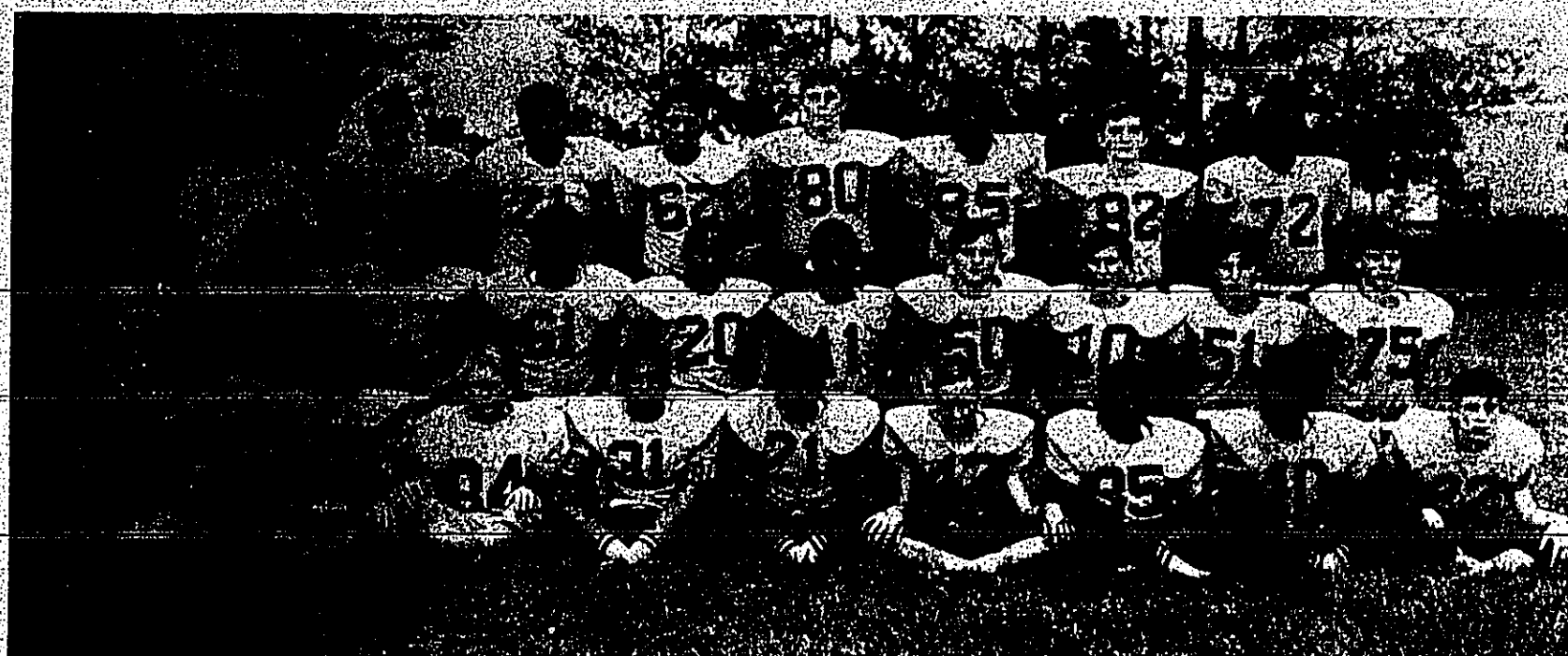

VOTE AGAINST School Bonds Election December 11, 1971

We must educate our children. We will educate our children. We must all face the fact that it does take a lot more money to educate our children. We must develop new sources of revenue through our

legislatures. We cannot impoverish our community. Neither can we sell our youth short. They have pointed out many valuable lessons for adults. Above all we need more citizen commitment.

WHY?



Could this be the reason we need the bond issue for future expansion?

It can't happen here. How often have we Americans boasted that the evils which befall other nations could never happen on our shores?

Remember Hitler. How could Germany have allowed such a man to come to power? It could never happen here, we said.

Remember Hitler's children? The Nazis took over the rearing of the youth from the parents in a massive indoctrination program that produced a generation of fanatics. It could never happen here, we assured ourselves.

Yet today in the United States, of all places, we are witnessing a monumental effort on the part of social planners in government to draw children away from their parents, home and neighborhood environment so that their psyches may be more readily shaped by government experts in the schools.

The action by the Houston Independent School District board of trustees Monday to seek funds for educating four-year-olds next year and three-year-olds the following year is part of this overall program.

Few people realize that child control is here. The Office of Economic Opportunity Bill, the Child Development Act, recently passed by the House and Senate, contain provisions establishing legislation which will remove final authority of parents over their children and place such authority at the federal level.

What are the reasons that every child shall have the right to develop to his "maximum" potential and environment an advocate in every neighborhood who will intervene in family situations whenever he should deem it necessary to guarantee that the child's "rights" be protected.

It establishes councils at the local level to determine policy relating to the educational, physical, medical, psychological, mental health, social and cognitive development of all children. Diagnosis, identification and treatment of barriers to a child's development are now to be a matter of federal concern.

The means of implementing such services, such as funding, designing a program of daily activities to cover every aspect of a child's life from infancy on, are included in the provisions. The estimated price tag ranges from \$14 to \$23 billion.

It specifically provides that children in the area served will in no case be excluded from the program operated pursuant to this part because of their participation in nonpublic preschool or school programs or because of the inclusion of their parents in a roll them in nonpublic schools when they attain school age.

Only a veto by the President will close the floodgates opened by this legislation.

As concerned citizens we must act. It is now clear that the public must give a lot more attention to our schools. We need a realistic school program.

There are many sound reasons why we should vote against this bond issue, which we cannot afford. Every school district that resorts to inflation and deficit spending ends up in big trouble.

Mostly, the school board have gone into everything but the primary needs of the children. We must begin with the ABC's: the basic reading, writing, and arithmetic.

We must take our schools back from the bureaucracy and the money-changers. How can we improve our schools so the youngsters are students, and scholars and not just recipients of money?

How can we take pollies out of the school?

Over a quarter of a million dollars for athletic facilities (what industry in a county designated as a poverty area by those who exploit that government to secure more money).

It has not been too long ago that the Federal Land Bank would not make loans to farmers in this county. We lost our credit. With the rapid expansion of taxes, we soon will be without credit again.

A school board member said that the retired people are rich. They moved here to avoid paying high taxes as they did there. It was a very intelligent statement, when some others do not pay their full share and invent pay.

It has been said, "the government is paying the bill people pay." They are able to vote school taxes. This is a favorable method for state money.

The only people who should be responsible for spending their life savings, and pay taxes, believe that as most citizens that should take an active part in the community. They certainly have a right to the stability of our county. They did not bring children to a community to be educated, but to be a pleasure and a privilege to the future generations without compulsory taxation.

What about the school board? Our school board should be elected through the courtesy of scholars and not just pollies. Why was one purchased out of the school district for \$2,000,000?

Why is not all school property sold, not advertised for sale from the public?

All our real property owners be placed upon the tax roll?

After your deficit financing and spending has taken more and more of our schools resources just for interest alone. We must get the children off the tank. The real need is not a bond issue but a drastic cut in spending until we have the debt.

Many of the so-called "rich pollies" are trying to find ways to avoid paying high taxes. Many of them and some have left the county. The unemployment rate is now 6% and pointing upward. Will someone tell us what happens when you are unable to pay your taxes and are sued by the school district? High taxes in other districts have caused pollies to leave. Then what happens to the economy? Retirees have been caught in a spin. The doctors won't suffer because some of them find out if you can pay before receiving medical attention and hospital care.

Do you remember what we were told when we voted the hospital bonds? They did not bring children to a community to be educated, but to be a pleasure and a privilege to the future generations without compulsory taxation.

Well I got my syrup made last week. I can always remember when syrup was made some forty years ago. Generally one syrup mill would make syrup for several families. The first thing to do was to get everything ready as it would also several days to get through. You had to haul your pine knots to cook it with under the evaporator. Check the mill and grade the logs and get the empty gallon buckets handy.

Then along about the first of November, it was time to get the cane knives and start stripping the cane and topping it and cut it down. This would be put in piles for the wagon and team to pick up and haul to the mill. Along about twilight the fire was started and the black smoke would start rolling out of the smoke stack. A horse was hitched to the pole that he pulled around to start the rollers moving, to mash the juice from the cane. The rollers could take five or six stalks at a time and this kept the person feeding the mill busy. Then as the cane showed up, someone had to take them off. The yellow jackets swarmed in to get some juice.

A good syrup maker had to know just how long to cook the juice to make good syrup. He would make other neighbors' syrup on a percentage basis and after all was over, he would take it to town to sell some and trade some for his winter food and feed for his livestock for the winter months. There was always visitors.

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

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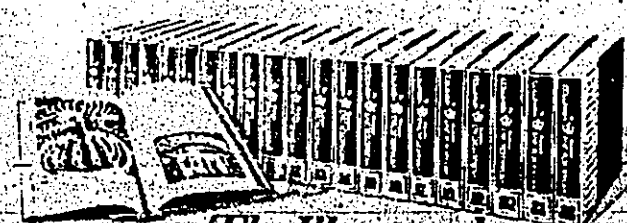
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
