## 10,000 Spectators Observe At Sam Rayburn

5 POSITIONS OPEN

### Tyler County To Receive Probation Officer

Josiah Wheat, president of the Deep East Texas Development Council, was notified Monday, August 16, by Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, that a grant for a 6 County Regional Adult and Juvenile Probation Program has been funded by the Texas Criminal Justice Council for the Deep East Texas Region.

The Regional Probation Program includes the member counties of Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity, Tyler and Hardin working in joint effort for the provision of Adult and Juvenile Probation Services; Probation services will be provided to all those individuals adjudged to be juvenile delinquents by the courts of the participating counties as well as all adults placed on probation by said courts. The county judges of the five participating counties, Judge Peyton Walters, Polk County, Judge Tom D. Mann, Tyler County, Judge Emmett Lack, Hardin County, Judge J. V. Price, Trinity County and Judge J. R. Page, San Jacinto County, are to be congratulated. President Wheat remarked that this program is a remarkable demonstration of regional cooperation in the Deep East Texas Region.

Counties in the Deep East Texas Development Council are:

Angelina, Hardin, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler.

Funding is to cover a three year period with first year funding at \$59,258.00.

The Deep East Texas Regional Probation Department is accepting applications for positions with the department. One juvenile probation officer and two adult probation officers are needed. The minimum requirement for these jobs is a bachelor's degree in the social science area. Positions are also open for two secretaries. Applicants may contact Ronald Coleman with the Probation Department in the courthouse annex in Livingston or call 327-6272.

The program, which covers the five-county area of Tyler, Polk, San Jacinto, Trinity and Hardin, will begin September 1.

The 1971 International Invitational Bass Tournament was held at Hank's Creek Marina on Sam Rayburn Lake, and from what this paper could observe, it was an extremely successful boom to the economy of East Texas. The tournament itself was 3 1/2 days long with 480 professional fishermen fishing from 22 states of the nation, competing for \$50,000 of prize money.

The tournament was sponsored by Sports Inc. of Dallas, with assistance from The American Anglers Association of Houston.

During the three day period there were an estimated 2500 spectators each day, for a total of approximately 10,000 over the three and one-half day period.

The cities of Lubbock and Jasper gained economically from this tournament by persistence of their Chamber of Commerce, and by individual citizens cooperation. The Tyler County area which was omitted from this economic boom because, and we quote from a representative from Sports Inc., "We were unaware of your recreational facilities or the desire of your city to participate in the success of this venture."

Upon investigation, this reporter found that the Chamber of Commerce of our area had received no information about this tournament until the regular monthly meeting in August, at which time Jim Dillon and this reporter brought the details of the tournament to their attention. Further, it was found that the city of Woodville had not received any information of the tournament either.

The above series of events has caused this reporter to wonder why, since Woodville is the geographical center of at least three of the four major lakes of this area, that Tyler County and the city of Woodville was not contacted for such economic events as these. This reporter feels that, possibly, Tyler County is missing a good, clean economic boom by not making it known that we are a logical tourist area with our recreational facilities, such as the Indian Reservation and Heritage Gardens. This paper has determined that the drive from Hank's Creek Marina to the city of Jasper is not much more of a drive than it is to the city of Woodville.

We also found that, other than the lakes edge of Sam Rayburn, there are many more attractive attractions than any other area we have so far mentioned.

This reporter would like to see an all out effort made by the Chamber of Commerce, business and private citizens of Tyler County to attract this tourist business to Tyler County and its immediate areas, before the surrounding aggressive communities continue to take full advantage of the situation.

One of the thoughts that come to this reporter's mind is that possibly the Chamber of Commerce could sponsor a tourist bureau composed of representatives of Chamber of Commerce, city and county officials, interested citizens and businessmen to actively, twelve months a year, try to entice tourist dollars to our own economy. This is only one way, and I am quite sure that interested people, given the opportunity, could come up with fantastic advances towards this goal.

### Highway Patrol Announces New Bus Laws

Since school is starting, the Texas Department of Public Safety would like to remind the general public about the new bus laws. They read as follows:

Sec. 104. Overtaking and Passing School Bus. (a) The driver of a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside of a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle before reaching such school bus when there is in operation on said school bus a visual signal as specified in Section 124 of this Act, and said driver shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer actuated.

### Dam B--Or Where, Oh Where Is The Water?

That was the question asked by County Judge Tom Dick Mann when he and Commissioners Joe L. Bass of Precinct 1, H. M. Parks of Precinct 2, and James R. Jordan of Precinct 4 went to visit

with Charles E. Ferguson, reservoir manager for the Corps of Engineers. The commissioners court had decided to inquire why the water level on Dam B was down, yet most other area lakes were full.

It was explained to them that the water users required the water and that the order for the usage was given out of district headquarters in Fort Worth. It was further explained that the water level at Sam Rayburn must be held high because it is used to generate electricity for one of its uses.

The group of Tyler areas also toured the Dam B area to see why we have not received what they consider a fair share of parks to induce more tourists to our immediate area of East Texas.

Judge Mann stated he suggested that the Corps of Engineers and interested citizens of Tyler County stage an open house and old-fashioned barbecue for the general public. Judge Mann stated he will keep us posted on the progress of this most worthwhile endeavor.

This paper feels that the steps put forth by Judge Mann and all the commissioners should be highly praised. But this paper also feels it will take the support of every citizen of Tyler County to help accomplish what the judge and commissioners have started. We further feel that the State of Texas could be of extreme help to make this area one of the best recreational areas of the state. And we must encourage our state officials to help our country and city officials to its fullest degree.
