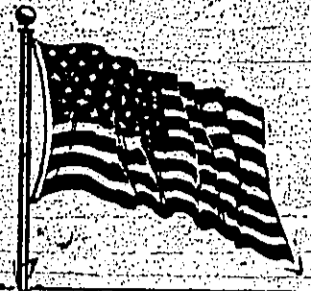

Distributive Education Classes To Begin

Classes in Distributive Education Cooperative Training are the most recent additions to the Kirby High School Curriculum, according to Superintendent B. H. McGuire.

These classes afford students of junior and senior standing both practical and theoretical training in the field of Distributive Education.

Practical work experiences are provided the student through part-time employment each afternoon at some cooperating business. The local school provides technical instruction on a supervised basis in specially scheduled classes.

The course is set up for two years of training and carries two or three affiliated credits for each year. Students receive wages comparable to those paid beginning workers in the same occupations.

Typical businesses acceptable in the program are: ladies and mens ready to wear, dry goods, hardware, food and furniture stores; mail order houses; auto parts, service stations, motels, restaurants, newspapers, radio, insurance, lumber yards and feed stores.

The program will operate under the direction of Mrs. Opal Walters, coordinator. Mrs. Walters will be responsible for the selection and placement of students and will correlate their practical and technical training.

An Advisory Committee of local business people will be organized to assist Mrs. Walters in organizing and operating the new program.

In commenting upon the new vocational program, Superintendent McGuire said, "We feel that the inclusion of this type of program will do much to provide the youth of our community with a well-rounded educational program that will fulfill the need for practical, down-to-earth training. It will enable that portion of our students who desire to be occupationally competent to enter full-time employment upon graduating from high school."

Students interested in this program are asked to contact Mrs. Walters at Kirby High School, Room 4, between 8:00 and 11:00 a.m. Monday through Friday beginning at this time. Council Names City Judge

The Woodville City Council at its meeting Monday night tabled an invitation to join the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, voted to make a \$10,000 payment on account to its engineering firm, and appointed a new city judge, among other things.

M. F. Alford appeared before the council to present the opportunities offered by membership in the East Texas Chamber. With barely a quorum present, Mayor Jimmy Freeman, Leroy Davis, Councilman Parks and Clay Miller, Councilman Miller made a motion that the matter be tabled until all councilmen were present.

Installation of two street lights were approved. Both are on South Beach Street, one near the Johnny Griffin residence and the other just south of Bluff Street.

David E. Pinnell, representative of Charles R. Hall and Associates, the city's engineering firm, presented a ledger sheet to the council showing expenses of \$25,925.38 for engineering work for the city including sewer and water plans for the proposed poultry plant which fell through, Cobb Mill Road, Chesserwood and other engineering work to date. City Secretary Walton Davis recommended that the city advance the firm \$5,000 this month and \$5,000 next month on the sum. Councilmen approved the recommendation.

The council voted to appoint T. E. Phillips to the position of city judge. City Secretary Davis has been acting as city judge but told councilmen he wanted out of the extra duties.

The engineering firm's representative gave the council estimates on extension of sewer lines west along and under Highway 190, which was \$38,000, and on the Chesser Highway at \$32,000. These extensions are being considered in the city's overall sewer improvement program, which would include another treatment plant. A grant of 55 percent of the cost of the plant may be available. The overall program would probably run \$600,000 or more. Councilmen told Davis to try to have complete figures on the program ready at the next council meeting.

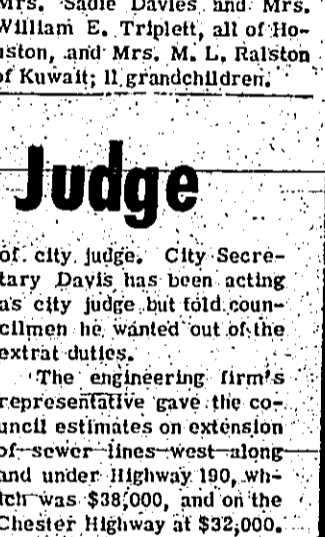

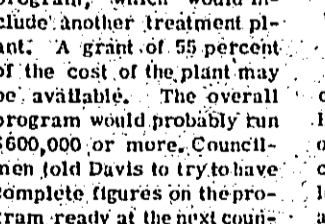
Tyler County had no fatal traffic accidents in July for the second consecutive month, according to Sergeant C. L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol.

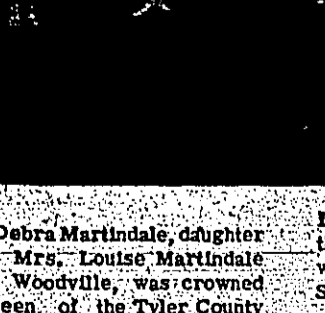
Milton Walters, right, is new president of Woodville Lions Club. Donald Duce is secretary. (Story at right)
