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# Chester, Colmesneil Battle To 0-0 Tie

It happened Friday night. The battle for championship honors in Class B football of Tyler County. And it ended up in a tie 0-0. Bulldog tacklers forced Chester to fumble nine times and recovered eight of them. Three times during the game the Yellow Jackets penetrated and were thwarted either by fumbles or a tough defensive unit of the Bulldogs.

Chester's defense did quite well. In fact, this writer would venture to say that they saved the team from disaster. They had to fight tooth and nail when the offense would have run the football over to Colmesneil in Chester's territory. They caused a fumble, intercepted a Colmesneil pass, and an end, Claude Deason, Chester turned back several attempts at the goal line.

Offensively the Yellow Jackets did quite well for themselves as they picked up 16 first downs and 245 total yards. Not as good as previous weeks which is a tribute to the fine defensive play of the Colmesneil Bulldogs. Kent Barnes was the leading ground gainer with 106 yards on 21 carries. He had one touchdown. 



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
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## JOHN ELLIOTT OUT FOR THE SEASON

The Booster learned Monday that star defensive tackle John Elliott of Warren will be lost for the remainder of the 1971 season due to an injury he suffered in a game with the New England Patriots. His mother told us that John will be in a cast for eight weeks and will not be able to walk for six weeks. John was one of three hurt in the game for the New York Jets. ## OUT OF THE ASHES EMERGES HENNINGAN

Out of the ashes of the worst year in Cleveland Indians history emerged a long absent but important department vital to the success of a ball club today—a bull pen crew. High-leader Phil Hennigan and left-hander Steve Mingo appeared in 63 games and Hennigan led the pitching staff with 57 appearances.

Hennigan recorded 14 saves, more than any Indian pitcher in six seasons. He led the rest of the staff by 10 and was credited with four victories. This he was part of 18 Tribe victories. This is almost one-third of the Indians total triumphs.

While it is expected that the Indians will trade heavily this winter, both Mingo and Hennigan are believed to be as hard to lose as the Indians' third baseman Greg Nettles and first baseman Manager John Lipon said.

"At least out of all this, we have got a bull pen with a future," Detroit Manager Billy Martin made it clear that he'd like to get Hennigan to bolster the Tiger pitching staff.

Hennigan hurled 62 1/3 innings, allowed 81 hits and 44 earned runs, 77 strikeouts. The left hander with an earned run average of 4.61. But one brutal outing against the Washington Senators July 5 destroyed his earned run average. Former manager Al Dark left Hennigan on the mound to absorb a humiliating defeat because I didn't have anyone else to put in and wanted to rest two other pitchers.

Hennigan, who didn't have "it" that day, was kept on the mound for three innings while he gave up 10 runs. Eliminating that one performance would reduce Hennigan's ERA by one whole run.

It started out in sorrow for the Indians 25-year-old relief pitcher. He was sent to Wichita in the final out in spring training and did not appear in a Tribe ball game until May 5 against the California Angels. The Vietnam medal winner was on the verge of giving up the game. But he decided to keep pitching much to the appreciation of the ball club.

Lifetime, Hennigan has appeared in 106 games, pitching 165 innings, winning 14 and losing 7 with 124 strikeouts and 99 walks. Lipon said, "Phil learned a lot this year. He is gaining confidence and should be one of the better relief pitchers next season. He and Mingo give us a real good left-right combination. A team we haven't had since Ray Narveski and Don Mossi."

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
