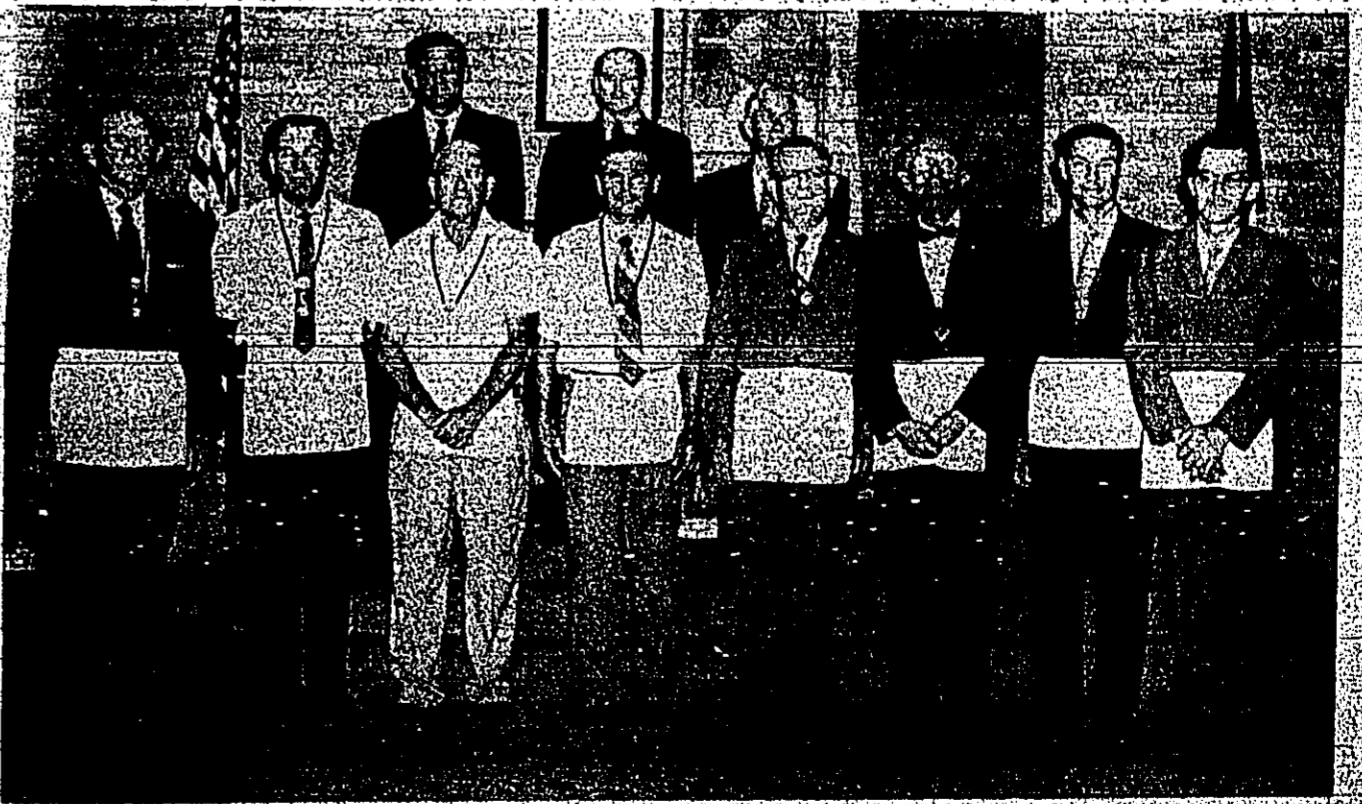
Some crucial games for the leading teams are on the schedule for next week. They are: Monday night, Eagles vs. Indians and Astros vs. Cardinals.
