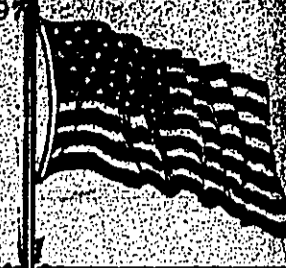

City Agrees To Highway 190 Water Line

Woodville City Council has adopted a resolution agreeing to furnish labor to install a 24-inch main water line along Highway 190 east to replace a smaller line which has been serving about 25 residences since 1956.

Removal of the small line has been made necessary by plans of the highway department to widen the right-of-way in an improvement program for the highway.

The small two-inch line was installed by private parties in the early 1950s to Woodville Lumber Company and in 1958 was extended eastward to serve several more residences along the highway.

Under the agreement the people being served will buy materials for the six inch line and the city will install it. The city will bill the customers individually for water used at each meter.

Another group of residents who live on Farm Road 1747 and who have been getting water service from a private line have agreed to furnish materials for a four inch main line to branch off the six inch line at the Highway 190 and FM 1747 east of town.

The agreement is contingent on the water users along the lines getting together and putting up the money for the materials.

The council approved the installation of two street lights—one on Griffin street and the other on Birch street.

Councilmen also discussed garbage collection, or the lack of it, by the present holder of a contract for pickup service in the city. The council looked up the quality of the service, which had been discussed at the past two meetings.

Wright Disposal Service has a contract with the city for the pickup of garbage both at residences and business firms with the city collecting for the service on a monthly basis. The contractor had asked for an increase in the amount paid him by the city and some councilmen voted the thought that perhaps the city could let the contractor. However, under the contract which expires in 1974, the city is obligated to purchase his equipment at an appraised price plus \$8,000 and councilmen felt the city was not ready to expend this amount of money now.

Another item brought up was the city's payment for a radio dispatcher at the sheriff's office from 12 midnight to 8 a.m.

In the original agreement this was to give the city and county 24-hour radio dispatching service but one councilman said the sheriff's office is not providing radio dispatching service during this period.

Mayor Jimmy Freeman named Councilmen Gardner Parks and Leroy Davis to confer with Sheriff Grady Ray in an effort to get the service restored.

SPURGER SCHOOLS GET GOOD START FOR 1971-72 YEAR

Spurger Independent School District opened the 1971-72 school year Tuesday, October 19, with a busy day of activities for the faculty and staff.

There is a slight increase in enrollment, addition of personnel, courses, services and equipment.

New faculty members include Mrs. Betsy Thyssen to head the English department, Mrs. Thyssen, the former Miss Susi Lowery of Woodville, is designated first year teacher, Mrs. Lydia Monk has joined the special education department as an upper level EMR teacher, Mrs. Monk, who lives in Sibley, is a former teacher in the Spurger School District. Miss Paula Davis, a Baytown, a 1971 graduate of Stephen F. Austin University has joined the Spurger Elementary faculty as fifth grade teacher, Mrs. Davis lives in Woodville. Remaining are the following teachers and administrators: Earl G. Sheffield, Jr., superintendent; R. Dale Coody, high school principal; H. K. Pitts, elementary principal; Harold Stanley, girls basketball coach and social science teacher; Phil Boyette, boys coach and civics teacher; Ray McLain, mathematics teacher; Miss Bertha Butler, business education teacher; Charles Holloway, vocational agriculture teacher; Mrs. Mary Boyette, home economics teacher; Mrs. Roberta Pitts, Title I teacher and librarian; Mrs. Kay Terry, first grade teacher; Miss Ida McCallie, second grade teacher; Mrs. Eunice McLain, third grade teacher; Miss Aulie Hill, fourth grade teacher; and Mrs. Betty McCallum, special education teacher.

The Spurger schools have a budget for the 1971-72 school year of \$269,289. The expenditures are broken down for administration, \$33,600; instruction, \$178,770; health, \$100; transportation, \$12,900; operation, \$16,450; maintenance, \$6,100; fixed charges, \$5,295; food service, \$2,000; student activities, \$500; and debt service, \$13,420. The assessed valuation of the district is 44% is \$6,961,000. The tax rate will be maintained at \$1.55, with \$1.45 for maintenance and \$1.10 for bonded indebtedness. Spurger will be one of the few schools that call for less taxes this school year than was collected last year. The total tax collection for the district last year was \$105,000 while the budget calls for a collection of \$107,500 this year.

The Vocational Agriculture boys are working on the completion of their new building. The building is a metallic construction sixty by one hundred feet, fourteen feet in height. The boys are currently paneling the inside walls and installing plumbing and ceiling materials. Through government funding, the building contains three new AC/DC welders with a hellarc attachment, a new DC welder, and a wide assortment of power and hand tools. Charles Holloway, vocational agriculture teacher, said an open house is planned as soon as the facility is completed.

The Spurger Pirates open their basketball season October 19 with Brookeland at the Spurger gym. Coaches Phil Boyette and Harold Stanley are expecting improved teams this year, paced by Herbert Castle, Tommy Jordan, Arnold Hutton, John Grissom, Doug Roberts, and Steve Sheffield on the boys team and Judy Sheffield, Hanelle Hancock, Eve High, Sharon Gill, Marilyn Odom, and Charlotte Hancock for the girls team.

Jack Stansbury of the architectural firm of Moore, Stansbury and Wyatt, Port Arthur, presented the preliminary plans and architect's drawings of the proposed additions to the buildings on each campus.

The board will meet later this month to hear cost estimates of the proposed work.

In other business the board approved the September financial statement, received the tax collector's report, and adopted a revised hiring policy to conform to recent federal court decisions.

Voter Registration

The new year-round voter registration law passed by the last session of the Texas legislature became effective October 1.

Those voters who registered last year will receive by mail a card from the county tax assessor-collector. This must be filled out and returned to the tax office which will then mail a registration slip to the voter. This will be good for as long as the voter casts a ballot in each three-year period.

Eighteen to 21 year old persons may register and are eligible to vote in local, state and federal elections. The new law also legalizes the deputizing of registration deputies who may register persons qualified to vote in their area, in plants, apartments, or other places.

To be eligible voters must have lived in the state of Texas for one year and in the county for six months.

142 Accidents Listed By Highway Patrol In First Nine Months

Sergeant C. L. Taylor of the Texas Highway Patrol in his monthly summary of traffic accidents reports that in Tyler County during September there was one rural accident in which three persons were killed and 17 other mishaps in which 13 persons were injured.

The DPS lists a rural accident as one which occurred outside of incorporated towns.

The September figures bring the total of rural accidents investigated by the Highway Patrol in the first nine months of the year to 142 with eight persons killed and 78 others injured.

During the same nine month period in 1970 there were 116 rural traffic accidents killing seven and injuring 47 persons.

During the month of September in the 16 counties comprising District 2B the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 424 rural accidents in which 19 were killed and 193 persons injured.

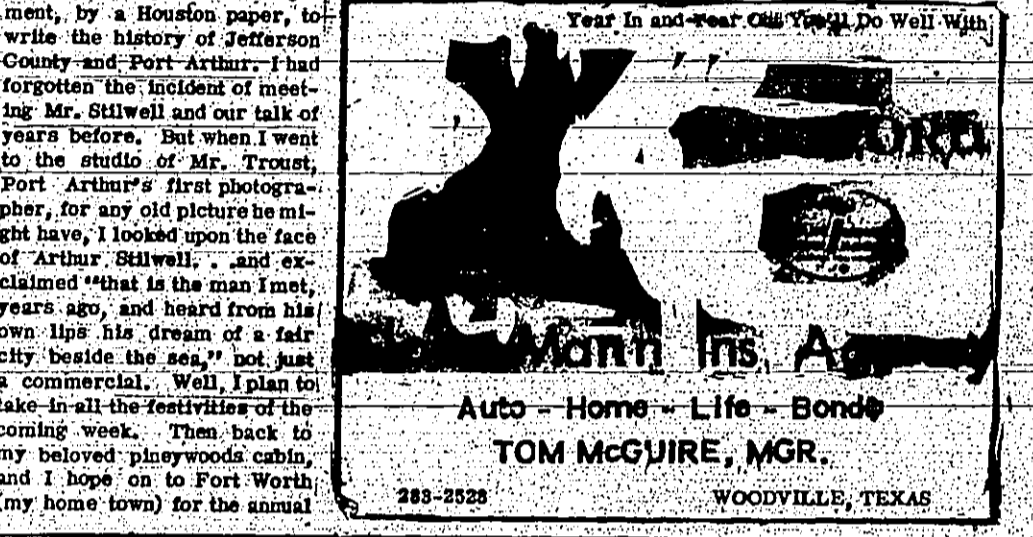
America Still Is... ONE WOMAN'S OPINION

Mrs. L. H. Johnson is Honored With Birthday Dinner

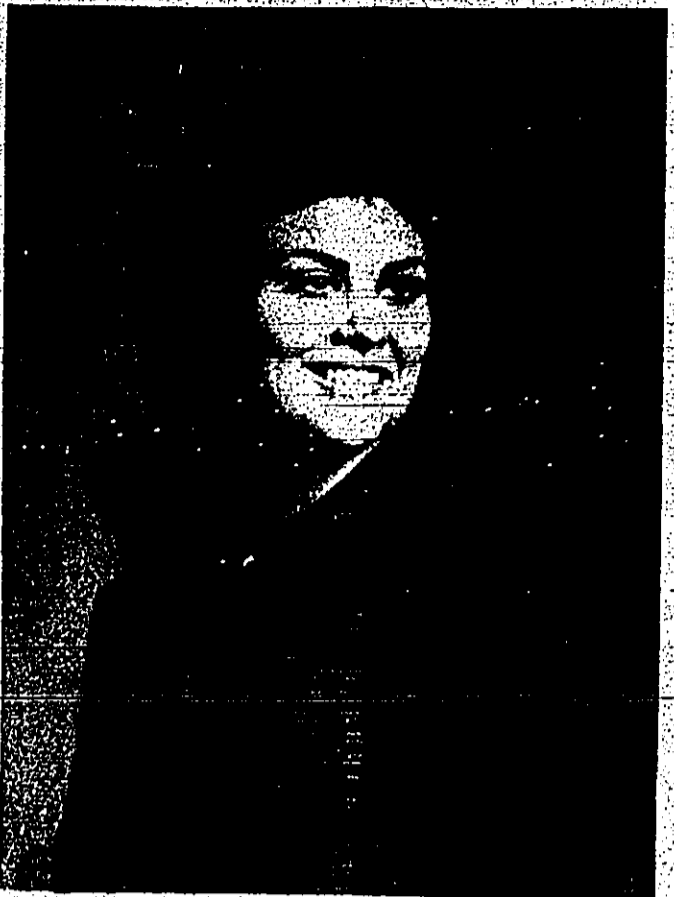

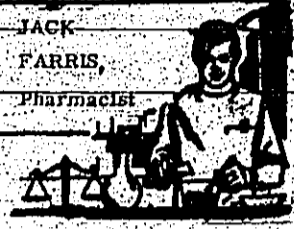

The working women of Tyler County are being honored this week (October 17-23) during the nationwide observance of National Business Women's Week.

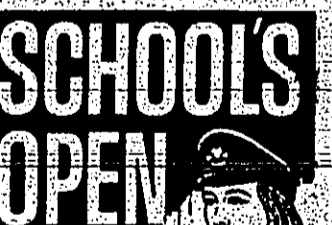
