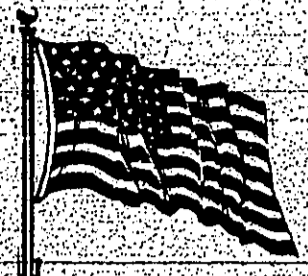

Vandalism Deplored

School and county authorities are investigating several acts of vicious vandalism which occurred Halloween.

Besides the traditional "wrapping" of the homes of several teachers, other more damaging acts of actual vandalism are under investigation. One of these is the cutting of a brake line on one of the Woodville school buses.

Had the driver failed to examine the bus before beginning his run, this act could have resulted in serious injuries to children riding the bus.

The following letter expresses the views of teachers regarding some of the actual acts of vandalism:

An open letter to the parents of Woodville students:

During the past weekend the teachers of both Wheat Junior High and Kirby High School suffered malicious damage to their homes, cars, and other property. This damage extended beyond the useless rolling of toilet tissue, an act to which most of the faculty does not object. However, the "merry-making" of Woodville's secondary students has now extended to the throwing of rotten eggs and eggs filled with permanent ink, the spreading of cow manure, the filling of air conditioners with flour, and the cutting of ruts in lawns by motorcycles.

I have heard many remarks that the damage was done by students of low income families. Contrary to this, the majority of the damage was inflicted by the students of some of Woodville's most "respectable" families. Furthermore, many of the students involved were "leaders" of the high school organizations and student body.

It is time to call a halt to such activities because some of the students are hurt either through the reckless driving of their escape from the scene of the damage or through the self-defense procedures which many of the teachers are now considering. Civic action in the form of city ordinances and arrests can only curb a small fraction of the damage and this type of action does not get to the real root of the problem. Charges are being pressed against several persons and certainly, with just cause.

It is time for the parents of our students to teach their children about respect for other people's property and respect for the adults who work hard to educate them and then are repaid through vandalism. I believe that many of the parents did not even know what activities their children were engaged in this weekend. Ask them; you might be surprised!

Please take this letter as a warning that next Halloween those of us who stood by and suffered at the hands of your children in years past will not be willing to do so again.

Heritage Garden To Be Featured At State Meet

Clyde E. Gray, curator of Heritage Garden Village, will be one of two panelists at the sixth annual Governor's Conference on Tourist Development.

The meeting this year will be held at the Inn of the Six Flags at Arlington November 10 and 11. This is the first time that the conference has been held outside of Austin.

Gray was selected because he has developed an individually owned tourist attraction that has focused both state and national interest on East Texas and especially the Woodville area.

The topic of the panel discussion will be "Developing Community Attractions."

It is felt that Gray's experience in the Woodville project will help other communities short-cut their way towards participating in the multi-million dollar tourist business in Texas.

County Tax Values Up \$10 Million

Tyler County Commissioners' court sitting at the county board of equalization adjourned last week after a long and tedious series of hearings on property revaluation in the county.

The final meetings with the large land companies was concluded before adjournment with all companies except two accepting increased valuations which will add approximately 10 million dollars in tax valuation to the taxable property in the county.

Companies which did not agree to the raise in valuation were two subsidiaries of EastTex, Inc., Jasper Timber Company and Southwestern Timber Company, according to County Judge Tom D. Mann.

The county tax office is now busy tabulating the values and will have an accurate figure when this is completed on the amount of increase in valuation.

Equalization Board Adjourns

The Tyler County Chamber of Commerce at its regular meeting Monday noon at the Pickett House heard reports on progress of the new Little League Ball Park, the Small Business Administration Workshop held October 20, and a summary of the Governor's Conference by M. F. Alford.

A new member, Hank Sharp, manager of the new Dairy Queen here, was introduced by Wyatt Bell, president. Also welcomed were Mr. and Mrs. John Smitley who were present for the first time since becoming members.

Toby Spurlock told of the progress on getting the work started on the new Little League Ball Park. Mr. Bell appointed a committee to assist him and asked that the Lions, Rotarians and Kiwanis clubs name someone from each club to assist in the project.

The SBA community workshop was attended by 48 persons from Tyler County, Mr. Bell said, and was very beneficial to all who attended.

The president also named a nominating committee to pick candidates for directors whose terms are expiring. Bob Bell was chairman of the committee and other members are Tom McGuire, Jim Gahney, Fred Sullivan and Robert McCombs.

A new city map which has been brought up to date by J. B. Goffman was shown. The City of Woodville had ordered 1000 copies, and the chamber voted to purchase another 1000.

C of C Directors To Be Named

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Newton Judge To Head DETDA

W. Q. Adams, Newton county judge, was named president of the Deep East Texas Development Association for the coming year at the meeting Friday at Pine Hills Country Club.

Carl Fairchild of Chester, who has served as president for the past year, presided at the meeting.

Other new officers, besides Adams, are Troy Mitchell, first vice president, John Batts, second vice president, and Bill Miranda, secretary.

The group heard reports on the progress of roads in the area of the lakes including FM 275 across to US 87, US 96 North from present construction north of Jasper, and a report on the development of recreational areas on Toledo Bend Lake. Also Neal Pickett, executive director of the Deep East Texas Development Council gave a progress report on requested grants on several projects including technical assistance on the study of a canal to connect Rayburn and Toledo reservoirs, low rent housing situation, the help of funds due to the economy, and the multi-county correctional centers which are a long-standing project.

Criminal Justice Council, Mr. Pickett said, that in the meantime the counties must begin improving their jails.

In connection with the jail, Leon Adickes said that the Sabine County jail at Hemphill is probably the only jail in Texas which still has a gallows in it.

The fire ant problem was taken up and the group voted to urge statewide action on it.

It was mentioned that it is hard to get anyone interested in the problem until they have been stung by one of the poisonous ants, and it was suggested (facetiously, perhaps) that a jar of the ants be gathered and dropped on the capitol grounds at Austin.

On a motion by Arthur Temple, the DETDA passed a resolution commending the service of the late Paul Wilson had given to the organization.

John Hannah, state representative from Lubbock, was the principal speaker at the meeting. His topic was the need for legislative reform in Texas, especially the House of Representatives. He said the only word to describe the last session of the legislature was "pitiful."

Hannah said the legislature failed to act on three great needs—a new criminal code, pollution laws, and a bad check law. He said that the legislative session resulted in too many mistakes being made in the last-minute rush of business.

Hannah said that legislative reform will not be accomplished by the enactment of one or two measures. He said that the outdated rules under which the House of Representatives operates allows one or two men to run the show instead of the entire house membership of 150. He said the Texas House is no longer a parliamentary body.

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Hannah suggested that the House adopt a limited seniority system, something along the lines of the U. S. Congress. He said the Texas Legislative Council could give the power to refer bills to the appropriate committees.

He said one of the most important reforms needed is in the conference committee which he estimates has cost the taxpayers \$70 million in the last two sessions. The conference committee, composed of five members of the House and Senate, has as its purpose the resolving of the differences in the appropriation bills passed by each house, but more often will rewrite the entire bill. Last session, he said, the committee added \$20 million for items which had never been discussed in either house.

County Voters To Get Applications By Mail

Tyler Countians who were registered to vote last year will receive an application through the mail which they can fill out and mail by bringing to the county tax office. Their registration certificates will then be processed and mailed to them.

Tax Assessor Jerry Mahan warned those receiving the application through the mail that it must be returned intact—no part should be torn off although there is a perforation which might tempt some to do so.

New residents and new voters should pick up an application for registration at the tax office.

Under the new law on voter registration, qualified persons may register throughout the year, except for periods of 30 days prior to an election. To be eligible a person must have lived in Texas for one year and in the county for six months.

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Teleservice Speeds Up Social Security Checks

Several months ago the Social Security Offices over the nation began making extensive use of the telephone in handling practically all Social Security matters. B. R. Young, field representative of the Lufkin-Haley, reports that there is almost no limit to the use that can be made of the telephone in taking care of Social Security business. For example, Young explained that many people are now filing claims for all types of monthly Social Security benefits, including disability, by telephone. They are also signing up for Medicare cards as well as making claims for Medicare reimbursement after they have had expenses under Medicare. "The kind of reports, such as change of address, death, loss and non-receipt of checks, work, disability, etc., can be handled by telephone. The Texas Water Quality Board has been designated the State's water pollution control agency. Field personnel will be benefited on problems in the 43 county area comprising TWQB districts 6, 7 and 12 with field offices in Orange, Deer Park and Corpus Christi. Heavy emphasis will be placed on industrial water control. The Water Quality Board area is located in Orange.

September Savings Bond Sales in County Total \$23,341

According to a report received from County Bond Chairman, David P. Young, sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Tyler County during September totaled \$23,341. Nine-month sales were \$77,311 for 77 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$100,000. Sales in Texas during the month were \$15,465,123 compared to \$15,033,393 during September, 1970. The January-September sales totaled \$152,382,599 with 84 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million achieved. Nationwide, purchases of Series E and H Savings Bonds totaled \$45 million-18 per cent above 1970 sales. The January-September sales were the best since 1952 totaling \$4,174 million -- 18.2 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$197 million were reported for the first nine months of 1971 -- 8 per cent above those exchanged in 1970.

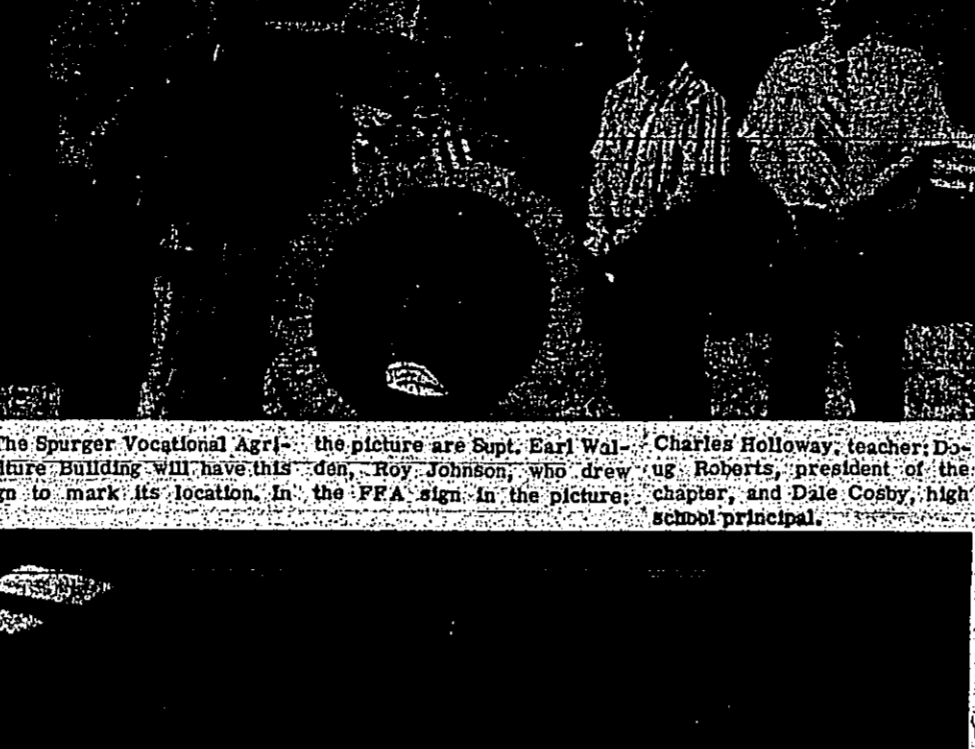

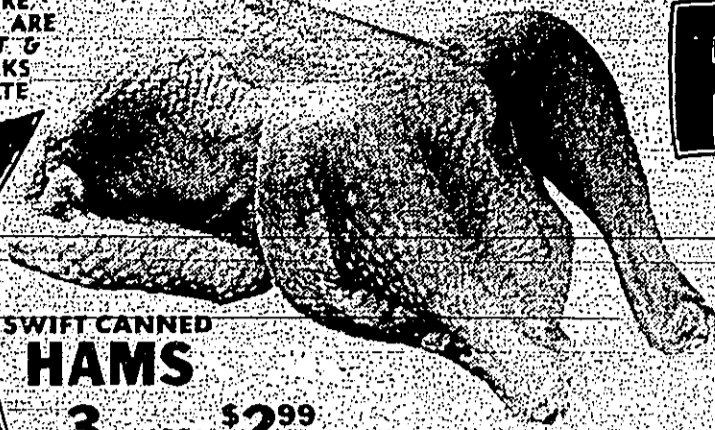

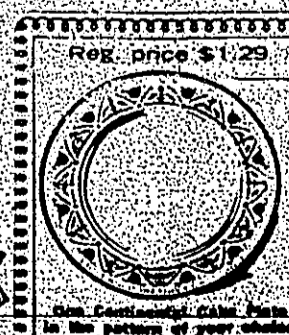
