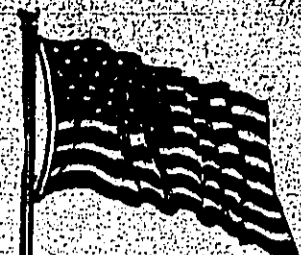

The public may come by to order or place orders ahead of time by calling 428-3303 or 429-3458. They ask that orders be placed Thursday or Friday.

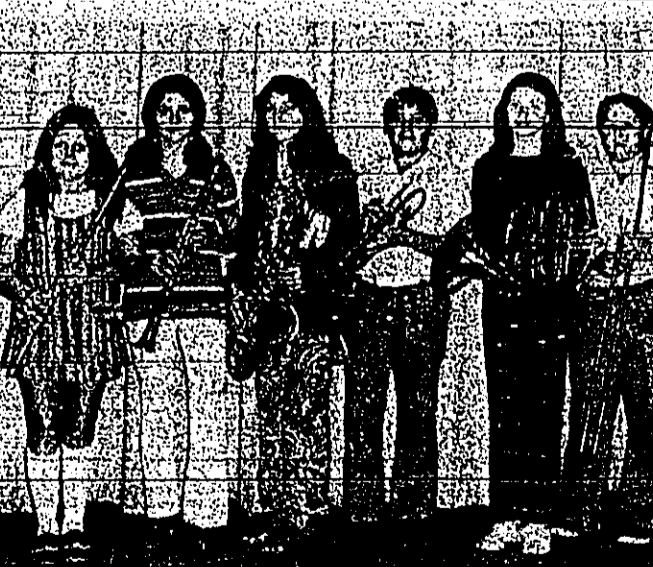

CITY COUNCIL GETS PROPOSAL FOR PURCHASE OF GARBAGE DISPOSAL

The Woodville City Council at its regular meeting Tuesday night had a short agenda of business with the main discussion centering around a proposal by Wright Disposal Service to sell its business and equipment to the city.

The disposal service has a contract with the city for pickup of garbage with the city charging its utility customers for the service on their monthly bills and paying Wright 80% of this charge.

City Secretary Walton Davis told the council that Wright had talked to Mayor Jimmy Freeman and had offered to sell the disposal service to the city for \$15,000. Included in the sale would be a recently purchased garbage truck for which Wright had paid \$10,000 and the two old trucks.

Mayor Pro Tem J. G. Anderson, presiding in the absence of the mayor, appointed Councilmen Leroy Davis and Gardner Parks along with himself to investigate the offer and report

District Court Docket Released

Details Of School Building Program

The board of trustees of the Woodville Independent School District, which has called an \$800,000 bond issue to be voted on December 11, this week released detailed architect's estimates on the costs of the various items in the building program for which the bonds will be used.

The board had earlier consulted with the architectural firm of Moore, Stanbury and Vaughn, Port Arthur, to make preliminary plans and prepare estimates on the costs. The firm has prepared these estimates which show a \$320,000 outlay at Woodville Elementary School, \$386,000 on the Kirby High campus, \$33,500 at the athletic field, and \$60,000 for estimated legal work and bond sales and \$45,000 estimated for architect fees.

On the Woodville Elementary Campus, proposed classroom additions and improvements are:

- (1) Addition to main elementary building to house grades 1-4, including 17 classrooms, 6 restrooms, two faculty rooms and corridor, \$222,000.
- (2) Repairs of main elementary building including new roofing, insulation and auditorium ceiling, \$13,500.
- (3) Remodeling certain portions of main elementary building including conversion of shop into library, homemaking laboratory into a group teaching and visual aids laboratory and a health service station for the school nurse, and the conversion of the present library into special type classrooms, \$16,000.
- (4) Covered walks to connect all buildings and paving for bus loading areas, \$17,500.
- (5) Furniture and equipment for new classrooms and special teaching areas, \$25,000.
- (6) Remodeling of classrooms in primary building for kindergarten purposes, including carpeted floors and equipment for inside kindergarten and special education activities, \$12,500.
- (7) Outdoor playground equipment for the kindergarten and primary grades and make gymnasium available for indoor play and recreational activities, \$5,000.
- (8) Curb 1420 feet main elementary playground and level play area, \$6,000.
- (9) Provide drainage for primary playground and level play area, \$2,000.

The estimated total, \$320,000. Estimates on the amount to be spent on building, remodeling and repair on the Kirby campus are:

- (1) Gymnasium and equipment, \$258,000.
- (2) Art and chemistry laboratory building, \$31,500.
- (3) Conversion of former art and chemistry laboratories into homemaking department, \$16,000.
- (4) Remodel present Kirby gymnasium for use as a girls' gymnasium, \$25,000.
- (5) Fireproof records storage room at the administration building by the purchase of fireproof cabinets for vital school records, \$5,000.
- (6) Repair ceiling in Kirby auditorium and replacement of fluorescent light globes, \$2,600.
- (7) Concrete walks under existing covered walkways between band hall and rear entrance to Kirby High building (495 feet), \$4,500.
- (8) Replant trim on existing buildings, \$2,500.
- (9) Reroof Kirby lunchroom and paint interior and exterior, \$4,000.
- (10) Asphalt parking areas in front of Kirby High School building and vocational building, \$3,000.
- (11) Equipment for vocational shop, the business department, band uniforms and choir robes, \$20,000.
- (12) Addition to recreation building to provide space for recreational activities of school pupils, \$15,000.

Kirby campus total, \$386,000. Athletic field improvements, totaling \$33,500, are \$25,000 for additional bleachers and press box, \$5,000 for retopping of track, and \$3,500 for additional restrooms for spectators.

With the estimates of \$16,000 for legal and bond sale and \$45,000 for architect's fees, the total estimates on the proposed building and improvement program is \$799,500.

Bonds Will Have No Effect On School Taxes, McGuire Says

The issuance of the proposed \$800,000 in school bonds to be voted on December 11 will have no effect on the Woodville School District tax structure in property assessment or the tax rate, Supt. B. H. McGuire says.

With the increase of the tax valuation of property in the district from 40 to 50 percent of market value, voted several months ago by the board of trustees, the present financial basis is adequate to operate the district including the servicing of the proposed new bond issue, he said.

Future changes in state law or national inflation may produce changes in school financing, he declared, but such changes will be statewide and will not be related to the issuance of the presently proposed bonds.

Public Meeting Slated

A public meeting to discuss the proposed building program to be financed by the \$800,000 bond issue will be held Tuesday, November 23, at 7:00 p.m. in the Kirby auditorium, according to Supt. B. H. McGuire.

Patrons of the Woodville Independent School District are invited to attend the meeting.

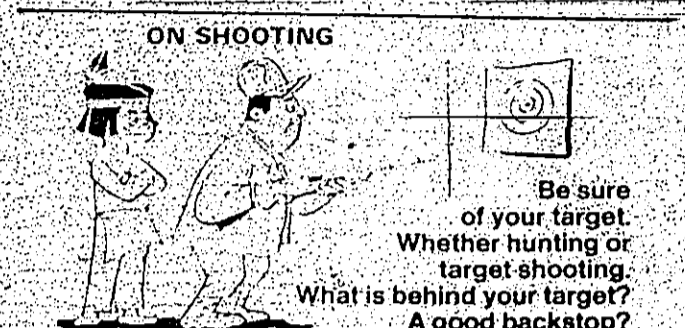

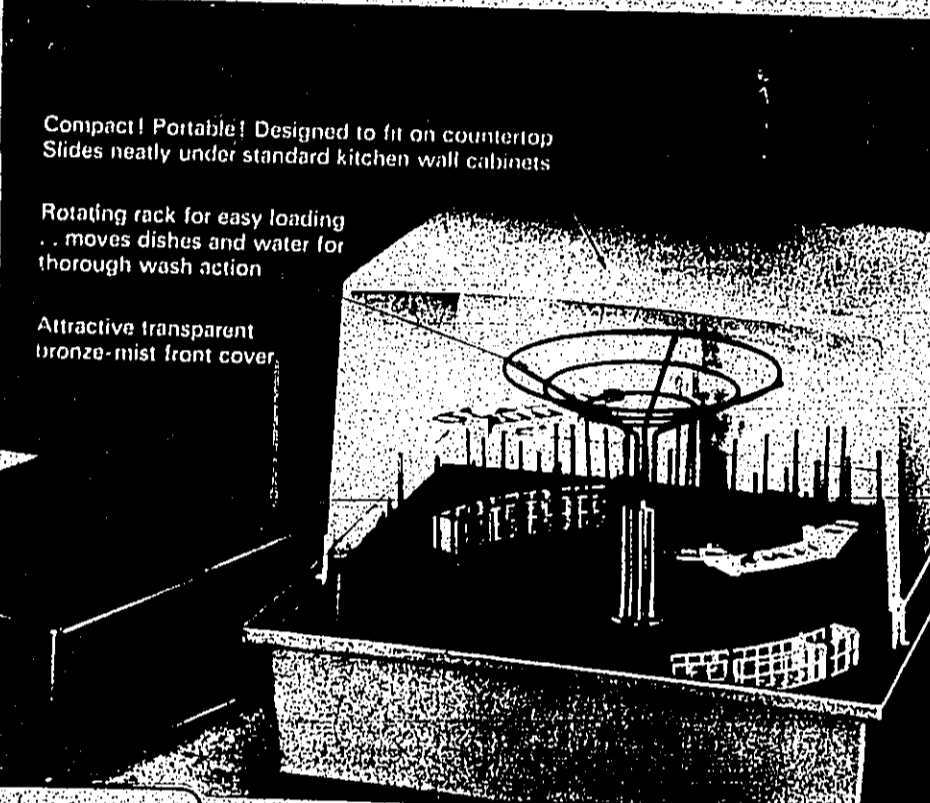

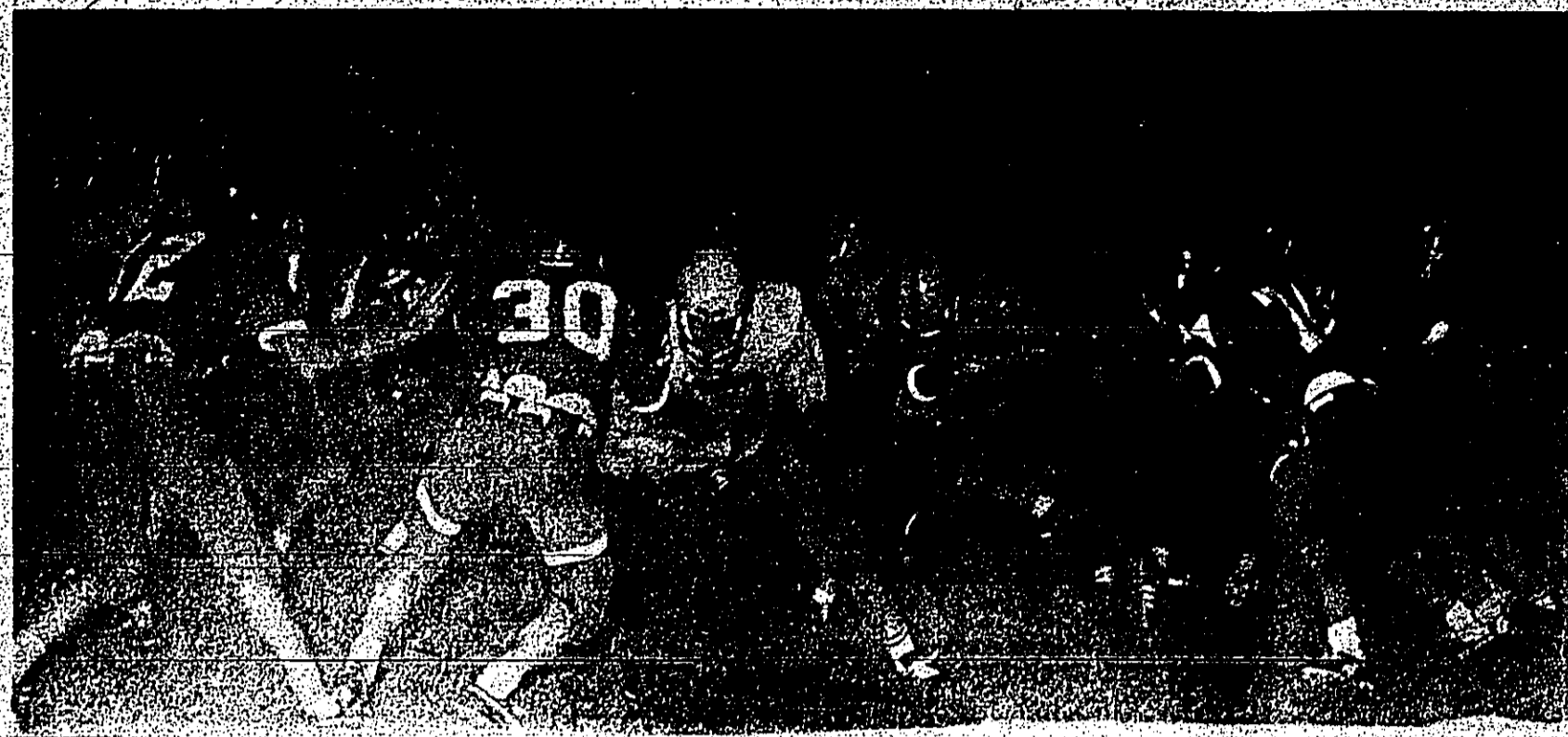
