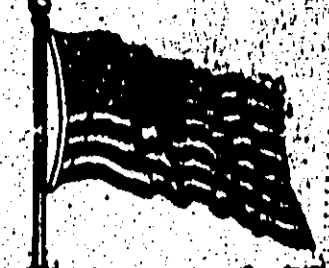

Less than 50 years ago the Federal Government had very little power to intervene in the affairs of the separate states. The federal budget was probably much less than the amount spent these days by the bigger states such as New York or California.

The great depression of the 1930s, worldwide in scope, began the gradual abdication of the sovereignty of the states to the central government. The session of Congress in 1933 passed literally hundreds of laws giving the federal government authority which it had never exercised and as the great depression continued more power was delegated by Congress. In the effort to bring the country back to some semblance of prosperity, until the country entered World War II, the efforts to stimulate the economy had not been too successful.

These thoughts occurred to us as we read of the federal courts' intervening in more and more affairs of the states. The federal judiciary today does not stop with deciding the constitutionality of state and federal laws, as was its primary function prior to the past two decades. The courts now issue edicts to enforce what the judges consider to be the law of the land.

When F.D.R. was president and congress was abdication the powers of the people to the central government many people feared he would be the country's first dictator. This fear was justified by the belief that the Supreme Court stood in the way. Today we have the spectre of a federal judiciary dictatorship hanging over the country. Think about it.

If I am elected, I will do my best for my precinct and what is available.

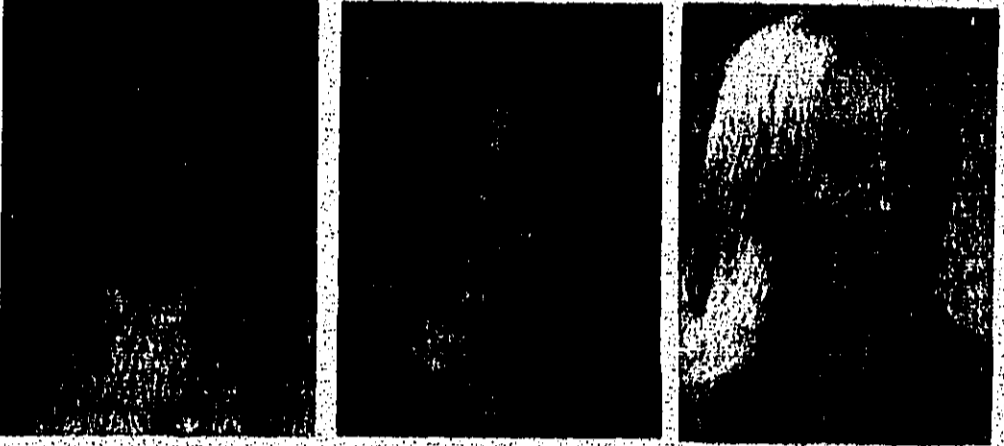
I sincerely seek your support during the months ahead. Hope to meet each of you and if not I will send you a card with my best for each of you.

## New Second District Favors Wilson

A three judge panel in Federal court in Dallas declared the Congressional redistricting bill drawn by the state legislature unconstitutional last week and accepted a plan which more closely follows the "one man, one vote" dictate of the U. S. Supreme Court.

Several incumbent congressmen in the plan adopted by the court will have to face each other in the coming May 6 primary. The new lines for the Second Congressional District were chopped off to the north and shifted to include counties in the west. It puts Rep. Otto Zeigler in the second district and he will be its incumbent congressman. The second district presently is represented by John Dowdy but in the redistricting by the legislature his home county was put in another district. It was announced recently he would not be a candidate.

The plan adopted by the federal court went further and dropped Nacogdoches, Anderson and Freestone counties from the district. In their place the court put Brazos, Robertson and San Augustine.

On the federal court in Federal State Senator Charles Wilson, who has announced for the position, was considered the front runner. However the federal court plan put the 30-year veteran Rep. Otto Zeigler of College Station in the second district.

Observers have expressed the opinion that the redistricting plan ordered by the court will give Senator Charles Wilson an edge because many of the old second district counties in which he is well known, were placed in the district. Zeigler's support is estimated by Zeigler. There are about 90,000 voters in the new second district who were formerly in Zeigler's sixth district while about 200,000 voters remain in the district's old counties. This would seem to give Wilson an edge.

Gov. Preston Smith has indicated that he does not believe a special session of the legislature can come up with a redistricting plan before the February 7 filing date. The plan would have to be approved by the three-judge federal panel who retained jurisdiction. If no federally accepted redistricting action is taken by the legislature the Congressional districts as ordered by the court will remain in effect until the 1980 census.

Another Federal Court has before it a suit challenging the redistricting of the state's senatorial and representative districts. If the court finds these unconstitutional and Governor Smith does not call a special session the court would probably redraw those lines.

The Federal Courts have further clouded the political situation in Texas by ruling that the filing fee statute adopted by the legislature also is unconstitutional. The new fee scale is four percent of the salary of the office and is used to pay for holding Democratic primary elections. Its primaries from contributions and is not affected. 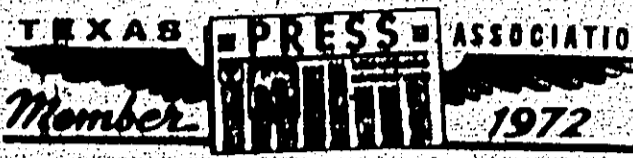
