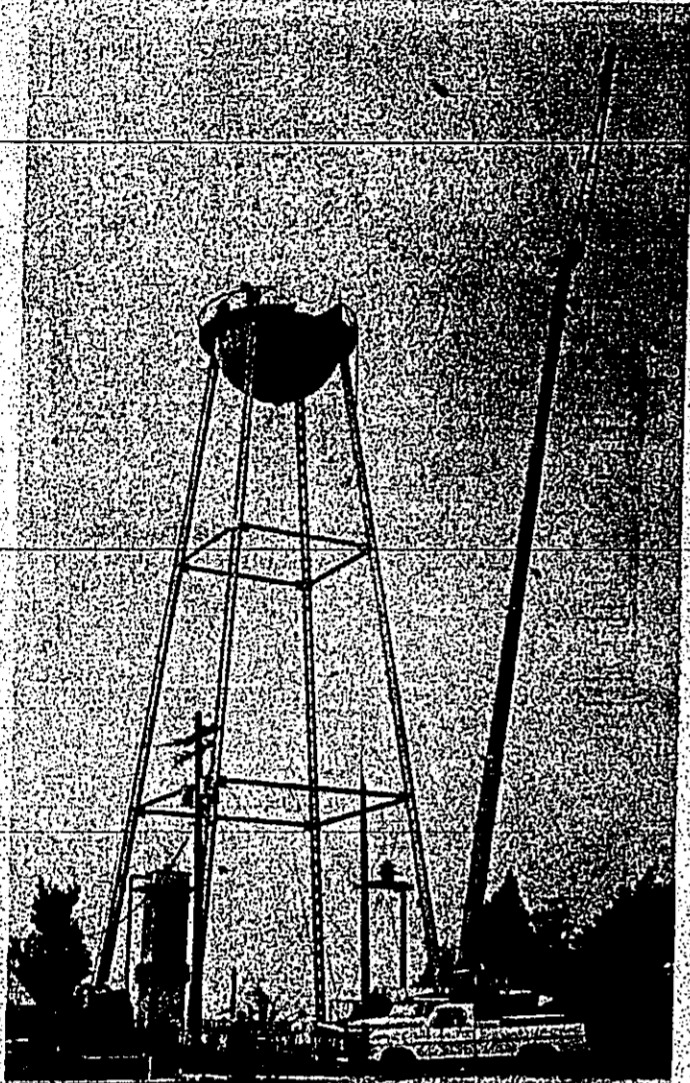

Old City Water Tower Comes Down

Workers for the contractor this week took down the old city water tower which has stood since the early 1930s over the little sheetiron building which served for almost as long as the city office.

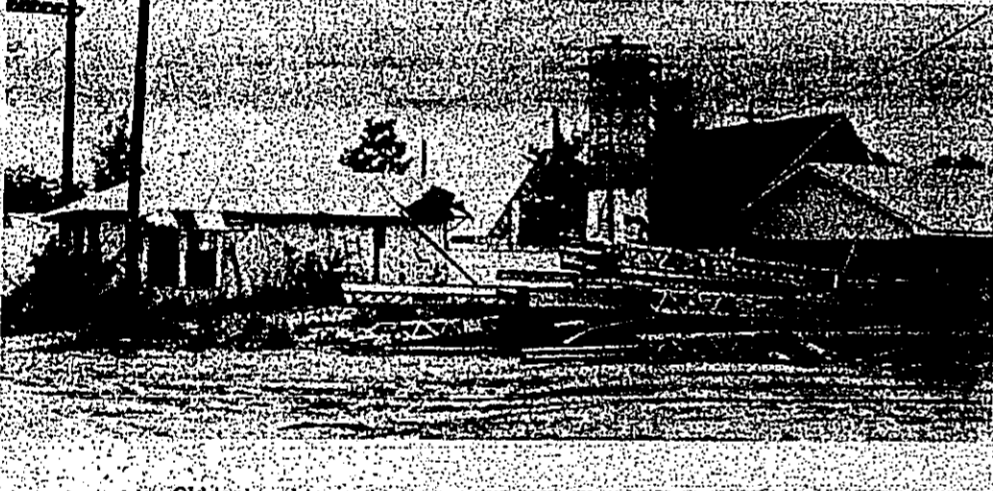
The water tower was erected in 1934 or 1935, as best as can be determined. The metal building was built soon afterwards and it was here that S. P. Sims, Sr. and the late Mrs. Sims attended to all the city business until the new city hall was built in 1952.

And would you believe that the city council regularly convened on meeting nights in the little building? Well, that's correct—but it was a roomful. The building will be torn down now that the water tower has been removed.

Mayors and councilmen from the time of the late Watt Barclay and Ezra Eaves through J. Wood Fahn attended to city affairs in the shed-like building. The present city hall was built in 1951 or 1952 during the incumbency of Mr. Fahn.

Today the city has improved its water supply system with new wells, a lower tank and ground tank off Pine street plus a new well and ground tank in the Southwest part of town.

Woodville has been one of the few towns that has not worried about its water supply during the extended dry weather.

Woodville Schools To Open August 30

The opening day for the schools of the Woodville Independent School District has been set for Monday, August 30, according to B. H. McGuire, superintendent.

Registration of kindergarten pupils, first grade pupils and senior high school pupils will be conducted Friday, August 27. Other elementary pupils and junior high school pupils will report for registration and instruction Monday, August 30.

Buses will operate a half-day schedule from 8:30-11:30 Friday morning, August 27, to transport kindergarten, first grade pupils and senior high school pupils who will require this service for registration.

Regular bus schedules will begin Monday, August 30. School lunchrooms will begin operation Monday, August 30. Price of lunches will be \$1.75 for a five-day meal ticket, or 40¢ per pupil if paid on a daily basis.

Teachers of the Woodville schools will begin a pre-school work conference Monday, August 23.

The calendar for the 1971-1972 school year calls for 180 days of instruction and 10 days of teacher work conferences. School will begin at 8:10 each morning and end at 3:15 in the afternoon.

First grade and kindergarten pupils must present birth certificates and vaccination certificates at the time of registration. Pupils born on or before September 1, 1965, are eligible to enter the first grade.

Five-year old pupils born between September 2, 1965, and July 1, 1966, will be eligible to attend the kindergarten provided they meet one of the two following qualifications: (1) family annual income of \$3,000 or less, or (2) be educationally handicapped to the degree that the pupil is not able to read or write with sufficient proficiency to function in the beginning of school to determine the degree of language handicap.

Pupils who have not registered or who are entering the Woodville schools for the first time are urged to register prior to the opening of school by calling at the office of the principal of the appropriate grade level.

Registration of pupils will be held on August 17 with buses running normal routes. New students should be accompanied by parents when they register.

Patrol Reports 87 Accidents in First Half of '71

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 87 motor vehicle accidents in Tyler County during the first six months of 1971, according to Sgt. C. L. Taylor.

During this period five persons were killed and 45 injured.

This is up from the same period in 1970, in accidents when the DPS investigated 75, but the number killed is the same, five, while the injury toll was less last year with 37 persons hurt.

In June of this year there were 12 rural accidents in which six persons were injured. There were no deaths.

In the 16 counties comprising District 2B, the patrol investigated 2,481 accidents during the first six months of this year. There were 37 persons killed and 1,262 injured.

General Rains Ease Drouth

A general rain throughout Southeast Texas which began falling early Monday night and continued Tuesday morning brought up to four inches of moisture to some areas of Tyler County.

The heaviest unofficial measurement was at Spurger where four inches was reported although the Texas Forest Service rain gauge in the area had only 1.82 inches.

The TFS gauge at Warren measured 3.30 inches. One inch was measured at Dies, Livingston 1.05, Segno 2 inches, and Saratoga 2.90.

The county has been dotted with showers, some of them heavy, during the past week. But this is the first rainfall that has fallen across the entire area for a period of several hours at one time.

The rain began about dark Monday night in the southern part of the county and slowly moved northward until it was falling across the entire county by bedtime. It continued Tuesday morning and sides were still cloudy in Woodville in the afternoon although no rain was falling.

However, the U. S. Weather Service had predicted more showers for Tuesday afternoon and night.

July rainfall at the TFS gauge here was only 5.92 inches.

The regular monthly meeting of the Long Leaf Soil Conservation District was held at 4 p. m. Friday at Wheeland's Cafe at Dam B.

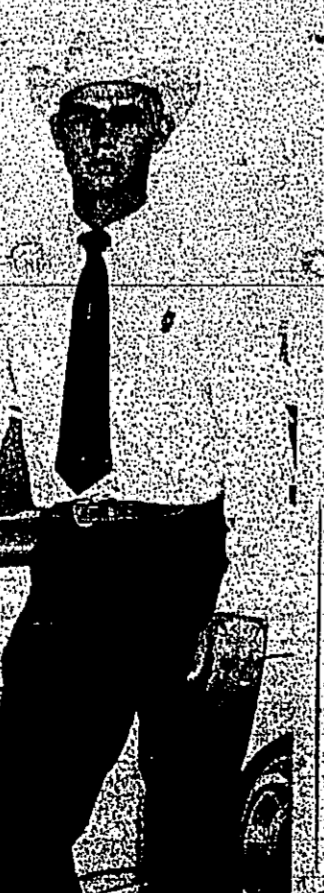
F. Sanderson, vice chairman, gave a report of the recent meeting of the Resource Conservation and Development Association which was held at League City and NASA near Houston.

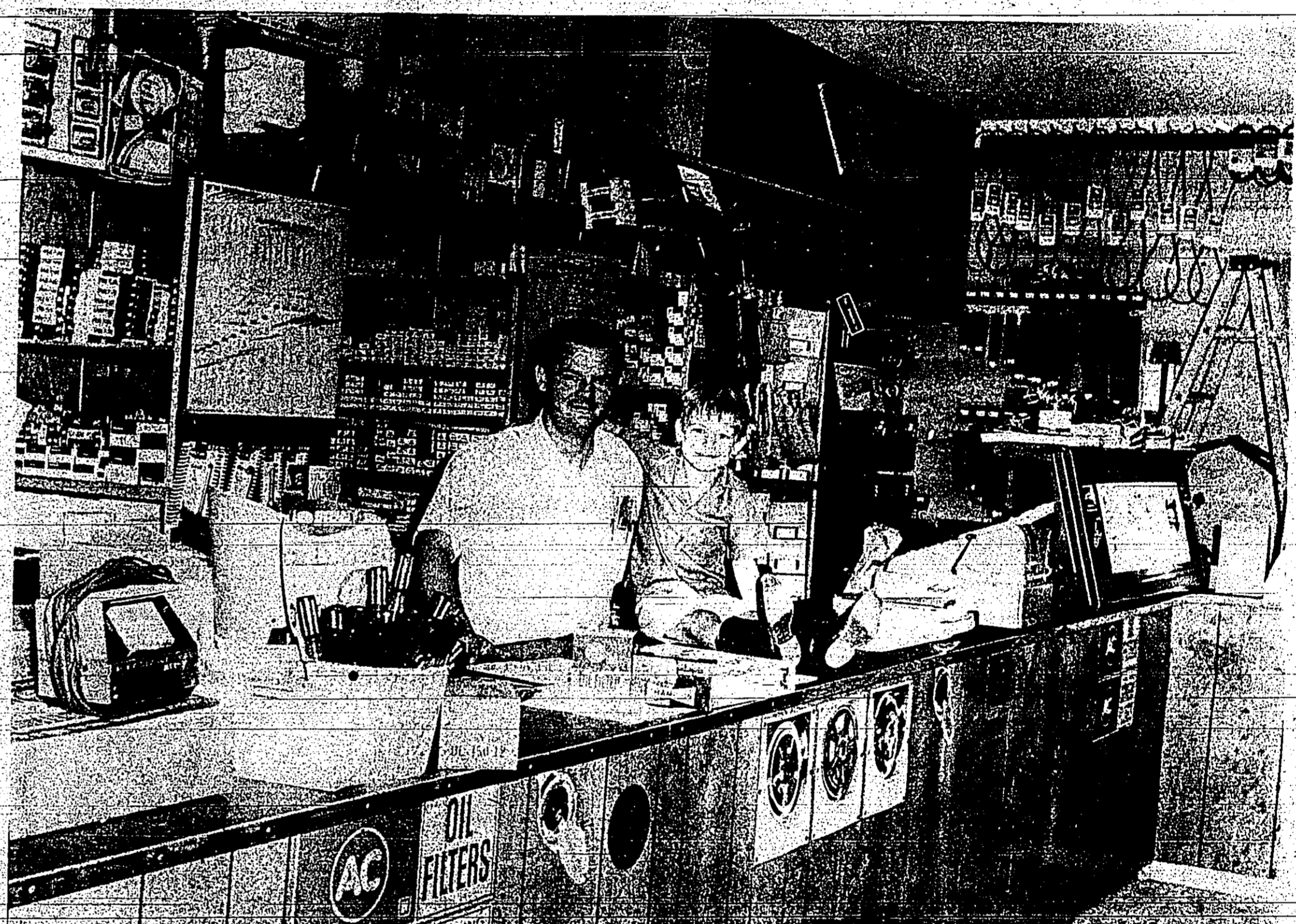

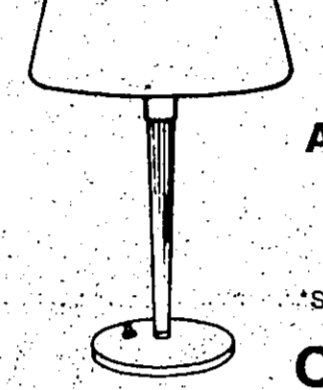

HOMEMAKING HINTS

FREEZING

AN OLD ART COMES BACK. A new system of freezing is now appearing on light bulbs to help you choose the best bulb for the job.

Freezing retains the natural color, fresh flavor and food value of most fruits, vegetables and meats far better than any other method of food preservation.

Summer is the best time to freeze fruits and vegetables while they are in season. To maintain quality and nutritional value during storage life, follow five keys for success:

1. Careful selection of foods to be frozen is important. For example, choose peaches which are fairly firm or only a trifle soft with skin color between red and yellow or at least creamy.

2. Speed in preparation is necessary. Promptness in handling, chilling and freezing any product helps retain quality. Prevent discoloration by adding a little powdered ascorbic acid or commercial anti-darkening preparation.

3. Proper packaging is important to keep food items from drying out and to preserve food value, flavor and pleasing texture. Use only freezing materials, such as glass, metal and rigid plastics that are moisture vapor resistant. Ordinary waxed paper, household aluminum foil and cottage cheese and ice cream containers, however, should not be used. They do not prevent evaporation.

4. Fruits and vegetables should be frozen soon after they are packed. After fruits, vegetables and meats are frozen, store them at 0 degree F. or below.

5. Frozen food undergoes "slow changes in storage and will retain its quality indefinitely. The length of storage time before loss of quality depends on proper handling before freezing, packaging material used, storage temperature and kind of food stored. Do not store frozen foods too long. Fruits and vegetables, for example, have a freezer storage time of not more than one year.

NEW LABELING TO AID IN SELECTION OF LIGHT BULBS

A new system of labeling is now appearing on light bulbs to help you choose the best bulb for the job.

The key words in the system, required by the Federal Trade Commission, are watts, lumens and bulb life.

The term "watts" will remain stamped on light bulbs to indicate the measure of power needed to operate the bulb. Watts do not necessarily mean how much light the bulb will give off. It simply means that a 100-watt bulb, for example, operated for 10 hours will use 1000-watt-hours of power or a kilowatt-hour.

"Bulb life" measures average hours a bulb generally operates before burning out. Conditions of use, such as excessive supply of voltage, excessive fixture vibration, rough wiring, loose connections, and so on, can reduce the rated life of the bulb.

In choosing bulbs, consider three basic areas:

1. If you require brightness for such as reading, sewing and studying, consider "standard" bulbs. They have a brighter light, but shorter life.

2. If you require convenience for hard-to-reach locations, such as a stairway light or a fixture needing removal and cleaning, consider the "long life" bulb. When you buy a "long life" bulb of the same wattage to replace a "standard" bulb, you will get less light.

3. If you require both brightness and long life, consider a "long life" bulb of the next higher wattage to replace the "standard" bulb. Generally, a "long life" bulb of the next higher wattage will give you the same amount of light.
