City Council Approves Homestead Exemption

The City Council of Woodville, Texas, in its meeting of January 16, 1973, providing exemption of \$3,000 from ad valorem taxes to homeowners 65 years of age and older, pursuant to Constitutional Amendment, but in any event not to exceed beyond such age of 70. The General Revenue Sharing Act available to the City of Woodville.

The ordinance provides that in order to secure the benefit of the exemption, the owner shall, between January 1 and July 1 of each year, file with the city tax assessor and collector a sworn inventory of such property owned on January 1 of each year for which the exemption is claimed, and resulting that deed be filed in the public records of Tyler County, Texas. (General Revenue Sharing Act authorized and approved by Board of Equalization upon recommendation of tax assessor and collector) and shall initially furnish proof of age by certified copy of his or her birth certificate or of such person does not have a certificate of birth, then by affidavit of two persons at least five years older than

the exemption claimant with actual knowledge of the date and place of birth or by the original or certified copy of any of the following documents, which must be at least five years old:

- Social Security record, Federal census record, State Census record, own child's birth certificate, Original birth notice in newspaper, School record, Insurance policy, Lodge record, Military record, Passport, Marriage record, Hospital record, Voter's registration record, Church baptismal record, Employment record, or Physician's record.

The City Council also authorized the city secretary to advertise for bids on purchase of a garbage truck to be paid for out of monies received under Revenue Sharing.

Other action taken at this meeting was the setting of the City Officers election for April 7, 1973. There are three alderman posts to be voted upon in this election.

County also approved purchase of 13.348 acres of land from Citizens Land Corporation for site of an additional sewer plant to be built.

Thunderstorms Rake County

Severe weather which swept through Tyler County Saturday night caused some damage to trees and lightning apparently struck power lines causing power failures.

Heavy rains Saturday afternoon preceded the thunderstorms which passed through the county before midnight Saturday and early Sunday.

A transformer on the Chester highway exploded, probably caused by lightning strikes, and caused a four hour power outage in northwest Tyler County. A tree fell across a house in the Cheswood addition in Woodville causing damage to the roof.

Thursday Is Day of Mourning

President Nixon Tuesday proclaimed today (Thursday) a National Day of Mourning for Lyndon Baines Johnson, the nation's 36th president who died Monday.

He ordered all Federal offices closed on Thursday when the holiday was observed.

Funeral services for Johnson will be held in Washington. He called upon Americans to assemble in places of worship and pay homage to the memory of President Johnson.

The Postal Service suspended regular mail deliveries for Thursday and State offices will also be closed in many parts of the nation.

VIETNAM -- CEASEFIRE SET FOR SATURDAY

In a televised address to the nation Tuesday night, President Richard Nixon announced that a ceasefire has been reached in Vietnam.

He said that the agreement initiated by Henry Kissinger called for a "cease-with-honor" and that the terms of the agreement will be strictly followed.

He said the ceasefire will become effective Saturday. On the same day, he said the agreement will be signed by Secretary of State Rogers.

He said that American troops will be withdrawn within 60 days and that all war prisoners will be released. There will be an accounting of all missing in action, too, the President said.

Speaking of former President Lyndon Johnson, who died Monday, the President said that Johnson had wanted it to be the right kind of peace and had given him his support. He said that no one would be welcomed the peace more than the former president.
