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Indian Reservation Receives Federal Grant

The Alabama-Coushatta Indians staged a demonstration in their East Texas reservation home Friday night (April 13) before high-ranking State and Federal officials. Yet, no shots were fired. No property was destroyed. And not even a harsh word was spoken. In fact, just the opposite happened at the banquet which the Indians held to demonstrate their appreciation to the Local, State, and Federal governments for helping the Tribes achieve their goal of total self-sufficiency through their tourism business.

A grant of \$2,000,000 from the Economic Development Administration for the final phase of the Reservation's tourist development was announced by U.S. Congressman Bill Archer from Houston, who praised the Tribes' efforts in working through the legislative system to obtain aid to help themselves.

"This grant is a true milestone in our history," said Emmett Battise, superintendent and second chief of the Reservation. "The objective of our tourism program, of course, has always been to develop job opportunities for Tribal members and enough revenue so that the Tribal Council can administer Reservation programs independent of all State and Federal aid."

"Now that we have the money needed to complete our tourism business, thanks to the EDA, we feel confident that our total self-sufficiency can be achieved as early as 1978."

The EDA grant will be used to complete the development of the Reservation's tourist attraction, which was started in 1965. Besides the construction of an outdoor amphitheater where an original historical play about the Alabama-Coushatta Indians will be performed, the money will also be used to construct a combination washateria-grocery store-service station, an arts and crafts factory, a sewage treatment plant, a complete camping facility, new activities for guests, and to improve the Reservation's water utility system.

Highway Patrol To Stay In County, Captain Russell Says At Hearing

Captain Bob Russell of the Beaumont District of the Texas Highway Patrol assured Tyler Countyans at a meeting in the district courtroom last Thursday morning that the Highway Patrol "will always be here."

The meeting, which originally had been set up between local county officials and Russell, was attended by a large number of persons some of whom expressed concern that the patrol would be pulled out of Tyler County.

Humors were rife before the meeting that the patrol would be pulled out of the county because of complaints made against the patrolmen stationed here. The complaints, which were not aired during the meeting, were reportedly made to Russell by top officials of the county.

However, a Booster reporter in County Judge Tom Mann's office the previous Tuesday heard a telephone conversation in which Mann told Russell that he had no complaints against the patrolmen "as far as my court is concerned."

Russell told those at the meeting Thursday that, "one in this county has authority enough to bring about the transfer of a highway patrolman. If he obeys departmental rules then there is no reason for a transfer."

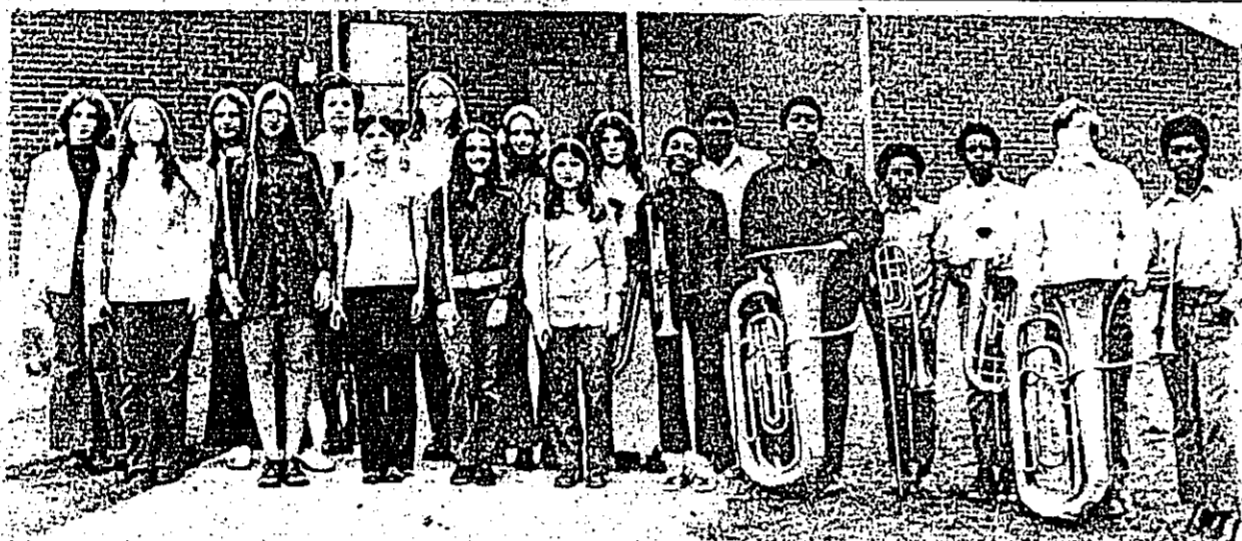
Captain Russell said that all complaints are investigated by the department.

Drug Central Program Organized In Area

Some twenty-one persons from throughout the Deep East Texas region have formed a Drug Central Steering Committee, to work on a regional Drug Central Program for the 13-county Deep East Texas Region.

Serving on the committee are Lume Thomas, Dr. Lee Popejdy and Mike Penry from Jasper, Tyler County Judge Tom D. Mann, Brian J. Kelly from Crockett, Mina Echols from Rusk, Joe Hignett of Siblee and Don Braun of Colmesnell.

Citizens, probation officers, educators and law enforcement officials have been expressing concern over the growing problems of drug and alcohol abuse in the 13-county region. The steering committee was organized at a Drug Central Workshop held recently in Woodville in the hopes of combatting some of these problems.

Present at the meeting in Woodville, which was attended by some fifty area residents, were Al Giles and Howard Pharr, from the Texas State Drug Control Program; Ed Spears, president of the Drug Central Workshop; and Gene McCollum received 58 votes.

The Vocational Industrial Clubs of America provides leadership, citizenship, and vocational industrial training for high school youths enrolled in the trade, industrial, and technical occupations.

The 25th Annual VICA State Convention is in Fort Worth on April 27-28, 1973. The Convention is devoted to providing competitive activities that foster the development of leadership and occupational skills. Contests, both technical information and skill, will be conducted in over sixty different industrial trades.

The highlight of the State Meeting and activities will be the Annual Award Banquet Program.

This Silver Anniversary will also be celebrated with many former members from the beginning of the organization. Past Presidents will be honored at a reception on Saturday, prior to the awards banquet, along with the founders of the organization.

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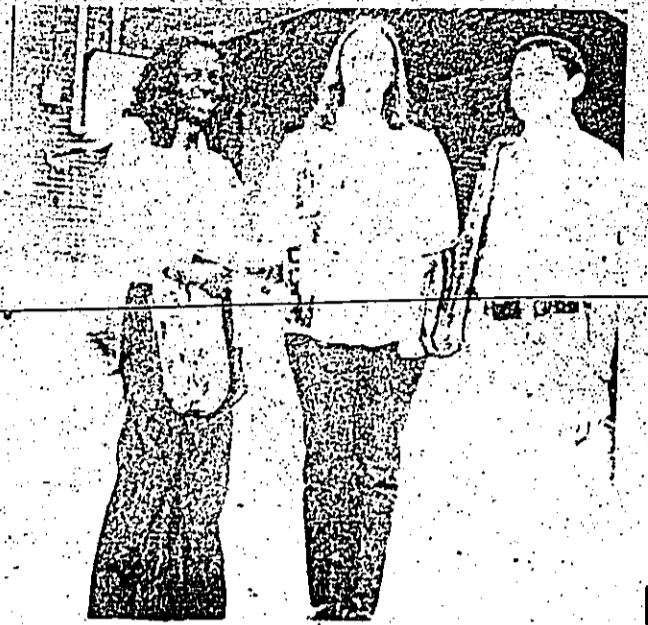
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Kirby High Band Winners In Regional Contest

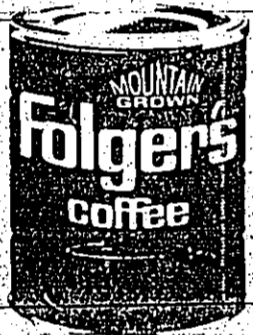
