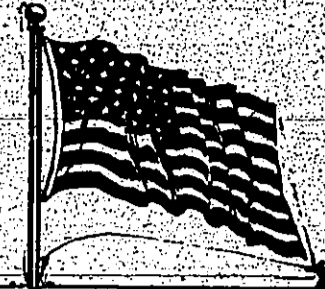

Land Companies May Go To Court

Horses Get Shots Against VEE

Dr. W. S. Nichols said Tuesday afternoon that the horse vaccination program was "over the hump" with over half the animals in Tyler County having received shots at that time.

He said that he had given the serum to approximately 750 horses by Tuesday noon and that he had no way of knowing how many more remained to be vaccinated. However, he said he felt that he was past the half-way mark—at least.

The emergency vaccination program began last Thursday when an epidemic of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis in South Texas and its rapid spread northward resulted in a quarantine of horses in Texas.

Thursday through Sunday Dr. Nichols drove along roads in the county and stopped at each place to vaccinate horses on

the premises. However, Monday the regulations were relaxed to allow horses to be brought to veterinary clinics to receive the serum.

Dr. Nichols set up a schedule where he could be at his clinic during the morning and make trips to various communities in the county. He was at Warren from 4 to 7 p.m. Wednesday and will be at Spurger across from Spurger Mercantile Thursday from 4 to 7 p.m. Horse owners can bring horses there to receive shots.

Horses can be moved to the clinics to receive the vaccination if they are returned promptly to their own premises after receiving the shot.

One difficulty in vaccinating horses in the county has been the supply of the serum. Dr. Nichols at first had to go to Houston for his supply until

early this week when it was brought to the Jasper area for distribution.

The vaccine must be kept refrigerated and lasts only 12 hours after being mixed for use. This time element has caused veterinarians to have to pick-up only what they can use in that time length and return to the distribution centers for more.

No cases of the strain of sleeping sickness have been reported in this area.

In addition to the vaccination program, U. S. Air Force planes are spraying areas south of here in an effort to kill mosquitoes which are the disease's principal carriers.

The federal government this week began picking up the tab for the vaccination after mandatory shots were ordered for all horses in the state.

Large land owners and the County of Tyler seem to be headed for a showdown on the elimination of the discount schedule on evaluations which the commissioners court, sitting as a board of equalization, voted at its May 8 meeting.

The discount schedule, adopted to go into effect in 1969, allowed a drop in land evaluation from one percent for small acreage to up to 20 percent for 750 acres or more.

At a formal protest hearing Thursday of last week, asked for by the large companies who own as much as 5 percent of acreage in the county, the companies presented formal testimony against the elimination of the discounts. Represented at the hearing were Southwestern Timber Company, Kirby Lumber Company, Champion Paper Company, Temple Industries, Owen-Illinois and Southland Paper Company.

At the end of the hearing

found themselves deadlocked on the issue with the county election board sticking to its original action in eliminating the discounts.

Friday morning B. F. Whitworth, attorney for Southwestern Timber Company, visited County Judge Tom D. Mann and said he would probably file a petition with District Judge H. A. Coe this Friday asking for an injunction barring the county equalization board from adjourning.

Such an action would indicate that the companies are planning a lawsuit against the county on the issue of the elimination of the discounts.

Judge Mann said Monday that he and the county commissioners had reached the conclusion that now is the time to settle the tax equalization issue once and for all. He said that if the companies do go to court the taxes could be tied up for up to two years and that the county would have to operate on borrowed money which, in the long run, will cause all taxpayers a little more.

However, he said that he and the present commissioners court are standing firm on the premise that all taxpayers, large or small, should pay equally on the same land valuation.

Judge Mann said he welcomes any suggestions from the public about the matter.

The firm of Davis and Wilson was hired to evaluate the land in Tyler County and their schedules went into effect in 1969. The discount schedule, also adopted in 1969, has been in effect until the present board voted to discontinue it on the current evaluation of land. Representatives of Davis and Wilson had only a short time to re-value the tax roll, Judge Mann said.

The controversial schedule gives a one percent discount on 15 to 25 acres, two percent on 25 to 50 acres, three percent on 50 to 100 acres, five percent on 100 to 250 acres, ten percent on 250 to 500 acres, and fifteen percent on acreage from 500 to 750. Over 750 acres the discount was 20 percent, or 80 percent of the regular evaluation.

The land size discounts were in addition to evaluation discounts set forth in the discount schedule. These included the following schedules:

- I. Pipeline and Utility R. O. W.: If the ROW is an easement, determine the amount of acres involved and consider it 10% good.
- II. Ditches and Gullies: Determine number of acres contained within and use a 10% good factor.
- III. Mining operation that have been abandoned: Same as No. II above.
- IV. Outfield Damage: Discount determined by the degree of damage the land has incurred.
- V. Brush and Undergrowth: Determined by the thickness and density. Discount from 5% to 20%.
- VI. Swamp or Marsh Lands: Land that will not drain off water, up to 50% discount.
- VII. Low Lands: Land with poor slow drainage discount up to 15%.
- VIII. Inaccessible Lands: Determine the degree of inaccessibility and discount from 10% to 25%.

Board Confers With Planners

The board of trustees of Woodville Independent School District at the regular meeting Monday night met with representatives of an architectural and planning consulting firm regarding the district's next building program, heard a report from the tax assessor, and other routine items on the agenda.

Moore, Stansbury and Vought, architects and planning consultants with offices in Fort Arthur, made a presentation with regard to their possible employment to assist with planning the next building program.

Supt. B. H. McGuire told the trustees that this coming school year the district will be using every available space due to increased enrollment and federally required special classes and that by the beginning of the 1972-1973 school year the situation will be critical.

The June financial statement was approved and the board voted to change the rate of tax assessments from 40 to 50 percent. Also approved was the recommendation of the school library committee for Title II books.

The trustees were given a report on the Commodity Food Receipts by the school lunchroom during the 1970-71 school year and also received a financial statement of the lunchroom account for the year.

The report showed that the lunchroom served an average of 175 pupils daily for a total for the year of 21,868 lunches. Of these 37,098 were free lunches served to pupils from low-income families.

The lunchroom just about broke even for the year. The account had \$11,605.10 in it on September 1, 1970, and has \$11,338.55 as of June 30, 1971.

The board adopted an insurance program for students and athletes.

Dr. L. G. Burton, vice president, presided at the meeting. The president, W. S. Jarratt, was out of town. Other members present were Jim Galtney, Dr. R. E. Swearingen and F. M. Archer.

TOP OF THE MORNING

Since the early centuries when man discovered that he could reason logically enough to guide his hands into carving crude objects out of stone and wood his inventions have brought him both a better life and considerable woe.

He discovered how to carve a bowl from stone and arrowheads from flint, to build a fire for warmth and for roasting meat, to fashion a bow and spear with which to harvest wild game as well as for defense and for offense against neighboring tribes, to erect crude shelters from the heat and cold. Many of his inventions have changed the course of his history. The wheel brought progress in both transportation and crude manufacturing. He harnessed the ox and the horse, finally invented the carriage. The steam engine provided energy with which to turn the wheel easier and faster.

Man's inventions have released him from drudgery (unless he is a newspaperman) and allows him to live in more comfort than he enjoyed back in his caveman days.

Of course man's inventions also have had compensative effects. The automobile affords offset to a great extent by bringing death and maiming. So it is with a major part of other instruments of progress.

The invention of the safety razor and its continuing refinements made obsolete the old, straight razor. This was true, except for the fact that it also made obsolete the razor strop. Not too many years ago the man of each house took a great deal of pride in his straight razor and fine leather strop with which he kept it sharpened.

The razor strop had another use in most homes—probably the majority of homes. It made a fine leather strap with which dad could paddle his unruly son (or daughter, we suppose). It was used for this purpose as often as for putting a sharp edge on the razor. The strop usually was made with two pieces of leather fastened with a tapering piece as a handle on one end and a hole on the other to hang it while honing the razor. A lousy how with the strop stung as it hit and the two pieces of leather popping together made a fearsome noise.

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All-Stars In Livingston Tourney

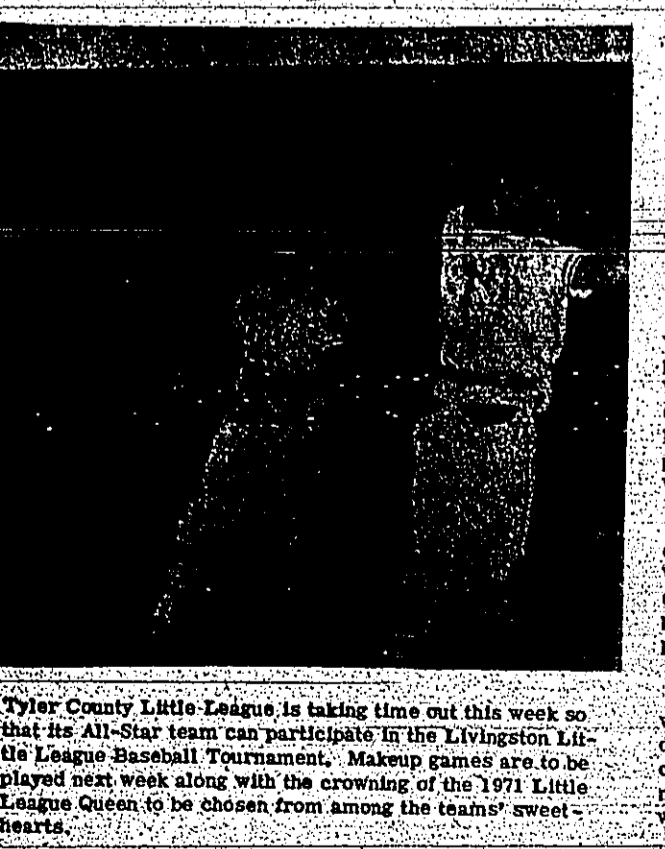
Tyler County Little League All-Stars are playing in the Livingston Little League Baseball Tournament which began Monday night.

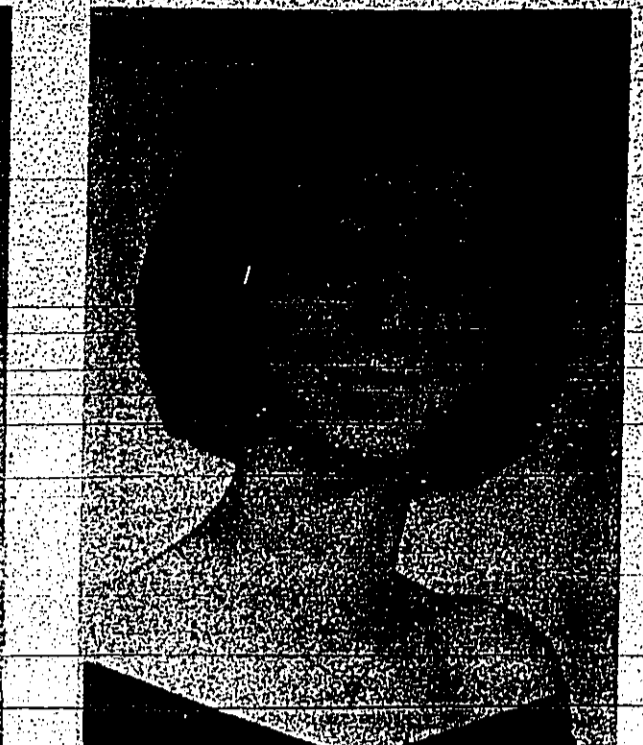
Yellow dotted Swiss with short puffed sleeves, a deep yellow velvet ribbon encircling the empire waist formed a bow with streamers in front.

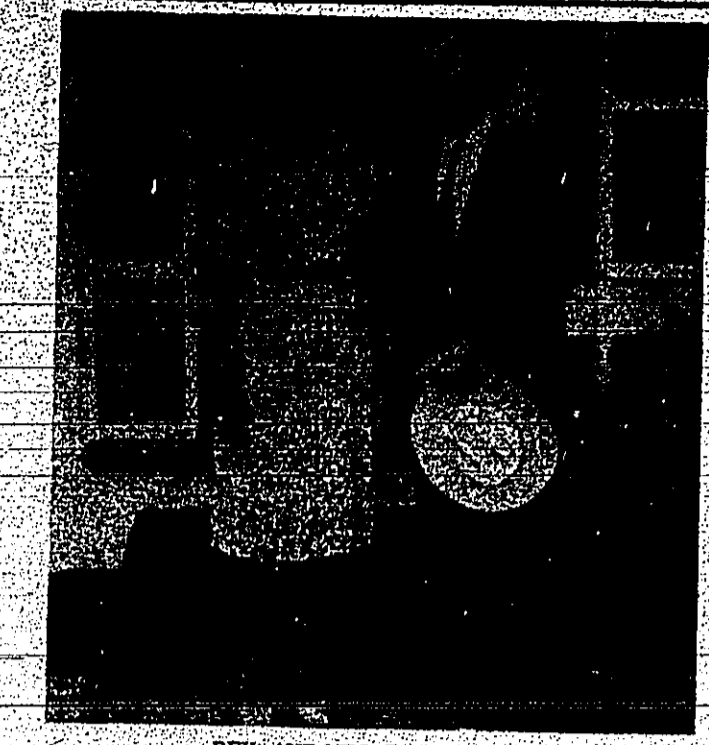

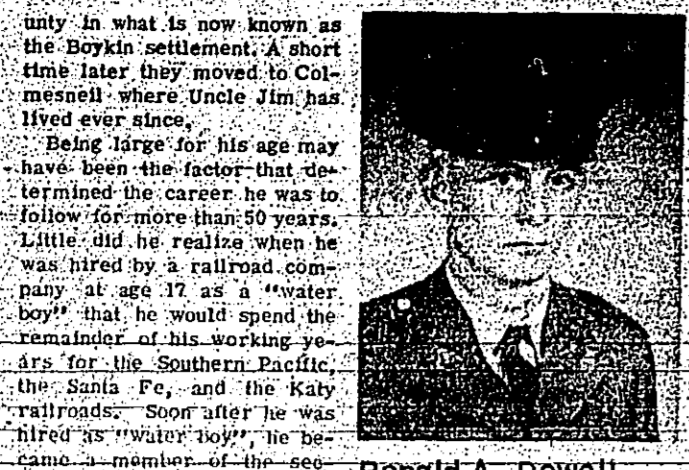
