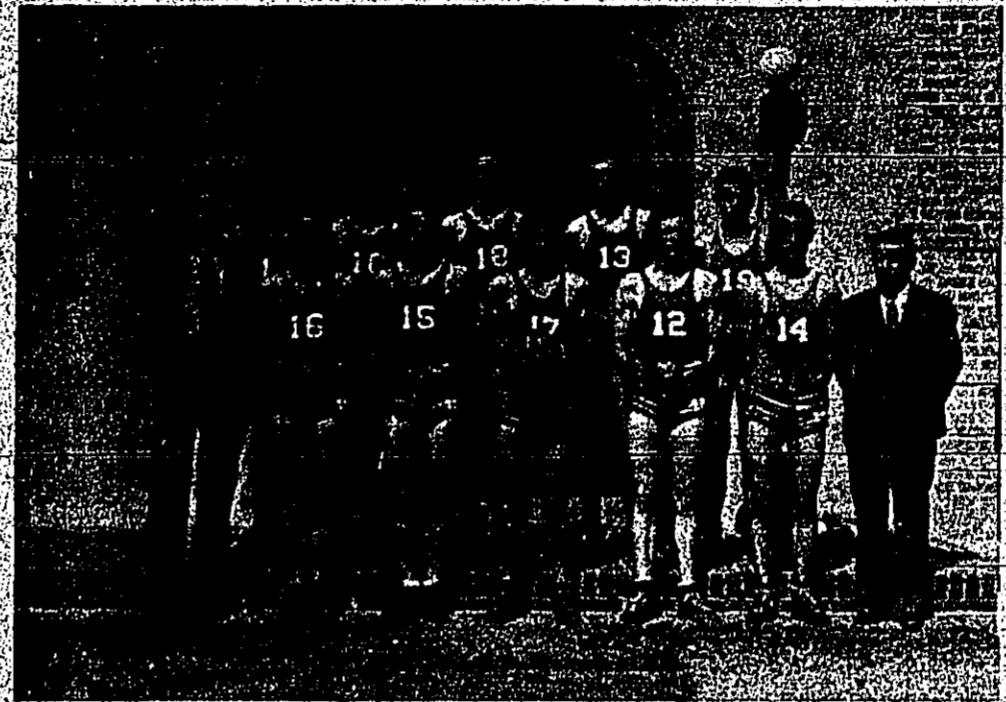

October 1. Mahan, 28, is a native of Colmesneil and graduated from Colmesneil High School in 1961. He served in the U. S. Navy from 1961 to 1965.

He attended Lamar University where he received his bachelor of science degree with a major in pre-law and a minor in geology.

Mr. Mahan worked for Gulf States Utilities Company as a surveyor and has been a logging contractor and in the hauling business.

Two Woodville business places were victims of burglars early Thursday morning of last week.

County Land fill Sites Approved

The three landfill sites for solid waste disposal which were recently selected by Tyler County commissioners court and the solid waste committee of the Tyler County Planning Committee were inspected Tuesday by a representative of the Texas State Department of Health.
