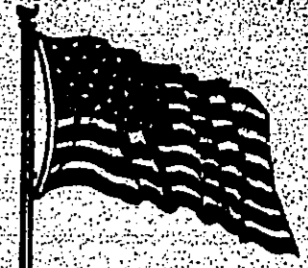




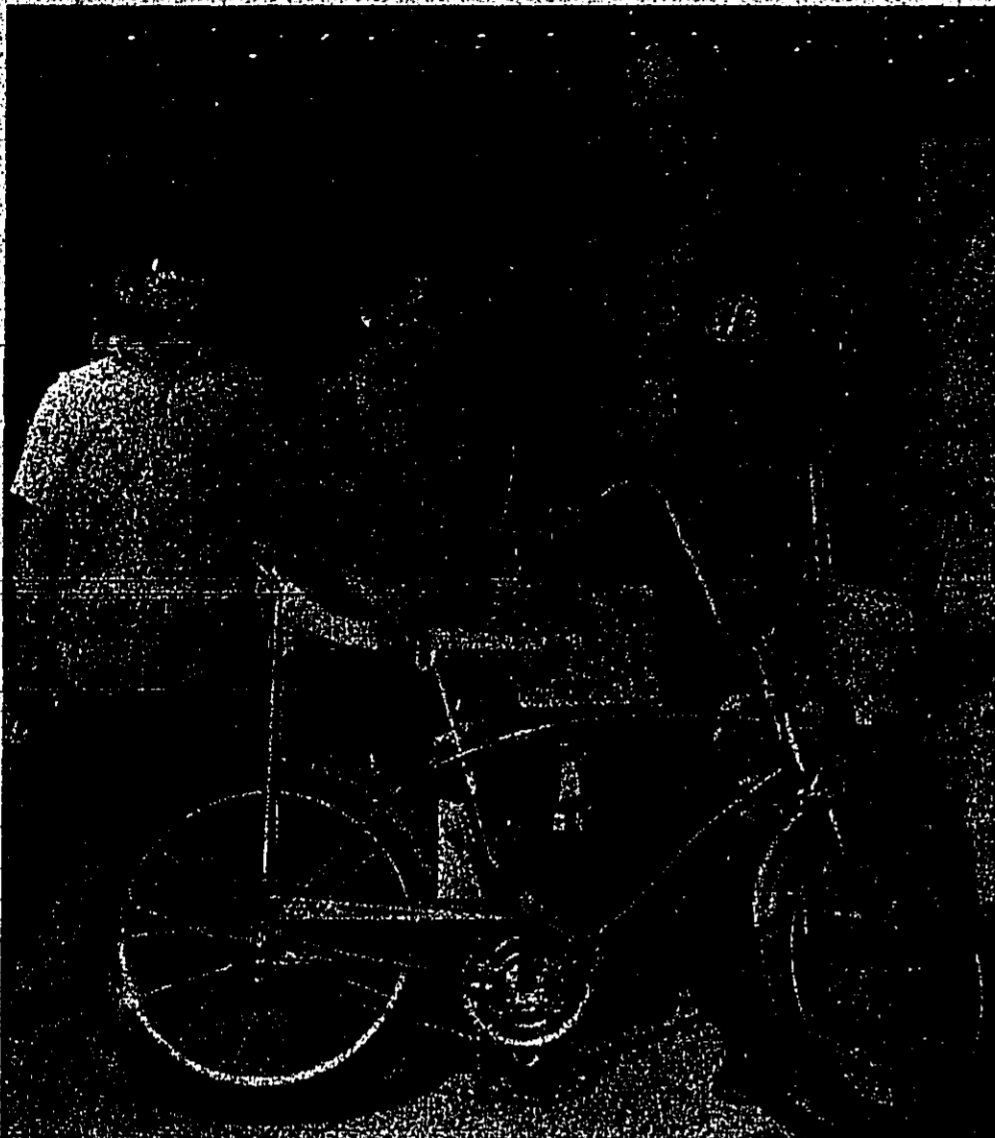

Woodville School Bond Election Set December 11

Band Continues To Win \$100 In Prizes Offered For Widest Spread Of Antlers

On Saturday, November 6, the Kirby High Band marched in the Stephen F. Austin homecoming parade and received the outstanding band trophy for the third consecutive year. There were approximately seven class AA bands entered.

Saturday, October 30, the band also marched in the Sam Houston homecoming parade and drum major Rhonda Sloan received the trophy for outstanding drum major of the entire parade. After the Stephen F. Austin parade, the Kirby High twirlers left for the Regional UIL Twirling Contest held in Liberty. Here they won a total of eighteen first division medals, seven solo medals, eight quarter medals and three trio medals. Pictured are the winners in various contests.

Local business firms, Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, and the Tyler County Booster have joined in a "Widest rack" contest for deer killed in Tyler County with a total of \$100 offered in prizes.

The first prize will be \$50 for the deer with the rack which measures the widest with second prize of \$25, third prize \$15, and fourth prize \$10.

Deer hunters who bag a buck with a wide set of antlers should bring it by the Booster office at 104 South Charlton where the rack will be measured for the contest. The winners will be announced in the Booster dated January 6 and cashier's checks mailed to the lucky hunters.

Business firms cooperating in the contest are Western Auto, Mack's Discount Auto Parts, Sullivan's, Office Supply Center, United Portable Building, Clemmons Insurance, Chester State Bank, North Magnolia Drive Grocery, Birdwell's Machine & Welding, Jarrott's Pharmacy, Boykin Lumber & Supply, White Auto Store, J. B. Best & Company, Globe-Mann Insurance Agency, Citizens State Bank, KVLL Radio, and others who are expected to assist later.

The only rules in the contest are that the buck deer must be killed in Tyler County and that it must be legally killed. And to enter the contest the deer must be brought by the Booster office for measurement. A picture of the deer and the hunter will be made for the Booster at the same time. An 8 x 10 glossy print will be made for each hunter entering the contest.

Tyler County residents are urged not only to enter the contest but to tell friends and relatives who are hunting in the county. As long as the deer is killed in Tyler County everyone is eligible.

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District have called an election for the issuance of \$800,000 in negotiable coupon bonds for December 11.

The election will be held at Kirby High School with R. E. Allison, Sr. as presiding judge and W. A. Parker as alternate presiding judge.

The trustees have had a Fort Arthur architectural firm making tentative plans for improvements and additions at Woodville Elementary School and Kirby High School and have consulted with a representative of the firm at several recent regular board meetings.

Purpose of the bond issue is to add classrooms and improvements on both school campuses. The increase in enrollment and the condition of the Woodville Elementary buildings and campus was given as the reasons for the needed additional classrooms and improvements.

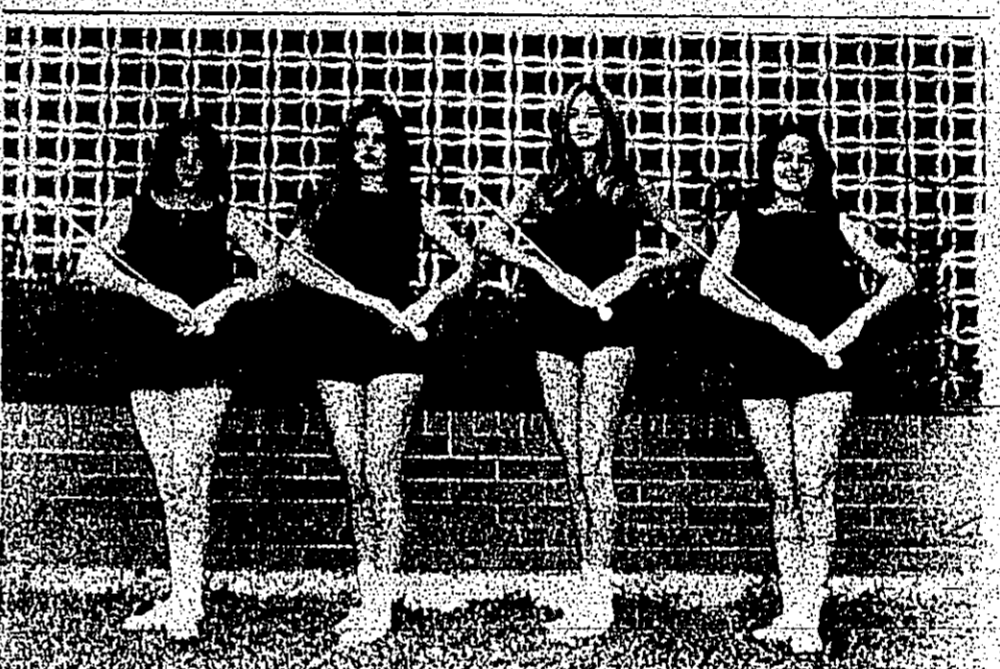
Besides classrooms, the Woodville Elementary campus improvements will include the addition of coverings over walkways so that pupils can walk from classrooms and to buses under covered walkways in inclement weather.

Architect's sketches of the additions and details of the improvements will be carried in the Booster in following editions previous to the bond election.

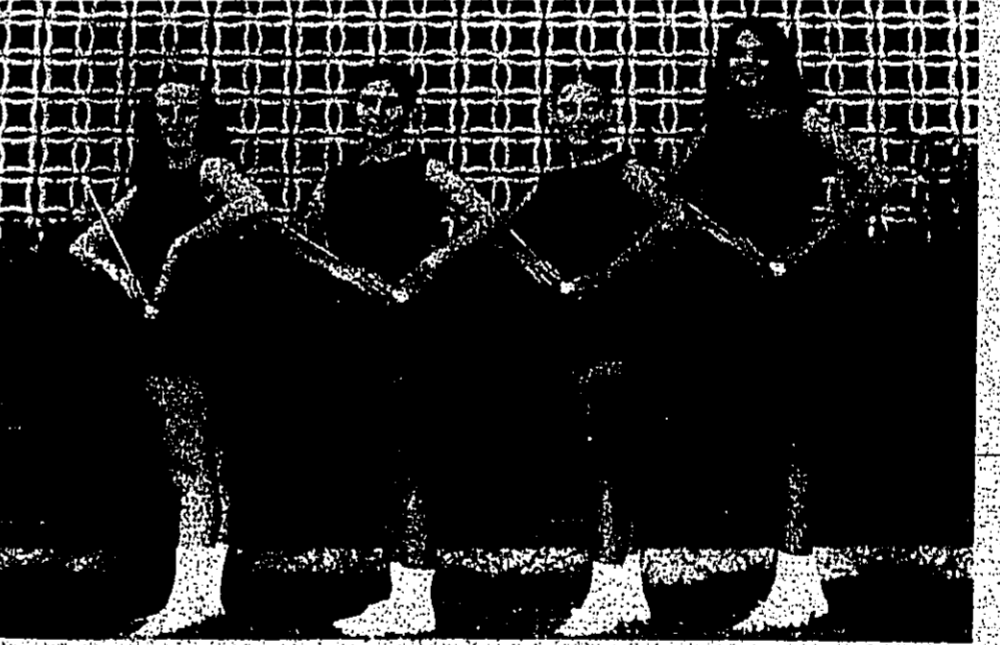
Annual Thanksgiving Supper At Warren

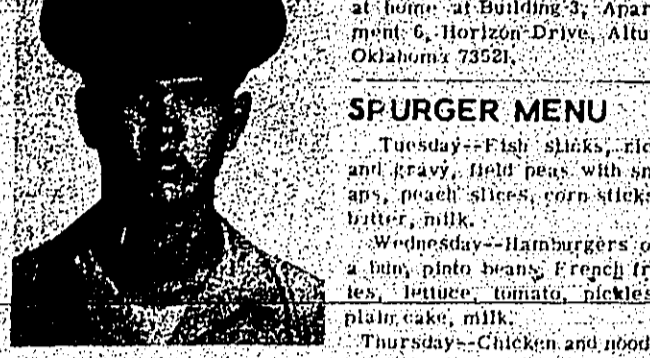

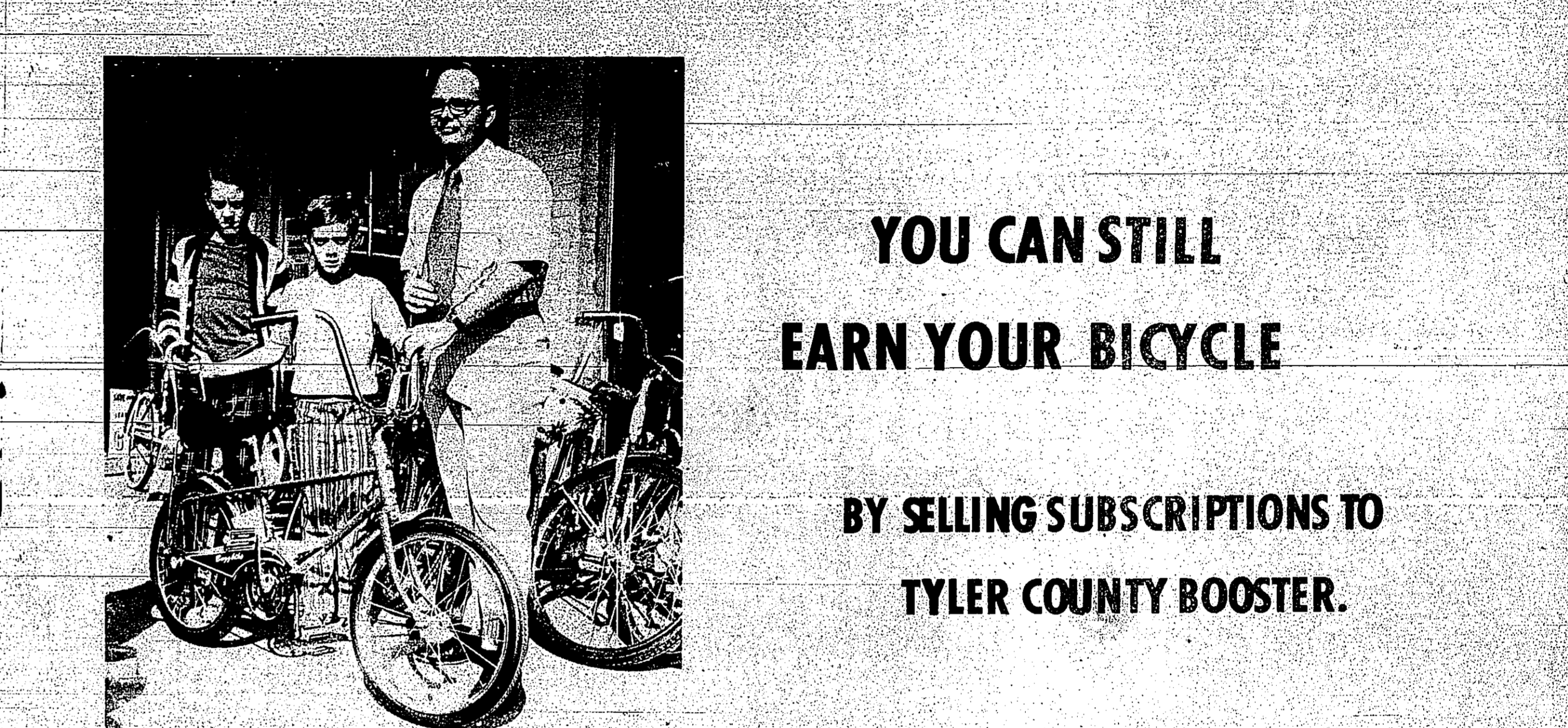

HOMEMAKING HINTS

FOOD SHOPPING HINTS

Shop with a grocery list and make food buying "efficient," says Maurine Mooney, County Home Demonstration Agent.

A key to making a thrifty list, she adds, is checking newspaper ads. Find out what meats, fresh produce, frozen foods and staples are on special, then work them into your weekly menu.

Make the menu as complete as possible so it serves as a guide when planning a shopping list. On the list, jot down items by departments to save steps in the store.

At the market, learn to recognize economical specialties. Then how to take advantage of them. If an item you use, or ten or one that keeps well is on special, it is a good food investment. But buy according to home storage space.

For example, family-size bags of frozen foods are economical, but only if you have a freezer to store them. Keeping frozen foods in the ice cube compartment of a refrigerator will not maintain their quality, since the compartment doesn't provide the degree of temperature necessary for prolonged frozen storage.

Remember price is no measure of nutritional value of food. Even though joint is pleasurable eating, other cuts such as chuck or round provide the same healthy boon at a more economical price.

Large cuts of meat on special often mean a bargain in price per pound, as well as meat for several meals.

Compare the prices of meats and poultry with the number of servings you'll get from each pound. Here's a rule of thumb: figure on four servings from a pound of boneless meat, two servings from a pound with bone-in, and one serving from a very bony choice.

Eggs are one of the biggest budget boosters. A serving of eggs is one of the best buys. They're like a built-in maid service.

Consider ready-to-heat foods when making a shopping list. Some convenience foods cost less than homemade dishes. A serving of canned vegetable soup figures out to about six cents. Compare this to homemade vegetable soup.

Also bear in mind how much your family will eat. A small can may be the best choice for a twosome; it gives mealtime variety yet eliminates leftovers.

When food shopping, pennies do count. Three to four cents off a 25 cent can of beans, for example, is a 10 to 15 percent savings—not bad for a few pennies. Applying this kind of shopping sense can save you as much as \$5 on a \$30 weekly bag of groceries. At the end of the month, that is an extra \$20 in your pocket!

Nearly 2-million pencil-tip erasers alone are produced each day by precisely chopping up long, spaghetti-like strands of extruded rubber compounds. EF also pops out about 60,000 multi-colored eraser tip replacements from its molds in a single day, as well as slicing up rubber sheets into thousands of various block and oblong shaped erasers.

Recently, EF switched from natural rubber to a special synthetic rubber produced by the Goodyear-Tire and Rubber Company.
