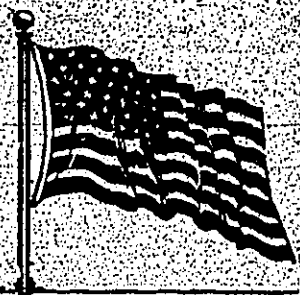

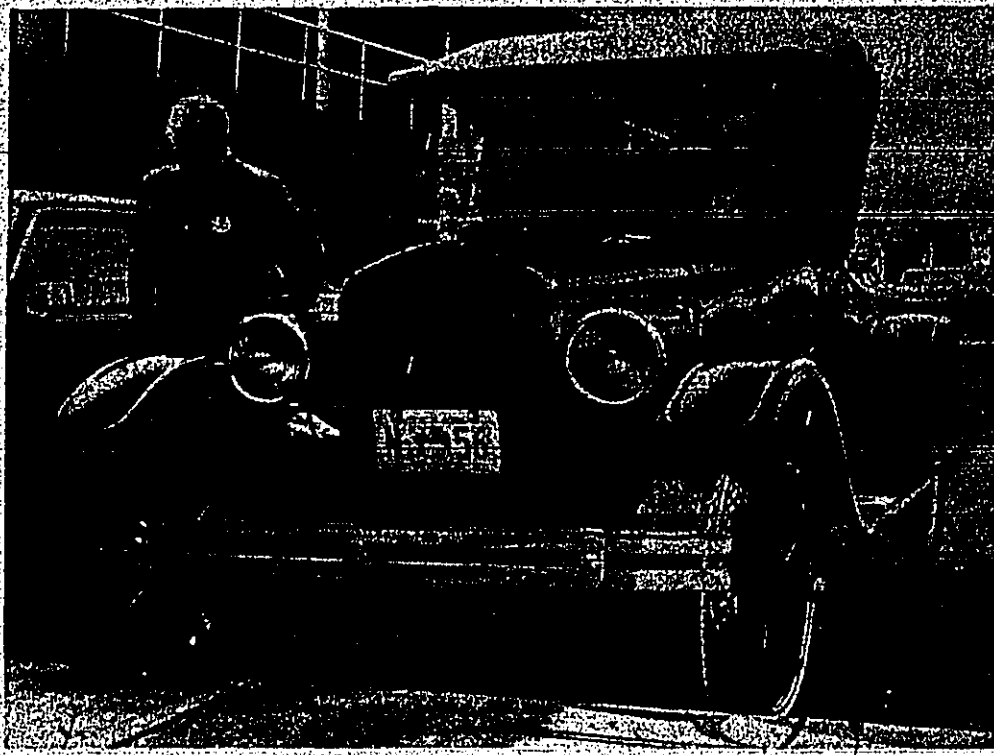

Vintage Autos Here Saturday, Sunday

Those vintage automobiles seen around Woodville Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning were part of an estimated 75 taking part in a Texas revival of the Glidden Tour, the original of which were run between 1904 and 1913 to demonstrate to a skeptical nation the reliability of the automobile.

This second annual Texas Glidden excursion from Houston to Woodville and return was sponsored jointly by the American Automobile Association and the Antique Auto Club of America. The antique cars rolled out of Houston Saturday morning, traveling a back road route leading through Dayton, Liberty, Rye and Yotaw to the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation where the drivers and passengers paused for lunch.

Most of them continued on to Woodville where they spent the night and began the return trip Sunday morning. The autos included various makes of both foreign and American-made cars built from the early twenties until the mid-thirties.

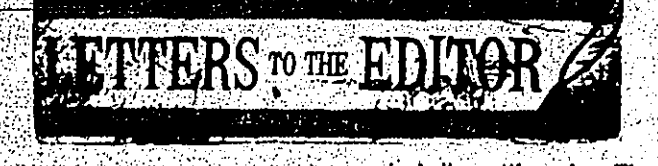

County Agent Reports

The consumer who reads an article of great interest in a paper grocery ad and sees even more most varieties in the store might be confused about the differences between veal, calf and beef.

The term "veal" describes meat from dairy and beef animals that are less than three months old and which have been milk-fed. This meat has a fine velvety texture and is grayish-pink in color.

Calf is the meat from animals that are older than three months. It has some surface fat and some degree of marbling.

Beef is the meat of animals that are at least one year old. It has a distinctive flavor. Aged beef costs more because it is held longer.

Another type of beef is called aged or ripened beef. This meat is held for a longer period of time, during this extra "aging" the exterior loses its red color.

In need of ripened beef, changes occur that make the meat more tender and juicy and help give it a distinctive flavor.

Gasoline stored on a farm or around a house can be a valuable convenience, but when stored longer than six months this convenience can turn into a troublesome, expensive problem.

The fuel contains a blend of several parts, one of which is extremely volatile and provides engines with easy starting. This ingredient also evaporates.

There are good retirement plans in force for most of our federal and state employees. Some examples from the federal level are retirement for all civil service workers and retirement for all federal departments of government and others.

Most all state employees have some kind of retirement benefit. All members of the Texas Highway Department have good benefits. Highway patrolmen and teachers have a fine retirement plan. All of these retirement are paid for in part by you, the people, through some form of taxes.

Now comes the forgotten person. These are our own elected county officials and county employees who are not under a retirement plan. It seems to me if teachers, state employees and national employees who need income at retirement age then our county officials and employees would come under

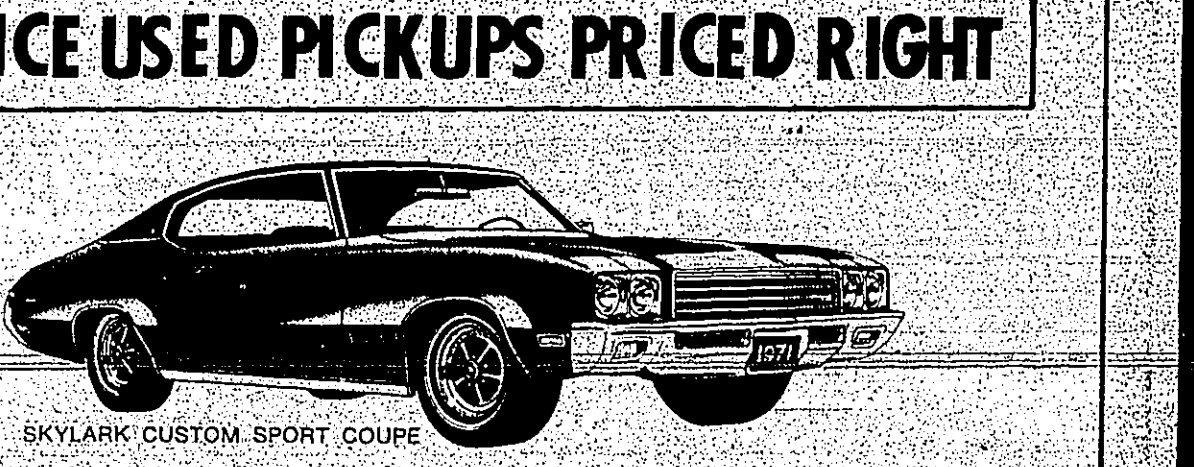

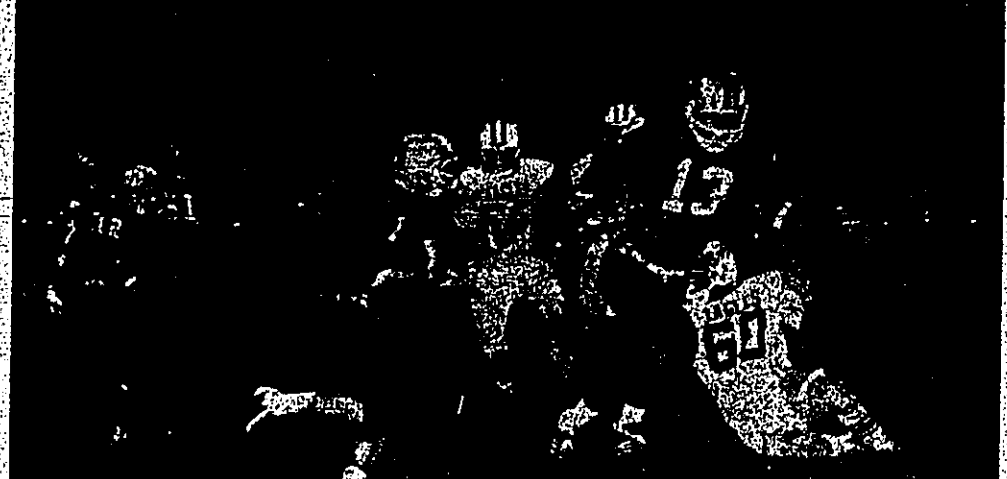

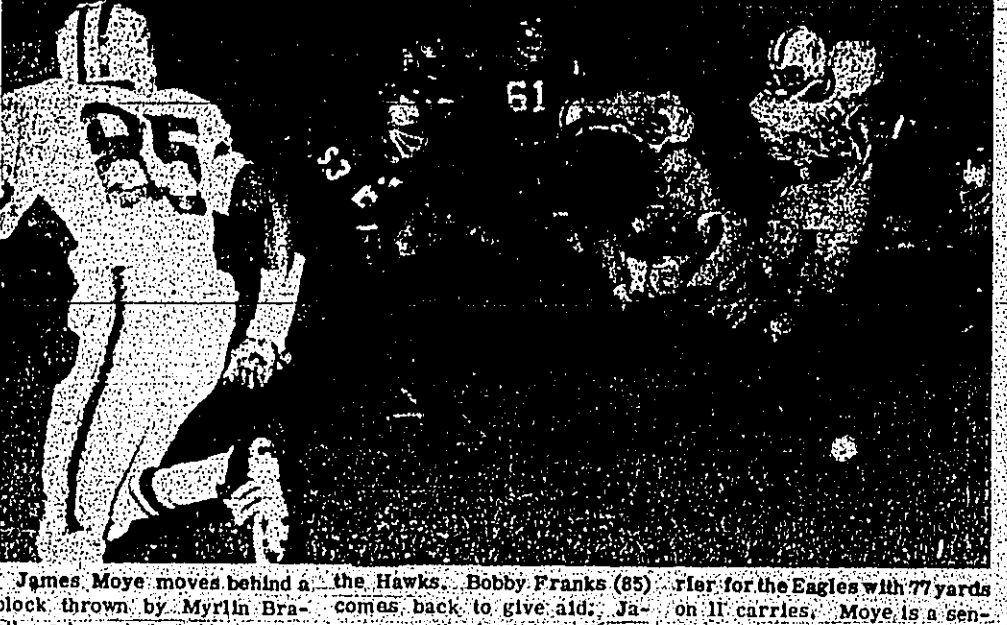
Waymon Berry intercepts a pass of the night against the Sabines. Passes, he also dropped one that was right up 92 yards and one touchdown.

Product Safety Standards Are Endorsed by Industry

Support for federal safety standards for common household products has been voiced by the National Association of Manufacturers. But the NAM warned that proposed legislation "will prove no monument to safety progress."

The industry spokesmen told the Senate Commerce Committee that "as far as we can determine, U.S. manufacturers overwhelmingly recognize the requirements of the federal government in the safety of products in national markets."

They also contended that faulty products cause only a small fraction of injuries and that most occur through the "hazards of human behavior." For these reasons, NAM predicted that the effect of the proposed legislation "will be minimal" in terms of lowering accidents and injuries.

Voluntary Action Praised

In accepting the objectives of proposed safety legislation, the Association called for "every opportunity to remedy any problems" through voluntary standards prior to imposition of mandatory rules and for extensive research and educational programs with regard to the use of consumer products.

The statement also asked for congressional and judicial protection in determining "the balanced public interest" and said, "there must be no one-way decision-making."

Principles Listed

Other basic principles adopted by the Association called for extensive research to establish a need for mandatory rules, and for the establishment of a professional, independent, bipartisan safety rules after a thorough review of product standards.
