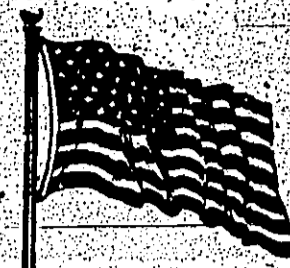

Deer Hunting Has Been Good In County

Deer hunters have had a fairly successful season so far through out the East Texas area under game management regulations. It was estimated last week that around 1500 buck deer had been harvested up to that time in Polk County where hunters seem to be having a little more success than in Tyler County. While no estimate on the number killed in this county are available there have been a larger number of hunters bringing their bucks by the Booster for pictures and, if wide enough, to have the antlers measured for the Booster's wild-rack contest which will run through the hunting season.

Hunters bringing bucks by the Booster office since last week include Toody Dennis, Charles C. Withers of Port Neches, and James R. Mitcham. Withers brought in a 12 point buck with an antler spread of 18-1/2 inches. However, there are four hunters who have entered wider racks in the contest. Gerald Havel of Kowitz leads with 19-3/4 inch wide antlers on a deer killed near Harmony. Still in second place is the 18 inch wide antlers entered by Daryl Ward. Cecil Grimes of Port Arthur is third with 18-7/8 inch wide spread. Tied for fourth place are Luther (Buddy) Brandin of Woodville and H. R. Hennigan of Deweyville. Each brought in an entry which measured 18-5/8 inches.

The Booster contest will close with the end of the hunting season in Tyler County on January 3.

To enter the contest, a hunter must have a legally killed deer and must have killed it in Tyler County. He must bring the buck by the Booster office at 104 South Charlton for measurement and a picture. The deer must still have its tag attached to the antlers.

First prize in the contest is \$50, second prize \$25, third \$15 and fourth \$10.

Students Active In Bond Election

The girl student was a little nervous when she came into the office at Radio Station KVLL Friday because she was doing something new to her, and to Kirby High School students.

"I want to buy some radio spots," she said. It turned out that some Kirby High School students who are reaching or close to the new minimum voting age of 18 decided that they wanted to take a part in the school bond election which was held Saturday. They held a meeting in front of the school after classes were dismissed Friday afternoon and decided to become active in support of the bond issue to be voted on the following day.

Student leaders said that since they will soon be voting (and some are now voting) that they wanted to participate in politics. The bond election gave them their first opportunity.

The students contracted for radio spots in support of the election and some of them taped their views to be broadcast several times Saturday during the election.

One of them said that older

people might not understand but that they, the students, knew firsthand the needs to be alleviated by the school bond money.

And, she said, older people might not think about it until reminded but a good many of the students are not only future taxpayers.

"We felt that since a great part of the paying for the bonds would fall on younger people during the life of the bonds that we should make our views known," she said.

Most of the students at Kirby High would like to continue living in Woodville after graduation from high school and college, and those who do will find themselves paying school taxes—and county and city taxes," she said.

"We are not trying to saddle a debt on the older people," she went on, "any more than we were offering to accept our part of it when we become adults. Any bonds voted will not be paid off tomorrow. They are long-time investments and many of the older people will not pay as great a share of it as some of us will in the years to come."

One civil suit went to trial before a jury this week in 88th District Court and five were settled in court Monday. In addition, Judge H. A. Coe granted two divorces and accepted three guilty pleas in burglary cases. Testimony began in an easement suit, Cornelius Brooks vs. Vernon Gallego.

The guilty pleas were entered by three men accused of breaking and entering five business places recently. They were apprehended after an alert Southern Pacific train crew notified the sheriff's dispatcher of their activities and Night Chief Kenneth Thyssen arrested them just east of the railroad tracks.

Thyssen was joined by Deputy Sheriff B. J. Vardeman and the ensuing investigation connected the men with five entries that night and cleared other burglaries here and in Hardin County.

Judge Coe sentenced Archie Lee Holmes to five years in prison and gave him a 10-year probationary sentence. The other two men, Chester Lee Holmes and John Folley, received four-year concurrent prison sentences.

District Attorney R. S. Coe and defense attorneys gave the jury panel "due to be called December 28 a Christmas present when they agreed a jury would not be needed that week. Judge Coe will be here to accept several guilty pleas and hear any non-jury cases that week.

Voters in the Woodville Independent School District in an election Saturday turned down a proposed \$800,000 bond issue for additional classrooms and repair and remodeling work on existing buildings.

In the unofficial tally, tax-paying voters cast 572 votes against and 421 for the bonds. Non-tax-paying voters cast 51 ballots for and 18 against the bonds.

Sturrock Attends A & M Shortcourse For Peace Justices

E. A. Sturrock, justice of the peace in precinct one, was among 100 justices of the peace who attended a three-day shortcourse Wednesday through Saturday at Texas A & M University.

The shortcourse, sponsored by a grant from the Texas Criminal Justice Council, was designed to upgrade understanding of the duties and responsibilities of justices of the peace, JPs from 34 Gulf Coast and central Texas counties attended.

Seminar topics included judicial ethics, new traffic laws, opinions affecting justice courts, buy a staff member of the attorney general's office, evidence, arrests with and without warrants, and other aspects of justice of the peace courts.

Instructors included Ira E. Scott, chief instructor for the engineering extension service's police training school, who was coordinator; Judge Bill Vance of Bryan, Capt. Dumas of the Department of Public Safety, Tom Bullington, attorney general's office; Judge John Forbes, Arlington; Judge Wayne LeCroy, Lubbock; and Walter Beasley, executive director of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education.

Seminars already have been held in Lubbock, Longview and Arlington and the first part of the series ends January 12-14 at San Antonio. A second 20-hour course is scheduled at A & M on April 12, 13 and 14.

Oops! There Goes Our Office Again

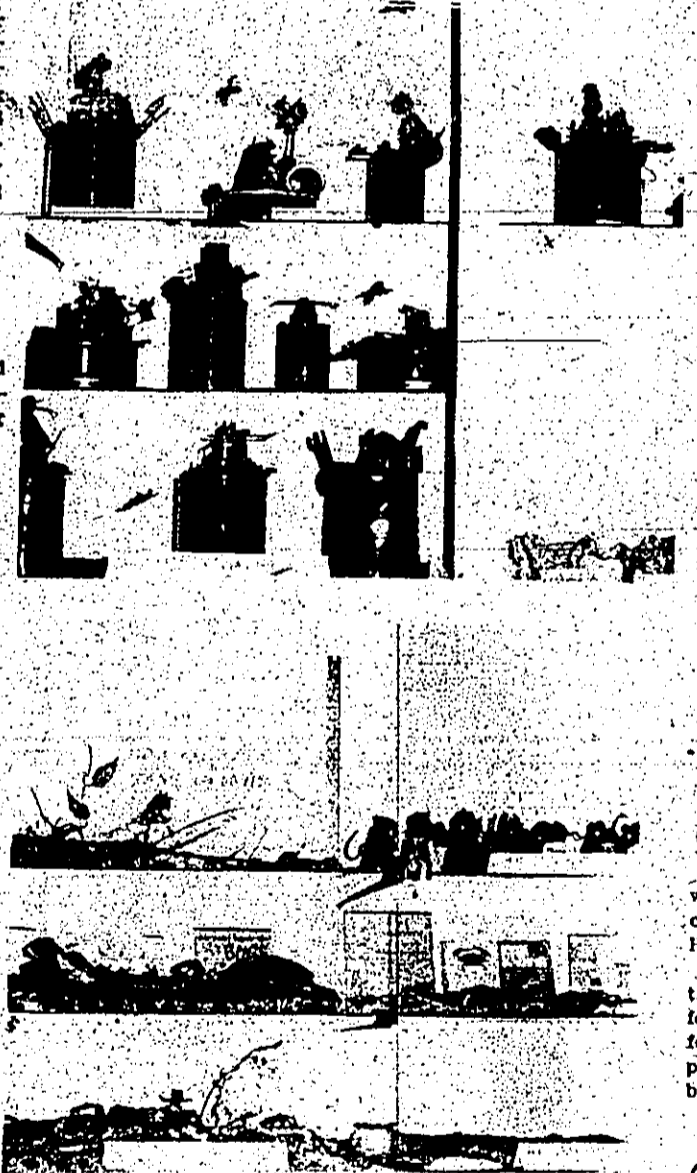
For the second time since United Portable Buildings Company has been in existence the firm has sold its office right out from under its personnel.

'73 Texas Almanac Has Wide Range Of Information

Flowers from the 1970 U.S. Census, a history of the Texas tidelands and many other features are found in the 704 pages of the 1973 Texas Almanac, published by the A.H. Belo Corporation, publisher of 'The Dallas Morning News'.

White data from the decennial U.S. Census are expected to be among the most widely used material in the new publication, editor Walter B. Moore said. He said there are many features not found in the previous edition. Among these are: a history of telephones in Texas, prepared by leaders in the telephone industry.

HOMEMAKING HINTS

COOKING WILD GAME

Game meat adds variety to meals and is high in nutritive value. Game meat is an excellent source of high-quality proteins, fats, minerals, iron, copper, phosphorus and B vitamins.

Characterized by a flavor stronger than that of domestic meats, game meat can make a savory and palatable meal if handled and cooked properly.

The success of cooked game is determined before the animal is brought home. Proper handling, then is essential to flavorful meat, and begins with selection of a good-quality game animal—one that is sleek with shiny hair. A rough, dry coat indicates poor body condition.

After the animal has been properly dressed and skinned, the meat should be aged one week or longer at 40 degrees F. To improve tenderness and flavor. Cut the carcass as for beef, storing boneless cuts in the freezer. Claps, short ribs, bone roasts and shoulders should be boned before freezing. Wrap meat only in moisture-vapor-proof freezer paper.

The method of cooking game meat—whether by dry or moist heat, depends on quality and tenderness of the carcass. Young tender game is best cooked by dry heat, such as roasting, broiling and grilling. Dry heat preserves flavor and tenderness. Braising with additional fat may be necessary if the meat is old and less tender game is best when cooked by moist heat, such as braising, stewing and simmering. Slices steaks and pot roasts are cooked by braising. Add a small amount of liquid to the meat and cook in a covered container.

Stews, stews and braised game are prepared by simmering (not boiling) in hot liquid that partially or completely covers the meat. With moisture, the high temperatures necessary to soften connective tissues can be maintained.

PEANUT BUTTER HAS PROTEIN

The protein in peanut butter is of high quality and is a good complementary food to include as often as possible in menu planning.

Peanut butter also ranks near the top of the food list in energy, fats necessary for body-balance, phosphorus, thiamine and niacin.

Whole or halved peanuts can decorate the top of a butter-cream pie, other desserts and salads. And peanut butter can be used in soup, sauces, gravy, mashed potatoes and milkshakes.

Baked goods that can be made with peanut butter include pies, biscuits, muffins, rolls, cakes, cupcakes, coffee cakes, brownies and cookies.

For something new and different, peanut butter pie crust might be a big hit with the family. Use 1 cup sifted flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup shortening, 2 tablespoons peanut butter and 2 to 3 tablespoons cold water. Cut shortening and peanut butter into sifted flour. Add just enough water to form dough into a soft ball. Wrap in wax paper and chill about 15 minutes. Roll and shape into fluted crust.

Bake 10 to 15 minutes in a 400-degree oven. For the filling, try a peanut butter chocolate and peanut butter butterscotch pudding. Garnish with finely chopped peanuts.

From Mrs. Santa's KITCHEN

PECAN FRUIT CAKE 5 egg whites, 1/2 cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 pound candied cherries, cut in half, 6 cups pecans (cut in 1/2 if large, small, leave whole), 1 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 pound candied pineapple slices cut in 1/8 using green, red and yellow 1/2 cup flour.

Beat egg whites until stiff. Beat in gradually 1 cup sugar and vanilla. Sift together and stir into meringue the 1/2 cup flour, salt and baking powder. Combine fruit and pecans. Stir over this 1/2 cup flour. Mix this into egg white mixture. Pour into greased 10 1/2 pan and line with brown paper that has been greased. Bake over a pan of water in oven 1/2 to 2 hours at 250 degrees. Drizzle few drops of bourbon on top after cooled if desired. Wrap in foil and put in freezer overnight for more moisture.

THEAT POLYESTERS IN LOWER TEMPERATURES

Washing and drying a polyester will wrinkle-set it too hot or the drying temperature too high. Keep temperatures below 130 degrees.

Wrinkles may be prevented by taking a polyester garment out of the washer as soon as the cycle is finished. For best drying, tumble at a medium or low temperature for just a few minutes to remove excess moisture, then remove from the dryer and hang to finish drying.

If touch-up ironing is done, also keep the iron on a symbolic setting. If the iron is too hot, you'll get an unwanted shiny look.

When a garment becomes wrinkle-set, rewash at the same temperature. This seems to lax the fabric enough to release the wrinkles. Tumble drying also helps remove wrinkles if the garment is removed as soon as the cycle is finished.

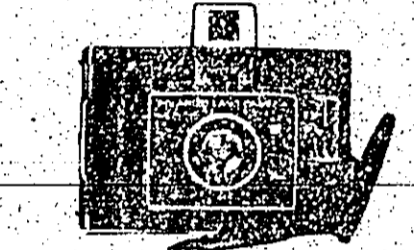

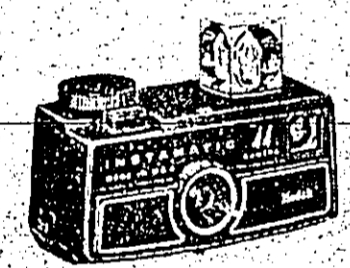

WHERE DID YOU GET THAT CHRISTMAS CUSTOM?

Ever wonder, as you deck the branches of that pretentious spruce, who trimmed the first Christmas tree? Or what folk first discovered the existence of Santa Claus? Or who sang the first Christmas carol? Hang up the first Christmas stocking? Should it be the first holiday mistletoe? First distilled that classic, bassy, sweet ingredient, George Dickel Tennessee sour mash whiskey?

Some Christmas customs are surprisingly recent, while others date back even beyond the earliest Christians. But the Yuletide we know complete with its under-trees, friends calling to admire decorations, and family reunions has existed only for the past 200 years.

To our ancestors who celebrated Christmas, Mass (the Mass of Christ) several centuries ago, Christmas was a time of solemn rejoicing and their religious dedication with little, if any, merriment. The New England Puritans actually forbade to New Year's Eve demonstrations.

New Englanders and others in America were not until the late 17th century followed the lead of New York's Dutch settlers and succumbed to the charm of St. Nicholas, a better-known, kinder, gentler Santa Claus. But the jolly god had a fourishing career long before he reached our shores.

More than 1,600 years ago there was St. Nicholas, a Turkish bishop whose countenance was depicted with a beard and a mitre. He had a legend in his own life-time—arrived in Antioch, a land in the eastern part of the Roman Empire, where he was the patron saint of children and of three orphaned boys. He used to give them gold coins to buy food.

Look into windows as well as out of them when you build or remodel a house. They're not only important for the appearance of your home, but its comfort, convenience and maintenance, as well.

Of course windows should harmonize with the architecture of the house, but each window also should be functional for the area it serves.

For example, basement windows are frequently preferred above a kitchen sink because they're easy to operate and their length, bay and bow windows add light and additional space to a room, as well as a more generous view of the outside. For privacy, awning windows placed high on a wall are ideal.

Curtainless or homemaker's today there are complete factory-made window treatments available in a variety of materials.

Basic stock window styles include the following types: Double-hung—a two-sash window with one above the other, moving up and down. Casement—the sash is hinged at the side to swing out, and generally is operated by a rotary opener.

Others include: Gliding—the window sash slides back and forth on a curved roller—sash is hinged at the top to open out and provide a shield from the rain. Hopscotch—a window sash is hinged at the bottom to open in, and is often used in basements and attics, but that doesn't move for rooms where light but no ventilation is needed.

All of these basic types can be used in bay, bow, picture windows. They're available with screens, removable grilles, plantation glass or storm panels if desired. Removable grilles are the new way to give windows traditional styling but simplify window-washings chores.

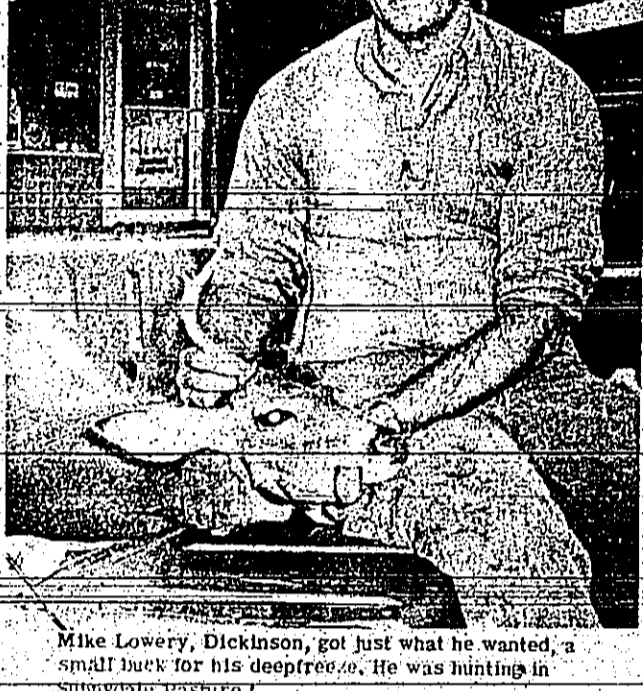

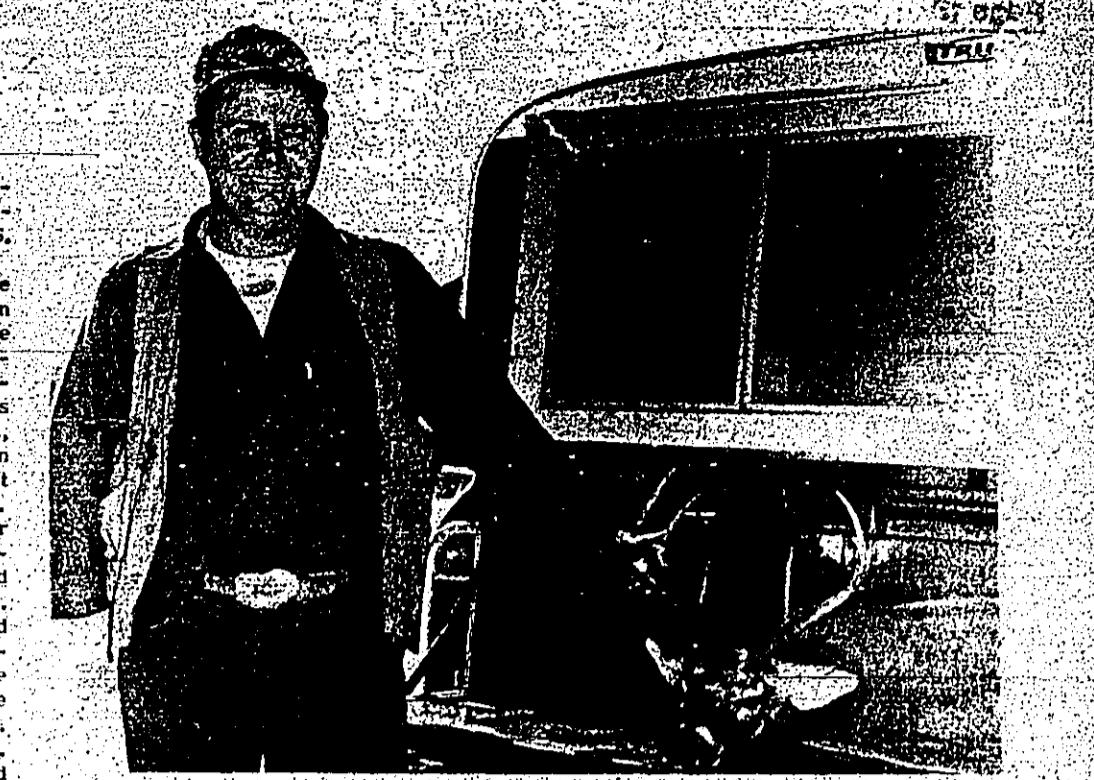

EDA CHECKS CHRISTMAS TOYS FOR SAFETY

With Christmas near, now would be a good time for parents of young children to be thinking about the safety of the gifts they are going to buy. Gifts of toys are taken of love. It is important that they be chosen with care. It is tragic when a toy, intended to bring happiness, actually injures a child.

Protecting children from unsafe toys is one of the responsibilities of the Federal and State Administrations. The Child Protection and Toy Safety Act of 1969, which became effective in January, 1970, empowers the Food and Drug Administration to remove and keep from the market toys and other children's products which are defective, mechanical, and thermal hazards. The law is aimed at reducing the estimated 700,000 injuries from toys that occur in and around the home annually.

Recalls were issued in the majority of the toy-associated injury cases. Other vehicle toys, such as roller skates, sleds, and bicycles were linked with most of the rest of these injuries. Dolls, homemaker items such as sewing machines, and toys involving electrical, mechanical, and thermal hazards. The law is aimed at reducing the estimated 700,000 injuries from toys that occur in and around the home annually.

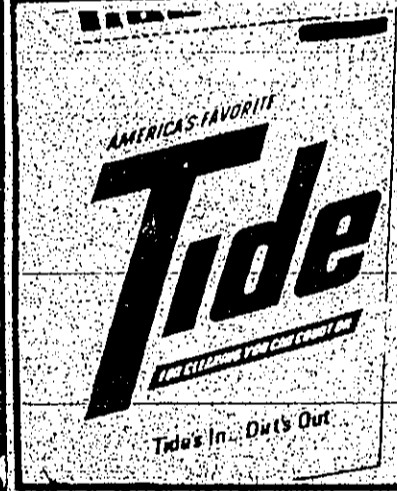

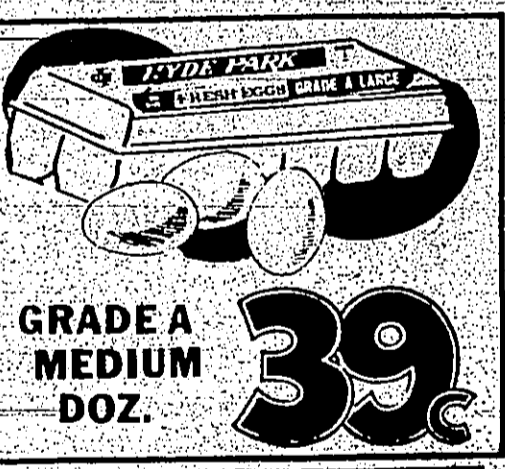
